All these five vessels were included in the sales approved by us during this week.

In the matter of settlement of claims for damage to vessels while in Naval Custody, the Commanding Officer, Pacific Coast, has submitted our recommendation that a fund be placed at the disposal of this Committee for the prompt settlement of claims surveyed jointly by the Committee's surveyor and the Naval surveyor, to the Secretary, Naval Board, Ottawa, and we are now awaiting decision.

A total of 35 claims, totalling \$3273.96, has been assessed to date. This does not include the claims which will come from the large number of vessels already repaired in shipyard or in process of being repaired.

Regarding the vessels coming within the jurisdiction of the Custodian of Alien Enemy Property, which were advertised for sale through the press, an analysis has not yet been made of the tenders submitted on these vessels, but we should be abl to report on this matter in next week's letter,







It would seem that since the owners are, for the most part, Canadian citizens they would be permitted to sell, transfer or lease their boats subject to approval and that if the fleet is not disposed of in this manner, then the Committee could, presumably, give consideration to other methods of disposal. I am submitting this to you since it comes from Vancouver and would respectfully suggest that the attention of the Council be drawn to the fact that the Government has recently appointed a Committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Justice Sidney A. Smith, to expedite the disposal of the fleet. I am enclosing herewith letter I have received from the Vancouver Zone Council of the Canadian Legion, together with a memorandum covering a rehabilitation plan for fishermen, drawn up by that body, wherein they urge that the Government take over 200 gillnet boats, 50 to 100 trollers and the entire shrimp fleet, providing enough money to buy the boats and nets and then set up a Fishing Rehabilitation Board to operate them as a means of rehabilitation. 
The These incidents have been a matter of considerable comment, and I sincerely hope that it will be found possible to utilize other than Japanese plants for the repairs to these vessels. I enclose herewith copy of a letter addressed to the Navy Control Service by the Stanley Park Shippards Ltd., and signed by "G. Kodama," the Japanese proprietor. I have received representations to the effect that some of the Japanese Fishing Vessels seized by the Navy have been given to Japanese Shipyards to be repaired; in particular, the following boats are mentioned: My dear Colleague, -Hon. A. L. Macdonald, Minister of Mational Defence for Maval Services, Ottawa, Ontario. Misso 1; Louise; and Holly Yours faithfully, 10, 1942. SYESSEN JULY TERNISSE TELLINE AT I am not writing this letter on behalf of Mr. Thompson or in any personal way, so I don't want to be misunderstood. He does not know anything about it. The information was brought to me by a very reliable party and I was asked to report same to you. This man could not understand why the work was done in a Jap shipyard and by Japs when the boats had been seized from them in the first place. VANCOUVER LIBERAL COUNCIL I was not able to find out who was responsible for the other two boats being sent there but the fact remains that they were repaired by a shippard operated by Japanese after they had been seized by order of the Government. Regarding the Holly L, I understand that it was tied up from there by the Navy. Then on December 18th, as per copy of letter enclosed which has been given to me in confidence with permission to send same along to you, the Japanese who owned this boat wrote to the Naval Control Service asking that the repair work on his boat be given to this Japanese concern, (The Stanley Park Shipyards) and the Naval Control released the boat and it was taken down there and the repair work done by this Jap shipyard. I have been asked to take up with you a matter with regard to the Japanese Boats which were taken over by the Government. You will recall that when I was in Ottawa we discussed the matter of some of them having been damaged. It has been brought to my attention that the repairs on three of these boats were done by the Stanley Park Shipyards, (a Japanese concern). The names of the boats are:-Nisso 1, Louise, and Holly L.
