MR. COBUS: The claim, your honour, of Toranosuke
Yasuda, No. 68 on the Secretary's list.

TORANOSUKE YASUDA, the claimant herein,
being first duly sworn, testified
through the official interpreter as follows:

MR. COBUS: I would ask leave to amend the claim herein
which is a claim for personal property only, by
10 deleting the itemized list as originally sub-
mitted, and showing a total claim for \$1002.00.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is for chattels only.

MR. COBUS: Yes, your honour, \$1002.00, and that will
be covered by a list to be filed as part of the
statement. There are no credits to the Custodian
in this claim.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. COBUS:

Q: Witness, I produce to you a statement concerning
the personal chattels for which you have sub-
20 mitted a claim. Did you instruct Mr. Leckie to
prepare this statement for you and is that your
signature? A: Yes.

Q: In your statement you make reference to a list
attached to the statement. I produce to you a
two page list of which the estimated value totals
\$1002.00. Is that the list to which you make
reference? A: Yes.

Q: Is the information contained in your statement and
30 in the list attached true to the best of your

knowledge and recollection?

A: Yes.

MR. COBUS: I would ask leave to file the personal chattels statement, your honour, as the first exhibit.

THE COMMISSIONER: That will be Exhibit 1.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1)

MR. COBUS: In this list --

10 THE COMMISSIONER: Mr. Cobus, I notice this chattels list contains a lot of articles here that show as church property -- furniture of a church, benches for a church, and so on.

MR. COBUS: I think perhaps, your honour, this man owned his own shrine equipment.

THE COMMISSIONER: It is his own church?

MR. COBUS: It is his own church, yes, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: I think you should bring that out.

MR. COBUS: Yes, I think he can make reference to his religious property in his statement, your honour.

20 MR. COBUS: In the statement, Exhibit 1, your honour, the witness says that all the goods claimed were left in his home at 1st Avenue South, Moncton Street at Steveston, B.C. The residence was locked and the key was handed to the Custodian. He says that he has allowed for depreciation on all articles. The religious properties claimed were declared by his wife and they form part of the equipment of his private shrine which he had on his property. I think that covers that
30 item, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. COBUS: The items referred to as religious properties, your honour, will be found on page 2 of the list attached to Exhibit 1, beginning at, as I recall it, one drum. The break is between 1 four inch wood chisel; I don't think the wood chisel forms part of the church properties. There should have been a break at "1 drum", and it continues as far as the item
10 "3 iron pots."

Would my friend produce the Analysis of Personal Property Claim?

(Handed to Mr. Cobus)

MR. COBUS: The Analysis is filed on behalf of the Crown, your honour.

(ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2)

MR. COBUS: For the information of your honour and the Commissioner, I am referring now to Exhibit 2, the Analysis. The claim as originally filed
20 showed a total in very general terms of \$1315.00 and the Analysis shows that a revised claim, dated March 5, 1948 was received, and that was received in reply to a request by the Custodian or by Crown Counsel that an itemized list be given. In the revised claim, your honour will note that again it was rather generalized under "Carpenter's Tools and Equipment" for \$455.55. That is now corrected by a list which forms part
30 of Exhibit 1. The religious properties I have already pointed out. The household goods are as

found on the list and are clearly recognizable.

Your witness.

10 MR. MACDONALD: In this case, your honour, I can't find that any goods were sold as per the Analysis sheet, but if it turns out, when the matter is later dealt with that any goods were sold, I submit they were sold at a fair market value. I can't find any auction sheets or anything here. Your honour will note that on the Analysis sheet the total of all the articles is set out as "Declared, not found." There is a statement under the heading of general remarks at the bottom, and the only question that arises there is as to who the key was left with. It is alleged in this statement here that the key was left with the Custodian, and according to what I can find in the file it wasn't.

CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. MACDONALD:

20 Q: Who did you leave the key with?

A: I was told to take the key to aman called King who was a representative of the Custodian. When I took the key there King was not in and there was a man called Cooper there, and so I left the key with Cooper.

Q: Was he in the Custodian's office? Was he a member of the Custodian's staff?

THE INTERPRETER: The name couldn't have been Cooper; the name was Kua.

30 MR. MACDONALD: Q: Was he a Japanese?

A: He was a Japanese, yes, and he was instructed by King to take the key there and King was not there so he left it with Kua.

Q: Did you instruct Kua to give the key to Mr. King?

A: I told Kua to give the key to King and he said he would do so.

MR. MACDONALD: If your honour will check on the general remarks, it seems that this house was rented to a Mrs. Woodcock who took possession on June 16th. She states in her letter to the Custodian dated September 19th, 1942 that there was nothing in the house at that time but one range stove, one heater, one kitchen table and wooden bench which she left on the premises when she vacated a month later. Then a Mrs. Shales came later and there was only a table and bench left in the house. Again, your honour, this was one of those places in Steveston that they were having trouble with.

20 Q: In this list of goods that you have given us here, how did you arrive at your prices?

MR. MACDONALD: If your honour will note, the prices in this claim are considerably higher than the average.

A: The prices were made on the basis of cost less depreciation.

Q: Now, did you make out this list yourself, did you arrive at the prices yourself?

A: Yes.

30 Q: Now, have you had any experience in selling second

A: I haven't sold any second hand goods.

MR. MACDONALD: That is all, your honour.

MR. COBUS: Q: Witness, the owner of the house which
you rented was named Mr. Tamura, is that correct?

A: Yes.

Q: Where did Mr. Tamura live?

A: He lived in another house in Steveston.

Q: In Steveston. He was a Japanese, was he?

10 A: Yes.

Q: Do you know when he was evacuated?


A: About the same time as myself, I think. When I

GENERAL REMARKS:

Mr. and Mrs. Toranosuke YASUDA occupied premises formerly owned by Jujiro Tamura at 1st Ave. near Moncton Street, Steveston (Lot 13, Blk.2 of Sec.10). Although Mr. Yasuda was evacuated Mar.31/42, his wife (Man) was not evacuated until Oct.15/42 and did not vacate the premises above-mentioned until June 1942. Mr. Tamura, owner of these premises, rented them to a Mrs. Woodcock who took possession June 16/42*who stated in her letter to the Custodian dated Sept.19/42 that there was nothing in the house at that time but 1 range stove, 1 heater, 1 kitchen table and wooden bench which she left on the premises when she vacated a month later. Premises remained vacant until November 5/42 when they were rented to a Mrs. B. Shales who advised (see Memo Feb.1/43) that only a home made table and bench were in the house when she took possession. Most of the chattels apparently stolen between time Yasudas vacated premises and Mrs. Woodcock took possession, and more were taken Before Mrs. Shales moved in on Nov.5/42.
