#### Adderman Wilson: Dear Sir:

As you are also interested in this Japanese problem perhaps you would be able to interest some Gov't. official in the following.

For the past number of months, many Japanese at Steveston, have been wearing Japanese Naval caps, some of the younger boys at the Public School have also been wearing them. To-day a young Japanese Man passed through the street of Steveston, and he was wearing a Japanese Army Cap (like the one's I have seen them wearing in pictures of the war in China.

It seems to me that there should be a stop put to this sort of thing at once. The younger Japanese generation are very disrespectful, in fact intollerable at times. Are they allowed to fly a large Jap flag on the center pole of a fishing boat that has just been launched, even altho' the British flag is on the boat?

It would be most educational for any good Canadian to visit the town of Steveston, wakk down the dykes, and check on the property owned and worked by these people, and to note it is as close to the River as they can get. Also wait beside our Lord Byng Public School until school is out, and note the enormour percentage of Japs - a large number of which come from the North each year, are boarded with other families and attend this school taxes free.

Dear Harry;-

I have typed out the rough memorandum attached, from whih you may be able to get some ideas that co-incide with your own. It is difficultof course without fully understanding law, and international agreements to say just how these ideas should be put into force in some cases, but where there is a will there is any a way and surely our Civil Servants can work out some fair and equitable method to take care of the problem of those already here with fairness to Canadians as well as the Jap.

With regard to your suggestion of Birth Control, in view of Quebec's attitude and the weight they have in the Government a change of terms to training for Canadian homemaking could mean the same thing, but no-ome could take offence; further Canadian born Japanese should be restricted if they wish to stay in this country to marrying Canadian born Japanese girls, there are plenty of them, and they are already amenable to training as homemakers instead of brood sows.

There should also be some law regarding child labour and wife labour, as that is oncof the chief difficulties in the market gardening field, the wife and children all putting in hours on the farm, and to the employment of children under 15 during summer holidays and other school holidays

Sorry that pressure of work at the office, does not allow me to devote more time to this, but if there is any other slant on which I can be of service to you, just let me know

#### Japanese (or Oriental Problem.

This can be divided into two sections.

(a) Those Japanese legally admitted, and Japanese born in Canada and considered Canadians but without rights of franchise.

(b) Further immigration from Japan.

(a) Those already here or who may be born here.

The problem created is the ratio of natural increase in comparison with the natural increase of the white population.

Fair opportunity within Canada, yet restrictions that will prevent control of any industry in any Province passing from control of the whites to the control of the Japanese.

Rights of Land ownership or leasing.

Where Orientals have become primary producers, rights of sale of products, i.e wholesaling or exporting must be through legitimate white organizations, and no dummy or anizations ostensibly white, but controlled by orientals to be permitted Education of Canadian born orientals to be in Canadian public schools.

National schools not to be permitted to cater to any child of school age, as it is believed that the educational load on the child in the public schools is sufficient to occupy the school hours of a growing child.

To prevent abuse of the above, and yet permit religious freedom, a limited time to be set that cannot be exceeded in any one week where the children may go for instruction in their ancestral religion.

Special training for oriental children in Canadian economy both political and financial with a view to inculcating Canadian standards of living.

In the high school special courses for oriental girls in eugentits, and homemaking, this to be a compulsory course to be taken by all oriental students before being permitted to leave school.

Nights schools in English and Canadian economy and standards of living for all orientals under thirty five and who have not been educated in Canadian schools. Attendance compulsory until a test showing satisfactory knowledge shall have been completed. This to be financed by Dominion Government in all centres wherever there are twelve or more available to form a class. (a special levy on the oriental in the form of a special income tax might be made to cover this.

Returning to their ancestral home to enter military service or Government service shall debar from reentry into Canada. This to apply to all nationalities, only exceptions to be where a permit is issued by "ederal Government before leaving and to be based on definite premises, i.e., training for consular service, trade service, or as special representatives of their Home Country's exporting firms, such re-entry to Canada to be granted then only for the period the person is engaged in that service for which permit to enter is granted.

Ratio to white population to be set, i.e. that is if there are thirty thousand Japs in B.C. to-day against say 750,000 population that there be restrictions against this ratio increasing either by natural methods or immigration, and thatany increase in this ratio in B.C. will be dealt withby moving the surplus to other Provinces or repatriation to Japan, allowing the **paraph** Hapanese to decide which they accept, Dominion also to set a limite beyond which ratio of Japanese to total population shall not be permitted.

Rights of living on Fish boats in organizad areas (i.e. areas where there are schools,) or where there would be a sufficient number f children to warrant a school to be denied to families with children, and control of buildings which may be used as domiciles.

I feel that the Japanese here have to be given an idea that there is some opportunity and fair treatment, and this should be worked out. They strike me as a similar problem to the Jews in the old days, they were denied access to every occupation, but they found that money was powerful and whoever could loan it could get power, and so despite all restrictions they managed to get powerful through money. The human being

under supression will either die, or find a way out, and the survival of the fittest means that they gradually do become a power by overcoming conditions.

It would appear to me that the oriental must be spread among more activities, and protect the whites by the ratio method; the control of berry growing, point oes, general garden truck and greenhouses has passed to the Oriental, this control should be broken, the same applies to fishing, and certainly to the peaceful penetration now taking place in our forestry and mining. As long as International trade demands that we trade with other nations we must trade, but the trade channels to that nation must be in the hands of our own nationals and not their nationals living in our country.

**General simulgration** With regard to the Japanese here all adults should be called up and compelled to swear to one allegiance, and definitely agree that they renounce all allegiance to the country of **migin** origin after being in this country one year, at theend of which time they can elect whether to live in this country, or if not they should be returned to their own country, even at our expense. I do not mean they must accept citizenship with voting rights, but they shall abrogate their obligations to their country of origin, and further agree to whatever service this country may call fhem for in the event of war or national emergency. This should apply to all nationalities.

Wherever the childron of foreign nationals **pressive** predominate, and they cannot be absorbed by intermrriage, there should be a special educational levy to at least pay for the teacher cost of these children while in school, that is if their parents are not already paying a land tax or resident in a dwelling paying a land tax equitable to that occupied by an average white family.

As a matter of fact no nationals in this country should be granted privileges any greater than is granted our nationals in their country. On this basis the Imperial Japanese Government should surely not complain of a diplomatic commission arriving at a basis of equal privileges, without anyone claiming that there is discrimination.

Immigration Further immigration should of course be stopped immediately, unless the Canadian Government want to accept the immigration only for the Province of Ontario, with no rights of change of residence.

STUDENTS. A student should be defined as one coming to study at a recognized University or theological college, and should be here for periods of study only.

A system might be arranged whereby High School students could be admitted only on an exchange basis, i.e., that where a Japanese can arrange for a white high school student to take one to three years in Japanese High Schools we might permit the exchange in our high schools, but purely on a basis of one for one exchange.
