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MR. COBUS: The claim, your honour, of Yokichi Ishida, No. 18 on the original list. This will be claim No. 267.

THE COMMISSIONER: No. 267, all right.

YOKICHI ISHIDA, the Claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified through the official interpreter as follows:

THE COMMISSIONER: This is a fishing vessel claim, is it?

10 MR. COBUS: Yes, your honour.

I would ask leave to amend the claim, your honour, by abandoning item 5 under the itemized description of personal property on the reverse side of the claim; that is, the fishing vessel claim is being abandoned subject to the possibility of the Terms of Reference being broadened in order to include such a claim.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is No. 5 (e), is it?

MR. COBUS: Yes, that is item No. 5 under item 5 (e),
20 "one boat" as shown is being deleted.

THE COMMISSIONER: Well, that is a little different
x than the one I have here. (Handed to Mr. Cobus)

MR. COBUS: It should be No. 18; you have No. 19.

THE COMMISSIONER: I should have claim form No. 18,
Mr. Secretary.

THE SECRETARY: I don't seem to have No. 18. It may be in the wrong place somewhere. I don't seem to have that at all.

THE COMMISSIONER: Would you like to adjourn for a
30 minute to see if you can find it?

MR. McINNES: I was just going to suggest that, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: Very well. We will adjourn for ten minutes.

(PROCEEDINGS RESUMED AFTER A SHORT RECESS)

THE COMMISSIONER: That was Item No. 5 you were dealing with.

MR. COBUS: That is correct, your honour. We are deleting, therefore, the credit allowed on the
10 boat below of \$447.50.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is the \$447.50 credit received from the Custodian.

MR. COBUS: Yes. The \$447.50 was inaccurate on the original claimant's form and it should have read \$450.00.

THE COMMISSIONER: Then that changes the \$527.50, doesn't it?

MR. COBUS: Yes, that is deleted entirely, that whole line.

20 THE COMMISSIONER: The total claim, then, is --

MR. COBUS: We are crediting the Custodian with \$81.00 for the sale of the fishing equipment instead of the \$80.00 shown for nets.

THE COMMISSIONER: Where does that appear?

MR. COBUS: That credit is shown immediately below the credit for the boat, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: I see -- \$80.00 should be \$81.00.

MR. COBUS: \$81.00, yes, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

30 MR. COBUS: The total of the chattels claimed amounts

to \$773.00 less the \$81.00 credit, leaving a net personal property claim of \$692.00.

THE COMMISSIONER: That changes that total, then, to \$692.00.

MR. COBUS: That is correct, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: All right.

MR. COBUS: I would like to point out, your honour, that the Custodian's file which was produced to us was a complete blank except for the J.P. form. On the instructions of our client, we had originally set up a claim for the vessel. Crown Counsel, however, was kind enough to let me see the remainder of the file which was in his possession but not produced to us, which would appear to indicate that the boat was sold by the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee in, I believe, April, 1942. In any event, the claim, as I have already said, is being abandoned at this point subject to the possibility that it may be brought within the Terms of Reference later on.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. COBUS:

Q: Witness, I produce to you a statement concerning the nets for which you are claiming and the lines for which you are claiming. Did you instruct Mr. Leckie to prepare this statement for you and is that your signature? A: Yes.

Q: Are the statements contained therein true to the best of your knowledge and recollection?

30 A: Yes.

MR. COBUS: I would ask to file the statement concerning nets and lines as the first exhibit, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: Exhibit 1.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1)

10 MR. COBUS: Referring to the statement, your honour, four nets are described and valued, the total value for the nets being \$450.00; and four lines, cork and lead lines of varying length are valued at a total of \$118.00. The statement indicates that the nets and lines were stored in the Star Cannery, B.C. Packers net house at Steveston, B.C. The claimant says that the Custodian sent him a statement showing the total sales by him of fishing equipment for \$81.00, but that the statement did not specify the actual items sold except the 300 loose corks for which he is not making a claim. He has no knowledge as to the actual items sold by the Custodian. In estimating values of nets and lines claimed he has allowed depreciation.

20 Q: Witness, I produce to you a statement concerning the personal chattels for which you are making a claim. Did you instruct Mr. Leckie to prepare this statement for you and is that your signature? A: Yes.

Q: And are the statements contained therein true to the best of your knowledge and recollection?

A: Yes.

30 MR. COBUS: I would ask to file the statement concern-

ing personal chattels as the next exhibit,
your honour.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2)

MR. COBUS: All of the items, your honour, are listed
on the statement itself and the details respect-
ing the date of purchase and so on are set out
on the statement.

THE COMMISSIONER: May I see that statement?

10 MR. COBUS: Yes, your honour. (Handed to the Commis-
sioner)

The total estimated value for the items is
\$205.00. As to storage of the goods, the witness
says that the above goods, and other household
items for which he is not claiming, were originally
stored or left in a shack of the Star Cannery,
B.C. Packers at Steveston, B.C. Before he left
the protected area he moved these goods to the
residence of Y. Oye at Chatham Street, Steveston,
B.C. He states that about two years after going
20 to Greenwood, around May, 1944, he advised Mr.
McTavish at Greenwood, the supervisor for the
B.C. Security Commission of the location of these
chattels in Mr. Oye's house and understood that
he would notify the Custodian. He says that he
has allowed for depreciation on all the articles
claimed.

THE COMMISSIONER: He has no knowledge of how or when
they came into possession of the Custodian?

MR. COBUS: I would think not, your honour.

30 Your witness.

MR. McINNES: With reference to the nets and lines, your honour, it is submitted that such of the nets and lines and fishing equipment as were sold were sold for their fair market value. It is further submitted that what has not been sold or accounted for, the claim of the claimant is exorbitant. I make the same submission with regard to the personal property claim, that such of the goods as were sold were sold for their fair market value; the claim in respect of any other personal property is exorbitant.

THE COMMISSIONER: Do you wish to make any submission at all, Mr. McInnes, as to whether the nets or lines or chattels were taken over by the Custodian?

MR. McINNES: I am just going to deal with that now.

CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. McINNES:

- Q: Mr. Ishida, you made your J.P. form on the 2nd of April, 1942, is that correct? A: Yes.
- 20 Q: Call his attention to the date. A: Yes.
- Q: That is your signature on this J.P. form?
- A: Yes.
- Q: Now, in that form you list six nets, one lead cork and one rowboat. A: Yes.
- Q: And you say that they are to be stored in the Cannery net house of the Star Cannery.
- A: Yes.
- Q: I understand from that that you turned them over to the Star Cannery to be looked after.
- 30 A: Yes, they were left at the cannery because they

belonged to the cannery. He has lived there for 30 years so he has kept them there. He has kept the nets there.

Q: Yes, in the -- ? A: In the Star Cannery.

Q: In the net house of the Star Cannery?

A: Yes.

Q: And there would be a great many other people's nets there as well as yours? A: Yes.

10 Q: Now, you make no mention in your J.P. form of owning any lines.

MR. COBUS: Any lines, Mr. McInnes? I thought I heard you read one line.

MR. McINNES: I read six nets, one lead cork, one rowboat.

MR. COBUS: "Lead cork," indicates cork line.

MR. McINNES: Lead cork line, I am sorry.

Q: Well, then, you listed one line.

A: He thinks there are four cork lines and one row-
20 boat.

Q: The question was: You listed six nets and one lead cork line, is that correct?

A: (Witness produces document)

MR. McINNES: Perhaps he would show it to his own counsel first.

MR. COBUS: This is just a copy of the claim form of this witness.

MR. McINNES: Yes.

Q: Mr. Ishida, I don't know whether you understand
30 me or not, but I am directing your attention to

your J.P. form which I just showed you which is dated April 2, 1942, while you were still at the coast and some 28 days before you were evacuated, and I am calling your attention to the fact that at that time you said you had six nets and one lead cork line and a rowboat.

A: Yes.

Q: Was that a correct statement?

A: Yes, it is quite correct.

10 Q: Now, was this line and this net your property or did they belong to the cannery?

A: They were my own property.

Q: Now, you were indebted to the cannery in certain amounts, weren't you? A: You mean indebted in money?

Q: Yes. A: No, I was in debt of \$20.00 and I paid it a month before that, when I left.

Q: Is it not a fact that the cannery took over nets and fishing gear from you to the value of \$160.00?

20 MR. COBUS: I would ask, your honour, that my learned friend add the time at which this took place.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes. Was that the date he was leaving, or have you got a date on that, Mr. McInnes when you suggest they took these in order to pay the debt?

MR. McINNES: I am sorry, your honour, from the information I have in my file -- unless there is something here, and I don't think there is -- my information is that Ishida was in debt to the
30 Star Cannery in the amount of \$160.00.

MR. COBUS: Your honour, I am presuming my friend has no intention of filing this, and I don't see any occasion to read it unless you can prove it.

MR. McINNES: My friend asks for information and then, when I proceed to give it to him, he stands up and objects.

MR. COBUS: I want only the date, your honour, if my friend has something to indicate the date for which I am asking.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: Well, I understand Mr. McInnes is simply using this for the purpose of cross-examination; he is not filing it. You can direct the witness as to the date, and this might refresh his memory. If you can't, I presume you intend to cross-examine on whether he did owe \$160.00 and whether he knows as to whether or not the cannery took over any of the goods in settlement.

MR. McINNES: Yes.

20 THE COMMISSIONER: You can cross-examine on that. I don't suppose you are in a position at the present time to prove it.

MR. COBUS: And I think, your honour, I have already indicated that the file that was produced by the Custodian was completely blank. I am taken completely by surprise at this turn of events, if there is anything in it, and I think it hardly proper that it be pursued.

30 THE COMMISSIONER: Well, I think Mr. McInnes will be bound by the answer, in any event; he can't go

further than that. He has got to ask him the question and see what he says.

MR. COBUS: Yes, your honour.

MR. McINNES: Well, I take it that my friend would be protesting much louder at a later date if I didn't call his claimant's attention to the fact that the equipment was appropriated by the Star Cannery, because undoubtedly there will be proof offered in the defence to that effect.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: The question of the defence will be decided later, and it will probably come up at that time. It is just as well to proceed and bring it out as far as you are able by cross-examination. That is all you can do.

MR. McINNES: Yes.

Q: Did the Star Cannery take any of your fishing gear and credit you with \$160.00?

A: No.

Q: At no time, either before or after you were
20 evacuated? A: No, I wrote to them to inquire, but they did not reply.

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: What was it you were inquiring about? A: I wrote inquiring about the nets, what they had done with them.

THE COMMISSIONER: I see.

MR. McINNES: Q: Where did you leave your personal chattels when you left Steveston?

A: I left them with Y. Oye.

30 Q: That is another Japanese? A: Yes.

Y. Ishida

- Q: And when did you leave them with this other Japanese? A: I asked Y. Oye to keep them, my things, two weeks before I was evacuated. I came here on the 1st of May and that was about the middle of April.
- Q: That you gave them to Mr. Oye? A: Yes.
- Q: Where did Mr. Oye live? A: 672 - 4th Avenue, Steveston.
- Q: And you took the goods there and left them?
- 10 A: Yes.
- Q: Did you sell them to Mr. Oye?
- A: No, I only asked him to keep them.
- Q: And do you know whether or not he did sell them?
- A: I don't know, only when I asked him he thought the Custodian had taken them away.
- Q: Now, you filed your claim in here in this manner, sworn on the 25th of November, 1947 before L.A. Dodd -- just say yes or no.
- A: Yes.
- 20 Q: And in that claim you mentioned, under Item 5 (a) and (b) that you left these goods at Mr. Y. Oye's place. A: Yes.
- Q: But your J.P. form said that you were leaving them, to quote from the J.P. form -- "The above articles will be left in the shack of the Star Cannery of the B.C. Packers, Steveston, B.C."
- MR. COBUS: The date, again, Mr. McInnes, of the J.P. form?
- MR. McINNES: April 2, 1942.
- 30 MR. COBUS: Would you add that to your question, please?

A: He got instructions to say that the cannery was to be occupied by the white people and that he was to take everything away, so he took his things away to Mr. Oye's in the middle of May.

MR. McINNES: Q: Now, you had certain correspondence with the office of the Custodian, certain letters passed between you?

10 A: There were no letters exchanged except that he got a letter from the Custodian to say that the boat was sold.

Q: And did he answer that letter?

A: I only received a letter from Sakamoto saying that the boat was sold, but nothing from the Custodian.

Q: I am producing a letter to you dated September 10, 1946, purporting to be written from Greenwood, B.C. to Mr. R.B. MacKedie, Protection Department, Custodian, Vancouver, B.C. and bearing the signature, Y. Ishida. Will you look at the signature and see if it is yours?

20

A: I don't think this is my signature, my name; I don't remember signing it.

Q: You say that is not your letter?

A: I don't remember writing it. Could you tell me what is written there?

Q: Did you receive a cheque for \$57.87 from the Custodian's office?

A: I received \$80.00, saying that it was the value of the net.

30 Q: Yes. Well, didn't you later on receive \$57.87?

A: No, I don't remember receiving it.

MR. McINNES: Well, I am going to ask the interpreter, your honour, to read this letter to him, and I will see, then, if he recollects it as being his letter. Just read this letter to him.

(Interpreter to witness)

THE INTERPRETER: A: He says, I don't know anything about this. He says he didn't write this letter. He says the name is different.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: Is there a reply to that letter of the witness'?

MR. McINNES: This is a reply to the Custodian. It seems to be all about this.

THE COMMISSIONER: He says he doesn't know anything about it.

MR. McINNES: That is right.

THE INTERPRETER: A: I didn't receive any letter from the Custodian regarding that, and I was in hospital at the time.

20 MR. McINNES: Q: Did you never write a letter to the Custodian complaining about the price that he got for your nets? A: No, I didn't write that and I didn't complain to the Custodian.

MR. McINNES: If it please your honour, in addition to the other matters submitted in the defence, it will be contended that it has not been established that these personal property chattels ever came into the custody or control of the Custodian and therefore are not within the Terms of Refer-

30

ence.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is as regards the chattels.

MR. McINNES: The chattels, yes, your honour.

MR. COBUS: Could my learned friend advise how many
nets were sold by the Custodian and credited to
the account of the claimant?

MR. McINNES: Perhaps the Analysis of Personal Pro-
perty Claim should be filed in these matters.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, It will probably show it.

10 MR. COBUS: Yes, your honour, I think perhaps this
analysis should be filed on behalf of the Crown.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is a form that is prepared
by the Custodian, isn't it, as I remember?
It seems to show some of these chattels. This
deals with some of the chattels, Mr. McInnes.

MR. McINNES: It shows they were declared and not
found. There is also a column there, \$303.00.

MR. COBUS: Your honour, I doubt if you will find any-
thing very informative on that. I have already
20 looked at it.

THE COMMISSIONER: I was trying to find if there was
anything in it.

MR. COBUS: I was merely wondering if, perhaps, there
was something in the remainder of the file.

MR. McINNES: I am going to give you any information
I have, but I thought that should be filed in
the meantime.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, it might as well go in for what
information it bears, I suppose.

30

(ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3)

MR. McINNES: I am sorry, Mr. Cobus, what was the question you asked me?

MR. COBUS: I would like to be advised of the number of individual sales of nets and lines, if you are able to tell me.

MR. McINNES: Well, I haven't got it listed as nets or lines; I can give you the different dates on which there were sales of fishing equipment.

10 MR. COBUS: And you would agree that there are six individual sales of fishing equipment, not described any further than as fishing equipment, and a separate sale of 300 loose corks?

MR. McINNES: That is correct. If you want the dates, they are all in 1943 from January 20th to October 1st.

THE COMMISSIONER: You have six sales in 1943, then, have you, outside of the corks that are referred to?

MR. McINNES: Yes. The sales were from January 20 to 20 March 18, inclusive, the six sales of fishing equipment, and on October 1st is the sale of 300 loose corks.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. COBUS: Would my learned friend undertake to produce any net statement concerning the sale, perhaps, of individual nets, or any detailed statement other than this statement of account which had been sent to the witness, before the hearings in Vancouver?

MR. McINNES: I am going to see what I have on that 30 now, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: I suppose the information is available some place. What is the trouble? Is this file not complete?

MR. COBUS: Well, all I have seen of the file, your honour, apart from what Mr. McInnes showed me last night, is the J.P. form.

MR. McINNES: Well, I have a statement here that may suffice for my learned friend.

MR. COBUS: Yes. This purports to be a net statement, your honour. It shows as sold three
10 cork lines of varying lengths and three nets.

THE COMMISSIONER: Three nets. You have four cork lines and four nets, haven't you?

MR. COBUS: That is correct, your honour. The J.P. form indicated six nets. He is claiming for only four. It showed one line, and I would like to question the witness on one point.

RE-DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. COBUS:

20 Q: Witness, when you speak of a net, a complete net, does that mean the net and a line attached, or part of the net? A: I claimed for

the net separately and the lines separately.

Q: Yes, that is correct on the claim form, but I merely want to know, when a fisherman speaks of a net, does he speak of the net and include the line therewith? A: No, they speak

30 differently. When the net is being used, we include the net and the line together and we call it a net, but when they are not in use, they talk

about them separately.

MR. COBUS: In any event, your honour, the net statement of the Custodian indicates that certainly three sales of cork lines were credited to this man and three nets. He is now claiming four nets and four lines, and I can't say that there is any reconciliation between the net statement from the Custodian's file and the nets described in the statement.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: Would it be of any value to have that statement which Mr. McInnes had, filed? You had some statement there.

MR. McINNES: He is reading from it, now.

MR. COBUS: The statement indicates as well that two nets are unaccounted for. Again I can't say that they can be reconciled with the nets as described by the claimant. There is a note in ink beside the unaccounted for nets which reads: "Inventoried but never sold by the Custodian," and
20 I believe that the Analysis Form, which is already filed, shows a certain amount as "No account, theft," your honour.

THE SECRETARY: Do you want this statement in?

MR. COBUS: It is up to my learned friend.

MR. McINNES: Yes.

(NET STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4)

MR. COBUS: Q; Now, witness, where did you keep your nets and fishing lines normally, that is, from day to day? A: I generally kept them at the
30 Star Cannery.

Q: Did the Star Cannery ever indicate that they assumed any responsibility for the nets which you stored in their net house?

A: The cannery net house is used by all the fishermen so I kept my nets there.

MR. COBUS: Yes. I have nothing more, your honour.

MR. McINNES: Your honour, I would just like to make one observation, and then I want to ask one more question of the witness.

10 I think I have already dealt with it in my cross-examination, but I will be quite frank with my friend and say that in regard to the \$160.00 shown on Exhibit 4, which is one of the two items on the bottom, there may be evidence introduced that that is the item which the Star Cannery took nets to that value belonging to this man to cover an indebtedness that he owed them. That is the information I have on the file. I am just pointing that out.

20 THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

RE-CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. McINNES:

Q: Now, Mr. Ishida, I want to be perfectly clear with you about some correspondence. Do you say that you at no time either received any letters from the Custodian or sent any to him?

MR. COBUS: Your honour, I don't want to appear to be obstructive in any way whatsoever, but it seems to me that my learned friend is going to cover ground that he has already covered in cross-

30

examination and which I haven't re-opened.

THE COMMISSIONER: I think you have already answered that point. He says he didn't write this letter.

MR. McINNES: There were a number of letters. I don't want my friend to be taken by surprise.

THE COMMISSIONER: I think he said he never wrote the Custodian. I think you can rest on that.

MR. McINNES: You have the note that he never received any letters from the Custodian. I don't want
10 him to come and say afterwards he didn't understand.

MR. COBUS: He received the cheque, your honour; he admitted that.

MR. McINNES: That was from a Japanese that he got for his boat, or something. Very well, that is all.

MR. COBUS: That is all, your honour.


THE COMMISSIONER: Yes. And he says definitely that he never wrote the letter, that is the main thing, I think. All right, Ishida, that is all.


