In connection with the recent death of one Fumiko Shirakawa at Bridge River on the 26th ultime, who died from pneumonia under circumstances which indicated according to the
Coroner's report that she only had one visit from a doctor,
the following report from the Coroner is submitted for your
information:-

three hundred Japanese residing at Bridge River at the present time, and approximately 400 at Minto City about 30 miles away. At the time this death occurred there was no doctor available to serve these people and so far as I am aware they are still without a doctor. Dr. King, of Bralorne, now cares for Pioneer residents as well as those of Bralorne, and with two hospitals to operate as well as his daily calls has no opportunity to visit these communities.

"May I suggest that urgent representations be made to the Security Commission in this connection."

Herewith report of Inquiry into death of the above deceased. In view of the fact that no medical practitioner was available to certify as to cause of death, Dr Hewitt the only Doctor who had been in attendance having proceeded to eastern Canada I felt it advisable under all the circumstances to make an investigation.

May I call to your attention that there are some three hundred Japanese residing at Bridge River at the present time, and approximately 400 at Minto City about 30 miles away. At the time this death occurred there was no doctor available to serve these people and so far as I am aware they are still without a doctor.

Dr King of Bralorne, now cares for Pioneer residents as well as those of Bralorne, and with two Hospitals to operate as well as his daily calls has no opportunity to visit these communities.

May I suggest that urgent representations be made to the Security Commission in this connection. Yours very truly, Voucher in favour of myself is attached hereto.

as Pneumonia. He instructed the parents to keep the patient in bed for at least two weeks. Cough was relieved by medicine supplied by the doctor, he also left a number of Frosst's 217's and a bottle of Sulfathiazole tablets with instructions as to their use. There being no local medical practitioner deceased was cared for solely by relatives except for the one visit by Dr Hewitt. Early Sunday morning deceased got out of bed and proceeded to bathroom, this despite Doctor's instructions that she was not to be allowed out of bed. On the Sunday morning deceased had stated that she felt quite well, but shortly thereafter collapsed and died. Deceased was the adopted daughter

of Mr & Mrs Nishi, who are Japanese born, but naturalized.

The Father is confined to his bed as the result of a stroke suffered three years ago.

Statement of Sennosuki Nishi and Shizu Nishi, Bridge River, B.C. foster parents of above deceased.

The deceased was adopted by us sometime ago after the death of her mother. About thhree weeks ago she caught a slight cold, and could not get rid of it. about ten days later she stayed in bed with it, but got up and was about the house at intervals until about three days ago when she went to bed and stayed there. At the request of the Security Commission Dr Hewitt of Pioneer visited her on Friday, July 24th at about 8.30 a.m. at that time he was on his way to the coast. Dr Hewitt stated that she had pneumonia, that she was very weak and we should keep her in bed for at least two weeks. He said that he would drop in again in about a week's time. The Doctor gaveher medicine to stop the cough that was bothering her, and also some pills to be taken as he directed. There was no apparent change in her condition until ax just before she died. On Sunday morning, July 26th when we first saw her she seemed to be in the same condition as on the previous night. Just before 9.30 a.m. she suddenly became worse, moaned slightly and died. Her general health had been good, she had had colds before, usually at the time of changes in weather, but had never before had to go to bed on account of illness.
