Dear Major Motherwell:

I have for acknowledgment your letter of May 15th, your file 10-5-1, wherein you inquire whether an applicant must be a British subject before being granted a licence to operate a fish collecting boat. I have to advise that licences are not required under the Provincial Fisheries Act to operate fish collecting vessels. Fish-buyers, however, are required to have a licence. Fish-buyers may operate from vessels or from shore stations. There is nothing in our Act which requires a fish-buyer to be a British subject before he may be granted a licence.

You will remember telephoning this office a few days ago regarding a report that Japanese Cod fishermen were operating at Tofino without licences and with as many as two or three men to a boat.

Unfortunately the closed period between Vancouver Island and the Mainland expired at the end of last month so there was little opportunity to investigate while fishing operations were being continued.
