MR. COBUS: Your honour, I would call the case of Naoichi Okino, No. 137 on the list.

NAOICHI OKINO, the Claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified through the official interpreter as follows:

MR. COBUS: Your honour, I would ask to amend the claim. This is a claim for personal property only. The boat remains at \$800.00, the fishing net becomes \$695.00, a total claim of \$1495.00
10 with a credit to the Custodian of \$771.20, leaving a net claim of \$723.80.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. COBUS:

Q: Now, witness, I produce to you a statement concerning the vessel for which you are claiming. Did you ask Mr. McMaster to prepare that statement for you and is that your signature?

A: Yes.

20 Q: Are the contents of that statement true to the best of your knowledge and recollection?

A: Yes.

MR. COBUS: I would ask to file this as Exhibit No. 1 for the claimant, your honour.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1)

MR. COBUS: Referring now to Exhibit 1, your honour, the subject matter of the claim is a gill netter vessel known as "NO"/Okino, a vessel 30 feet by 7 feet by 3 feet six inches. It was built in 1935,
30 that is, it was new. The hull, only, cost \$700.00

to build. During the time that the claimant held the vessel, he scraped and painted it once each year and copper painted it twice a year and had the engine overhauled in 1938. It was turned over to the Navy according to instructions. He estimates the value of the boat to be \$800.00.

10 The improvements on the vessel consist of the addition of a 7 H.P. Vivian engine, including shaft, propeller, etc. Other normal gear was added, including an anchor, chain, compass, etc., at a cost of about \$25.00.

20 The claimant comments respecting this vessel as follows: "In or about 1939 the Fisheries Department made a survey and asked for the value of our boats. Like most other fishermen, I thought this survey was for the purpose of taxation and therefore valued my boat very conservatively at \$600.00. This did not reflect my estimate of a fair sale price for my boat. I do not remember ever valuing my boat at this figure for any other purpose or on any other occasion. I believe a fair value would have been \$800.00 as claimed."

I would ask my learned friend to admit that the boat was sold by the Custodian.

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: Your honour, the file indicates that the boat in question was sold on September 19, 1942 to Nelson Brothers Fisheries, Limited, and that the Custodian signed the sales papers. I will admit that is correct.

30 MR. COBUS: Q: Now, witness, I produce to you a state-

ment concerning your claim for nets. Did you instruct Mr. McMaster to prepare that statement for you and is that your signature?

A: Yes.

Q: Are the statements contained therein true to the best of your knowledge and recollection?

A: Yes.

MR. COBUS: I would ask to file this as the next exhibit.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2)

10 MR. COBUS: Referring to the statement concerning the nets, your honour, on the reverse side of the statement we have listed the gear for which he is claiming under four heads. We have made an attempt to reconcile our inventory with that of the sales summary sheet as we found it in the Custodian's file. In the list of gear for which we are claiming we indicate the description of the article, its age, the claimant's value, the sale price by the Custodian where it was capable of identification,
20 the sale price by the Custodian by general description, and in the last column we indicate those articles which are unaccounted for.

I would call attention, your honour, to the fact that there are four items of nets underlined in columns three and four which agree -- that is, the claimant's value and the sale price obtained by the Custodian agree in four instances, indicating that his estimate of value is quite accurate.

30 The statement is as follows: "I left my nets and gear at Terra Nova Cannery at Eburne, B.C.

The company permitted me to build a small room in which to hang and store my nets. I did so, and after I had tagged my nets I locked the door. A Mr. Jamieson, the cannery watchman, had advised me that he had been asked by the Custodian to have the fishermen in my neighbourhood store their nets in this cannery, and I handed to key to him. I gave Jamieson a list of my nets and gear and placed values opposite the various items. I

10 kept a copy of this list. When I signed my J.P. form it was after I had stored my nets and declared them to Jamieson. I did not think it was necessary to declare them again!

The nets are not found on the J.P. form, your honour, but they were declared on this list which was handed to Jamieson.

"I got burned out at Lillooet in 1945 and asked the Custodian to send me a copy of the list which I had declared. My claim is based on

20 the list he sent me."

I would ask my learned friend to produce a net statement of the claimant dated January 9, 1948, and would my learned friend produce the statement submitted by the claimant from which this statement which I have last asked for was prepared?

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: I will produce, your honour, a fishing net inventory. Whether or not the last statement was prepared from that I am not prepared to say, but this is an inventory on my file

30

that was apparently made out by the claimant. It is undated, shows the place of storage of the nets in question to be Terra Nova Cannery. They were in the care of B.C. Packers. It lists quite extensively the different types of nets.

MR. COBUS: Your honour, that is not the list to which I refer. There is an original list made by the claimant as stated in his claim form respecting the nets.

10 MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: Well, I haven't that on my file.

MR. COBUS: Then would my learned friend undertake to produce both the original and a copy of the statements which I have indicated?

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: Well, I would like to get that clear now as to what is required. Of course, if they are available, every effort will be made to get them.

MR. COBUS: The statement I make reference to is the
20 statement submitted by the claimant from which
statement the Custodian prepared a list and which
he sent to the claimant on January 9, 1948.

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: Now, I take that statement to be a statement that itemizes the various nets.

MR. COBUS: The various nets and gear which are claimed for in the statement which I have just read.

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: And when was it submitted to the Custodian?

MR. COBUS: According to the net statement I have before me, your honour, these were declared on April
30 17th, 1943.

Q: Now, witness, I produce to you a net statement. Will you tell me where you got that statement from?

A: This was sent to me by the Custodian from Vancouver.

MR. COBUS: I would ask to file this statement, your honour, as the next exhibit.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3)

MR. COBUS: It can be identified as a net statement of Naoichi Okino declared April 17, 1943 dated
10 January 9, 1948 and consists of a list of fishing gear with the claimant's values opposite each item.

Your honour, I would ask my learned friend to advise whether the fifth net described under item 3, a 9/40 x 9" x 32 mesh, 170 fathoms, two years old, which was valued by the claimant at \$150.00 and which was sold by the Custodian for \$100.00, was appraised. If my friend can't advise me, or cannot find it in the file, your
20 honour, will he undertake to produce it before the hearings in Vancouver.

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: The difficulty in these net claims, your honour, is that the Custodian may find it impossible to identify what he has disposed of with what the claimant may say belonged to him and is claiming for, and I don't feel that we can make that undertaking.

MR. COBUS: Your honour, I would suggest that the
30 Custodian has no difficulty in arriving at a figure which he credits to the claimant.

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: Well, I can give my friend all the information we have on the file, but, on this question of identification, I don't think we can undertake a great deal.

MR. COBUS: Well, will my friend at least undertake to produce such appraisal if one was made?

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: If there were appraisals of the nets that came into the hands and were disposed of by the Custodian, I will undertake that my
10 friend receives that information.

MR. COBUS: Your witness.

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: It will be submitted by way of defence, your honour, that the boat was sold for its fair market value, and it should be noted, in this respect, that the owner himself admits having valued the boat at \$600.00 and is now claiming \$800.00 for the same boat.

20 With regard to the nets, it will be submitted that what nets were sold by the Custodian were sold for their fair market value. It may be submitted that certain nets were of no value at all, and it may be further submitted that certain nets claimed for did not come into the hands of the Custodian. If any nets that are proved to have come into the hands of the Custodian are not accounted for, it will be submitted that the claim is exorbitant in connection therewith.

CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST:

Q: Now, witness, you will concede that your value of

the boat is far from a conservative one, will you not?

A: I think that the price that I placed on my boat was fair market value.

Q: However, you have already admitted, have you not, that at one time, when asked to make an estimate of the price of the same boat, you made an estimate of \$600.00?

10

A: I was asked by the fishery representative to put on a price of the boat. As all the other fishermen considered that this was for the purpose of taxation, I put on a price of \$600.00.

Q: Well, do you now say that that was not a true value, that it was a false value?

A: No, I think that \$800.00 is a fair market price.

Q: My question, witness, is this: Do you now say that \$600.00 was a false value for that boat?

A: It was not a false price or a wrong price, but it was not a selling price.

20 MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: That is all the questions I will ask that witness.

MR. COBUS: No questions, your honour.

(Witness aside)

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: I want to put in as Exhibit 4 the net statement dated February 1st, 1944.

MR. COBUS: Your honour, I think that is quite admissible, subject to my friend being able to prove the appraisals contained in that statement.

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: Yes, that is agreeable.

30

(NET STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4)

MR. COBUS: Your honour, I would point out, in addition, that the last exhibit is a statement of the Custodian, not that of the claimant.

MR. BOWEN-COLTHURST: That is correct, your honour, although there are certain values that are the values of the claimant and not of the Custodian that are on that form.






