1. Acting on instructions of the Officer Commanding, "E" Division, the writer, accompanied by Mr. D. Hanford of the Dept. of Labour, proceeded to Slocan City, B.C., for the purpose of serving Orders, signed by Mr. J.F. MacKinnon, Commissioner of Japanese Placement, on the following Japanese families to proceed to Neys, Ont. not later than November 8th, 1946. Transportation was supplied by the Dept. of Labour.

2. The writer and Mr. Hanford left Vancouver, B.C. at 7:30 A.M. on October 29th, via Spokane, Wash., and arrived at Slocan City, B.C. at 8:30 P.M. on October 30th. The party stopped enroute at Passmore, B.C. where three Orders were served.

3. Six of the Japanese men in question were employed by the Burns Lumber Co., Passmore, B.C. and one at Vallican, B.C. and two residing with their families at Slocan City, B.C. The families of the six men at Passmore are still residing in the Government Project at Slocan City.

4. On October 30th, the writer and Mr. Hanford, accompanied by S/Cst. Forbes, proceeded back to Passmore, B.C. where Mr. Burns, owner of the Burns Lumber Co., conveyed the writer and party, by truck, up the mountain to where the other three men were employed. The party returned to Slocan City at approximately 5:00 P.M. same date, when the wives and children over sixteen years were served with their Orders.

5. The Orders issued on [REDACTED] and his wife were cancelled on the advice of a long distance telephone call from Mr. J.F. MacKinnon. This Japanese is a skilled tradesman and it would be very hard to replace him at this time. If he was taken out it would institute closing down that operation and throwing fourteen other people out of work. Word was left with the Burns Lumber Co. that [REDACTED] hand his Order and his wife's Order to Mr. Adams, Supervisor of Slocan City, as soon as possible.

6. No trouble was encountered in serving these Orders. The Japanese did not give any impression to the writer as to whether they would ask for repatriation or go East on the dates specified in the Orders.

SET FOR

7. The Order to be served on the Japanese working at Vallican, B.C. was not served owing to a heavy snowfall and road conditions made it impossible to proceed to that point. However, this Order was left with Cst. McKernon to be served Saturday morning as subject would be

be returning to Slocan City at that time to remain with his family over the week-end.

8. The writer and Mr. Hanford proceeded to Vancouver, B.C. on November 1st, 1946, stopping overnight at Spokane, Wash. and arriving at Vancouver in the early A.M. Sunday, November 3rd.

1. Further to the writer's report dated October 15th, 1946, please be advised that information has been received, at this office, that out of the eight Orders served only two families have complied by going East.

2. The Order on one family has been cancelled as they have now requested voluntary repatriation to Japan.

3. Orders on the remaining five families had to be cancelled owing to the wives of the men in question reporting sick to the Doctor in charge at Slocan. On the recommendation of the Doctor at that point, one of these families will definitely not be going East. The remaining families are now in a position to travel.

4. Mr. J.F. MacKinnon is issuing new Orders to these people to leave next week.

1. With reference to instructions of the O.C. Lethbridge Sub-Division dated the 24-6-46 appended to Edmonton C.I.B. report of the 20th June 1946, please be advised that [redacted] was located on the farm of August MANN at Picture Butte on the 25th instant.

2. Subject stated that he wrote to the placement officer of the Department of Labour at Winnipeg advising him of his present whereabouts and requesting permission to remain here for best work in Alberta.

3. I served the order on [redacted] from Mr. Pickersgill, Japanese Placement Officer, dated the 7th June 1946, directing him to return to Mafeking, Manitoba. Subject stated he did not have sufficient funds to return but if he were allowed to return via Edmonton he could obtain money from his brother-in-law, [redacted]

4. In order to facilitate his return to Mafeking, [redacted] was given permission to return via EDMONTON and he left Lethbridge on the 6.15 P.M. train C.P.R. for Edmonton on the 26-6-46. He will arrive Edmonton at 6.30 A.M. of the 27-6-46 and will leave there via C.N.R. at 10.30 P.M. of the 29th June. This delay at Edmonton is due to train schedules to Mafeking and whilst in Edmonton his address will be 10028-94th St.

5. Subject will arrive in Mafeking, Manitoba at 2.15 A.M. of the 2nd July travelling via Saskatoon, Sask. The N.C.O. or Cst. In Charge Swan River Detachment is being advised by Air Mail that subject is enroute and will arrive at Mafeking on the date and time indicated.

6. Communication of the Comm'r Japanese Placement dated Vancouver June 7th 1946 is returned herewith.

Pursuant to the authority vested in me under sections three and six of Order-in-Council P.C. 946 of February 5th, 1943, I, the undersigned Commissioner of Japanese Placement, do hereby order you to proceed by rail forthwith to MAFEKING in the Province of Manitoba and there to report upon arrival to the Superintendent in Charge Woods Operation, Manitoba Paper Company, for employment.

Notwithstanding the provisions of any other Order or Regulation made under the aforesaid Order-in-Council and except as herein provided, you are hereby forbidden to travel a distance of over fifty miles in the Province of Manitoba or cross any Provincial boundary line into any other Provinces at any time hereafter until further advised, without first having obtained a written permit for such travel from a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

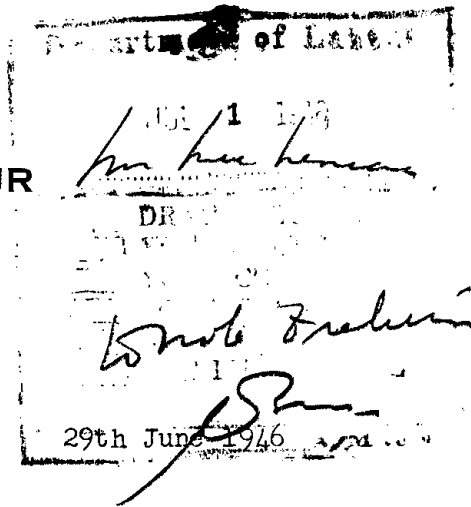

Re: ISSUING OF MOVEMENT ORDERS FOR TRANSFER
OF PEOPLE EMPLOYED PRINCETON-TRAIL SAWMILL.

Just in case you might receive some wires of protest, I thought you should be familiar with what action we took at Tashme Friday in respect to the issuing of compulsory movement orders.

After investigation, we found that there were a number of men from Tashme who had transferred to the Princeton-Trail sawmills and were actually employed there. These men had previously been employed in our woods operations at Tashme and were on our lists for transfer to Neys, after we discontinued our logging and lumbering operations at Tashme. Their names were placed on our Neys list after they themselves stated that this was where they intended to relocate.

On the strength of our list for Neys, we ordered a special train for their transfer, leaving Tashme Friday. This special train had to be cancelled at the last moment, because of the substantial reduction in the numbers. Only 161 people were transferred to Neys and they went on the regular train.

Unquestionably, the principal contributing factor to the reduction in number was by virtue of these men at Tashme being employed without proper authority at the Princeton-Trail sawmill. We therefore issued orders, to be effective Friday, July 5th, for transfer to Neys of all those who had gone down to the Princeton-Trail sawmills for employment, and members of their immediate family.


We were of the opinion that this was the only alternative, because we knew that a good proportion of the population at Tashme was just watching to see what action we were going to take in these cases. The Japanese superintendent at the Princeton-Trail sawmills admitted to us yesterday that he knew that these men were employed without proper authority.

This mill is owned by Mr. P. Bain. The other day he and his lawyer were in the office in an effort to persuade us to

make exceptions for these men. We had to be frank in stating that we just could not meet their request because of the danger of jeopardising our whole relocation programme. We explained to Mr. Bain that we were most anxious that nothing be done to disturb his permanent Japanese employees, and that we would do our utmost to co-operate in seeing that vacant houses at Tashme were made available on a rental basis, provided that these houses were moved from Tashme to the sawmill site so that the families could move from Tashme.

We believe that since Tashme has been established every cooperation has been extended to the owner of this sawmill. We consider too that it was most unfair of him and his superintendent to hire these men when they both knew that this was being done contrary to regulations. The permanent Japanese employees at the sawmill have been issued with the regular permits, and the operators of the mill are completely familiar with this procedure.

We regretted having to issue these orders. We realise that if we should become involved in court actions which might be necessary to enforce these movement orders, we might get some unfavourable publicity. I believe however, that we have a good defence for these particular actions, and can provide pretty effective replies to any questions. We can assure you that it will be our effort to keep the number of such orders issued to the absolute minimum.

3. The subject then stated he wanted to see his Doctor again before he would leave. He was advised that [REDACTED], had advised this Force that his condition was not serious. To this he replied, how does he know when it maybe serious. As the subject still insisted on seeing [REDACTED] he was taken over to his office, but unfortunately [REDACTED] is out of Hamilton until June 3rd, or 4th, and could not be located. [REDACTED] would not see any other Doctor.

4. This matter was then discussed with Sgt. D.L. Canniff, who also interviewed [REDACTED] and it was decided that in view of the fact that [REDACTED] was performing heavy work at his place of employment without complaining, and in view of his defiant attitude, that it would be best considering the local situation at Hamilton, and [REDACTED] complaints, that he should be charged and put in jail, where the jail physician could attend and examine him.

5. The accused has not hired counsel as yet, and as the Crown Attorney at Hamilton refuses to handle cases under the War Measures Act, it would appear advisable that special counsel be appointed. In the event that counsel is not appointed could instructions be issued as to whether any order is required from the court regarding [REDACTED] return to Nevs. Ontario, other than the penalty the court may impose on [REDACTED] for this offence, if he is convicted.

6. It is also requested that a copy of the Canada Gazette containing P.C.946 be supplied for entry as an exhibit at the trial in this matter on June 6th, 1946, as same cannot be located at this detachment.

7. Could this matter please be treated as urgent. A further report will be submitted to comply with the diary date noted.

I wish to acknowledge your letter of July 7 concerning the above mentioned Japanese who are serving jail sentences in Eastern Canada. Our records do not indicate where these men are jailed, nor when their sentences will terminate, but the R.C.M. Police or your local Placement Officers at Toronto and Montreal should be able to provide this information.

legally If action is delayed until these men are released from jail, it will not be possible to send them west for several weeks, during which time they may get into further trouble. We feel that it would be best therefore to ask them now whether they wish to sign for repatriation and, if the answer is in the negative, decide whether their records are such that they should be directed to Techno by Commissioner's Orders, as has been done with such cases in the past. When the Orders are issued and in the hands of the R.C.M. Police, they can be served upon the persons concerned as soon as they are released. The men can then be sent west immediately with or without escort, as you may consider advisable.

The above persons, the first at Kapuskasing, Ontario, the second at or near Montreal, P.Q., have recently been sentenced to six months in jail each. No doubt you have received reports from the R.C.M. Police and the Local Placement Officers on these cases.

The records of these two men should be examined, and, if they have signed for repatriation, they should be brought back to Tashme as soon as their sentences are completed.

If they are not willing to sign for repatriation, careful consideration should be given to their records and the reports of the Local Officers to ascertain whether the individuals are of unsuitable character to remain in Eastern Canada. If the decision is in the affirmative a Commissioner's order should be issued in each such case in duplicate and referred to the R.C.M. Police in plenty of time so that the individuals concerned can be met upon release and either directed or escorted back to Tashme, as circumstances may warrant.

On April 6, 1945, the above Japanese National, at his own request, was transferred to the employ of the Spruce Falls Power & Paper Company at Kapuskasing, where he was to be assistant cook in one of the company's camps, working under an intimate friend by the name of [REDACTED]

Word has just reached us from the R.C.M.P. that on the 14th day of June, [REDACTED] was arrested after having been involved in a fight at the Northern Inn in Kapuskasing. It appeared that [REDACTED] took lodging at this Inn on the above date. An argument arose during which Yamada pulled a knife and seriously wounded [REDACTED]. One slash narrowly missed an artery in [REDACTED] and another cut completely through the upper lip, just below the nose. In all it required about 40 stitches to close the wounds. It appears that if some assistance had not been rendered to [REDACTED] during the affray, there is little doubt but that [REDACTED] would have inflicted more serious wounds, with probable fatal results. In the ensuing trial [REDACTED] was given six months sentence at hard labour. The name of the institution is not yet to hand.

This man has been a great trouble to us ever since he came down East. He is evidently below par physically as well as mentally. He is a Japanese National in possession of Parole Certificate [REDACTED]. I recommend that on his release from prison he be transferred immediately to one of the centers in B.C. now being used for repatriates. I imagine it would be necessary for an R.C.M.P. Officer to pay him a special visit in order to get his signature to the repatriation papers.

This man has been placed in the Cranbrook City lockup being in protected area without permission or travel permit, he is in possession of a telegram from T.B. Pickersgill, Commissioner of Japanese Placement, under date of Vancouver, June 25th, 1945, advising him to follow National Selective Service Instructions, this telegram no doubt has reference to his being instructed to go to work for Wenger at Athelmere. Subject being held pending further instructions.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UPON WHICH TELEGRAPH AND CABLE MESSAGES SHALL BE TRANSMITTED ARE PRESCRIBED BY ORDER No. 49274 DATED DECEMBER 5th, 1932, OF THE BOARD OF TRANSPORT COMMISSIONERS FOR CANADA, AND PUBLISHED IN THE CANADA GAZETTE.

It is agreed between the sender of the message, on the face of this form and this Company, that said Company shall not be liable for damages arising from failure to transmit or deliver, or for any error in the transmission or delivery of any unrepeatable telegram, whether happening from negligence of its servants or otherwise, or for delays from interruptions in the working of its lines, for errors in cypher or obscure messages, or for errors from illegible writing, beyond the amount received for sending the same.

Accepted up to 2 a.m. for delivery on the morning of the next day after their date at places where the Company's offices are open on Sundays, and on the morning of the next ensuing business day at places where the Company's offices are not open on Sundays, at rates still lower than its standard night telegram rates as follows: The standard day rate for 10 words for the transmission of 50 words or less and one-fifth of the initial rate for such 50 words for each additional 10 words or less.

Night Letters may, at the option of the Company, be mailed at destination to the addressees, and the Company shall be deemed to have discharged its obligation in such cases with respect to delivery by mailing such Night Letters at destination, postage prepaid.

1. During the P. M. of the 14-6-45 the above named was arrested by Chief Constable Walsh of the Kapuskaing Municipal Police after receiving a call that [redacted] was involved in a fight at the Northern Inn, Kapuskaing. Investigation revealed that [redacted] had become involved in a fight with one [redacted] who is employed at the same camp as the subject.

2. It appears that [redacted] is the cook in Camp 37 and [redacted] is his assistant. For some time past [redacted] has had considerable trouble with YAMADA due to his bad disposition and his unwillingness to co-operate with the other members of the Camp and to execute his duties in a satisfactory manner. This trouble apparently reached a peak during a visit of both parties to Kapuskaing, where they took lodgings at the Northern Inn. During the course of a heated argument, YAMADA pulled a knife and seriously wounded Mochizuki, inflicting severe cuts on his face and neck. One slash narrowly missed an artery in [redacted] neck and another cut completely through the upper lip, just below the nose. In all it required about forty stitches to close the wounds. It appears that if some assistance had not been rendered to Mochizuki during the affray, that there is little doubt that YAMADA would have inflicted far more serious wounds, with probable fatal results.

3. [redacted] was charged under Section 273 of the Criminal Code of Canada, "Wounding with Intent" and appeared before Magistrate E. R. Tucker, Esq. of Cochrane, Ont., on the 20-6-45 at Kapuskaing, Ont. [redacted] elected to be tried by the presiding Magistrate and pleaded "Guilty" to the charge. An Interpreter was required.

4. After all the evidence had been heard, the Magistrate, before passing sentence, remarked that there was no doubt in his mind that [redacted] However, this did not justify his actions as outlined in the evidence. Taking this into consideration together with the fact that the Court was not in possession of any evidence that subject had a previous Police record, [redacted] was sentenced to serve a term of six months at hard labour. The name of the institution was not mentioned by the Magistrate in passing sentence.

5. [redacted] is a Japanese National. He is in possession of Parole Certificate [redacted] having made his last report on the 7-3-45. The place the report was made is not known. However, [redacted] was transferred to Kapuskaing by the Enemy Alien Branch, Toronto, Ont., on the 6-4-45 and reported to the Chief Constable at Kapuskaing on the 9-4-45. He was posted to Camp 37 by the Spruce Falls

SPRUCHE FALLS POWER AND PAPER CO. Due to remoteness of his present abode, he has not been reporting monthly to the Chief Constable at Kapuskasing. [redacted] is registered under the National Registration Regulations, giving his address as 717 Hawkes Ave., Vancouver, B. C. The Electoral District is 238 Vancouver Centre and the Polling Division as 106. He is described as 40 years old, 5' 4" in height and weighs 119 lbs.

6. Although this Force took no part in the investigation and prosecution of this case, it was felt that as this Force was responsible for the enforcement of the Orders of the B. C. Security Commission, under which orders [redacted] was sent to the Kapuskasing district, a record of his conviction might be required by that Commission. No other action is contemplated by this Detachment.

7. Extra copies of this report are attached hereto for the information of the parties concerned.

Police requesting them to meet Takahashi when he leaves the jail at the end of his sentence and direct him to Tashme, either with or without an escort.

The above-mentioned Japanese is again in Montreal without a permit, he is at present in jail pending his appearance before the Court (April 24/45). The charge is travelling without a permit, but there was another charge against him today it was taken by his wife and reads as follows:
"Commit a common assault upon Chiyeko Saito by twisting her arm."

Before the Court was opened I asked [redacted] if she would forget the charge against her husband (because I was afraid that the newspaper would make a fuss over this affair), she agreed, providing I would promise her that she would not be annoyed any more by her husband.

Taking in consideration that this is [redacted] second trip to Montreal without a permit and also that he mistreated his wife, I am of the opinion that he should no longer be allowed to work in the East since he does not care about our laws and I believe that steps should be taken to prevent him from causing further troubles.

The R.C.M.P. report suggests that we may wish to
issue a Commissioner's Order requiring this family to move
(presumably to Tashmo) if it is considered that their
presence in Montreal is detrimental to the placement of
other Japanese there. After a study of their record, I would
be glad to have your view on this matter, with return of
our file attached.

A review of our file on this subject discloses a report on this man from Mr. Wright of the Lethbridge office of which the following is excerpt:

" Subject person was placed in the Provincial Gaol and examined by the Provincial Doctor. His report is that this man was in all probability acting as he did under the influence of liquor and that he could find no reason for having him placed in any institution. Upon his brother's request, he was released to him and taken back to the farm where he is working.

As this man's brother and his family seem to think from the actions of this man that he is a bit strange we will endeavour to keep in touch with this case and if anything further develops, we will let you know immediately. "

You will note that the Lethbridge office is keeping this man under observation and I am of the opinion no further action is required at least, for the present.

Re: Directive Orders

We have had a discussion with Deputy Commissioner Mead and other R.C.M.P. officials in which the above subject came up.

It was felt that the principle of having an R.C.M.P. escort accompany every Japanese required to return to the Interior Housing Projects on a Commissioner's Order should not be adopted, but that escorts should be recommended only where under the circumstances of the individual case it may be advisable, to ensure that the man did return. It was decided that in each case the necessity of an escort should be determined by you in consultation with the Officer Commanding, R.C.M.P., at Vancouver, and that in cases where the Japanese is to be returned to the Coast under escort, the Commissioner's Order should so specify.

Would you please see that the above procedure is put into effect in the case of [redacted] about whom I wrote on November 29, and in all future cases of this nature.

MEMORANDUM to Mr. H. T. Pammett.

When in Commissioner Mead's office today, in connection with some matters on POWs, the following items in connection with Japanese were also brought up:

A. Return of Japanese to B.C.

In the case of the two Japanese who are to be returned to the Coast under escort after release from jail, Commissioner Mead said the R.C.M.P. would pay the costs of the escort. It was felt that the principle of having an escort accompany every Japanese being returned to the settlements for cause should not be adopted but that escorts should be used only where circumstances of the individual case appear to make this advisable. This to be decided in each instance by the Commissioner of Japanese Placement and the Superintendent, R.C.M.P., Vancouver. In instances where the Japanese is to be returned to the Coast under escort, the order of the Commissioner of Japanese Placement should so specify. This will apply to future cases. Would you mind writing Collins confirming this.

B. Applications for Repatriation

The Commissioner had a copy of Mr. Collins' letter of November 22nd. He suggested that six copies of the application form might be required as follows: 2 for External Affairs, 1 for the R.C.M.P. files, 1 for Secretary of State, 1 for Immigration and 1 to be retained by the Japanese who signed the application.

It was suggested that Inspector Leopold and Sergeant Jones would check the application form in the light of the forms which have been used in connection with repatriation of other Japanese and Germans, etc., and would let us have the benefit of any further suggestions they had to make in connection therewith.

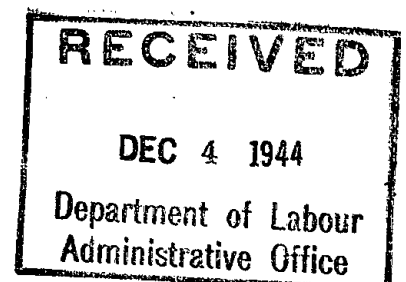



The captionally noted recently came to the attention of a member of our Regina Town Station in that he had stolen from a farmhouse some articles of furniture and sold them to a second-hand dealer in Regina,

2. This subject gave the following statement on August 1st, 1944:

[REDACTED] state as follows: I am thirty-three yrs. of age. At the present time I am employed by a farmer by the name of James HAYES of the Francis Dist., Sask. I have been working for him for the past month. Before that I was working for Everett KJELLANDER of Regina, Sask. who had us contracted to seed a farm in the Arcola and Lajord Districts. Frank BEEBE, was also working for KJELLANDER in the same capacity along with me.

"This spring, Frank BEEBE, Mr. KJELLANDER's brother, Anton, and myself put the crop in on the old YEVRENOV farm in the Lajord District, Sask. Mr. & Mrs. BEEBE, their children and myself were living on the farm while we were putting the crop in. When we finished putting this crop in, the BEEBE family, Anton KJELLANDER and myself moved to the Arcola District. I stayed with the BEEBE family until after seeding time and after that I came back into Regina and worked in the City.

"Last Thursday, July 27th, 1944, I came to Regina as there wasn't much work on the HAYES' farm at the present time for the harvest season is not quite here yet. As I was short of money at this time I got the idea of going to the YEVRENOV farm which I knew was vacated and sell some of the furniture. I went to the ISMAN's Auction Rooms at Regina and asked him if he would buy any furniture that I brought in. He said that it was his business to buy second hand furniture. I asked him if he would buy any furniture I had in the country and whether or not he would haul some in. Mr. ISMAN said that his license would not permit him to go out into the country. I then went to look for someone who had a truck in order that I could bring the furniture to town.

"Around 12:00 noon on Friday, July 26th, 1944, I got a chap by the name of [REDACTED]. I don't know his last name, who said that he would bring this stuff into Regina. When I hired this man I told him that I had a couple of stoves to bring in and he said that he would charge me six dollars.

"We left Regina at around 1:30 p.m. on Friday, July 26th, 1944 and arrived at the YEVRENOV farm around three o'clock. Before loading the furniture on the truck we fixed ourselves a lunch. After eating we loaded the Quebec Heater from the front room of the house and the bed and bedspring from the south east bedroom, onto the truck and brought them back to Regina and sold them to the ISMAN's Auction Rooms for which I got twenty dollars all told. I paid [REDACTED] the six dollars and we both went our ways.

"As for this [REDACTED] I had never seen him before but I think he comes from Moose Jaw. He had an old model truck. I don't know the make but on the windshield was an "F" sticker plate.

"The above statement has been given by me to the police by my own free will; it has been read to me and I state it to be the truth."

2. As the complainant stated that it was against his religion to take an oath by swearing or affirming; no search warrant was obtained nor an information laid. However, in view of all the facts and also in view of Ottawa Gazette 5-24-7261, I have instructed that this subject be located and that a member of this Force lay the Necessary Information and Complaint.

3. The British Columbia Security Commission are being advised of this subject's whereabouts.

1. At 12:15 a.m. this date, Mrs. Dan YEVRENOV of 1774 Winnipeg St., Regina, Sask., phoned this detachment complaining that her husband had just returned from their farm situated two and a half miles north of Lajord, Sask., and found that someone had entered their farm-house sometime during the week previous and had stolen their 4' x 8' bed, bed-spring and mattress, the Quebec heater, three gobblers, one hen-turkey, two ducks and two chickens. No suspects could be named but Mr. YEVRENOV related that he had made enquiries in the district and the only thing learned was that [REDACTED] approx. two miles to the North West, saw a little red truck headed in the vicinity of the YEVRENOV farm-house on the afternoon of 28-7-44. Mrs. YEVRENOV further related that her husband was employed by the Burns Co., Regina; that the family had moved in from the farm during May, 1944 and that Mr. YEVRENOV visited and worked on his farm in the Lajord District every weekend.

31-7-44

2. Patrol was made to the YEVRENOV farm in the Lajord District on the a.m. this date by the writer and Const. Bannerman of this detachment. A thorough investigation was made within the farm-house, the farm buildings and about the farm. The Quebec heater was removed from the west wall side of the living room and the bed from the south east bedroom. The two pillows and bed-spread were on top of the round table situated in the centre of the living room. No finger-prints could be found anywhere. In the chicken house and the Pig-pen fowl feathers could be seen arranged in such a manner as to show the struggle the thief had before trapping and catching them. No footprints could be seen as the ground was hard and covered well with weeds. Smooth vehicle tracks were followed from the farm-house to the road to Lajord town but were blotted out by later traffic.

3. Enquiries were then made throughout the District but were of no avail. There are no close neighbors, the nearest being one and a half miles to the south, one a mile to the north and one a mile and a half to the North West. The farm-house view is obstructed by trees to the North and by high land to the south. Ed LEIPPI was away from his farm and could not be contacted; and none of the neighbors knew anything of a little red truck's appearance in the district.

4. Returning from Vibank, Sask., to Regina, the patrol checked a hitch-hiker walking east on #16 highway. A record was made of this man, a Jap by name of [REDACTED] Patrol returned to Regina at 10:00 p.m. this date.

5. During the early p.m. of this date, the complainant phoned this detachment reporting that he found his

7. On the early a.m. of this date, Const. Bannerman and the writer patrolled to Isman's Auction Rooms and the following statements were taken:--

STATEMENT OF MANUEL J. MILLIGAN, Regina, Saskatchewan, 1-8-44

"I am a truck driver hired by Isman's Auction Rooms, Regina, Sask. On Friday, July 28th, 1944, I was working in the Auction Store Rooms when Mr. ISMAN asked me to help unload a bed and stove which was loaded on a bright red truck of an old make. It had a home-made rear box painted the same colour. I would know the truck if I were to see it again. The bed which I helped to unload was a four foot panel steel bed, walnut in colour and a St. Louis cable bed-spring. The stove was a large size, Western Quebec make. There was two men with the above described

Mr. YEVRENOV called at these Rooms with a Mounted Policeman on the a.m. of the 31-7-44 and stated that these above described articles belonged to him and were stolen."

STATEMENT OF MR. HYMAN ISMAN, Regina, Sask.

1-8-44

"I am the owner of the Isman Auction Rooms, corner of 10th Ave. and Osler St., Regina, Sask. On Tuesday, July 27th, a chap of oriental extraction wearing a dark-coloured suit, well dressed, about 5'6" tall and weighing about 145 lbs. whom I could identify, called at my store and asked if I would buy a bed, bed-spring, and heater. I stated we bought furniture all the time. He asked me if I would pick these articles up which he mentioned were about twenty miles out into the country. I stated we could not do this due to War Time Regulations. He then said he would bring them in. The next day, Friday, July 29th, 1944, this oriental along with another chap delivered the bed, bed-spring and stove in a little red truck of an old make with a green painted grain box but with a red frame and red wheels. I could easily identify the truck if I were to see it again. I didn't take notice of the other chap as my dealings were with the short oriental who stated these articles were his property. I had my hired man, Mr. M.J. Milligan, help unload these articles. I paid eight dollars for the stove and twelve dollars for the bed and spring. I made out the receipt now held by the police in the same amounts as is stated above, and had the oriental

and had the oriental sign it as I gave the twenty dollars to this chap personally. This furniture, as is marked by the police, is held at my Auction Rooms in Regina and on their request I will hold same and will not dispose of same unless required and requested for by the Mounted Police."

8. Patrol was then continued on #16 highway to the spot where the Jap was checked the previous evening and after several enquiries were made in the immediate district, [redacted] was contacted who stated that he was spending a day or two with Ben WOODSHAW, farmer in the Jameson Dist. Sask. A sample of his signature compared favourably with the signature on the receipt surrendered by Mr. H. ISMAN. The oriental then pointed out that he had a brother working at the Balmoral Cafe, Regina, who wrote very much like him and stated that that was his signature (his brother's whose name was said to have been [redacted]). The oriental was then asked to accompany the patrol to Regina and help locate his supposed brother, Hideo. Patrol returned to Regina at 1:50 p.m. the same date.

9. Patrol to the Balmoral Cafe found the restaurant closed for the day. Patrol then continued to Isman's Auction Rooms and [redacted] was told that he would be identified by Mr. ISMAN whether or not he were the [redacted] who signed the receipt and who was handed the twenty dollars for the bed, bed-spring and stove. [redacted] then admitted that he stole the furniture from the YEVRENOV farm-house and the following confession was taken from him:-

STATEMENT OF [redacted] Regina, Sask. 1-8-44.

[redacted] state as follows: I am thirty-three years of age. At the present time I am employed by a farmer by the name of James HAYES of the Francis Dist. Sask. I have been working for him for the past month. Before that I was working for Everet KJELLANDER of Regina Sask. who had us contracted to seed a farm in the Arcola and Lajord Districts. Frank BEEBE, was also working for KJELLANDER in the same capacity along with me.

This spring, Frank BEEBE, Mr. KJELLANDER's brother, Anton, and myself, put the crop in on the old YEVRENOV farm in the Lajord District, Sask. Mr. & Mrs. BEEBE, their children and myself were living on the farm while we were putting the crop in. When we finished putting this crop in, the BEEBE family, Anton KJELLANDER and myself moved to the Arcola District. I stayed with the BEEBE family until after seeding time and after that I came back into Regina and worked in the City.

Last Thursday, July 27th, 1944, I came to Regina as there wasn't much work on the HAYES' farm at the present time for the harvest season is not quite here yet. As I was short of money at this time I got the idea of going to the YEVRENOV farm which I knew was vacated and sell some of the furniture. I went to the ISMAN'S Auction Rooms at Regina and asked him if he would buy any furniture that I brought in. He said that it was his business to buy second hand furniture. I asked him if he would buy any furniture I had in the country and whether or not he would haul same in. Mr. ISMAN said that his license would not permit him to go out into the country. I then went to look for someone who had a truck in order that I could bring the furniture to town.

Around 12:00 noon on Friday, July 28th, 1944, I got a chap by the name of [redacted] I don't know his last name, who said that he would bring stuff into Regina when I hired [redacted] A0027077-146-000 is

When I hired this man I told him that I had a couple of stoves to bring in and he said that he would charge me six dollars.

We left Regina at around 1:30 p.m. on Friday, July 28th, 1944 and arrived at the YEVRENOV farm around three O'clock. Before loading the furniture on the truck we fixed ourselves a lunch. After eating we loaded the Quebec Heater from the front room of the house and the bed and bedspring from the south east bedroom, onto the truck and brought them back to Regina and sold them to the ISMAN's Auction Rooms for which I got twenty dollars all told. I paid the six dollars and we both went our ways.

As for this "Nick", I had never seen him before but I think he comes from Moose Jaw. He had an old model truck, I don't know the make but on the windshield was an "F" sticker plate.

The above statement has been given by me to the police by my own free will; it has been read to me and I state it to be the truth."

10. In view of the foregoing statement, the complainant was advised to report to this office immediately where the Information to Obtain a Search Warrant, the Search Warrant, and the Information and Complaint were being drawn up. When the complainant was brought before Police Magistrate E.S. WILLIAMS, K.C. on the p.m. of this date, the former signed the Information to Obtain a Search Warrant but refused to swear, affirm or state it to be the truth in any way by swearing when requested to do so by the Police Magistrate. Mr. Dan YEVRENOV stated that to take such oath by swearing was against his religion, the Apostolic Christian. The complainant further stated that he would rather lose his bed, stove and any other chattles stolen from him, than take the requested oath before the Bible.

11. In view of the fact that this complainant refused absolutely to make an oath or affirmation, the documents before the Magistrate at the time were not dealt with. The accused party left the court room as did the complainant and his wife.

I have received information from the R.C.M.P. that the above mentioned Japanese National was sentenced in May last to six months imprisonment in Lethbridge jail for a breach of Section 31 of the Defence of Canada Regulations, and it is stated that he will be discharged on December 28, 1944.

The R.C.M.P. advise that the Immigration Branch of the Department of the Secretary of State has made out a Deportation Order against this man, which will be put in effect at the cessation of hostilities.

In the meantime, it is requested that a Commissioner's Order be issued under Section 3 (vii) of Order in Council P.C. 946 requiring Maruoka at the expiration of his imprisonment to proceed to Tashme, B.C., under the escort of an R.C.M.P. officer.

Dear Sir:

We have received a letter from the Commissioner of the R.C.M.P., enclosing reports on the above-mentioned Japanese evacuee in Manitoba, who is now serving a gaol sentence of two and one-half months for assault and bodily injury.

The Commissioner advises that you wrote to the Officer Commanding "E" Division, R.C.M.P. on October 24, requesting that steps be taken to cancel this man's citizenship and also arrange to have him escorted to Tashme at the expiration of his gaol sentence.

On the first point, it is advised that no steps can be taken to cancel the subject's citizenship as there is no indication of disloyalty in the evidence so far on file. It is suggested, therefore, that you have the Manitoba Placement Officer interview Fukuda at Headingly Gaol to see if he will voluntarily sign a request to be sent back to Japan. If he will do so, the provisions of Section 1(a) of Order in Council P.C. 10773, dated November 26, 1942, will automatically deprive him of Canadian citizenship upon leaving Canada.

The police advise also that in the absence of evidence of disloyalty, this man cannot be interned.

Concerning transfer to Tashme, the Commissioner of the R.C.M.P. asks that you issue a Commissioner's Order under the provisions of Section 3(viii) of Order in Council P.C. 946, dated February 5, 1943, requiring Fukuda, at the expiration of his imprisonment, to proceed to Tashme, B.C. under the escort of an R.C.M.P. Officer. As this man will be released from gaol about December 17, 1944, it is requested that the Order be completed and sent to this office at least ten days prior to that date, for action by the R.C.M.P.

Enclosed herewith will be found self-explanatory reports covering the conviction of [REDACTED] of assault occasioning actual bodily harm. This is the same person concerning whom we wrote you on August 4th last, our file [REDACTED]

2. Referring to Vancouver Report of 31/10/44 and forwarding minute of Superintendent Gray of 1/11/44, copies of which are also attached, it is requested that you issue an order under the provisions of Section 3(vii) of Order in Council 946 dated February 5th, 1943 requiring [REDACTED] at the expiration of his imprisonment to proceed to Tashme, B.C., under the escort of a member of this Force.

3. Regarding Mr. Collin's suggestion that consideration be given to the cancellation of the subject's citizenship, we do not see how such action can be implemented at this time as he was born in Canada and while he is definitely not a law-abiding person, there is no indication of disloyalty in the evidence. However, at the time of the subject's arrest under the National Registration Regulations, on July 12, 1944 he expressed the desire to be interned and stated he intended to return to Japan after the war. In view of this, possibly you could have your Placement Officer at Winnipeg interview the subject at Headingly Gaol to see if he will voluntarily sign a request to be repatriated. If he should do so and leave Canada at the cessation of hostilities, the provisions of Section 1(a) of Order in Council 10773 dated 26/11/42, will then automatically deprive him of his citizenship. At the present time on the available evidence we can see no other

The above named Japanese, resident of Winnipeg, is once again in trouble with the authorities. He has already had four charges preferred against him in various parts of the country and is at present in Gaol pending trial on a charge of Assault against a white woman living in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

The mother of this man is living in Japan, to which country [REDACTED] returned at the age of 3 remaining until he received his education. The attitude of this man is detrimental to further placement in eastern Canada and in view of his record, I respectfully suggest that full particulars be submitted to the Dept. of External Affairs with the view to having his citizenship cancelled and that he be designated for deportation to Japan as soon as possible.

Pending any action being taken by the Dept. of External Affairs, I would appreciate if, upon his release from custody, you would arrange to have Fukuda escorted to Tashme where he will be retained pending the decision of the Dept. of External Affairs.

Your comments in this regard would be appreciated.

5. This man was, by occupation, a farm labourer. He states he has never been to Japan. He did not claim Japanese Nationality when being registered nor did he contemplate ever going to Japan.
4. Subject was evacuated from Vancouver, B.C. to Solsqua, B.C. on April 16, 1942. In September 1942 he went to Vernon, B.C. In November 1942 he returned to Yard Creek Camp, B.C. In January 1943 he travelled from Yard Creek Camp, B.C. to Port Arthur, Ontario. In April 1943 he went from Fort William, Ontario to Beardmore, Ontario. Subject remained in the Ontario district until December 1943 when he travelled to Winnipeg, Manitoba. From that time he has remained in the Manitoba Area.
5. Subject's Police Record is as follows:
Oct. 5th, 1942 - Convicted on Assault charge. Sentenced sixty days Vernon Gaol.
July 1, 1944 - Being of Japanese race did change his residence without obtaining necessary travel permit. - Two months in Gaol, without option.
July 11, 1944 - Sec. 24A-a, National Registration regulations - One month in Gaol.
October 25, 1944 - Assault occasioning actual bodily harm. - At present awaiting trial and is being held without bail in the Headingly Gaol, Manitoba.

1. With reference to the above and further to the marginally noted P.C.R. I have to report that on the 31st ultimo [REDACTED] appeared before Magistrate A.C. Campbell in St. James Police Court, entered a plea of "Not Guilty" to the above noted charge but was convicted and sentenced to serve Two and one half months in gael. Sentence to commence from the time of his arrest on October 12th, 1944.

2. It was learned from the Chief of the St. James Police that [REDACTED] was not in possession of a National Registration Certificate when he was apprehended and same could not be found when a search was made of his effects. In this connection I would submit that on August 31st last the writer personally handed to [REDACTED] a duplicate National Registration Certificate to replace his original which had been defaced.

3. Chief Turnkey T. J. Keen of Headingley Gaol advises that with time off for good conduct [REDACTED] is due to be released from gaol on December 17th, 1944.

With reference to paragraph 2, in cross examination by the Crown Prosecutor, [REDACTED] stated that his National Registration Certificate had been left in his working clothes at the place where he was employed. According to the St. James Police this statement was incorrect. A duplicate Registration Certificate was handed to [REDACTED] by a member of this Force immediately

after his release from gaol where he had served a sentence for contravention of B.C. Security Commission Order, No. 1.

2. In my opinion this Japanese is utterly incorrigible, he has been a source of trouble and anxiety ever since he first came to the attention of this Department in Sept. of 1943 and I am having a brief prepared upon his activities and conduct whilst in this Divisional area which will be forwarded to you at an early date. 2. Mr. Parker, by whom [REDACTED] is employed is, I understand, a man of some substance and a resident of the Municipality of St. James. I am given to understand that he was prepared to have the matter completely ignored. A perusal of the statements indicates to me that there is no doubt that Mr. Bert Paye was also assaulted. It will be noted that Paye himself states "I fell over the woman who was lying on the floor". Anna Berg, whose statement is also attached, states, "The Jap then knocked Paye down in a struggle". Constance Riddle, in her statement, states, "He turned on Mr. Paye. He had Mr. Paye on his back on the ground and was trying to strangle him". It is interesting to note that Mr. Paye is an employee of the Municipal Council and I am of the opinion that his reluctance to admit that he was assaulted by this Jap is largely, if not wholly, due to the possibility of repercussions, particularly in view of the fact that Mr. Parker probably has influence with the Municipal Council.

3. I understand that Mr. Heaney, of your Department, is attending to this case.

The following statement taken from Miss Constance Riddle, of 515 Ellice Avenue, Winnipeg, Manitoba.

I have been employed by Mr Ernest Parker at 185 Oakdean Boulevard since March 25th 1944, As a green-house woman.

On September 9th/44 [REDACTED] 'Japanese' commenced to work at the same place.

He received instructions from Mr. Parker's housekeeper to do the heavy work, digging etc..

This man has on several occasions told me that I have to dig. On the first Monday he was there he asked me to go to the Park with him, 'I refused ' I wasn't nasty with him when I refused; the next night, that was on the 12th of September he told me I had got Park with him.

I asked him why? He said I want you, I didn't mention anything of this to my employer as I thought they may think I was trying to frame the Jap-

A few days later he asked for me to come down Town with him after work to the Winnipeg Hotel.

I felt afraid of him, I asked Victor, a boy who resides with Parkers if he would come down Town that night as I was afraid of the Jap. Victor said he would and he accompanied me as far as the Hudson-Bay store.

Miss Burg' i.e. Mr. Parker's house-keeper heard me talking to Victor and she asked what it was all about.

I told her that the Jap wanted to go down Town with me,
She told me to forget it as he was alright.

He didn't bother me for the next few days' But tackled the Cook
instead, Miss Louise Cameron.

A day or so later he tried to be Friendly 'too' friendly with me,
He tried again to persuade me to go to the Park with him,
He tried various ways to get me to go out with him, he even said
he would give me Five dollars if I would go out with him.

I asked him why he should offer me Five dollars, he said, white
woman for Japanese use.

I had no right to refuse, he said I get what I want, (meaning
himself) I stalled him off again by going into the house.

One day last week, I took onions down the basement in the green-
house, I was putting them on the racks, he sneaked up behind me
and put his arm around my neck and nearly cut off my breathing,
he tried to force me to give in again, I beat him to it,

I tried to tell Miss Burg about this occurrence, 'She said' dont
argue with him but keep away from him. The Jap wouldn't keep
away from me. On Thursday, October 5th, 1944, this was the cooks
day off, Miss Burg was also out, the Jap had been ordered to work down
near the house also to watch the house. The Jap and I were the
only two working on the property. Between 2.30 & 3.00 P.M. I
was in the green-house preparing poison for the plants when in
came the Jap, I told him it wasn't coffee time' He said 'I know'
I want you. I noticed his pants was unbuttoned and his privates
out, He tried to force me down onto the floor. I had in my hand,

With a spoon, I struck him on the shoulder. I then lifted my knee and caught him in the privates. He said sometime I get you for this' any-way he left me and went out. He complained to the house-hold in general that he had a sore stomach. The next day I tried to tell Miss Burg about this occurrence. She didn't give me a chance' she walked away. So I told all the rest around there except Mr. Parker. On Wednesday, October 11th/44 I commenced work at 12.40 P.M. I received instructions from Miss Burg to dig Gladiola Bulbs she said the Jap would help me so I dug them and the Jap piled them. About 3.00 P.M. Miss Burg went down Town, the Jap kept saying you come to the green-house with me, 'I refused' He told me I was crazy, He said white woman who refuse Japanese man blood-well crazy. At 4.00 P.M. we were called for coffee, after having the coffee, We returned to work, I had to go to the toilet in the green-house, I had just got the door shut when I heard the Jap coming running like man, He told me to open the door and let him in, I didn't answer, by my watch he kept me in there a full fifteen minutes and tried to force the door.

He swore at me and called me names, then one of the dogs barked and he left. So I got out of there as quick as I could.

I told Louise (the cook) about this that night, I also told her I was going to quit on Saturday.

On Thursday October 12th/44 I commenced to work just after 9:00 A.M.

I didn't see the Jap until about 11 A.M. it was 11 A.M.

He came to the green-house and asked me what I was doing.

I told him I was fixing the roses up'

asked the doors and I told him to open them,

I also told him to go out of the green-house and leave me along
at the same time I opened up the south door.

I told him to get out and stay out, Told him I was going to tell
Mr. Parker, He laughed again and said, "You No tell Mr. Parker
I told him I would.

About 11.30 A.M. we were called too the house for lunch,

He asked Louise if she was going out' she told him she was;
He also asked Louise if Miss Burg was going out' she told him No.
Do you wish she would, the Jap laughed, He said maybe better if she
did. About 1.50 P.M. Louise went out, I was in the green-house
alone, I heard a voice at the door, I looked up and saw Mr. Paye, -
He said he was going through and thought that he would stop for a
minute, Just two minutes after the Jap came in and asked me what
I was doing I told him I was doing the work I was told to do,
He ordered me to go out and dig. I didn't answer him. He left and
returned a few minutes later. He asked me again what I was doing '
I said if you must know come down and see.

He bawled me out for the leaves being wet.

He said all the time you stay in the Green-house do nothing

I work hard outside, You come out and get a shovel and dig

I ordered him out again, He told me 'He was boss of the place from
now on and what he said go's, He ordered me to take my glasses off,
I asked him for why' He said take off glasses and get out and fight
like man,

tol him I didn't have to, So he slapped my face, He reached out with his other hand and grabbed my throat, I grabbed a chain and struck him with it,

Mr. Paye tried to stop him and after I hit him he said He'd go and get Miss. Burg,

Mr. Paye said he had to go I begged him to stop and he did,

We heard Miss Burg and the Jap coming, The Jap didn't speak a word as he came into the Green-house,

He took a flying leap down the green-house and struck me on the left eye with his right fist and under the chin with his left fist,

I was wearing glasses at the time and they was smashed, I fell to the floor and the Jap kicked me ' He was going to jump on me, It was then that my hand was hurt, Mr. Paye grabbed him and he turned on Mr. Paye, He had Mr. Paye on his back on the ground and was trying to strangle him,

Miss Burg, tried to stop the Jap' but he wouldn't listen to her,

I knew the Jap intended to kill Mr. Paye,,and I knew He would have finished us bothe, I used Mr. Paye's iron bar on the Jap ' I hit him three times before he let-go of Mr. Paye,

The Jap got up and turned on me again, Mr. Paye got up and grabbed the iron bar from me, and threatened the Jap, (I past out) A few minutes after I came to and Miss Burg told me I better go home She got rid of the Jap and I washed my face and changed my clothes Miss Burg came from the house and told me Mr. Parker was coming home and that I must wait for him, She had just turned to go in the house when the Jap came running into the Green-house with a sickle in his

hand Miss. Burg called to him and ordered him to go back to his work I ran into Victor's bed-room in the green house, and held the door. He tried to get in, I heard him throw the sickle down and he went to the sink to get a drink, I grabbed my clothes and ran to the house' him after me, Me and Miss Burg, had just got inside and locked the door when the Jap tried to force the door, We kept the door locked until Mr. Parker came, He listened to my story and then went looking for the Jap, He had a talk with him and took him to the basement in the house A few minutes later' Mr. Parker came to me and the Jap wanted to talk with me, I said NO, Mr. Parker said yes You must come, So I went down stairs with him, And the Jap wanted to shake hands with me' 'I refused' Mr. Parker said I didn't treat him fair, This is the Jap he said. I was too sharp with him, the poor boy didn't understand, Mr. Parker said, for my own sake I should shut my mouth and not tell a living soul about it, He said we had to protect the poor Japanese people' I made Mr. Parker understand I would take the case to court, He drove me home in his car' On the way home He told me I must not speak a word of what had happened to a living soul, He said it involved him to, much-

THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT TAKEN FROM Miss Anna Berg of 185 Oakdean Boulevard, St. James

In the early spring of this year 1944 Miss Constance Riddle commenced to work for Mr. E.S. Parker at 185 Oakdean Boulevard. Shortly after she commenced working here I had an accident and was in the hospital two weeks. While I was there Miss Riddle came down to me and told me that the gardener had fired her and had refused to work with her. The man was John W. Isbister who has since joined the navy.

At the time I wasn't interested and advised her to go back to work. She came back and worked. John never complained to me, so I never found the reason for the complaint.

On Thursday October 12th 1944 about 2.10 p.m. [REDACTED] came to the door and called me. He said Connie Lazy Connie dont work. Connie stay in green house with man McCall once. Connie dont work. Stay in with man McCall. Second time Connie stay with man, you come see. Tell Connie to work I told him to go back to work but he said you come green house see Connie.

He went ahead of me and I came behind him into the green house. Connie and Paye was in the green house at the south door. He took one fast leap through the green house and struck Connie with his fist. She fell over. Paye came to her rescue. The Jap then knocked Paye down in a struggle. Connie got up and struck the Jap with a piece of iron. In the meantime I reached the scene. I called [REDACTED] and told him to stop. I called him twice before he stopped I told him he had broken the law of the land and he could not hit ladies

in this country and that he would have to go to the Penitentiary. I ordered him to go back to his work and stay at his work. I ordered Connie to come into the house and stay in the house until Mr. Parker came home, it took her a long time to get ready.

Masaji came back on the scene. He went towards the green house. He had a sickle in his hand. He went into the green house. I called Connie out and took her to the house and [REDACTED] stayed in the green house. He stayed there until Mr. Parker came home.

THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT TAKEN FROM Mr. E. S. PARKER of 185 Oakdean Boulevard, St. James.

[REDACTED] Japanese Canadian born, came to my employ through the British Columbia Securities Commission on September 8th, 1944. His duties consisted of doing the rough work in my garden. I found him satisfactory. He did his work well and was very pleasant about the house all the time I was around.

No reports ever came to me from any of my other employees and I heard nothing regarding this trouble until Thursday October 12th. On this date about 2.30 P.M. I received a telephone call from my housekeeper Miss Anna Berg who informed me that Masaji Fukuda had been fighting with Constance Riddle.

I left my office shortly after receiving the telephone call and got home about 3.15 p.m. On arrival I found Constance Riddle very much upset and in a very nervous frame of mind with apparently a bruised hand. I saw no marks of any kind on her face although she did say her glasses had been broken.

After over two hours of consultation with Constance Riddle and [REDACTED] I left these two with the understanding that the fracas should be forgotten, after Fukuda apologized to Constance Riddle.

About 5.45 I took Miss Riddle to her home at the corner of Young Street and Ellice Avenue in the City of Winnipeg and left Miss Riddle with the understanding that she would forget about the altercation she had had with Masaji Fukuda provided Fukuda would

pay Miss Riddle the costs she was put to for any medical attention required and the cost of repairing her glasses.

THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT TAKEN FROM MR. BERT PAYE, EMPLOYEE
OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF ST. JAMES.

(ENGINEERS DEPARTMENT)

On Thursday October 12th 1944 about 2.00 P.M. My work took me out to the west-end of the Municipality, I walked in on Mr. Ernest Parker's property 185 Oakdean Boulevard, the object was to look at the flowers in the Green-house as I approached the green-house I saw a man walking out of the Green-house through the front door.

As I entered the green house through the back door I saw a Lady it was one of Mr. Parker's Employee's, I asked her how everything was 'She said everything was alright'

She appeared to be up-set, a few minutes later the same man whom I had seen walking out of the Green-house returned he was accompanied by Mr. Parker's House-keeper He was walking in front of her. This man was a Japanese. He entered the green-house first After they had entered the green-house Mr. Parker's house-keeper said 'whats the matter Conny'. At the same time, the Jap rushed down towards Conny with his fists up. Conny at the time was standing about three feet from me, I saw the Jap strike out at Conny with his right hand, I dont know were the blow struck her, I think he struck her with both fists. He knocked her right down. I stepped in front of him so he wouldn't hit her again I then stepped back still facing the Jap I fell over the woman who was lying on the floor.

The Jap came down on top of me. I dont remember him grabbing a hold of me. The Jap didn't try to hold me down. I got up right away. The first thing I said to the House-keeper was 'Call the Police'. She said No I'll call Mr. Parker. I said alright But dont include me in this affair. I then left.

I have been in Mr. Parkers employ all the time [REDACTED]
has been working at 185 Oakdean Boulevard and during that time
I have had no reason to complain of Masaji Fukuda.

I was absent on the day of the fracas, that was on Thursday
October 12th 1944.

On Wednesday October 12th 1944 Connie asked me if I would
back her up if she went to the Mounties about [REDACTED]
bothering her at the green house. I advised her not to do it
at all that she would be better to leave than to cause all that
trouble. She didn't think it was worth her while to leave as she
only has a short time to work as she was thinking of getting
married the 30th of November.

On Tuesday October 10th Connie told me to keep my eyes
and ears open that she had over heard a conversation between
Mr. Parker and [REDACTED] about Japan. Mr. Parker has
been asking [REDACTED] if he knew certain men in Japan, naming
these men and of course [REDACTED] told him he knew them. Mr. Parker
told him he knew one man in particular that he was a friend of
his. Connie then said Mr. Parker was in co-hoots with the Japs
she thought and that he was a traitor to his country.

1. You will recall that the above noted subject, who was recently escorted to Tashme upon his release from the Kenora District Gaol, was the subject of an insertion in the R.C.M.P. Gazette, Supplement A, July 21st, 1943, No. 629.
2. The B.C. Provincial Police, Kamloops Detachment, held a Warrant to Apprehend this subject on a charge of Forgery. They were notified of his return to Tashme, and on January 10th he was taken into custody by them.
3. On January 13th, 1945, KENO appeared in Kamloops City Police Court before A. Rankin, Esq., Police Magistrate, to face three charges of Forgery under Section 467 C.C.C. The cases were remanded until January 17th, on which date the accused was found guilty and sentenced to one year's hard labour on each count; the sentences to run concurrently.
4. Copies of the B.C. Provincial Police crime reports have been placed on this subject's file in the Japanese Registration Office.
