THE SECRETARY: Case No. 599, Yuichi Akune.

YUICHI AKUNE, the claimant herein, being
first duly sworn, testified through
the Interpreter as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. TURCOTTE:

Q Mr. Akune, you are making a claim for loss which
you say arises out of a sale by the Custodian
of certain fishing nets and a rowboat?

A Yes.

10 Q I am showing you a statement of the nets and row-
boat (indicating). Does that statement contain
information which is correct to the best of your
memory and belief?

A Yes.

MR. TURCOTTE: I present that, your Honour, as an exhibit.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1).

MR. TURCOTTE: Q: Now you stored your nets in a nethouse?

A Yes.

Q Of the Great West Cannery?

20 A Yes.

Q And was a list made of the nets at that time?

A Yes.

Q I am showing you a document (indicating). What
is that?

A: The Great West
Cannery's manager and I discussed the nets at
the time they were left there, and these are
what we considered fair prices in the right hand
column.

Q And that is a list of the nets, a description and
a list of the nets?

30

Y. Akune,
In Chief.

A Yes.

Q With the fair prices on the right hand side?

A Yes.

Q And that is signed with the initials of the
cannery manager?

A: Yes.

MR. TURCOTTE: I submit that, your Honour, as Exhibit 2.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2).

MR. RICE: It is a receipt?

MR. TURCOTTE: A receipt from the cannery with the
10 prices marked.

Q And you are claiming for those prices that are
shown on that cannery list?

A Yes.

Q Now you are claiming \$25.00 for the rowboat. Can
you give us the reason you say it was worth \$25.00?

A I had it made two years before evacuation and
at that time I paid \$35.00 for it.

Q \$35.00?

A: Yes.

Q And was it in good shape when you left the Coast?

20 A Yes.

Q You are also claiming for some household goods?

A Yes.

Q And I am showing you a statement of them (indicating).

A Yes.

Q Is the information contained in that statement
true to the best of your belief and memory?

A Yes, including what I consider to be fair prices
at the time of evacuation.

Q I see. I present that, your Honour, as Exhibit 3.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3).

Y. Akune,
In Chief.

MR. TURCOTTE: Q: Now did you make a list of your household goods before you left British Columbia?

A Yes, sir.

Q Where did you make that list?

A While I was still at Steveston.

Q While you were still at Steveston?

A Yes.

Q But in what did you make the list; what sort of a document or book?

10 A It is in a notebook that I have here.

Q In a black notebook? A: Yes.

Q Is it all on the one page?

A Yes.

Q Perhaps we could tear that out and file it.

Would it be all right to tear that and file it with the Court? A: Yes.

Q Now you say you made this list out in Steveston?

A Yes.

20 MR. TURCOTTE: I would like to present that, your Honour, as an exhibit.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4).

MR. RICE: It is a list of chattels, is it?

MR. TURCOTTE: Yes, a list of chattels.

Q Now you remember signing a list for the Custodian called the J.P. Form?

A Yes.

30 Q Now in that form you only set out one bed and spring, and you didn't include a baby crib which you are now claiming for. Can you give us any reason why those two articles were not in the J.P.

form?

A: Such items as that I did not include because at that time we figured that the war would be over in about six months and that we would be coming back.

Q That is, you are trying to tell us then that you were not too careful and that you might have forgotten some things, is that right?

A Yes.

Q Now you are making a claim for approximately,
10 well it is exactly \$123.50 for kitchen utensils, other kitchen utensils and dishes and glassware. The kitchen utensils \$23.50, other kitchen utensils \$40.00, dishes and glassware \$60.00, .Will you just tell us what you had that came to that amount, that made that amount about \$123.00?

A I am afraid the question is a bit too long.

Q It is these three items here (indicating), the last three, they total \$123.50.

A Well this includes miscellaneous kitchenware,
20 some of which was new, some had been used a short while and some was fairly old. These prices are as close as we could figure to the value.

Q And those prices were figured out before you left the Coast?

A Yes.

Q Now were there any sets of dishes?

A Yes, there were some dinner sets, and then there were Japanese style sets of crockery and such things.

30 Q Now you are making a claim for festival dolls,

\$35.00 and \$45.00. Perhaps, your Honour, the analysis of personal property claim could be filed by my learned friend at this time so that you can follow it.

(ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 5).

MR. TURCOTTE: Q: Now for girls' festival dolls and boys' festival dolls, \$35.00 and \$45.00, there is a notation that a box containing Japanese festival dolls was shipped to you in 1943, apparently.

10 A At that time I wrote asking for my gas stove to be sent.

Q Yes. A: The gas stove didn't arrive but I did receive one box with the boys' dolls in it.

Q But you got the boys' dolls?

A Yes.

Q So that the \$45.00 for the boys' dolls, that should be cut off, should it?

A The previous answer needs clarification. Contained
20 in the box for the boys' festival were a number of dolls of which I received just one.

Q You just got one doll? A: Yes.

Q Well how much should be taken off your claim of \$45.00 for that one doll?

A About \$5.50.

Q \$5.50? A: Yes.

Q Now your kitchen range, was it a good one?

A Yes.

Q Size? A: It was a six-hole
30 range with a water heater on the side.

Y. Akune,
Cross-Exam.

Q Reservoir on the side? A: With a
water reservoir on the side.

Q I see. I think that is all.

MR. RICE: I am submitting, your Honour, that the property
sold by the Custodian was sold for its fairmarket
value. I am submitting that the chattels claimed
by the claimant and which were not declared,
the Custodian is not responsible for, and if there
are any articles that the claimant is claiming
10 that the Custodian is responsible for, I say that
the claim is exorbitant.

CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. RICE:

Q You say it cost you \$35.00 for the material for
that boat? A: That cost
\$35.00 for the material and the labour.

Q Oh, I thought you said that you build it yourself?

A No, I had it made.

Q You had it made? A: Yes.

20 Q Are you sure it wasn't \$25.00 that it cost you?

A No, there is no mistake. My boat was a fairly
big one.

MR. RICE: Perhaps you made a slip on that one there.
There is a gas stove at \$15.00 and apparently
the claim as filed is for two gas stoves, \$15.00.

MR. TURCOTTE: Yes, it should be two gas stoves.

MR. RICE: Two gas stoves?

MR. TURCOTTE: Yes.

MR. RICE: I am referring to Exhibit 3, your Honour.

30 And then you also say kitchen utensils, \$23.00,

you mean that to be \$23.50?

MR. TURCOTTE: Yes, it should be \$23.50.

MR. RICE: I notice that your personal property claim totals, according to my figures, \$392.75, whereas the claim is filed at \$406.25.

MR. TURCOTTE: I don't think I put everything in the personal chattels form. I just took the main or large items. For example ---

MR. RICE: ---the 50 cents added on would make it
10 \$393.25.

MR. TURCOTTE: For example, I haven't got the table in, have I? Yes, I have; a dresser, apparently I left the dresser out.

MR. RICE: \$13.00?

MR. TURCOTTE: Yes.

MR. RICE: You didn't intend to abandon that?

MR. TURCOTTE: No. Of course ⁱⁿ a large number of these personal chattel claims I haven't listed all the chattels. They asked for a description of major
20 items and particularly of goods lost, stolen or destroyed.

MR. RICE: I think your other claim sets forth the chattels in detail.

MR. TURCOTTE: Yes.

MR. RICE: My understanding of that is that that is your full claim?

MR. TURCOTTE: Yes.

MR. RICE: Q: How do you arrive at the value of the stove \$15.00? I am sorry, it is \$50.00. How do
30 you arrive at the value of the stove at \$50.00,

a stove that was eight years old when you were evacuated from there?

A It was actually 7 years old; it was presented to me when I was married. Twenty friends donated \$4.00 each, a little over \$4.00 each, bringing the cost price when it was new to over \$80.00 and my wife used it very carefully and at the time of evacuation I thought it was worth \$50.00.

Q How do you arrive at the valuation of \$23.50
10 for kitchen utensils? A: The \$23.50 amount is about one-third of what the various items cost because they were in use every day.

Q Can I see Exhibit No. 4? (Exhibit 4 to Mr. Rice).
Exhibit 4 did not itemize the kitchen utensils?

A I overlooked those at the time I made the list.

Q Well the list contains kitchen utensils \$23.50
and what I want to know is if you have got a copy
of the list to show how the amount of \$23.50 is
20 arrived at?

A No, I have no detailed list making up the total of \$23.50.

Q Well where did you get the figure \$23.50 if you have no statement with regard to it?

A At the time we left we gathered together such things as aluminum sauce pans, mixing bowls, and other small items of kitchen wares and totalled what we thought they had cost and then marked it down to one-third.

30 Q Why didn't you keep a copy of that list for \$23.50?

A There was no list made. We just looked at the items.
We just got all the items out.

Q And guessed at the price?

A And looked at them.

Q And guessed at the price? A: And
estimated the price.

Q And guessed at the price?

A Well, we remembered the prices that we paid more or
less and marked it down from that.

10 Q And did you mark down the prices that you paid
and that added up to \$23.50?

A We just got these things out and took a physical
look at them, looked at them and remembered what
we had paid for them when they were new, and then
marked them down to \$23.50 because they had been
used every day.

Q How many boys' dolls were there that you had there?

A About sixteen altogether.

Q Sixteen boys' dolls? A: Sixteen
20 dolls, sixteen boys' dolls.

Q I wanted to know how many boys' dolls?

A Sixteen boys' dolls.

Q And how many girls' dolls?

A About two less than the boys', about 14.

Q Fourteen girls' dolls, is that right?

A Yes.

Q That would be 30 dolls altogether?

A Yes, altogether about 30, they were in two big
boxes.

30 Q Well didn't you receive a shipment of a box with

Y. Akune,

dolls in it? A: Yes, I received a box, 16 x 16, with just one doll in it.

Q All right. A: That particular doll was in a separate box from the rest when I left it. All the rest were in two bigger boxes.

Q But you only declared two boxes, did you not?

A Yes.

Q I notice in your declaration you declared two
10 festival dolls, not boxes; you just declared two festival dolls.

MR. TURCOTTE: Twenty.

MR. RICE: You can read it two ways; it could be 2 or could be 20.

MR. TURCOTTE: The way you show it on your analysis of personal property claim is 20. "J.P. Declaration, festival dolls (20)."

MR. RICE: It could be read as 2 or 20; there is a mark over it.

20 Q I show you your J.P. declaration. Is that your signature? A: Yes.

Q And you have got down here festival dolls; do you know whether it is 2 or 20?

A It isn't two.

Q It is twenty, is it? A: Yes.

Q Well that was on the 17th of April, 1942?

A Yes.

Q Well will you explain how 20 has now grown up to 30 dolls? A: The 20 was

30 the ones that we bought for the children ourselves,

but the children also received presents of such dolls from other people and I had not included those at the time of the original declaration.

Q Why didn't you include them?

A As they were presents received from other people we didn't know the price of them; we could have guessed, but we didn't include them.

Q But you didn't include them?

A No.

10 Q Why are you including them now?

MR. TURCOTTE: I don't think he included them. You asked how many dolls he had and he answered you.

MR. RICE: I asked him how many dolls he was claiming for.

MR. TURCOTTE: The question was how many dolls were there, not how many he claimed.

MR. RICE: I am talking about his claim, not about presents or something else. I am asking what he is claiming.

20 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: I think he had better answer the question.

A Well there actually were about thirty altogether and if such things could be returned to me now, I would prefer to have them returned to me, but as they were lost I am claiming for them.

MR. RICE: Q: Why didn't you drop one doll when you fixed up your claim before my learned friend and swore to it that the statements that you submitted, Exhibit 3, was true and correct?

30 MR. TURCOTTE: Your Honour, there is nothing in any of

Y. Akune,

our statements setting out the number of dolls.
We have two boxes of dolls, boys' dolls and girls'
dolls.

MR. RICE: He admits that a doll worth \$5.50 should be
deducted.

MR. TURCOTTE: That is true.

MR. RICE: Then you are reducing your claim by \$5.50?

MR. TURCOTTE: If you really want to get down to cases
and start figuring up what the value of 20 dolls
10 would be, we would have it up quite a little higher
than our claim here now.

MR. RICE: I presume. Eighty dollars for dolls seems
to me as exceptionally high, but I admit I don't
know very much about them.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: That is all, thank you.

MR. TURCOTTE: That is all, thank you, Mr. Akune.

(Witness aside)
