The City Properties, Licenses & Claims Committee met on Monday, May 23, 1938, at 2.40 p.m.

1. RE B.C. SOCIETY FOR THE PREVENTION

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OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS. A delegation from the above-noted Society appeared before the Committee in connection with the question of humane extinction of animals at the City Pound, and a report on this subject by the City Veterinarian was submitted.

Recommended that the report of the City Veterinarian in connection with the method of destroying animals at the City Pound be approved.

2. RE AMENDMENT TO POUND BY-LAW.

The License Inspector submitted a report pointing out that under the existing conditions of the Pound By-law animals must be kept 48 hours before being destroyed, and suggesting that this restriction be removed. Recommended that the City Solicitor be instructed to prepare the

necessary emendment to the Pound By-law indicated in the premises.



Heather Street on May 15, 1938, be settled in full for the sum of \$17.32, in accordance 3 with the recommendation of the City Solicitor.

Recommended that the claim of J.B. Donatt, being the cost of repairing 6 the claiment's cer damaged by a loose plank in the lane of the 800 block, E. 7th 11. RE CLAIM: J.B. DONATT. Avenue, be settled in full for the sum of \$3.66, in accordance with the recommendation 7 of the City Solicitor.

12. RE LOTS 21 and 22, BLOCK 65, D.L. 185, The City Solicitor submitted a report with regard to a claim made by SOUTHWEST CORNER OF GILFORD & ALBERNI ST.

Herbert W. Green for illegal trespass, arising out of the use by city workmen of the above-mentioned property for the storage of lumber, etc. Recommended that the claim of Herbert W. Green in the premises be 12 settled in full for the sum of \$25.00, in accordance with the recommendation of the City Solicitor.

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13. RE WATER LOT ADJOINING CARDERO STREET END.

The City Solicitor submitted the following report:

"In April, 1937, the City obtained a 'license to use' a water lot adjoining Cardero Street-end from the National Herbours Board. Paragraph 3 of the 17 agreement provides as follows:

'The Licensee may use the licensed premises for the purpose of serving the Western Airways by providing access to their lending float in Burrard Inlet for the Public, and for no other purpose

It was also provided that all structures, erections, materials and 21 supplies, articles, effects and things at any time erected, brought, placed or being upon the said lands shall be entirely at the risk of the City in respect of loss, demage, injury, destruction or accident, from whatsoever cause arising.

Inasmuch as the Western Airways are now non-existent, at any rate so for as operating an airplane service from Vancouver to Victoria is concerned, the 24 use for which the City obtained this license to use is no longer existent, and I would suggest that it be in the best interests of the City to terminate the license. This 25 can be done by giving thirty days' notice to the Board."

RECOMMENDED that the License by the City of Water Lot adjoining Cardero Street-end from the National Harbours Board be terminated, and that the 27 City Solicitor be instructed to serve the necessary 30 days' notice on the National 28 Harbours Board.

14. RE CONDITIONS IN ROOMING HOUSES DUE TO NON-OBSERVANCE OF PROVISIONS OF CIVIC BY-LAWS.

Whereas this Committee regrets the loss of three children's lives in 31 a recent fire at a rooming house situated at 2024 Triumph Street, and whereas reports would indicate that the number of people occupying the building was detrimental to wholesome, healthy living.

Whereas a coroner's jury investigating the circumstances brought in a verdict reading in part:

'We recommend that the license issuer should not grant a license permitting any building to be used as a tenement or rooming house until inspected and approved by the City Health Department, the Fire Department, and Building Department.

Therefore be it resolved that the Health Department, the Building Department, and Fire Warden's Department confer with the License Inspector and City Solicitor with a view to improving by-laws governing such conditions; further that this matter receive expeditious attention to prevent a repetition of this tragic 39 event in many similar buildings existing at present.

15. RE INSPECTION OF ROOMING HOUSES. Recommended that, at the conclusion of the Committee meetings today, the License Inspector, the Building Inspector, the Fire Chief, the Medical Health Officer and the City Flectrician go out with as many aldermen as possible to inspect 43 the rooming house at 2024 Triumph Street, recently damaged by fire, and also the rooming house at 1778 Powell Street, to see at first hand what is going on with a view of 44 improving conditions with respect to sefety and health.

#### 23. RE GLASS AND TIN CONTAINERS AND SCRAP PICKED UP FROM DUMPS.

Alderman Gutteridge stated that when the Grandview Viaduct is opened, visitors coming into the City by this route would see men on the dumps gethering screp end junk and this would not be very desirable. She also stated she had been informed that some of the containers so wathered were sold to very small manufacturing concerns and were not always thoroughly cleaned and sterilized before using, and so constituted a health menace.

Some doubt was expressed by other Aldermen as to any individual or individuals selling food stuffs in such containers, and at the suggestion of Alderman Gutteridge it is recommended that the Health Department be requested to submit a report as to any knowledge that the Department may have as to the disposition and use of glass and tin containers picked up from City dumps.



Martin (Engineering Dept.). The report sets out the distribution of parked cars at such times on the streets, boulevards and parking areas. Four schemes are suggested for the alleviation of the annoyance and inconvenience to residents in that vicinity and the obstruction to traffic which results from the large number of cars parked on the streets and boulevards. The report was accompanied by a detailed plan of the area affected.

Recommended that a copy of the report by the Special Committee on parking conditions in the vicinity of Hastings Park be sent to the Exhibition Association, with the request that they study the report and give consideration to the recommendations contained in Scheme Four. It is desired that arrangements be made, following the Exhibition Association's study of the report, for a joint meeting of the representatives of the Association and the Traffic Commission to endeavour to find a mutually satisfactory solution to the problem.
