

> CENSORED EXTRACTS FROM LETTERS WRITTEN BY NATURALIZED AND CANADIAN-BORN PERSONS OF JAPANESE ORIGIN.

It has occurred to us that in meeting certain delegations or replying to letters protesting the prospective repatriation of Canadian citizens of Japanese origin, quotations from some of the letters written by these Canadian citizens might We have reviewed a number of files of naturalized be useful. Canadian and Canadian-born Japanese and the attached are examples of censored extracts taken from their letters. In addition to the possible use of these documents in meeting delegations and replying to letters, we thought you might like to send copies to certain prominent Canadians who are so critical about this phase of Government policy.

We are not suggesting that the majority of the files of naturalized Canadian or Canadian-born Japanese would contain information of this nature. As a matter of fact, the opposite is the case. Most of the excerpts extracted were from letters written to immediate relatives such as to sons or daughters or husbands or wives. Owing to the fact that in the majority of the families, all members of the immediate family live together, there would not be occasion to write letters. That is why most of the extracts from censored letters on our files were written by families where certain members of that family are in internment or relocated outside of B.C.

We do feel however, that it would have a salutary effect on some of the people who are so outspoken in their criticism, if they could read what some of these Canadian citizens of Japanese/wrote before Japan was defeated. origin

We have only just started making this survey and we will be sending down in a few days further extracts from censored letters. We are limiting this survey to Canadian citizens of Japanese origin and not including Japanese nationals, but if it would be helpful to have some extracts from censored letters of Japanese nationals, we can easily have such prepared.





The kids here all write to girls in the relocation centres in U.S.A. and have a grand time. She (Toyo) is one of the joiliest girls around here though she is a bit shorter than I. I'm sure whoever writes to her won't regret it as she writes interesting letters as I've corresponded with him. Do you think one of your pals would like a pen-pal? Would you please look around? Just address it Miss Toyo Taira, Kaslo, B.C.

Goodness, since our registration for voluntary application for repatriation has finished, a lot of people have gone east of the rockies. I had to sign for repatriation as my dad was so set on it. Also all my friends had to sign too or I should say the majority over here have signed. It seems most people don't want to head out east so they just sign up. Its silly what they do around here these days. And now Kaslo is really a ghost town. Since most of the families are sent to other interior relocation centre, that Kaslo only has less than half the regular population. Now the streets are bare at nights and also no lights in most of the buildings. Since dad is the Japanese foreman here I'm thinking we will be the last to move, and I'm just itching to get out of here as its so dead with nothing to do. If I do happen to move all of a sudden I'll write and let you know. They hope to close this place up by the end of May but I doubt it."

"A really bestial persecution against our brethmen has arison. We greatly resent the way this investigation proclamation is phrased. It is a disgrace to speak of a first rate country like JAPAN in these terms. I would like to ask the government officials to be more gentlemanly. My second point-comforts for the JAPANESE in the SOUTH PACIFIC were lost when the S.S. AWA was torpedoed by an AMERICAN submarine. Again, the U.S... planes are bombing TOKYO, hitting the PALACE, the MEIJI SHRIME and other palaces etc. Why do not the U.S. AIRFORCE men keep their bombs for war factories? It is hard for us JAPANESE to understand such inhuman actions by a socalled CHRISTIAE nation. CHRIST teaches rather "LOVE YOUR ENEMIES." People like this will never win the WAR. Even if they do win they will never be highly regarded by the worlda"
