## TWO-THIRDS OF JAPANESE BOATS BACK IN FISHERIES

Of the 1,337 Japanese-owned fishing boats confiscated in British Columbia by the Navy shortly after Japan's entry into the war 887 or approximately 66 percent have been sold for use in the coast fisheries.

The largest number, 660, were acquired by fishing companies either for resale to individuals or for own use. B.C. Packers bought 237 boats; Canadian Fishing Co., 151; Anglo-B.C. Packing Co., 99; Nelson Bros. Fisheries, 67; J.H. Todd & Sons, 29; Francis Millerd & Co., 29; Great West Packing Co., 22; Cassiar Packing Co., 13; North Shore Packing Co., 7, and Queen Charlotte Fisheries, 6.

The entire fleet was classified as 860 gillnet boats, 148 carriers, 141 cod, crab and other types, 120 trollers, and 68 seiners.

Sales to the fishing industry realized \$1,021,530 which, less 1 percent service charge, was paid to the Japanese owners.

Average price of seine boats was \$5,694; carriers, \$2,275; trollers, \$1,321; cod, crab and other types of boats, \$740, and gillnet boats, \$620.
