MR. COBUS: The claim, your honour, of Nakano, Sadao, which is No. 58 and 59 on the Secretary's list, and which becomes Case No. 293.

SADAO NAKANO, the claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified through the official interpreter as follows:

MR. COBUS: Your honour, two claim forms were submitted by this claimant, one for a vessel which is abandoned now, subject to the Terms of Reference being broadened; the second covering a claim for personal property.

THE COMMISSIONER: I will just mark the one "abandoned subject to the Terms of Reference being broadened."

MR. COBUS: With respect to the personal property claim submitted, there are the following amendments to be noted: Item 1, two beds, is amended to read \$30.00 in place of \$50.00. The five chairs item is to be deleted. Item 3, three stoves, becomes \$40.00 instead of \$66.00.

THE COMMISSIONER: You have shown the amounts of these stoves. Do you want these taken out?

MR. COBUS: Yes, I would ask that the amounts of the stoves be deleted as such and the total of \$40.00 shown.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. COBUS: Item 4, chimney pipe, five pieces, \$1.20, becomes 60¢. Item 5, a dresser, valued at \$25.00 now. Item 6, gramophone and records, the values shown above each item there can be deleted and

the total estimated value shown as \$17.50 now.
Item 7, the carpet, is now valued at \$8.00. The
remainder, 8 and 9 and 10, can be deleted.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is, the bath tub, \$7.00, deleted.

MR. COBUS: Yes, your honour. Phonograph records \$50.00
are deleted; and the amount credited to the Custodian
will be amended. The total of the items now
claimed is \$121.10. The credit to the Custodian
should be \$25.50 on the items claimed. The
10 net claim is now \$95.60.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. COBUS:

Q: Witness, I produce to you a statement concerning
the personal chattels for which you are claiming.
Did you instruct me to prepare this statement for
you and is that your signature?

A: Yes.

Q: Are the statements contained therein true to the
best of your knowledge and recollection?

20 A: Yes.

Q: In this statement, witness, you have listed,
item by item, all of the chattels for which you
are claiming, is that correct?

A: Yes.

Q: And in the extreme right hand column are certain
values. Are those values what you consider to be
a fair market value for the items opposite which
they are placed?

A: Yes.

MR. COBUS: I would ask to file the statement con-
30 cerning personal chattels as Exhibit 1, your honour.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1)

MR. COBUS: Referring to Exhibit 1, your honour, for each item claimed the witness has given full information as to the date of purchase of each of the items, whether the item was new or used when purchased, the price paid, and the condition of each item when he was evacuated. He shows, too, the estimated value of each item. With respect to storage of goods, the witness says that

10 all of the chattels listed were stored in the homes of Nakade and Hayashi and were found and removed by the Custodian after being identified by him as the claimant's goods. Then he comments that, as shown above, he has allowed reasonable depreciation on the goods claimed, and that he is not now claiming for goods which, though left, do not appear to have been found by the Custodian.

20 Would my learned friend produce the Analysis of Personal Property Claim?

(Handed to Mr. Cobus)

THE COMMISSIONER: Are Nakade and Hayashi neighbours of his?

MR. COBUS: In the next exhibit, your honour, I will be able to point out who these individuals are.

I would ask to file the Analysis of Personal Property Claim on behalf of the Crown.

(ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2)

30 MR. COBUS: Referring to Exhibit 2, your honour, the Analysis of Personal Property Claim, under the

first column is shown that by letter dated January 19, 1946 the claimant reported certain goods in care of Y. Nakade at 44 Chatham Street which is in Steveston, and in care of R. Hiyashi, 111 Steveston Highway. Under column 2, I see two dates, July 9, 1943, and January 6, 1945, under the heading "Inventory" but no details of inventory shown thereunder.

Your witness.

10 MR. McINNES: It will be submitted, your honour, that the goods claimed were not declared and are not shown to have come into the custody or control of the Custodian and are therefore not within the terms of this reference. It will be submitted as to any of the goods that may have come into the custody of the Custodian that the same were sold for their fair market value.

CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. McINNES:

20 Q: Witness, did you make a J.P. form and is this your signature? A: Yes.

Q: And you will note under the heading "Statement of personal property owned" that all you claim as owning is one fishing boat. A: Yes.

Q: It was not until the 19th of January, 1946, that you first made any claim for the personal property we are dealing with now? A: Yes.

Q: And you then wrote a letter from Tashme, B.C. to Mr. R.B. Mackenzie of the Custodian's office?

30 A: Yes.

Q: And I am now producing this letter to you and I ask you if that is your signature? A: Yes.

THE COMMISSIONER: Is that dated January 19, 1946, that letter?

MR. McINNES: Yes. I think I will just read it into the record, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: All right.

MR. McINNES: It is dated at Tashme, B.C., January 19, 1946 to Mr. R.B. Mackedie of the Custodian's office. "Dear Sir: In answer to your letter of 10 January 15 re R. Tagashira Company account of the sum of \$134.89, I wish to say that I nor any member of the family has any knowledge of this account and as such I do not feel obligated to pay this account. With regard to the chattels which came to light, they were left with relatives, and I had failed to report the same. At 44 Chatham Street, care of Y. Nakade, we had left the following: 20 Two beds, one chest of drawers, one gramophone, and records, one stove and one roll of carpet. At 111 Steveston Highway, care of R. Hi-yashi were left the following: one box of kitchen utensils, three boxes of festival dolls, and approximately ten other boxes containing miscellaneous goods. I am looking for my list, but I cannot locate same. I am giving an approximate list of goods to the best of my knowledge. I trust that this is the information required. Yours truly, Sadao Nakano, Registration No. 04071."

30 Q: Now, that is the first time that you told them

about your goods that you are now claiming for?

A: Yes.

MR. McINNES: That is all, thank you.

MR. COBUS: As I mentioned before, your honour, in Exhibit 2, column 2, the Custodian shows under the heading "Inventory" two dates, July 9 '43, and January 6, '45. I would ask my learned friend to produce either inventory or both inventories which were taken at that time, or what may be storage lists.

THE COMMISSIONER: Have you got an inventory, Mr. McInnes, for July 9, 1943 or January 6, 1945?

MR. McINNES: I was just looking in my file, your honour, in compliance with my learned friend's request. There appear to be two lists here which correspond with the dates mentioned by my friend. I am quite willing to produce those for whatever they may be worth.

20

MR. COBUS: I have, produced from the Custodian's file, your honour, two what we have been terming "storage lists," one dated the 9th of July, 1943, under the name of Nakano, S., indicating the place from which the goods were taken was a "house east of Normal Marshall, 44 Chatham Street," and the future address of which would be warehouse No. 6.

THE COMMISSIONER: How would that address check with these two names Nakade and Hiyashi?

RE-DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. COBUS:

Q: Witness, I produce to you a document which I shall call a storage list. On it is a description of a place as being a house east of Norman -- by the way, that should be "Norman" Marshall, not "Normal" Marshall --

THE COMMISSIONER: Norman.

MR. COBUS: Yes.

Q: -- 44 East Chatham Street. Whose house would be east of Norman Marshall's home at 44 Chatham Street?

10

MR. McINNES: I think my friend should say "could be" not "would be". There may be a lot of them.

A: This Norman Marshall lived next door to him and he lived in front.

Q: Next door to whom? A: To him.

Q: To him? A: Behind my house.

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: Behind him? A: Yes, behind him. Nakano lived in front of this Norman Marshall.

20 MR. COBUS: Q: Nakano or Nakade?

A: Nakano.

THE COMMISSIONER: When he says it is behind him, does he say he lived behind Nakano himself, or does he mean --

MR. COBUS: Well, I gather now, your honour, that this house east of Norman Marshall's is given as 44 Chatham Street.

Q: Who lived at 44 Chatham Street in Steveston?

A: I don't quite remember now.

30 Q: Where did Mr. Nakade Live, Y. Nakade?

A: On the opposite side of the street is where Nadade lived.

Q: On the opposite side? A: On the opposite side. There was a road between, there; between his house and this Nakade house.

MR. COBUS: Your honour, this storage list lists ten items which were removed from the address 44 Chatham Street, I take it, to warehouse No. 6, some of which are noted by the Custodian in blue and red
10 pencil to have been sold by auction.

MR. McINNES: You are putting in the earliest date first, are you?

MR. COBUS: Yes.

MR. McINNES: That will be 3, then.

MR. COBUS: Yes. That will be filed on behalf of the Crown, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: According to the Analysis of Personal Property Claim, 44 Chatham Street would be Y. Nakade.

20 MR. COBUS: I take it to be so, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is what is stated on this Analysis.

MR. COBUS: Yes, your honour.

(STORAGE LIST MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3)

MR. COBUS: Then I have a storage list produced from the Custodian's file dated January 6, 1945. The name of S. Nakano is shown. It refers to an address, 111 Steveston Highway from which the goods were removed, and the future address, No. 3
30 Auction. Eight items are listed, seven of which

are noted in ink to have been sold by auction.

Item 1 happens to be the kitchen stove.

I think, your honour, that all of the items for which claim is being made and listed in Exhibit 1 are covered by those storage lists, or by the auction lists as shown sold by the Custodian.

(STORAGE LIST MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4)

MR. COBUS: That is all, your honour.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: Well, were the proceeds of these sales by auction turned over to the claimant?

MR. COBUS: We have credited the Custodian, your honour, with the amount of \$35.50, which is also shown as a total under "Auction sales" on the Analysis sheet.

THE COMMISSIONER: That would apparently include the sales shown on these two sheets, then.

MR. COBUS: Yes, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

Have you any other questions, Mr. McInnes?

20 MR. McINNES: No, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: All right, Nakano, that is all we can do now.
