Dear Sir:

Further to your request of January 26th for information on herring, cod, etc., this is to advise that this Department has no published information on these species such as was forwarded to you on the salmon fishery of the Province. I am, however, forwarding under separate cover, a copy of the Department's annual report which will indicate to you statistically, something of the various fisheries of the Province.

In passing I might mention that herring are caught off the coast of British Columbia largely in purse-seine nets. The vessels used in this fishery run to about seventy-five tons nett, and carry a crew of seven to ten men. Cod are taken on nearly all parts of the coast and are caught with gear similar to halibut gear or with hand lines.

Soup-fin sharks are caught off the coast of British Columbia principally by the use of modified halibut gear and the vessels presently engaging in this fishery are mostly halibut fishing vessels which are tied up during the winter months. This fishery is comparatively new and has been brought about largely due to the increased demand for vitamin bearing oils, as the war in Europe has dried up the former source of this commodity.

If you are interested in following news of the industry I would recommend that you subscribe to the "Commercial Fishermen's Weekly," 163 West Hastings St., Vancouver, and/or the "Western Fisheries" published by the Roy Wrigley Printing Co., 818 Richards St., Vancouver, B. C. This latter is a monthly publication.



This Committee was constituted by Order in Council, P.C. 288, January 13th, 1942, for the purpose of implementing an effective plan to transfer impounded Japanese fishing vessels to new owners, who must be Canadian citizens, other than Japanese origin.

Prospective purchasers should be experienced fishermen, who propose using the vessels in the Fishing Industry of British Columbia. They should negotiate directly with the Japanese owner of the ship they wish to buy, or with his representative.

Descriptive details of vessels are available in the offices of the Committee, which may be freely examined by those interested.

When an agreement for sale and purchase has been made by the Japanese owner and buyer, the details of the transaction should be submitted to the Committee, and, if approved, the transfer of the vessel can be promptly completed. If an agreement cannot be reached between parties, the Committee will arbitrate the differences.

Only outright sales, enabling transfer of title of vessel, will be approved by the Committee. In the event of a purchase involving term payments to the seller, the balance to be paid, must be secured by mortgage.

Permits for inspection of vessels under negotiations, will be issued jointly to owner and prospective purchaser when there is reasonable prospect of an agreement being reached.

.

To prospective purchasers living at a distance from Vancouver, the following procedure is suggested:-

When a specifically desired vessel is known, as well as the name and address of the owner, direct negotiations should be carried out in accordance with the procedure outlined above.

Where the vessel is known but not the owner or his whereabouts, the Committee's offices will assist in supplying the information.

In the case of fishermen not having any specific vessel in mind, but desiring to purchase one or more of the impounded vessels for active fishing service in British Columbia waters, he should write this office, giving the following information:

- (a) Type and size of vessel required.
- (b) What class of fishing he primarily proposes and the probable general fishing location.
- (c) Amount of cash payment he is prepared to make.
- (d) What terms are required for the balance of total purchase price.

With this information on hand, this office will endeavor to have Japanese owners of suitable vessels communicate directly with prospective purchaser.

All communications should be addressed to the Committee.

ORDER NO. 25.

WHEREAS under and by virtue of the powers conferred on the British Columbia Security Commission by Orders of the Governor-General-in-Council P. C. 1665 and P.C. 1666, both dated the 4th day of March, 1942;

AND WHEREAS by Order of the British Columbia Security Commission dated March 20th. 1942, all fishing and angling permits in Coastal and Inland waters of Canada to any person of the Japanese race were cancelled and it was further ordered that no further licenses or permits for fishing or angling in any such waters should be issued to any person of the Japanese race;


AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to prohibit all persons of the Japanese race including children under eighteen years of age, who are subject to the Orders of this Commission from fishing and angling in Coastal and Inland waters of Canada.

NOW THEREFORE pursuant to the Orders conferred on the Commission IT IS ORDERED:-

No persons of the Japanese race shall
fish or angle or use any means whatsoever
to obtain or remove fish from any
Coastal or Inland waters in Canada.
