For years now Oliver has had the dubious distinction of being a "white man's" town, and any Oriental who was so unlucky as to set one trembling foot on the soil was immediately informed that he was as welcome as the plague. If a warning did not suffice there were always enough stout hearts about to organize suitably effective strong arm methods.


Now, however Oliver's peaceful, tight little world lies shattered — or almost shattered. A Japanese — a resident of Canada for over 30 years — has actually had the nerve to purchase property and has moved his Canadian-educated family onto the land he owns.

All sorts of things are being whispered about. parently, the Japanese has gathered a huge pile of wood that, lighted, conceivably could serve as a beacon to bombers Trail-bound. In fact, he seems to be setting about ordinary

The Japanese may stick to his wood piling and his land clearing, and also to his own business, which is more than his neighbors seem to be able to do. But it is possible that he will be in for an uncomfortable time.
