

INFORMATION AND COMPLAINT.

The information and complaint of J.E.Murchison, of the townsite of Steveston, taken this 1st day of August, A.D., 1904, before the undersigned, saith that he hath just cause to suspect and believe and doth suspect and believe that one Maede, a Japanese, of the townsite of Steveston in the said County of Vancouver, within the space of ten days last past, to wit: on the 31st day of July Oltimo, at the townsite of Steveston, in the County aforesaid, did in and upon one William Scott commit an assault thereby occasioning to the said William Scott actual bodily harm, contrary to section 262 of the Criminal Code of Canada.

Police Court. (Before G. .. Corbould, Esq., Police Magistrate.) steveston, 8th August, 1904. there have you been duping the fishing denson? Te Kary, Maede and Komena (Japanese) charged with having, at Steveston, on the 31st day of July ultimo, assaulted Wm. Scott, thereby occasioning the said Wm. Scott actual bodily harm. feint recollection of it. Mr. T. Shoebotham for the prosecution (Municipality of Richmond). Mr. Joseph Martin, K.C., for the prisoners. F. Evans sworn as stenographer. Q. New Long did you remain there? A. Lell, I have a diserrecollection of being in there about an hour or so. Mr. Martin states that the prisoners consent to be tried summarily, and also consents to have the whole four tried at the same time with regard to the assault on Scott. I have a faint recollection of it, and at soom to be very Q. Where were you on that evening? A. I was at Steveston. Q. Were you at the Star Hotel at all? A. I believe I then was there, yes. C. What time did you go to the Star Hotel? A. Somewhere round about the hour of 10 o'clock. Lant Q. How long did you remain there? A. Well, I have a recollection of being in there about an hour or so. - Q. Did you see any weapons, knives or anything of that kind?
- A. No, not to my knowledge.

- Q. Those wounds you have you got on that occasion? A. Yes,
- your Honour. In the bar when this assault happened.
- cut in the back. I did not think there would be any trouble
- O. It was sufficiently severe to render you unconscious?

 A. It did put me to sleep for sometime.

- Q. Had not medical aid arrived? A. Yes. artin
- Q. You say you were rushed so fast that you were not able to detect those who rushed you? A. Who came to my right, no.
- O. Did you see after maede went away at the time you wrestled with him, see him after that at all? A. Yes, he came back there and looked in and went away again. I believe,
- I ---, that is all I seen of him.

 3. Did he say anything to you at the time? A. No, he did'nt say nothing to me.
- Q. How long would that be after you wrestled with him?
- A. I guess 15 or 20 minutes.
- Q. How long would that be, this time he came back and looked in, before the Japs. rushed you? A. It was half an hour afterwards before the Japs. rushed between 20 minutes and half an hour.
- Q. You see those men sitting there, Mr. Scott? A. Yes sir.

- Q. Do you recognise any of those as being the assailants?
- in fact I am satisfied To Kary is not one with the men because we were standing there having a friendly drink together when this attack came.
- Q. Which is Te Kary? A. That gentleman there (indicating).
- Q. You are satisfied it was not he? A. Yes.

- c. You did not anticipate being rushed by the Japs. when they came in? A. I did'nt think there would be any trouble at all. I thought it would pass over -- a friendly bout, no harm at all about it. I was explaining to Te Kary at the time the rush took place, there was no harm about it.
- Q. Did you see any weapons or anything like that flash?

- A. I did nt see no weapons flashed in front of the bar. If
 there was any weaponsk flashed it was after I got through

Q. You are stopping in Steveston at the present time? A. Yes

Q. I am not going to ask you about your own wounds except you were wounded. You see the four men? Will you tell me whother you saw any of those Saturday night or early Sunday morning? A. I am positiv I saw this man.

Al I want you to be sure. I don't want you to take any shances, but to be satisfied? A. I would not like to swear

that I am positive.

O. Now tell me where you first saw Maede. Where was he coming from-where did you see him?

A. The first I see him he was coming at me outside.

O. Do you know from whence he came-where he came from

when he came at you? (Shows witness plan.) You were not in the building when you were hurt? A. Just outside the building, right in front of the hall door on the sidewalk.

Did you see any Japs. coming from the building on to the seen.

coming from the dining room from the saloon. I stepped in the door to see the racket.

Q. Now, what did you see? A. Well, I seen them coming out.

There was a lot of men in there making an awful racket, and when I see them come out a couple or two or three, I could'nt say for sure whether two or three Japs. and one white man.

I was then rushed by two or three Japs., I don't know which, into a corner through the swinging doors. Q. You were forced through the swinging doors -- is that out towards the front door? A. Towards the front door, yes sir, into a corner on the left, that is, on the left from here, right up against where the glass doors is, in that corner. The outside doors, they were shut. I then noticed Scott and some Japs. in the xx other corner. Q. Opposite to you? A. In the right, opposite me, inside of the swinging doors; then--- your gun? A. Yes. Q. That did you do then? A. Well, I noticed the dining room door open and a glass dish came flying through. Indi dodged and it struck against the wall. At the same time these Japs. were striking me with that part of their fists (indicating) with their heads down and coming this way. They struck me here and here and on my shoulder. I forced my way out of there with my club backwards, got out backwards through the swinging doors and got out and turned into the har, because I noticed Japs. were after me and I backed re down to see where officer hipp was or what he was doing.  A. He had a big gash in the back of his head here; that is what I noticed at that time. It seemed to me from here (indicating) right away down to his neck here, and the other man he took his both hands and held it together because he was lying in a pool of blood. The man held it together until the doctor arrived.

And you remained there until the doctor arrived? A. The second time, yes. Y's, I went out with the officer before that.

Q. But a moment ago you said Maede? A. Well, I don't know the name Maede from any other.

Jap. mandade that night? A. The first time I noticed him, Mr. Martin, so as to recognise him properly was the time he came in front of me and threw out his arms.

O. You had not seen him up to that time? A. He might have been there but I could not positively state.

O. What did you mean by telling us Scott was talking about having thrown him fairly? A. Yes sir, a Japanese.

O. And that Maede, you said, came up and said "Well, let us have a drink?" A. Well, in my evidence—the first of my evidence—I did'nt say that. I made the mistake of saying Maede in replying to this gentleman, but when I started in I did'nt say Maede, I am sure/ I said a Japanese, and they wrangled afterwards.

O. Did you understand the Jap/, who came up and said "Let's have a drink an way", was the man Scott had been wrestling with?

A. I don't know sir. I don't know who he had been wrestling with. I did'nt come in until afterwards.

- Q. That is long before you over came to that part at all. You heard it read. Mr. Shoebothan asked you to look carefully at these men and then having done so you said That is the man' pointing to the man called Macde? A. Yes.
- O. Referring to him as the man that came up to Scott and proposed to have a drink? You withdraw that? A. I withdraw saying I am positive this is the man, sir.
- a few minutes ago, are you repared to stick to the other, that he was the man that had his hands up? A. Yes, bucause I was looking him right square in the face.
- Q. And you say that is the man? A. That is the man to the

best of my knowledge and belief.

1. Do you think he was or was not in there when the drink was ordered? A. I tell you I can't positively say.

C. All you know is it was a Jap., A. Yes sir, it was a Jap. We were standing sideways when this dispute was going on and they went to the bar to have a drink.

Q. How can you so deliberately say so -- it was the man"? Can you over do that? A. No sir, I can't; it is a mistake; it was a Jap.

Q. Woll, isn't it better for a man not to come here and swear - - - A. Well sir, I was positive and when you corrected me I gave my correction as well as I could.

Geo. Brennan sworn saith as follows:-Examined by Mr. Shoebothem:

Q. What is your occupation, Mr. Brennan, where do you live?

A. My house is in Blaine.

. Where are you living at the present time? A. StevestonX.

1. You are a fisherman, I believe? xxx A. Yes.

(. You rememb r, 1 suppose, a week Saturday last -- were you at the Star Hotel? A. Yes sir.

Q. And I believe you were in an altercation with some Japanose? A. Yos.

C. There did you first get into the altercation with the Japs--inside or out? ... Well, I think it was inside.

Q. Before you got into the xxxx altercation inside, did you see Scott inside? A. Yes sir.

G. Standing whore? A. We were stanling at the bar drinking.

Q. Were you there at the tim of the friendly wrestling bout? A. Yes sir.

Q. Between hom was the wrestling done? A. Between Mr. Scott and the Japanese.

- Q. Do you know the name of the Japanese? A. I do not.
 Q. Do you recognise him among those there sitting there
 beside you? A. Well, I would not say for certain by looking
 at him. I only seen him for a little while, therefore I
 would'nt be certain. This man here (indicating) resembles
 him, I think.
- Q. That man resembles him? A. That first man.
- Q. He is known as Maede. Is he the man with whom the wrestling took where place? A. Yes, that is the man as far as the best of my knowledge.
- Q. Yes, that is the man you would take for him? A. Would take for him, yes.
- Q. How long did he remain there? A. Well, it was Mr. Scott threw this man fair and square and then he went out.

Q. Just tell us, as shortly as you can, what you saw and what took place there? A. Well I don't know so far I as saw very much about it. I came in there just as the Jap.

Q. Then evidently you went there after the first wrestling bout?

A. Yes:

- Q. Did you see any at all at any other place? . Yes, I saw them down in the Chinese house No. 14; there was a couple of Japs.came in there, seemed excited and they took 5 or 6 Japs. out with them.
- Q. Can you recognise among those who are sitting there any of the Japanese that went there? A. Well, this man here that came in and done the talking in Japanese, I don't know what he said.
- Q. Who is that -- Maede? Where was this China house that he went to? A. No. 14.

This is the Jap., The Kary. He said "Come and have a drink." I said alright, stepped to the bar and took a cigar. After I took a cigar I stepped back into the door again, going into the card room into the bar. Scott still stood on my right hand and there was a Jap. standing --

Q. You were going out here and Scott was standing this way Q (illustrating)? A. When I came into the bar first I said to the Jap., as soon as I got through the door into the bar, "What is the trouble?" and Scott started to tell me. This here Te Kary he steps up and said "Come and have a drink, Mr. Frank." So I said alright, thinking maybe it would stop it. So I stepped to the bar, took a cigar, stepped back, went to light it; I had the cigar in my mouth and Scott was at my right hand. I was standing in the centre of the bar and there was a Jap. at my left. Brennan was standing in front of me while Scott was talking to him. This Jap. and Brennan got into an argument. I turned to them and told them to stop--did'nt want no more row. About the time I got the words out of my mouth this Jap.called Brennan a pretty strong name, called him a son of a bitch; "you son of a bitch", and as he did Brennan hit him and then the crowd came in and one of the Japs. went after Mr. Scott.

Q. Can you recognise him? A. Yes, it was this man Maede here. He went right after Scott, the minute he started he made right straight for Scott, and the Japs. came in there

so lively it was hardly time for a person to think; and this Maede followed Scott right up along the bar and got him into the corner. In the meantime Deasy was off that way, off near the door going into the dining room and he was in a scuffle. I turned round and saw him pull Maede from Scott. As he did this there was two or three other Japs. took hold of him and he caught hold of one Jap. and threw him back and when he did so I grabbed him and he took hold of my arms and through the tussie I got a bottle of whiskey in the back of the head. The bottle broke and the whiskey ran down my clothes and it did not put me to the floor but kind of dazed me. I kind of staggered off to one side up against the bar and when I hit the bar I put my hand round to my hip pocket for my gun. I could see what was going on all the time but I was kind of dazed and could not do anything myself from the blow I got on the head.

A. Well, this man here (Komena) I think was in the fight there, but I would not swear positively whether he was or not.

Well, we went back down to the hotel and this is the first man that I noticed (Te Kary). When I went in there the bar room was full, pretty nearly full, pretty much all white men, I think, but I could not tell you who was in the bar, outside of the police officer, and Mr. Scott was lying in the corner in the office. Dixon was lying in the side of the bar room on the floor and they told me Scott was the worst -- I had better attend to him first. I requested them to carry him out in the card room and put him on the table. They did so, and on examination I found a scalp wound a little to the right of the median line of the head, right at the top of the head here, extending down that way (indicating) about midway between the top part of the back of the ear and the middle of the head behind, about two inches long and down to the skull. Just in front of that, and a little to the left of the middle line of the head, there was another and slight scalp wound, but not as deep--about two inches long and straight along the front of the head; a little to the inner side of that another one started and came down to the front of the forehead like that and turned to the side. I dressed these wounds all first. After I got through with them, there was some blood on the back of his neck and on examination I found another wound, on what we call the xxxxxx A. In your op nion they were knife wounds anyway? A. Knife

seventh cervical vertebra -- that little lump at the back of the neck just on the side of the prominent bone here. I dressed that also.

- C. Any wounds on the face? A. Yes, there was also a wound on his face running from -- I think it is -- I don't know whether it is the right or left side of the face; I think it is the right side, running from the eye down past the corner of the mouth.
- Q. Did you require to use your needle? A. Yes. Q. How many stitches did you require to put in? A. Oh, well, I could not tell you. I think I put four stitches in the first wound, this one in the back of the head. I think there was three in this one right on top of the head, and either
- three or four in the front wound, his face wound, I think there were four or five stitches in that and the neck wound
- .. What nature would you consider those wounds, dangerous?
- A. I consider them all scalp wounds -- no, not dangerous as
- Q. Sufficient to incapacitate him? A. Yes, for a week of tundaxxx ten days, probably a little longer.
- Q. He has lost considerable blood, I believe? A? Yes.
- Q. What kind of instrument would you - A. I claim
- it was a knife that did all the wounds.
- Q. And that is all you know of the fracas? A. That is all
- Q? You attended Dixon also, I believe? A. Yes.
- Q. Could the wounds be made, doctor, with a knife of that description that you saw? A. All of the scalp wounds could be made with that, but I don't think they were made with as big a knife as that. I don't think the neck wound was made with that. All the scalp wounds might have been made with a knife like that, but not the neck wound.
- Q. In your opinion they were knife wounds anyway? A. Knife wounds, yes.

Cross-examined by Mr. Martin: -

- O. Don't you think they could have been made by any sharp instrument, doctor? A. No, I don't think so.
- Q. Why not? A? Well, any sharp instrument, if it is similar to a knife, but not with a hatchet.
- Q. But that knife, whatever you call it, is very unlike an ordinary knife, isn't it? A. Yes, but still that knife-the scalp wounds could be made with that knife.
- Q. Because it has got a sharp surface, that is the only reason, isn't it? A. And it would have to be made with an instrument similar to a knife because it was made with a sharp thin instrument from the nature of the wound, and the wound was clean cut.
- C. The hatchet might have been sharp and thin on the kxxxx blade? A. No, if made with a hatchet it is more of a blow, not cutting and the edge of the wound is more likely to dip in.
- Q. Supposing in striking the blow you used the hatchet like a knife and cut with it? A. No, I would not say a hatchet could make the wound at all; a hatchet drawing that way would have more tendency to tear.
- Q. It might, but supposing it was curved round the corner like that; instead of having a square corner, a slight curve like that edge? A. I don't think it is possible for a man to hold a hatchet firm enough to make a wound as regular as it was.
- Q. You don't think so, but if it had a good sharp surface?

 A. But a man would not hold a hatchet in a racket of that kind sufficiently straight and firm.
- Q. It could be done? A. It could, if he was a good artist and had a pretty firm hold with the hatchet he might probably do it.
- Q: The surface of the hatchet would do it? A. I would not swear. I never saw a hatchetm of that shape you speak of and handled that way, and I don't know what would it would

make.

- Q. You never saw a hatchet with a square edge or rounding a little? A. I never saw one with a rounded edge. If they produced the hatchet I would be in a position to swear whether it could make the wound or not.
- Q. In the absence of the hatchet it would depend upon the shape? A. Yes, a square pointed hatchet could not make the wound, that is sure.
- Q. You saw Maede's arm? A. Yes.
- Q. Last Monday night? A. Yes.
- Q. It was bruised quite a little was it not? A. Yes.
- Q. And more or less blood would likely have come from that maxxx bruise? A. Yes.
- Q. That is on his elbow here? Xx A. Right about here, on the arm (indicating), as well as I can remember.
- Q. Outside of the elbow? A. Yes.
- Q. (Court) The wound in the back of theneck, was that made with a knife? A. Yes, must have been made with a knife.
- Q. Not with a hatchet? A. No; a hatchet could not make a knife wound; it was impossible to make that with a hatchet.
