Re: Payment of Express charges on distribution 7 Filed of books sent by the Japanese Red Cross to the International Red Cross Poly in Canada.

The International Red Cross Delegate has sent to us a bill dated July 9, 1945, which he has received from the Department of Labour. This bill, for \$21.29, covers the express charges on shipping Japanese books to the various Japanese settlements in Canada. These books arrived some months ago on a relief ship.

The Canadian Government is bound to pay the express charges for distributing the books, and the only question is whether the Department of External Affairs, or the Department of Labour should assume the payment.

In January, 1945, we had a similar problem, and it was decided that the Department of External Affairs should pay the transportation charges. However, when I handled the case in January, 1945, I was not aware (due to faulty filing) of the existence of a precedent in May, 1944. At that time we had to deal with a very large bill for dis-tributing relief supplies which had been sent by the Japanese Red Cross to the International Red Cross; but at that time you requested the Department of Labour to assume the expense, and they agreed to do so.

In view of the fact that we now have precedents on both sides of the question, what view do you take of the Departmental responsibility for paying the bill of \$21.29?

Your letter of February 1 referred to customs taxes and express charges on Red Cross shipments to the Japanese Division of this Department at Vancouver and enclosed a cheque for \$35.38 in full payment of the invoice for express charges and brokerage. I attach a receipt from the Treasury Officer of the Security Commission acknowledging this payment, for your records.

As you suggested, the other invoice for \$46.50 in customs taxes is being taken up with Mr. H. R. Munroe of the Customs Division, Department of National Revenue, to obtain a refund. The Commissioner of Japanese Placement advises that the invoice date, March 6, 1944, is correct, and covers last year's shipment. This was mislaid in the local Treasury Office and has just now turned up. I presume that we will be receiving another invoice if customs duties were paid on the recent shipment of Red Cross books from San Francisco.

We have received your letter of January 22nd regarding the shipment of books recently sent by the Japanese Red Cross and forwarded to Mr. E. Maag, Delegate in Canada of the International Red Cross Committee.

The sum of \$81.88 referred to in your letter is made up of two separate items. The first is the invoice for express charges and brokerage, amounting to \$35.38. We are of the opinion that the Canadian Government should pay for the shipping of the books from San Francisco to Vancouver. We therefore enclose a cheque for \$35.38 to reimburse your Department. Will you please tell Mr. Maag that these charges are being paid by the Department of External Affairs.

The other item consists of customs taxes amounting to \$46.50. Mr. Wershof of this Department discussed this matter last week with Mr. H.R. Munroe of the Customs Division of the Department of National Revenue. Mr. Munroe agreed that no taxes should have been charged on this shipment, in view of the fact that it was intended for the International Red Cross Delegate. Mr. Munroe said that if you would send him full details, he would arrange a refund of the taxes paid. In this connection, may I point out that the invoice (which I return herewith) indicates that the duties and taxes were paid in March 1944. This is obviously incorrect and you will no doubt obtain the correct date and perhaps the Customs entry number, before writing to Mr. Munroe. In writing to him, I would suggest that you refer to his telephone conversation with Mr. Wershof. We would be glad to take this matter up in writing with the Department of National Revenue if you should have any further difficulties.

A shipment of books for Japanese civilians in the internment and settlement camps in Canada recently was sent to San Francisco by the Japanese Red Cross. The International Red Cross in the United States shipped the books to Mr. E. Maag, Delegate in Canada of the International Red Cross. For convenience the books were consigned to Mr. Maag c/o the British Columbia Security Commission (part of the Department of Labour). The British Columbia Security Commission paid the collect express changes amounting to \$35.38 and then billed the International Red Cross Society.

It is desirable that these charges be borne by the Canadian Government, and it would be contrary to our usual policy to expect the International Red Cross to pay them. A shipment of supplies for American and Canadian prisoners and internees in Japanese territory was recently sent to Japan and the Japanese Government is paying all transportation charges within Japan. In the interests of reciprocity, it is desirable that we pay the transportation charges on these books from the port of arrival in North America to Vancouver.

Enclosed is the original invoice dated January 3, 1945, sent to the International Red Cross Society by the British Columbia Security Commission. Would it be possible to obtain a cheque for \$35.38 payable to the Receiver General which we could sent to the Department of Labour in payment of this account.

Re: Shipment of books for Japanese civilians in Canada

These books were sent to San Francisco by the Japanese Red Cross and were forwarded by the International Red Cross in the United States to Mr. Maag, for distribution to Japanese in camps in Canada. As a matter of convenience Mr. Maag had the books addressed to him c/o the British Columbia Security Commission.

A week ago Mr. Pammett of the Department of Labour phoned me and said that the British Columbia Security Commission had had to pay customs duties on these books and that Mr. Maag said that no customs should be levied on things imported by the International Red Cross. Mr. Pammett said that he had spoken to Custom's about the matter but without success. I told Mr. Pammett to send the details over to us and that we would arrange a refund.

Mr. Pammett accordingly send over a letter of January 22nd. This letter is rather confused. It refers to \$81.88 customs tax as paid. The enclosures make it clear that the customs amounted to \$46.50 but that the British Columbia Security Commission also paid \$35.38 express from San Francisco to Vancouver. It also appears from the enclosures that Mr. Maag had told the British Columbia Security Commission that he would pay the express charges.

I phoned Mr. H.R. Munroe, Chief Appraiser of the Customs Department (Local 3622). He remembered having talked with Pammett about this matter. However, Munroe insists that all that he asked Pammett to do was to send over full details in order that a refund might be arranged. Munroe agreed that supplies brought into Canada by the International Red Cross for distribution to enemy civilian internees should not be subject to customs duties.

I then phoned Mr. Pammett and explained what Munroe had said. I also pointed out to Pammett the error in his letter regarding the amount. I told Mr. Pammett that his letter did not give the correct date on which the duty had been paid and that we would need such information before the refund could be arranged.

At this point Mr. Pammett brought up something which he had never mentioned before, namely, that Mr. Maag had told him that the Canadian Government should pay the express charges. I discussed this with Mr. Feaver and it would appear that we ought to pay the express charges, in view of the exchange of telegrams with the Spanish Consul General on file 621-CR-40C (his telegram of October 18, 1944 and our reply of October 24, 1944).

This morning I spoke to Mr. Maag and asked him what his intention was regarding the express charges. He said that he had intended to pay them and then to ask this Department for a refund. It was never his idea they should actually be borne by the International Red Cross. I told Mr. Maag, that as the charges had already been paid by the Department of Labour, it might be simpler not to bill Mr. Maag.

As suggested by Mr. Wershof, I am enclosing Recoverable Invoices sent by the Japanese Division, Vancouver Office to Mr. E. Maag, for payment of Customs Taxes by the Japanese Division (or B.C. Security Commission) for Japanese books sent from San Francisco, by the International Red Cross for Mr. Maag. I enclose also copies of correspondence received on the subject.

You will note that Mr. Meyer's letter of December 12 to Mr. Maag states that the books were being shipped to Mr. Maag c/o the B.C. Security Commission at Vancouver. While speaking with Messrs. Taylor and Munroe of the Customs Branch, Department of National Revenue, on the telephone, however, I was informed that their view was that goods coming into Canada consigned to a Government department were required to pay the regular tax. They professed to know nothing of any arrangement for International Red Cross goods coming in free of tax.

I would be obliged if you would take the necessary measures to clear this matter up with the Customs Branch of the Department of National Revenue and have them refund to the Japanese Division, Department of Labour, (Vancouver Office) as soon as possible the amount of \$81.88 to cover Customs Taxes paid on these goods by the Vancouver Office of the Japanese Division as a courtesy to the International Red Cross Delegate in Canada.

I understand that Mr. Maag is proceeding to Vancouver next month to make a distribution of such books as may be cleared by Censorship.

With reference to your letter of May 11th, I wish to state that I very strongly share in the regret which you express concerning the destruction of certain books, condemned by Censorship, which arrived in Canada from the Gripsholm, destined to Japanese nationals.

It is probable that these particular books were of no substantial value, but you will agree that it would be disastrous for the Canadian Government to establish the principle that books, destined for prisoners of war, upon being found objectionable to Censorship authorities, may be destroyed.

At the present moment we are encountering difficulties with the German authorities who are preventing Canadian prisoners of war from receiving books of a highly technical and scientific nature which the prisoners of war desire for educational purposes. These particular books happen to be very expensive. It would be most unhappy if the German authorities, relying on the destruction of Japanese books as a precedent, decided to dispose of the technical and scientific books by fire, or otherwise.

I would be grateful, therefore, if you would point out to Mr. Collins the possible implications of his action and request that he instruct all those who know of the disposition of the Japanese books, that they give absolutely no publicity to the matter.

In reply to your letter of April 30th concerning Japanese literature which arrived on the "Gripsholm" and was subsequently condemned by the Censor, I may say that Mr. Collins has reported as follows:

"These books were returned to this office by the Postal Censor with the advice that authority would have to be received from Ottawa to destroy them. Accordingly, I wrote to Mr. Maag asking for the necessary permission. Some time passed and I wrote again but no advice was received. As the books were taking up valuable space in this office and fearing that they might be inadvertently shipped out with stationery, they were taken to the furnace room and destroyed in the presence of witnesses.

I regret that this occurred but the books were gone over very thoroughly by officials of the Censor's Department and possibly they could advise if there was anything which might be of value to the Intelligence which should be recorded."

You will recall that I mentioned to you by telephone two or three weeks ago that of the 1213 books and pamphlets which reached Canada aboard the Gripsholm last year, destined for the Japanese in Canada, 129 were condemned by censorship. 'At the time of our conversation you mentioned that the British Columbia Security Commission had no storage space available for such material.

I am now advised by the Chief Postal Censor that, following consultation with the Delegate in Canada of the International Committee of the Red Cross, the books were returned to Commissioner George Collins on March 20th.

As I indicated to you, this Department is prepared to accept responsibility for the books. It occurs to me that some of them may, in fact, be valuable to us from the standpoint of Intelligence, and I shall consequently direct them to the competent officers of External Affairs, if you would kindly advise Mr. Collins to forward them here.

#### REJECTED BOOKS FOR JAPANESE PRISONERS OF WAR.

Mr. Norman was asked whether he had any interest in these books. He replied that he could not say offhand, but that some of the titles suggested that at least a portion of the books might be useful.to him. Still more, he thought, they would be wanted by the United States Intelligence people.

He therefore asked whether we could have the books delivered to this Department so that he could look them over and select those he wanted and alsomake a list of the remaining titles for forwarding to the U.S. I undertook to arrange this.

Presumably National Defence, Army, has a storage room or rooms for rejected German books. Doubtless they could be persuaded to accept the remaining Japanese books which neither Norman or the U.S. wanted.

I see the first item for Sub-Committee B on Thursday is "provision of free transport for parcels destined for enemy prisoners of war". This may perhaps be related to the subject of our recent correspondence, the last item of which was my letter of March 7th, . answering yours of March 4th, concerning free transport of Gripsholm relief to Japanese in Canada. It may be worth while, in anticipation of receipt of the paper, to point out that the correspondence referred to one shipment of bulk relief destined for Japanese civilians in Canada (there are no Japanese prisoners of war in Canada). It was agreed on the last repatriation exchange, between Canada and Japan. that each side might send "relief goods" on the Gripsholm; the Japanese chose to send tea, books and other goods designed to relieve nostalgia rather than hunger. It seemed simpler to arrange mutually for the country of destination to pay for the distribution of the goods, which in Canada were divided by the I.R.C.C. delegate between interned and uninterned Japanese.

The Canadian Government have apparently not considered whether. in general, goods destined for civilian internees or for non-interned persons in Canada should be transmitted free of charge but would doubtless be willing to consider it if requested.

Subject: Relief Goods for Japanese Nationals via Gripsholm.

I have for acknowledgment your letter of March 17th, which concerns the distribution of relief goods sent to the Japanese in Canada via the Gripsholm.

I shall bring your objection to the method of distribution to the attention of Mr. Maag. I should, however, appreciate it if you would make clear what you mean by saying that some goods were given to Japanese Canadians "by mistake". In a letter to this Department dated 8th December, Mr. Maag submitted his proposed distribution. In that letter he stated that he would be forwarding a similar schedule to the B.C. Security Commission. I assumed that had you any objection to it I should hear of it from you or you would discuss it with Mr. Maag. I felt on the whole, that the proposed distribution was reasonable and that in any event it was properly primarily a matter to be decided by the Red Cross and the Protecting Fower, by whom the schedule had been drawn up.

I think, you will agree that it would be very difficult to distribute such supplies only to Japanese nationals when it is remembered that within a family, some members will be Japanese nationals and others Canadian. On the other hand, if we were to take the position that only internees should be considered, we should be seriously handicapping the work of distributing vitally important supplies to our own nationals in Japanese hands. I felt, therefore, that we should not object to any reasonable proposal put forward by the Red Cross and concurred in by the Protecting Power.

It is highly unlikely that there will be another shipment in the near future but as I am anxious to meet your wishes I should be very glad to receive your views as to a method of distribution which will obviate the difficulty of which you speak and I will discuss with Mr. Maag the handling of future shipments of a similar character.

I am informed by the Department of Labour that some exception is being taken by Japanese to the distribution of relief goods which arrived on the Gripsholm. It is suggested that Japanese in many settlements have complained to the Department of Labour either that they were omitted from the distribution or that ones that should not have shared in the goods were improperly recipients of supplies.

I had thought the distribution proposed in your letters of November 50th and December 8th, entirely reasonable and that in any event, it was primarily for decision by you and the Protecting Power. The suggestion is now put forward that no Japanese who are Canadian nationals should have been included. I realize the impossibility of excluding all Canadians of Japanese racial origin, at the same time, including all Japanese nationals since, within families, some will be Canadians and others Japanese.

While no future distribution seems contemplated at the moment, I should appreciate receiving your views as to the reaction generally with respect to the method used and also would appreciate any suggestion you have to make in event that occasion should arise to consider it again.

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I have a communication from Mr. George Collins, Commissioner of the British Columbia Security Commission, Vancouver, asking for instructions as to the disposal of Japanese books which arrived on the "Gripsholm" and which were condemned by the censor. Mr.Collins says that it was his impression that the postal censor would make the necessary arrangements to dispose of these books but he is now apparently waiting for my authority to do so and would be glad to receive my persmission to have these books destroyed.

According to information received at the time we submitted these books for censorship, there was a total of 1213 books and pamphlets received, of which 129 were condemned by the censor, the condemned books being pamphlets on drama and some twenty books on such subjects as "Looking into the European War", "Japanese History", "Loyalty", "Uprising Japanese Spirit", "Hardships of Family Life", "Beautiful Woman's History", "Book on Swords", etc.

I do not think that it is up to me to suggest disposal of these books, and I would appreciate it if you would instruct the Chief Postal Censor or the District Postal Censor in Vancouver regarding the action which he should take.

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I have received copy of intercepted letter from three delegates in the Japanese Road Camps at Princeton, B.C., to Mr. E. L. Maag, International Red Cross delegate at Montreal. This letter is dated February 28 and complains ' that they were not given a share of the Soya Sauce, etc., which came from the 'apanese Red Cross. They asked to be put on the list for distribution of future supplies.

Attention: Mr. Feaver.

We are entirely opposed to such goods being given to Japanese Canadians, as happened by mistake in a number of cases in the last distribution. There have been harmful repercussions as a result in every Japanese settlement from British Columbia to Montreal.

I understand that you were bringing this matter to the attention of Mr. Maag, and I wish you would advise me of his reply. In any future distribution he should be asked to make a careful allotment of such goods to Japanese Nationals only, so that the Government and B.C. Security Commission will not be accused by the public and/or the Japanese Canadians in this connection.

May I refer to your letter of 7th March with respect to free transportation for the distribution of relief supplies for Japanese in Canada, shipped on the Gripsholm.

You will recall that this matter was considered early in December. The memorandum prepared by Captain O'Brien and approved by you, drew attention to the fact that the proposal regarding free transport on shipments intended for prisoners of war need not necessarily be deemed to extend to shipments consigned to civilian internees and almost certainly not to civilians who are not interned. You will also recall that this matter was discussed by you and Mr. Rive and was referred to the Legal Division before the Delegate of the Red Cross Committee was informed that the Government of Canada would pay these freight charges.

I feel that this situation is somewhat different from the I feel that this situation is somewnat different from the agreement to pay freight on other goods consigned to other prisoners of war in that, when this matter was being considered, we had to make arrangements to pay transportation charges on goods which had been sent to Japan for Canadian nationals there. It seemed a matter of almost purely local concern to arrange through the Red Cross that we would pay transportation charges here, provided we were given assurance that the Japanese would defray transportation charges on goods consigned to our nationals. The decision was not intended to be general in its application but explied only to a particular shipment which has now been disbut applied only to a particular shipment which has now been dispesed of.

I think there is no reason why the matter should not be discussed by Sub-Committee "B" if you feel that Sub-Committee "B" would be at all interested in it.

May I refer you to Captain O'Brien's letter of February 3rd, regarding free transport for the distribution of relief supplies from the "Gripsholm" for Japanese in Canada.

Gardner of the War Office has written pointing out that when a similar question arose regarding free transport on British railways, the U.K. consulted Sub Committee 'B' before reaching a decision. (See Item 4 of the Minutes of the 29th meeting). While he thinks that nobody would object to the policy, he suggests that it be brought before Sub Committee 'B' at its next meeting, with a view to the Committee taking note.

I have replied that we have no objection whatever to this happening, and that I presume the reason we had not consulted the Sub Committee was the Chairman's statement at the 29th meeting that the question of free transport facilities for parcels destined for civilian internees did not come within the terms of reference of the Sub Committee.

This is perhaps rather a lucky break, as I suppose in fact we had not the Chairman's statement in mind. The fact is, both the U.K. and ourselves are not very consistent in referring things to the Sub Committees. In this case I think that we were quite justified since the general principle of free transportation had been approved by the Dominions.

Canada House would be grateful if, in communicating decisions which may interest the Sub Committees, the background for them could be given in your letters as fully as possible. It happened in this case that I remembered that there had been some previous conversations in the Sub Committee, but we have not the staff here to go through the files as a matter of course. In the present case, for instance, it would have

Mr. Maag, the International Red Cross Delegate to Canada, received via the Gripsholm four cases of books for distribution to the Japanese settlements including internees. These books which did not come by mail were referred to the British Columbia Security Commission for distribution, and we offered the Commission the service of our examiners in Vancouver.

According to a report from Commissioner Collins of the British Columbia Security Commission, this shipment comprised 1,213 books, of which 129 were condemned by the examiners. All these books were returned to the Commission, but the condemned pieces have since been delivered back to Postal Censorship in Vancouver for disposal. As the books referred to are not Postal items, it seems to us that disposal should be decided on by the British Columbia Security Commission, possibly after consulation with Mr. Maag, but before returning them to the Commission, we would appreciate your advice.

The labelling contravenes the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act in certain respects. The products. Metabolin, Sovolin, Tokadiastase and Biofermin violate Section 6A of the Act. The list of medicinal ingredients must be stated in English or French or in both. Since these preparations are not for sale we would not be prepared to take objection to their distribution to the Japanese nationals.

I have your letter of January 20th in reply to mine of the 17th with reference to the above. I think you may take it that no replief supplies will be distributed to Canadian Japanese, except in unusual cases as for example, where one member of a family may be a Canadian National and the others Japanese Nationals.

With respect to the distribution of the goods recently received, the Delegate of the International Red Gross Society discussed the distribution of supplies with this Department and with the Director, Prisoners of War and probably should have been referred to your Department but as there was no suggestion in the correspondence that the Delegate proposed to seek the assistance of your officials in distribution, and as the matter was one of some urgency when it reached this Department, the proposal put forward by the Delegate and approved by the representative of the Protecting Power, was accepted.

I feel that there is considerable merit in your suggestion that supplies should not be distributed to Japanese who are self-supporting and who are working on civilian employment but I feel that to exclude such a class from a general distribution, might very well result in a cry of discrimination.

I enclose for your information, a copy of the proposed distribution which I think is, having regard to all the circumstances, quite fair.

I have your letter of January 17th in which you recommend that this Government should be prepared to assume the expense of transporting such supplies furnished by the Japanese Government as might be consigned to Japanese in Canada - not only those who are interned but those who are in the Japanese settlements subject to the assurance that the Japanese Government would, in turn, defray the cost of relief supplies shipped to our internees in Japanese hands.

I am not sure that the position of Canadians in Japan who, I understand, are all interned, is parallel with Japanese in this country, of whom there are less than 400 interned, the balance being scattered across Canada with one group comprising 50% of all Japanese in Canada situated in settlements in B.C., a substantial group in southern Alberta, another substantial group in an area of Manitoba, and the balance scattered through Ontario and Quebec, chiefly in the City of Montreal.

The International Red Cross representative appears to have handled the recent shipment of supplies from the Japanese Government to the Japanese in Canada by an arbitrary allocation of the shipment of these supplies to our Departmental Placement Officers in Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Lethbridge and Vancouver and presumably also by shipment to the internment camp at Angler; this being done without prior references, as far as we are aware, to anyone in this Department.

Our suggestion is that these supplies should no. be available for Canadian-born Japanese and that the distribution of such supplies might well be limited, at the most, to interned Japanese and the Japanese Nationals in the Interior Settlements in British Columbia, and that there should be no undertaking to distribute these supplies to Japanese who are self-supporting and working at civilian employment elsewhere in Canada.

Nevertheless, any reasonable arrangement for distribution of supplies from the Japanese Government to Japanese Nationals in this country, which will facilitate distribution of supplies to British subjects in Japanese custody should be agreed to, but there should be no undertaking to distribute such supplies to Canadian Japanese.

I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your Despatch of December 20, which has reference to the distribution of relief supplies to the Japanese population in Canada. With respect to the third paragraph of your letter, you say that the question of granting free freight or, rather, the question of the Canadian Government paying the freight on shipments intended for internees, has not been considered.

In the last paragrph you say that the Canadian authorities will be prepared to pay the charges on shipments of relief supplies for Japanese civilian internees in Canada if they can be assured that the Japanese Government or the Japanese Red Cross will provide for transportation of relief supplies for civilians interned in Japan and Japanese-occupied territories, and assume the costs.

Upon receipt of your Despatch I cabled my Principals as per my telegram #1398, copy of which please find enclosed herewith. Under date of January 7th my Principals answered, as per cable #620 INTERCROIXROUGE SE893, which takes reference to their cable #507, copies of which cables are also enclosed.

Although the wording of cable #507 in some respects appears to me to be ambiguous, that cable is quite clear in the statement made in the second-last sentence, which says that charges for reshipment from ports of call and Yokohama to final destinations, also those connected with actual delivery to various camps, are borne by the Japanese authorities.

The Japanese relief goods off S.S."CRIPSHOIM" have been shipped and the freight charges have been prepaid by this office pending settlement of the question as to who should finally assume these charges. The freight bills are being paid tentatively out of the Delegate's Account, because we have no funds whatsoever to take care of even incidental expenses in connection with relief to Japanese nationals.

I should appreciate it if you would give this question your consideration and inform me of your decision.

/ With reference to previous correspondence, I have to advise you that we have received the four cases of books which were forwarded on the S.S. Gripsholm, for distribution amongst Japanese in Canada.

The cases are being shipped to the British Columbia Security Commission in Vancouver for distribution. The Commission has been advised that if they consider the books should be examined, the necessary examiners required in this connection may be obtained from the Vancouver Censorship station.

We have written the Commission advising them that the books are being shipped to them, and we have also advised Mr. Maag of the action we have taken.

## Re: Shipment of Japanese Relief Goods off S.S."GRIPSHOIM".

With further reference to our previous correspondence concerning Japanese relief in Canada, we have now received the following merchandise in Montreal:

> 1190 small barrels of Shoyu Sauce, 41 large barrels of Bean Paste, 113 cases of Tea, 3 cases of games and musical instruments, 5 cases of Drugs, 4 cases of Books.

The Shoyu Sauce, Bean Paste and Tea have already been distributed in agreement with the representative of the Protecting Power and according to the plan which we submitted to you under date of December 8, 1943.

The four cases of books have been shipped today per C.P.R.Freight to the Chief Postal Censor in Ottawa, without the cases having been opened, and I am enclosing herewith copy of a letter addressed to the Chief Postal Censor concerning this shipment.

In connection with the five cases of drugs, I regret to inform you that the liquid drugs arrived in very bad shape, most of the bottles containing liquids having been broken due to poor packing. The shipment comprised the following drugs:

280 bottles Mercurochrome (?) (hardly one bottle complete due to breakage

of glass or poor erating); 140 boxes @ 100 tablets Metabolin corlin 23 jars @ 50 tablets Sovolin 70 jars @ 50 tablets Biofermin 23 bottles Saccharogen (appro.4 oz.bottles) 138 bottles @ 60 tablets Riken Vitamin pills

160 bottles @ ...tablets Wakamoto pills (this seems to be another Vitamin preparation). 64 jars @ 100 tablets Takadiastase tablets.

I am mailing to you today one each of the packages enumerated above, so that you may have them examined by the competent medical authorities and advise me if it is permissible to send them either into Camp 101 or else into the Japanese DEAL OF EXTERNE WE Settlements in B.C.

Regarding the games and musical instruments, the contents of the three cases were the following:

Box 126 - measuring approximately 12 x 13 x 24" - contained only four (4) mouth organs, the rest being excelsior. In my opinion the contents of this box were pilfered.

Box 118 - contained six small bamboo flutes and 13 large bamboo flutes.

Box 117 - contained 24 sets of Japanese Checkers and 24 sets of Japanese Chess, both apparently complete.

I have asked our Delegation in Washington if they had shipping bills showing what the boxes were supposed to contain, and until such time as I have received these I cannot say how much of this relief shipment has been pilfered. It may interest you also to know that the tea arrived undamaged and complete, as also did the Miso Paste, but a small number (probably 8 or 9) of the bamboo bound pails containing Shoyu Sauce were damaged and the contents leaking out or completely emptied.

We have despatched to you today, per C.P. Freight, four cases of books which were received here off S.S."GRIPSHOLM", for distribution amongst Japanese nationals in Canada. These cases were not opened in Montreal, and if it is not asking too much, I should appreciate it if, upon unpacking, lists could be made of the contents of each box, so that we may check same with the shipping bills when received. Those boxes which are permitted for distribution in Canada should be returned to us in Montreal unless the censoring has to be done in Vancouver, in which case the books may be turned over to the British Columbia Security Commission for distribution at their discretion to the Japanese Settlements, but in that case the Japanese Internment Camp at Angler, Ont. must not be forgotten, who should also receive a fair share of these books.

## Re: Relief Supplies - S.S. Gripsholm

I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of November 30, together with the letters enclosed therein, and your letter of December 8 with suggestion as to method of distribution.

So far as the distribution of relief supplies is concerned, I feel that this is primarily a matter for yourself and the Protecting Power and I have no comment to make on your proposal.

With respect to the last paragraph of your letter of November 30, I may say that the proposal regarding free freight, referred to relief supplies and presents for prisoners of war. The question of granting free freight or rather the question of this Government paying the freight on shipments intended to internees, has not been considered.

The Canadian authorities will be prepared to assume the freight charges on shipments of relief supplies for Japanese civilian internees in Canada if they can be assured that the Japanese Government or the Japanese Red Cross will provide for transportation of relief supplies for civilians interned in Japan and Japanese-occupied territories, and assume the costs.

NOTE FOR MR. RIVE

I pass on to you File No.3464-AF-40 and 621-HQ-40. The former deals with the disposition of comforts for Japanese in Canada: The latter with the proposal that this Government should bear the freight on shipments intended for prisoners of war.

As I read the correspondence, no consideration was intended to be given to the payment of freight on goods intended for civilian internees and certainly not for goods consigned to civilians who were not interned.

It may be that as a matter of policy and in the interests of our civilians in the Far East, we should transport such goods free. I suggest, however, that we ascertain what the Japanese Government is doing before committing ourselves. I think we must take it that the present situation is that we have no approval of such a scheme from other interested Departments.

With further reference to our letter of November 30th, may I draw your attention to an error which occurred in the copying of our list of distribution of the goods in Canada, on which list the quantity of cases of tea reserved for Slocan Extension is marked as 50 cases, whereas we meant to ship 20 cases to that settlement.

Since discussing the matter of distribution with the representative of the Protecting Power, Consul General P.E.Schwartz, it has been suggested that we should keep back in our warehouse about 10% of the cases of tea available in order to have a reserve if any claim should be made by groups of Japanese not considered in the distribution made by me. The distribution of tea, therefore, is proposed on the following basis:

This also is at the suggestion of the representative of the Protecting Power.

I have not as yet sent a list of distribution to the British Columbia Security Commission pending approval of this list by your Department.

I would appreciate hearing from you at an early date whether this distribution is acceptable, because we expect this shipment in Montreal very shortly.

We have been informed by the Japanese Government, through the International Red Cross Committee of Geneva, that a small quantity of supplies and comforts is being shipped to Japanese internees and transferred Japanese in this country via the civilian exchange ships which met at Portuguese India last week.

As you may know, Canada and the United States shipped on the M.S. "Gripsholm" a large quantity of relief supplies for distribution among Allied nationals in Japanese hands, and in return we have agreed to accept and distribute Japanese "relief" sent to this continent. It is of course most desirable that we should see that the Japanese supplies are duly distributed in this country so that the Japanese authorities will have no excuse for badly distributing, or neglecting to distribute, the goods we are sending to them; and in this connection I think it may be useful for you to know that in the Japanese shipment to Canada there are stated to be four cases of books, all of which are presumably in the Japanese language. These books, like the other supplies, are to be distributed under the supervision of Mr. E.L. Maag, the Delegate in Canada of the International Red Cross Committee, and are expected to arrive in New York on or about December 2.

I am passing this information on to you as you will probably wish to have a censorship inspection made of the four crates. They are probably addressed to Mr. Maag. If you think it desirable, we could write to Mr. Maag asking him to be sure to send the crates on to whatever place they should be censored at. Copies of this letter are being s nt to Mr. Jolliffe, the Deputy Minister of Labour and the Director, Prisoners of War.

I have the honour to acknowledge your letter of July 5th, forwarding a copy of a cable received by yourself from the International Red Cross, No.434 INTER-CROIXROUGE 56730 of July 5th.

With regard to the distribution of comforts from Japan among the Japanese internees in Canada, as you know, the usual procedure is for these to be sent forward by the Director of Prisoners of War where they are distributed with the assistance of the spokesman. There is, however, no objection to the Canadian Red Cross taking part in the distribution, should the International Red Cross Committee feel that this is desirable, and we are writing the Canadian Red Cross asking them if they would care to nominate an officer at Ottawa to collaborate with you and with the Director of Prisoners of War and yourself in making the distribution.

With regard to the desire expressed by the Japanese Red Cross for the satisfactory censorship of books which they expect to send forward, I don't think there will be any difficulties, as this will be undertaken in the usual way.

The International Red Cross Delegate, 1040 Sun Life Building, Montreal, Que. It is assumed that the Japanese Red Gross have been advised by the International Red Gross as to the subject matter which is acceptable and that which should not be sent.

All mail for individual internees, letters and parcels alike, whatever the contents, should be addressed "C/o the Director, Prisoners of War, Ottawa". The addressee's camp and his internee number should be shown if they are known, but failure to show them will not prevent, although it may slightly delay delivery.

Mail to Japanese subjects who have been moved from security zones may be addressed to their new place of residence if known. If the new address is not known, such letters should bear the full name of the addressee, the previous address, if known, and be marked "C/o the British Columbia Security Commission, Vancouver". If no address is known the full name should be given, followed by "C/o the British Columbia Security Commission, Vancouver."

In conclusion, may I say that we are gratified to learn that the Japanese Red Cross is prepared reciprocally to grant all possible facilities for the distribution of relief supplies to Canadian prisoners of war and internees in Japanese hands.

I note from the telegram from Geneva which Maag encloses with his letter that Japanese intentions could be interpreted as meaning that they wished to send mail to "internees and detainees".

#### (a) Internees:

It will be sufficient if the full names of the internees are given and if the letters are marked "care of Director, Prisoners of War, Ottawa". If they are known, the addressee's camp and his internee number should also be indicated. I believe the Japanese have the latter information in some cases, but I am not sure whether they have it in all.

#### (b) Detainees:

The Japanese may possibly include in this category those of their nationals who have been moved away from security zones. I have discussed the question of appropriate addressing in these cases with Inspector Saul's office, and they suggest we advise the Japanese to mark such letters "care of B.C. Security Commission, Vancouver."



Dear Mr. Gordon:

We received an enquiry through the International Red Cross as to whether the Canadian authorities will permit the Canadian Red Cross to arrange for the distribution of relief supplies and comforts sent from Japan to Japanese internees in Canada and whether the Canadian Red Cross will be prepared to undertake this service.

The ordinary arrangements for disposition of supplies among prisoners of war and internees are that they are shipped to the camp, where the spokesman supervises distribution. However, as we are concerned about the distribution of supplies to Canadian prisoners of war and internees in the Far East and may have to depend upon the good will of the Japanese Red Cross, I should be glad if the Canadian Red Cross would consider associating themselves with the arrangements for distribution at this end. No great amount of work is required as the normal arrangements work very well. All that would be required would be for you to name an officer, preferably in Ottawa, who could be in touch with the Delegate of the International Red Cross and the Director of Prisoners of War when the goods arrive from Japan, and could assume himself that they were sent forward and equitably distributed in the camp.

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I have the honour to enclose herewith copies of a cable which I have received from Geneva under date of July 5th, bearing reference No.434 INTERCROIXROUCE S6730.

My Principals ask me to obtain the consent of the national Red Cross Society to receive and distribute foodstuffs, games, pastimes, books, etc. which are to be shipped from Japan to Japanese internees in Canada.

The Canadian Red Cross has never undertaken such activities on behalf of enemy prisoners and these goods will have to be distributed either direct through the Directorate of Prisoners of War or my office. Please note also that the Japanese Red Cross wishes to reach a satisfactory solution in the censorship of books and they have also expressed the desire to include on the exchange boats Red Cross correspondence addressed to internees in Canada.

Will it be permissible to include such mail, and should it be addressed to the Directorate of Prisoners of War, or to the internees concerned?

My Principals assure me in this telegram also that the Japanese Red Cross is fully prepared to grant all possible facilities for reciprocity and they promise to forward the relief goods sent from here from the ports of call of the relief boats to the camps.

I am sending you five copies of this telegram and would ask you to please forward one copy each to the Canadian Red Cross, Toronto, the Canadian Red Cross Enquiry Bureau, and to other Government Departments interested.

This Department has agreed that the Japanese Minister may be allowed to donate books and games and possibly other articles for the use of the Japanese internees in Canada subject to censorship and to the right of the Canadian authorities to withhold any books or articles which they consider unsuitable for use in an internment camp.

It is understood that arrangements for the collection of books and articles from the Japanese Minister's residence for transport and censorship will be made by yourself. Mr. Beaudry, Assistant Under Secretary, has written to Inspector R.S.S. Wilson of the R.C.M.P. giving the necessary authorization from the Police to permit the collection of the books and other articles if any, Under proper supervision. Copy of his letter is enclosed.
