Enclosed you will find a copy of letter that I have received from F. P. Varcoe, Deputy Minister of Justice. In view of the previous correspondence in this matter. I was considerably put out by the attitude displayed by Varcoe. He seems to overlook entirely the fact that the payment of the monies in this case will be chargeable to the Japanese and also to overlook the fact that the work that we have done in connection with each individual property is worth far more than the \$20.00 we have asked if our accounts are taxable on the Supreme Court tariff of this Province. In view of the fact that Varcoe does not see fit to follow the recommendation of the Secretary of State which was made after Mr. McPherson had been in Vancouver and had an opportunity of seeing the work that was going on, I feel that in fairness to myself I should have my accounts taxed. I feel that I have been more than fair in trying to meet the Department half way but I do not feel that I should allow the Department a straight advantage of its position to impose a completly unfair arrangement upon me. I take it from Varcoe's letter that his attitude is "take it or leave it". If arrangements can be made to have my accounts taxed in Vancouver I would have no hesitation in proceeding and would not feel it necessary to bother you further with the matter. It was indicated to me at one time that if the accounts had to be taxed they would have to be submitted to





Miall Assistant Deputy Dear Sir: This will acknowledge your telegram of November 20th and confirming letter which reads as follows: "Reference transfer Japanese lands Fraser Valley to Director Veterans' Land Act will you accept flat fee Fifteen Dollars for each property delivered and Ten Dollars for each property withdrawn from sale". We suggested that in view of the large volume of business in this matter that we would be pleased to reduce our taxable accounts and also include all attendances and charges on the original transaction whereby the property was first transferred by Master Deed for the sum of \$850,000.00, having in mind two purposes; firstly, to try and get a standard charge for the convenience of the Custodian (and thereby obviate endless explanation by the Custodian as to why one Japanese was charged more than another) and secondly, to avoid the necessity of drawing hundreds of pages of bills that would take up a great deal of time in the office. We understand that Mr. McPherson who attended in Vancouver and was familiar with the situation, after investigating the matter, recommended that our proposal of \$20.00 for each certificate of title actually delivered and \$10.00 for each property withdrawn, be accepted. My suggestion was that in order to save about a month's work drawing itemized accounts that we might agree on a fee of \$20.00 for each title actually delivered irrespective of how much work was involved and a fee of \$10.00 for each property that we handled and which was subsequently withdrawn from the transaction. Mr. McPherson advised me that he had recommended this settlement and that he would take it up with the Minister in due course. 


















CANADA DEPARTMENT OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE Ottawa, July 14, 1943. This acknowledges your letter of July 7th, advising me of the recommendations of your Executive Committee with respect to the sale of Japanese property. Careful note is made of your representations.

I am inclined to think, from a statement contained in the second of the proposed safeguards, that the members of your Committee were not informed as to the facts. This paragraph assumes that the proceeds of the sales are held by the Custodian in trust for the owners. That, of course, is not the fact; proceds are paid over to the owners in full, and immediately, except in the rare case of an owner who has been interned as an enemy alien. Possibly if this fact had been understood, the views of the members of your Committee would have been different. May I say, in general, that the rapid deterior-ation of this property was so great that, in a year or two, it would have had little value, and the sale before the lands have been completely overgrow with weeds and the useful plants smothered would see to be in the the useful plants smothered would see to be in the interest of the owners. 


- 1. That sales of property and possessions should not be made heatily and only when deterioration might affect values.
