Dear Mr. Alexander,

I would advise that telegraphic instructions have now been received from the Department regarding licenses to fishermen of Japanese origin. These are to the effect that there will be no reduction this year in the number of fishing licenses, other than the assistant licenses, or as they are commonly called, boat puller licenses. In the case of these, the reduction is twenty-one per cent and the numbers available in the several districts are as follows:

District No. 1 (Fraser)	179
District No. 2: Skeena	68
Naas	1
Other points District No. 2,	a total of 1 only.	
District No. 3,	1 only.	

The instructions are further that the requirements of the Japanese returned soldiers engaged in salmon gill-netting must be taken care of from the above quota. It is therefore being arranged that 26 salmon assistant licenses, in the Fraser river area, for instance, will be reserved for the returned soldiers.

Dear Major Motherwell:

This will acknowledge with thanks your letter of February 4th, your file 11-5-20, advising in connection with the instructions received by you from your Department regarding the issuance of licences to fishermen of Japanese origin in 1939. It is noted that boat-puller licences will be reduced this year by 21%. It is also noted that the licences issued to Japanese returned soldiers engaged in salmon gill-netting must be taken care of from the quotas.
