THE SECRETARY: Case No. 513, Sukenobu Akizuki.

MR. HUCKVALE: Ready on that one, sir.

SUKENOBU AKIZUKI, the claimant herein,
being first duly sworn, testified
through the Interpreter as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. HUCKVALE:

Q Mr. Akizuki, you are claiming for some fishing
equipment?

A Yes.

10 Q Consisting of nets and twines?

A Yes.

Q Now, I show you this statement with the page attached
thereto. Will you look at that, please?

A Yes.

Q Have you read that? A: Yes, I understand
it.

Q And is that your signature on the first page?

A Yes.

20 Q And is that statement true, to the best of your
knowledge, recollection and belief?

A Yes.

MR. HUCKVALE: I will file that, if I may, sir.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Yes, all right, Exhibit 1.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1).

MR. HUCKVALE: Q: Now, Mr. Akizuki, with reference to
your twine, can you tell me what that document is?

A This is a receipt from the British Columbia Packers
for the twine that I left with them.

30 Q For the twine that you left where?

A At the Imperial Cannery.

MR. HUCKVALE: I will file that as Exhibit 2, sir.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT No. 2).

MR. HUCKVALE: Q: Now, you also had a claim, Mr. Akizuki, for certain personal chattels left in British Columbia when you were evacuated?

A Yes, sir.

Q I show you this statement. Will you take a look at that, please? A: Yes.

Q And have you read that? A: Yes.

Q And is that your signature on that document?

A Yes.

Q And is that statement true to the best of your knowledge, recollection and belief?

A Yes.

MR. HUCKVALE: I will file that, sir.

(STATEMENT OF PERSONAL CHATTELS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3).

MR. HUCKVALE: Q: Are you positive, Mr. Akizuki, that these nets and twine and all these chattels were left behind by you when you were evacuated?

A Yes.

Q And have you done your best to give what you consider to be a fair re-sale value in the case of each item?

A Yes, I have tried to fix the fair price.

Q Would you answer my learned friend Mr. Rice, please.

CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. RICE:

Q Do you speak English, Mr. Akizuki?

20 A No.

Q I show you a letter with apparently your name signed to it. Is that your writing?

A This was written by my daughter.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Q: What does he say?

A It was written by my daughter.

MR. RICE: Q: The things that you left and that you refer to were left by you at the Imperial Cannery?

A The nets were left with the Canadian Pacific Cannery which is connected with the Imperial Cannery.

10 Q When were they left there?

A At the time I evacuated.

Q Did you instruct the cannery to dispose of the nets for you?

A: No, I asked them to take care of them.

Q You asked them to take care of them?

A Yes, just in case they had to be sold after I left, I did fix a price for the nets.

Q You told the cannery the price to sell them at?

20 A Yes.

MR. RICE: I perhaps should state here, your Honour, the lines of defence that the Crown proposes to pursue, and that is that part of these chattels that were left were left with friends or agents of the claimant, and those that are alleged to have been lost, destroyed or stolen, that the claim that he has placed against the same is exorbitant.

Q Now you claim as one of the chattels that have been lost on Exhibit 3 as being a shoe repair machine.

30 Where did you leave that?

A In the upstairs of the warehouse of the Imperial Cannery.

MR. HUCKVAE: I don't think there is any question about that. It was sold by the Custodian and admittedly sold by the Custodian.

MR. RICE: Q: You left it upstairs in a warehouse?

A Yes.

Q Of the Imperial Cannery? A: Yes.

10 Q You left it with the Imperial Cannery?

A Yes.

Q And these personal chattels, did you leave those chattels with the machine, the shoe repair machine?

A No, the personal chattels were left with the Canadian Pacific Cannery.

Q All personal chattels were left with the Canadian Pacific Cannery?

A Yes, they were ^{all} left with the Canadian Pacific Cannery, particularly in No. 1 house, partly there, and partly
20 in No. 2 house.

Q Did you tell them what to do with them; to ship them to you or to sell them?

A No, they were just left at the cannery.

Q They were just left with the cannery?

A Yes, I was told that they would be left there and would be taken care of and that I was to evacuate.

Q Who told you to leave them there?

A The cannery manager.

Q You asked the cannery manager if he would leave them
30 first, did you not?

A Yes, about 16 or 17 farmers all got together and asked the manager if they could leave their household goods at the cannery.

Q The carpenter tools; where did you leave them?

A Those were left along with the household chattels.

Q At the cannery? A: With the Canadian Pacific Cannery.

Q With the Canadian Pacific Cannery?

10 A Yes.

Q And the fishing tools, where did you leave those?

A Those were also at the same place.

Q Or were they left in the boat?

A I was having a new boat built. I had ordered a new boat and as the times were difficult, that is, the European war was on, I was advised that some tools, ships' equipment, might be difficult to get, so that I ordered about \$50.00 worth before the boat was started to be built. Those were left with the personal chattels, but the old boat equipment was left on the boat.

20

Q Well, it is referred to in your personal claim, those chattels.

MR. HUCKVALE: The claim is only for those new tools.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Pardon?

MR. HUCKVALE: The claim is only for those new tools.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: For the \$50.00 brand new tools?

MR. HUCKVALE: Yes.

MR. RICE: Q: When you stored these chattels with the
30 cannery, you gave the cannery a list, did you not?

A No.

Q Did you not make a list of the things that you took to the cannery?

A Yes, I made a list.

Q And you delivered it to the cannery, did you not?

A No, I didn't. I was told that if I just left the stuff there, there was a watchman that would take care of it.

10 Q You made no list at all, you say?

MR. HUCKVALE: He said he did make a list.

MR. RICE: Q: You made a list?

A Yes.

Q Oh, all right. And the list that you have filed here today is a different list, is it not?

20 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Before he answers that, Mr. Rice, I am wondering if the list he made should not be produced, if he has got it, and then let him compare it with the list that he is now filing. In other words, what I am thinking of is this; that you are cross-examining him and it seems to me that the document should be produced to him.

MR. HUCKVALE: I have the list that he gave to me; that is all.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Then a comparison can be made and if there is any explanation, it can be made.

30 MR. HUCKVALE: I have got it right here, the claim is an exact copy of it. I have the list that he gave me; there is the list of chattels and there is the list of fishing nets.

A At the time I was evacuated to Alberta to the sugar beet fields, I was asked to provide a list of chattels to the Custodian, which I did, but the list that I handed to the Custodian was not complete.

MR. HUCKVALE: Q: I take it he is referring to the J.P. Form, is he not?

A Yes, I believe it was the J.P. Form.

MR. HUCKVALE: Your Honour, I just wish to say that all these people before they left were asked to make a
10 declaration as to personal chattels or real property left behind in the particular area. Now there was a great rush in this evacuation and it has been accepted all along that if that statement contained in what is known as the J.P. form was made in general terms, that is sufficient. In other words, he didn't have to list, let us say for example, his household furniture, simply put in household furniture and that was accepted and that was signed in the presence of an official of the Custodian's office.

20 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Well then, it seems to me that is all the more reason why those documents should be produced and filed for further reference later on.

MR. HUCKVALE: I can produce it, but it is a copy of the claim. The claim is a copy of the list, sir.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Have they got a copy of the other list?

MR. HUCKVALE: I don't know what my learned friend is getting at, really.

MR. RICE: There is another matter of which I am not
30 quite sure, your Honour, and that is whether I

should file an analysis of the personal property claim.

MR. HUCKVALE: I can speak from my own experience, your Honour, when Government counsel was here before it was always done. The Commissioner demanded it, that the personal property analysis claim be always filed. I mean that was just a habit.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Always filed?

10 MR. HUCKVALE: Yes, sir.

(ANALYSIS OF PERSONAL PROPERTY CLAIM MARKED EXHIBIT No. 4).

MR. RICE: That is all I have, sir.

MR. HUCKVALE: I have no further questions, sir.







								The Canadian Pacific Cannery set aside Houses #1 and #2 for Japanese Storage: Effects of 8 Japanese were moved into house #1, effects of 4 Japanese were moved into house #2. Custodian agents listed chattels according to the Japanese names tagged on them. Where there was no tag the article was listed in the name of the former tenants of these houses. Letter of Dec. 4/42 on file - AKIZUKI states that he did not tag all his goods as "we thought the Imperial Cannery will look after".
