Please accept thanks for your letter of yesterday's date with which you sent me a copy of the report of the Special Committee on Orientals in British Columbia, which reached me under secret cover.

The typed copy which you sent me quite meets my requirements but I am not certain whether I may, at this time, issue instructions to the Divisional Registrar in British Columbia, under National War Services Regulations, 1940 (Recruits), as it is not stated whether the report has been approved and if it is to be made effective.

It is noted that Recommendation number five (with some other recommendations) has been recommended to be implemented, mutatis mutandis, in the case of persons of Chinese racial origin resident in British Columbia.

In regard to Recommendation number seven and Appendix B "Proposed Method of Registration", it is noted that this is to be done under the supervision of the Commissioner of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. It is not known whether it is intended that this Department thae any action under Recommendation number seven.

Will you please tell me, at your earliest convenience, when I may issue instructions to our Divisional Registrar at Vancouver.

It was recognized that any such action, if taken unilaterally by Canada at this time, might have the most unfortunate repercussions in the international sphere, but it is, nevertheless, considered to be an argent and incacapable element in any approach towards a final solution of this

problem. The views on this subject which have been expressed in British Columbia in the past are held even more strongly today.

Committee believes to be a true representation of the views of the people of British Columbia, the Committee recommends that, when the international situation permits, the Government should announce its intention of revising or revoking its agreement with the Japanese Government with the object of prohibiting further Japanese immigration into Canada.

Dear Dr. Reenleyside,

I have gone carefully through the draft report and appendices, and I have no criticisms or suggestions to offer.

But I should like, only for purposes of record and not for inclusion in the report, to state my opinion that:

- the minority problem presented by the presence in British Columbia of large aggregations of Japanese is one which deserves the serious attention of the Canadian Government, not only in present circumstances but also from the point of view of long term policy, desertic and foreign;
- the complete assimilability of this
 minority is ultimately a biological problem,
 and I can well understand the reluctance of
 British Columbia to become a field for a
 biological experiment which might have unhappy results; but there are degrees of
 assimilation, and I believe that a policy
 designed to promote social, political and
 economic equality as between white and
 oriental citimens would in the long run
 produce a degree of assimilation sufficient
 to make the minority problem unimportant;
 - race the right and the duty to receive military training is contrary to such a policy, and can be justified only by the conviction of the military authorities that such Japanese must be excluded on grounds of emergency.

ooth in Cttawn and subsequently in British Columbia consisted of Lieut.-Col. A.W. Sparling, D.S.O., of the Headquarters Staff, Military District No. 11 (British Columbia), Convener; Dr. H.D. Keenleyeide, Counsellor, Department of External Affairs, who was for some years on the staff of the Canadian Legation in Japan; Assistant Commissioner F.J. Head of the Royal Canadian Hounted Police; and Sir George Sanson, who was until recently Commercial Counsellor of the British Embassy in Tokyo and who is recognised as perhaps the leading occidental authority on the history and culture of Japan.

The Government has now examined the Report prepared by the Special Committee and has decided to implement many of its conclusions.

As a result of the Committee's study and of its own knowledge of the situation, the Government is satisfied that the great majority of the people

of oriental racial origin who are now in Canada are thoroughly loyal to their adopted or (in the case of the large percentage who have been born in Canada) their native, land. The Government is further satisfied that all necessary measures have been and are being taken by the various military and police authorities to deal with any disloyal or subversive activities that may arise.

After careful study of the entire question it is the opinion of the Committee, and in this the Government fully shares, that the most serious danger in the British Columbia situation is that arising from ill-informed attacks against the loyalty and integrity of the oriental population. Some weeks ago such attacks became widespread and public opinion was aroused in a manner that was prejudicial to the welfare of the community as a whole.

Fortunately, public minded citizens, organimations and newspapers, realizing the unfairness and danger of basing suspicion on more rumour and heresay, sought facts before serious developments occurred.

In this connection the Prime Minister stated that the Committee and the Covernment had been very greatly pleased by the temperate and reasonable attitude adopted, in this critical time, by the newspapers of the Province which, almost without exception, have contributed to the enlightenment

and pacification of public opinion on this serious subject. The Prime Minister expressed the hope and belief that this policy would be continued in the future.

step will be taken to see that no subversive act is committed by any resident of the Province, and that if any such act is committed the full penalty of the law will be invoked against the guilty person. At the same time the Government will take whatever measures are necessary to see that no loyal and law-abiding oriental shall be made to suffer in his person or his property through acts of persons who may be misled and provoked to illegal action by inaccurate runours and intemperate words such as featured the recent anti-oriental campaign in British Columbia.

attention to revived charges that many orientals had entered Canada illegally in recent years. Both the Committee and the Government are satisfied that these charges are unjustified but it has been decided, after consultation with leaders of the Japanese community, that in order to protect the Japanese themselves - and to eliminate any illegal entrants who may in fact be in Canada - a special registration of all Japanese residents of the Province will be carried out in the near future. Each member of the

community will be registered and if found to be legally in Canada will be given a certificate and a card which will be final proof of his legal residence in this country and will thus exempt him from future suspicion or annoyance.

As a special registration of the Chinese population was effected a few years ago they will not be included in the present project.

In accordance with the recommendations of the Cosmittee the Government has decided that for the time being Canadians of oriental racial origin will not be called upon to perform compulsory military service. It is felt that in the present state of public opinion unfortunate incidents might occur and that under the circumstances Canadian citizens of oriental race should be allowed to make their contribution to the national war effort in some other form.
