THE SECRETARY: Case No. 759, Nobuichi Takeyasu.

NOBUICHI TAKEYASU, the claimant herein,
being first duly sworn, testified
through the Interpreter as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. RUSSELL:

Q Mr. Takeyasu? A: Yes, I am.

Q I am showing you a summary of evidence in support
of claim. Now, in this summary of evidence there
is a long list of personal property which was
prepared from information and figures supplied
by yourself, is that right? A: Yes.

Q Is this your signature at the end?

A Yes.

Q And having studied this over are you positive
that it is true to the best of your knowledge,
information and belief? A: Yes.

(SUMMARY MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1).

MR. RUSSELL: Q: I am showing you a picture here of
a Japanese lady sitting on a sofa. Now, what sofa
is that in the picture? Is this the sofa claimed
on the top of page 3 of your personal property
claim? A: Yes.

Q That is the sofa? A: Yes.

Q Yes. A: The same thing
as in the picture.

MR. RUSSELL: I will just have that marked as an exhibit.

(PHOTOGRAPH MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2).

A And that is the mahogany dresser in the same picture.

MR. RUSSELL: Q: And is that lady your wife?

A That is my wife but a long time ago.

N. Takeyasu,
In Chief.

Q And there is a piece of furniture there on the right, it looks like it has drawers in it; what is that? A: That is a mahogany dresser. This article on top of the dresser is a small box which has nothing to do with the claim at all.

10 Q I see. You are claiming for two dressers; you claim one 36 inches by 48 inches, and you are claiming one 48 inches by 54 inches. Which one is that one? A: That one the smaller one 36 x 48; it is the small one, mahogany wood.

Q Now, I am showing you a second picture and it again shows a Japanese lady seated on a sofa. Is that the same lady and is that the same sofa as was shown in Exhibit 2? A: The same sofa and the same wife.

Q Yes. And this object on the right, is that the same dresser? A: Yes.

20 Q That is the same dresser? A: Yes.

Q Now, here is a table here with some flowers on it in the foreground of this picture. Are you claiming for that table? A: No, I am not.

Q That is not the same table as this table (indicating) shown here? A: No.

Q It is a different table? A: Yes.

MR. RUSSELL: Put that in as an exhibit.

(PHOTOGRAPH MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3).

30 MR. RUSSELL: Q: Now, I am showing you a third photograph, and it is a picture of a doll and

a model boat? A: Yes.

Q Now, is that boat one of the model boats you are claiming in your summary of evidence?

A Yes, this is the one built in 1940.

Q This is the one built in 1940 and you paid \$30.00 for it?

A: Yes, that is the one.

Q Is that the one? A: Yes.

Q You haven't made any claim for this doll? There is no claim for that doll at all?

10

A No.

MR. RUSSELL: That will be Exhibit 4.

(PHOTOGRAPH MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4).

MR. RUSSELL: Your Honour, I would just point out that in the summary of evidence it is shown to total \$520.00; actually the total should be \$519.50. There has been an error of 50¢ in addition.

Q Mr. Takeyasu, you are claiming for an item which is listed as "1 wood age"; what is that?

20

MR. RICE: It is adze.

MR. RUSSELL: Q: Is it axe or adze?

A Adze. I am claiming for that.

Q Now, you say it was bought in 1935 at a price of \$7.00, is that right? A: Yes.

Q And you say it was worth \$6.00 when you were evacuated, is that right? A: Yes, it wasn't used very much.

Q And you say it only depreciated \$1.00 in those six years?

30

MR. RICE: Seven years.

A Yes.

MR. RUSSELL: Q: Well, had you stored it or had you
used it?

A: Well, I was using
it now and then, not very often.

Q You feel it was worth \$6.00, do you, in 1942?

A Yes.

Q You show two dressers, one was bought in 1935 and
one was bought in 1940, and one cost \$45.00 and the
other cost \$55.00?

A: Yes.

10 Q So that together they cost you \$100.00?

A Yes.

Q Now, you valued them at \$90.00?

A Yes, that is what I wish to claim.

Q Well, do you think you could have sold them second-
hand yourself for \$90.00?

A: Yes, I could have.

Q These two model boats that you are claiming, one
for \$20.00 and one for \$30.00; what were they
used for?

A: They were used as
an ornament in the house, but I had made some and
sold some previously.

20

Q Did you make these boats yourself?

A Yes.

Q Well, when you say "price paid", what does that
refer to then if you made them yourself?

A That is what I was charging for the boats when
I sold them, therefore, I put that value on the
ones I had.

Q Well, in other words, what you mean by "price paid",
actually it is the value you feel you could have
re-sold them for?

A: Yes.

Q I see. Did you make quite a number of these models like the one that you showed in the picture?

A: Yes, I had made several.

Q And did you sell them? A: Yes.

Q And what price did you get for those models when you did sell them? A: Well, I could

get \$35.00 or \$37.50.

Q And you have actually sold boats for that price, have you? A: Yes, perhaps

a little more than that.

Q I notice you are claiming for some treatment equipment, vibrator and so on; did you use this equipment to treat people? A: Yes, for about two years I was treating people besides myself and my wife.

Q Were the machines in good condition when you left?

A Yes, very good vibrator.

Q I see. A: Yes, very good.

20

Q You listed some equipment in your J.P. form, the declaration you made in 1942, and it appears that it was equipment for giving treatments, but it isn't described in the technical terms you have used here. Is that the same equipment as you have declared in your J.P. form?

A Yes, it is the same.

Q Well, I am showing you a declaration which was made on the 13th of April, 1942 (indicating); is that your signature there? A: Yes.

30

Q Well, now, in that declaration you say there is

one massagine machine, one steam massaging machine, and an inhaler. Now, I take it that that is the same equipment as these three items, or these four items, the termohaler, the vibrator and the electrical treatment machine? That is the same thing, is it?

A Yes, they are the same things.

MR. RUSSELL: I will put that in as an exhibit.

(J.P. FORM MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 5).

MR. RUSSELL: That is all, thanks, will you answer Mr.

10 Rice, please.

MR. RICE: I am submitting, your Honour, that the claimant turned over his property to a person other than the Custodian and the Custodian is not responsible for the same, and if the Custodian is held responsible in any manner I submit that the claim that the claimant is making to the things that have been lost, or destroyed, or missing, is exorbitant.

I tender as an exhibit an analysis of personal property claim.

(ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 6).

CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. RICE:

Q Before you were evacuated were you living with another Japanese by the name of Fusanosuke Okubo?

A We were staying on the same ranch.

Q You were staying on the same ranch?

A Yes.

Q You were evacuated on the 16th of April?

A Yes.

30

Q And Okubo was not evacuated until the 13th of

October of the same year? A: I don't know,
because that was after I left.

Q Have you ever got in touch with Okubo since
you left there? A: No. I just
received one letter from him at one time, but
since then I haven't heard from him.

Q When did you receive that letter?

A In 1944, sometime, I can't remember very clearly.
The letter came from Tashme.

10 Q Tashme, who is he? A: That is a place.

Q Oh, excuse me. Did he say anything in the letter
that he wrote you as to when he was evacuated?

A It had nothing to do with our evacuation. I had
sent him a letter asking him to return me \$2000.00
which I had loaned him, and he replied that he
couldn't re-pay me at the time because he had no
money.

Q Oh, I see. Okubo owed you \$2000.00. As a matter
of fact, it was \$2504.43, wasn't it?

20 A I can't remember very clearly, but I believe my
lawyer has it. It is over \$2000.00 anyway.

Q It is over \$2000.00? A: Yes.

Q And then Okubo looked after your property when
you left? A: No, I left it
with the Custodian.

Q The Custodian wasn't there; how did you leave it
with him? A: No, everything
was left with the Custodian. I had nothing to do
with Okubo.

30 Q How was it left with the Custodian, will you tell

us that? The Custodian wasn't there, was he?

A We all assembled in the Hall where the Japanese met usually and we were registered there.

Q Well, did you have this electrical equipment there with you when you were assembled there in the hall, and these carpenter's tools that you are claiming for? Why do you hedge? Why don't you answer the question?

10 A It was too heavy to carry with us, so that we just reported our property and we were registered.

Q I am asking you if you left Okubo, or whatever his name is, to look after your property after you left there? Did he agree to look after the property for you? A: No, I never had any talk with Okubo about anything like that. I boarded up the windows and locked the house up and handed everything over to the Custodian.

20 Q Well, tell me what you handed over to the Custodian? You have mentioned that four or five times about handing it over? A: I had two

keys and I handed them both to the Custodian. Q Whereabouts? A: I handed one key to the Custodian at Whonock at the Community Hall and the other one...

Q ...What was his name? What was the Custodian's name? A: I don't know, but my lawyer has the man's signature there.

Q For the key? A: Yes, he gave me a receipt for the key.

30 Q May I have the receipt? A: The other key

was handed to the Custodian at the railway station when I was boarding the train.

Q The same Custodian or someone else?

A I have a receipt for the key I handed over at the station also.

Q Did you bid goodbye to Okubo before you left?

A I just said goodbye to him. There was no talk about the stuff that I was leaving behind.

Q You say you treated people with these electric machines. How much did you charge for a treatment?

A Well, the treatments varied. I charged sometimes \$1.00, sometimes \$2.00, according to what the treatments were.

Q Are you licenced under the laws of the Province of British Columbia to administer treatments to people?

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Do you think that makes any difference, Mr. Rice?

A Yes.

20

MR. RICE: Q: You are licenced? A: Yes, I was.

Q As what? A: I had a licence for massage.

Q You had a licence for massage? A: Yes, a B.C. licence.

Q I notice that a few months ago you swore that you left the key at the Custodian's office; today you say that you gave one key at a hall and another one as you were getting aboard a train. How do you explain the discrepancy in those statements?

30

A I don't remember saying anything like that. I

don't even know where the Custodian's office is.

Q I show you a proof of claim form which you apparently swore to last November, the 13th of November you swore it; just look at that document and tell me if that is your signature on it?

A Yes, that is my signature.

Q That is your signature? A: Yes.

Q In a statement on the third page, sub-paragraph (c), "In whose care was property left by the Claimant at date of evacuation? Japanese section of the office of custodian. Key number 210 reg. in the custodian office"?

10

A: Yes, that is correct.

Q How could you be in the Custodian's office? You say you were in the Japanese section of the Custodian's office; today you said you weren't there, that you went to a hall where you gave up the key and you went to a train and gave up another key?

20

A: When I mentioned the office of the Custodian, I meant the office they set up at Whonock where I handed in my first key.

Q An office set up at Whonock? A: Yes.

Q Did the Custodian have an office at Whonock?

A Yes.

Q I mean, did he have an office there, or did they must meet there?

A: They set up an office in the hall, in the community hall at Whonock, and we all registered there.

30

Q That is what you meant. You referred to two dressers

N. Takeyasu,

that you say cost you \$100.00, and after using one of them for seven years and the other for two years, you say they only depreciated in value \$10.00? It doesn't say mahogany dressers, it is just "two dressers" that I said, Mr.

Interpreter.

A: Yes, that

is correct.

Q That is correct?

A: Yes.

Q They only depreciated \$10.00 or 10% after using them for seven years and two years?

10

A I really wished to claim the full amount as it is impossible to replace these articles now, so that, therefore, I am only cutting it \$10.00.

Q I am talking about the time that you were evacuated; I am not talking about the value now?

A Well, I wish to claim \$90.00 for that.

Q I believe you told my learned friend that you could have sold them for \$90.00. Did you have a chance to sell them for \$90.00?

20

A Yes, I could have.

Q How do you know you could have? Did anybody ever offer you that amount for them? Oh, tell him to answer the question, not go into a long dissertation about it.

A: A school teacher

offered to buy these articles but my wife didn't want to sell them.

Q For how much?

A: She offered me

\$65.00 for the maplewood dresser. This dresser was built in two sections.

30

Q The one that was built in '35 had another section

built in 1940, is that what you mean?

A No, the one that was built in two sections was built in 1940.

Q That is the one that you were offered \$65.00 for?

A Yes, that is the one.

Q I observe that you purchased a table in 1938 for \$6.00 and after using it for four years you still think it is worth \$6.00? A: No, I am not deducting anything from that.

10 Q I see that. Will you explain why it was that you said that you paid \$50.00 for two boats that you have since stated that you made yourself, and you left out about thirty-five other articles as to the year that you purchased them, or what you paid for them?

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: I think he explains the boat question, Mr. Rice, in his direct examination.

MR. RICE: He explained, your Honour, that he built the boats himself.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: For sale.

20 MR. RICE: For sale.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: And that the price he put on them was the price that he usually got for them when he sold them.

MR. RICE: That is right.

Q But why did you leave off thirty-five other articles in the list of property which you are claiming for that you give no particulars as to what you paid for the same, and yet you give us particulars of what you paid for boats that you didn't pay for? A: I am afraid

I can't remember the price because as articles got old I just replaced them.

Q Well, am I right in this, that you have one boat that you said was worth \$20.00 and you tried to sell it for four years and you couldn't sell it, and the other one that was worth \$30.00 you tried to sell for two years and you didn't succeed in selling it?

A: It wasn't a case of not being able to sell, it was just that I didn't want to sell.

10

Q I thought you said that you built them for sale; you told us that awhile ago, at least?

A Those two were not for sale; they were used as ornaments in the house. I gave them to my son, so that I didn't sell them.

Q Well, then, they are not yours?

A He was about twelve at the time that we evacuated.

Q I observe that a box for a thermohaler that cost you \$10.00 in '38, after using it for four years you say it is still worth \$10.00?

20

A Oh, yes, because it contained the inhaler.

Q Because it contained the inhaler?

A Yes.

Q All right.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Anything further, Mr. Russell?

MR. RUSSELL: No, thanks.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: All right, thanks.

MR. RICE: The claimant stated that he had receipts for the keys he was going to produce, and he didn't do it.

30

N. Takeyasu,
Discussion.

MR. RUSSELL: We have no such receipt on our file, sir.
Mr. Aoki went back to the office to check that,
and we have no receipts. If he had a receipt, we
are not in possession of it.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: He said he left it with your office.

MR. RUSSELL: Yes. I think that he is mistaken in that,
sir.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: All right.

(Witness aside)




