JAPANESE PROPERTY CLAIMS COMMISSION

PROCEEDINGS AT HEARING







MR. COBUS: The claim, your honour, of Masaharu Ogawa, which is No. 47 on the Secretary's list.

MASAHARU OGAWA, the claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

MR. COBUS: I would ask leave to amend the claim, your honour, in this case. The claim is set out under 5 (e), being entirely personal property.

10 Item 9 is a gillnet boat, sold by the Vessels Disposal Committee, and that item is being abandoned subject to the Terms of Reference being broadened. With respect to the remaining items, we have amended the values shown thereon. Item one becomes \$1228.45; item 2, \$25.00; ~~item~~ 3 remains at \$20.00; item 4 remains as is; item 5 becomes \$20.00; item 6, \$30.00; 7 remains at \$75.00; 8 becomes \$45.00. I would ask leave to add an item under 10, 1 double bed. The rea-

20 son I do that, your honour, is that that double bed, in fact, was sold by the Custodian and slipped the mind of the claimant when he submitted his claim. That item is estimated at \$25.00. That makes a total personal property claim now of \$1488.45, with credits to the Custodian of \$278.35, leaving a net claim of \$1210.10. The list attached to the claim, your honour, is replaced by a list to be filed with the chattels

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. COBUS:

Q: Witness, I produce to you a statement concerning the personal property for which you have submitted a claim in the amount of \$1488.45. Did you instruct Mr. Leckie to prepare this statement for you and is that your signature?

A: Yes.

10 Q: In your statement you make reference to an item, "4 trunks with boat building and carpenter tools." Following that item there is this note: "See itemized list attached," and the amount \$1228.45. I produce to you a list headed "List of Carpenter Tools and 4 Trunks." Is this the list to which you make reference?

A: Yes.

MR. COBUS: I would ask leave to file the statement as Exhibit 1, and the list, your honour.

(STATEMENT AND LIST MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1)

20 MR. COBUS: In his statement the witness has given complete details with respect to the items which he has listed separately; and the list attached gives details as to the tools, which is the major item. With respect to the camera, he says the camera was turned in to the R.C.M.P. The net was left at Namu Cannery net house at Namu with a name tag on it. The household articles and boat building and carpenter tools were left at Y. Yamamoto's place at 130 Moncton Street, Steveston, B.C., tagged with the claimant's name on the tag.

He says that he has allowed for depreciation on all articles claimed.

Would my friend produce the Analysis of Personal Property Claim?

(Handed to Mr. Cobus)

MR. COBUS: The Analysis is filed on behalf of the Crown, your honour.

MR. COBUS: Q: Witness, I am showing you a copy of the Analysis of Personal Property Claim in which the Custodian shows, opposite item 54, one  
10 seven inch salmon gillnet, for which you submitted a value of \$75.00, as having been abandoned, and, under "Remarks" he says "No value." "See memo April 9, '43." Can you account for the Custodian finding this net to be of no value?

A: I don't think so.

Q: Was it useful to you? A: Yes.

Q: When had you used the net last?

A: Oh, 1941.

20 Q: 1941. And after the fishing season was over, did you do the usual maintenance work on the net?

A: Yes.

Q: And when you were evacuated, what was the condition of the net? A: Good.

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: When did you buy this net?

A: 1940, I guess.

Q: Around 1940? A: I think so.

Q: You bought it in 1940? A: Yes.

Q: And was it new then or second hand?

30 A: New.



MR. COBUS: Your witness.

MR. MACDONALD: In this case, your honour, I submit that the personal property, which is the only claim here, was sold at its fair market value and that the personal property claimed for is claimed at an exorbitant value.

10 In this connection, regarding this net, your honour, the memorandum dated April 9, 1943 is an extract from B.C. Packers' letter of April 9, 1943 which reads as follows: "There are six nets stored at our Namu Cannery belonging to Japanese" -- and they list the six -- and then "M. Ogawa, 1 old Cohoe Net -- "

MR. COBUS: One what?

MR. MACDONALD: One old Cohoe net. It is a Cohoe salmon net, I presume. They are all listed as Cohoe nets here. There are others listed that do not concern this case. "The net boss at Namu Cannery considers these nets to be of no value."

20 I would like to file that memorandum.

The original can be produced.

MR. COBUS: And proved.

MR. MACDONALD: And proved, I presume.

THE COMMISSIONER: That will be Exhibit 3.

(MEMORANDUM MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3)

MR. MACDONALD: Did my friend credit us with the proceeds of the sales of tools, etc.?

MR. COBUS: We can't do any better than credit you with \$278.35.

30 MR. MACDONALD: I did not think you credited us with



that, did you?

MR. COBUS: If I didn't, I most certainly intended to. I may not have. Would your honour refer to the claim, if you will? I think I showed a total personal property claim of \$1488.45?

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, you mentioned about the credit.

MR. COBUS: \$278.35 credit.

THE COMMISSIONER: You put in the amended claim.

MR. COBUS: Did I put in any credit against the amended  
10 claim?

THE COMMISSIONER: No.

MR. COBUS: I should have. \$278.35, your honour.

That leaves the net claim \$1210.10. I am sorry to have overlooked it.

MR. MACDONALD: I would like to draw to your honour's  
attention that all of these chattels listed were  
sold with the exception of this net that was  
abandoned, and three items that were of "No  
account, theft." There is one item here marked  
20 "Stolen;" it looks as though that was the cam-  
era. It was a camera, and it is under the  
heading of "No account, theft," as well as two  
other items on the list.

CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. MACDONALD:

Q: Now, this camera, how do you arrive at the value  
of \$61.00? A: What?

Q: How do you arrive at the value of \$61.00 for this  
camera? A: Well, I paid \$61.00 for the  
30 camera.



Q: I beg your pardon?

A: I paid \$61.00 for the camera.

Q: When?

MR. COBUS: Your honour, I would point out that he is claiming \$45.00, not \$61.00.

MR. MACDONALD: Well, he paid \$61.00 for it.

Q: When did you pay the \$61.00 for it?

A: '37, around '37.

Q: '37?

A: Yes.

10

Q: Now, did you at any time have it insured?

A: Insured?

Q: Was there any insurance on the camera at all when you had it?

A: No.

MR. MACDONALD: I would like to submit a memorandum here, your honour, which reads: "Camera was appraised for insurance by Messrs Dunne and Rundell at \$27.50. This camera was stolen from Custodian warehouse, 992 Powell Street, Vancouver." I would like to file this, your honour, because there is no doubt that the original of that can be produced.

20

THE COMMISSIONER: Well, it will have to be produced, I think.

MR. MACDONALD: I t can be produced and filed. It is just to let my friend know we have that information.

MR. COBUS: Your honour, it seems to me the Crown is putting in his complete defence now. The memorandum will have to be produced eventually.

30



The Custodian knows what he has in his file and the Crown knows what is in his file. I think I have to object to these inter-office memorandums going in.

MR. MACDONALD: This is for your benefit.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: This actually has no value at all, you see. The only thing, Mr. MacDonald, as you say, is that you can put it in so that they will know it is referred to, and you can produce the original. Actually, though, it has no value at all.

MR. MACDONALD: No, it has no value, but this is not a trial; we are only putting everything before the Commission. I think this is for the benefit of the claimant; instead of the Custodian coming along later on and producing something, we are letting them know that we have it.


That is all, your honour.
