THE SECRETARY: Case No. 760, Yukio Takasaki.

YUKIO TAKASAKI, the claimant herein,  
being first duly sworn, testified  
through the Interpreter as follows:

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Do you speak English?

A Just a little bit.

Q Perhaps you can get along without the interpreter.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. RUSSELL:

10 Q Mr. Takasaki, I am showing you a summary of  
evidence in support of claim? A: Yes.

Q And I am showing you the particulars of this  
summary of evidence, and your signature on the  
last page. Is that your signature?

A Yes.

Q You are familiar with the contents of this  
summary of evidence? A: Yes.

Q You are familiar with these figures and so on  
contained in this summary of evidence, is that right?

20 A Yes.

Q And to the best of your knowledge, information and  
belief these particulars are correct, is that  
correct? A: Yes.

Q And you caused this to be prepared from information  
and figures supplied by yourself?

A Yes.

MR. RICE: I think you had better call attention, for  
the purpose of the record, to the pencilled change  
you made, that the claim now for chattels to  
30 \$2349.50 instead of \$2439.00.

Y. Takasaki,  
In Chief.

MR. RUSSELL: That has been amended in all of them.

MR. RICE: There was a pencilled note here, but I didn't know whether it was on the one that you are filing.

MR. RUSSELL: Yes, it is. The summary of evidence has been amended in all cases. In any event, the claim is \$1915.79 as shown on the last page.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: How much?

MR. RUSSELL: \$1915.79. I will put the summary in.

10 (SUMMARY MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1).

MR. RUSSELL: Q: You are claiming for a fishing boat, Mr. Takasaki, is that right?

A Yes.

Q This is your own boat? A: Yes.

Q You say you paid \$900.00 for it, is that right?

A Yes.

Q You bought the boat in 1938?

A Yes.

Q And you put in a new motor you say in 1939?

20 A Yes.

MR. RUSSELL: I am going to ask my learned friend to produce a certificate of British Registry, which he has in his file.

MR. RICE: This is the document you refer to, is it? It is only a copy.

MR. RUSSELL: Yes. Your Honour, I would just put in a copy of the certificate of British Registry which shows the present value of the boat at \$900.00.

30 MR. RICE: I don't think that is a correct statement.

Y. Takasaki,  
In Chief.

I think it was the present value at the time  
it was registered.

MR. RUSSELL: Yes. It says "Present value, \$900.00."  
(CERTIFICATE MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2).

MR. RUSSELL: Q: Now, Mr. Takasaki, you made a  
declaration -- is that your declaration, what  
is known as the J.P. form, dated in April, 1942,  
I believe, is that right? A: Yes.

Q In the J.P. form there is a boat listed. This  
document says "1 motor boat"?

A Yes.

Q "1 motor boat 'H.Y.' \$600.00, in custody at New  
Westminster, B.C." Now, I want to know why it  
was put down as \$600.00 in the declaration which  
you made, or apparently made, in April, 1942, in  
view of the fact that the registry value is  
\$900.00, and I also want to know why you are now  
claiming \$900.00 if you put it down in the J.P.  
form as \$600.00?

20 MR. RICE: He is only claiming \$675.00.

A At the time that registration was made I had  
an argument with an R.C.M.P. officer previously, and  
although I wasn't ready...

MR. RUSSELL: ...I am sorry, I have made a mistake. He  
is claiming \$675.00. \$900.00 was the new value of  
the boat. I am sorry, the mistake was mine.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Yes, I noticed that.

MR. RUSSELL: Now, I want to know why he put down \$675.00?

THE INTERPRETER: Well, he said at that time he had an  
argument with this R.C.M.P. officer and, therefore,

he felt that he would put any price down on it, and he just put \$600.00 down on the registration form.

A In any case, I wasn't thinking much about such matters at the time, therefore, I revised the figure later on when I heard that some friends of mine had sold some boats at that price.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Well, you aren't going to file the J.P. form?

A: That is why I sold or put the price at that.

10

MR. RUSSELL: I am always hesitant about filing it for the reason that I don't know what attitude the Commission is taking. I am not putting it in as part of my case. I would just as soon my learned friend did that.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Very well.

MR. RUSSELL: Q: Now, in addition to the fishing vessel, on page 3 of your summary of evidence you list a spotlight, a generator, water tank, and some other boat equipment for which you are claiming?

20

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Now, can't he answer the question without giving an explanation?

A Those items had no connection with the fishing boat. I had them in stock and I used to sell them to other fishermen as they required them.

MR. RUSSELL: Could you answer me directly in English?

A I don't speak much.

Q Well, this spotlight, generator, and so on, that you are claiming, were they attached to the

fishing vessel that you are claiming \$675.00 for?

A No.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: All right, that answers the question.

MR. RUSSELL: Q: Did you own any other boat besides the boat for which you are claiming \$675.00?

A Yes.

Q When did you sell that? A: Two or three days before I evacuated, you see.

10 Q I see. And did any of this equipment come off that boat? A: No, just the water tank.

Q Just the water tank? A: Yes, and the anchor.

Q Have you a brother by the name of Yukinori?

A Yes.

Q I am showing you a letter from your brother which reads as follows,

20 "That band saw is not belong to me,  
I had declare it, but it was belong to  
Yukio Takasaki,"  
and then there is the signature, "Yukinori Takasaki,"  
and below that in the same writing also "Also  
carpenter tools belong to him." Now, do you  
recognize the handwriting and that signature?

A That is Yukinori's writing.

Q Is that your brother 's writing?

A Yes.

Q Did he give that paper to you?

30 A Yes.

Q Did you see him write it? A: Yes.

Q I see. That will perhaps clear up a conflict of claims. Apparently the brother made a claim and that is indicating that this claimant is entitled to these things. I will put that in as an exhibit.

MR. RICE: What date is it?

MR. RUSSELL: It is undated.

(LETTER MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3).

10 MR. RUSSELL: Q: Where did you leave these nets and corks for which you are claiming \$89.50?

A At the Brunswick Cannery.

Q Pardon? A: At the Brunswick Cannery.

Q Brantford, Canada?

BY THE REPORTER: "At the Brunswick Cannery."

MR. RUSSELL: Oh, pardon me, I am sorry. Brunswick Cannery.

Q Were they tagged with your name?

20 A Yes.

Q They were all tagged? A: Yes.

Q How was it they weren't mentioned in your declaration that you made to the Custodian in 1942?

A Well, there wasn't time to register at the time because I was in such a hurry.

Q Well, what was the hurry? Can't you answer my question in English? A: (By the interpreter) He keeps saying he had no time.

Q I see. Well, Mr. Takasaki, did you receive any tools from the Custodian, a box of tools from

the Custodian? A: Yes, one box.

Q You received one box? A: Yes.

Q8 You are claiming for carpenter's tools in your  
summary of evidence? A: Yes.

Q You have made a claim for carpenter's tools?

A Yes.

Q Are these the same tools that you have received  
from the Custodian that you are claiming for now?

A Yes. Well, I got one box from the Custodian, but  
10 in there all junk, not good one.

Q Well, these tools that you are claiming, they aren't  
old junk? A: Oh, no, no, no.

Q These are different tools from the ones that you  
received, is that right? A: Yes.

Q Now, you are claiming for 500 feet of cedar lumber,  
is that right? A: Yes.

Q Now, did your brother Yukinori also have some  
lumber? A: Yes.

Q And where was this lumber left?

20 A Well, in Brunswick Cannery, x the same place, you  
know, we leave nets, you see.

Q And did you have some lumber there yourself  
besides? Your brother had some and you had some,  
is that right? A: Yes, we  
bought 1000 feet and we divided it half and  
half, because we want to make one speedboat,  
you see.

Q Well, how did you have the lumber? Was it  
separated? Your share separated and your brother's  
share separated? A: Well, yes.

Y. Takasaki,  
In Chief.

We put the name on top of both.

Q Was there one pile or two piles?

A Two piles.

Q Two piles? A: Yes.

MR. RUSSELL: Your Honour, I am going to draw your attention to the agreement for sale of the boat which my learned friend has on his file, and I am going to ask him to produce the same. It is dated the 2nd day of November, 1942.

10 MR. RICE: Yes, here it is.

MR. RUSSELL: I will ask that to go in as an exhibit.

(AGREEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4).

MR. RUSSELL: I would draw your honour's attention to the fact that that agreement for sale is not signed by the representative of the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee, it is signed by the Custodian.

MR. RICE: He is the only one that could sign it, unless the claimant decided to sign it himself.

20 MR. RUSSELL: Well, I think you are right there, as a matter of fact, but that may be of some interest later on when the cases are re-heard at the Coast.

MR. RICE: Well, I am submitting, your Honour, that the vessel, this fishing vessel was disposed of by the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee and the claim is not within the terms of reference.

I am also submitting that the chattels which were not shipped or not discarded as worthless were sold for their fair market value.

30 I submit as an exhibit an analysis of personal

property claim.

(ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 5).

MR. RICE: I submit a personal property summary.

(SUMMARY MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 6).

CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. RICE:

Q I show you your J.P. form, completed on the 8th of April, 1942 (indicating); does that bear your signature, that document? A: Yes.

10 Q That is your J.P. form? A: Yes.

MR. RICE: I tender his J.P. form as an exhibit.

(J.P. FORM MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 7).

MR. RICE: I show you two releases, one dated July 13th, 1943, and the other dated December 15th, 1943, whereby you released the Custodian from any further claim to the articles mentioned in these releases; do those documents bear your signatures?

A Yes.

Q They are both signed by you? A: Yes.

20 Q I can perhaps tender both as one exhibit, your Honour.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. RICE: One release dated July 13th released a washing machine, Beatty, stored with John Jacobson at Brunswick Cannery, one typewriter, Remington, paper box, 2 No. 8 and No. 9, books in it, record, Brunswick Cannery, Ladner, B. C. The other release is dated December 15th, 1943, and releases Japanese records, net twine, three boxes, picture without frame, carpenter tools in box, big black box.

Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.

A Can I say something for that thing?

MR. RICE: Yes, if you wish to.

A I not receive that net twine in there; I not receive even one pound.

(RELEASE MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 8).

MR. RICE: Q: Apparently these are the shipping bills that accompanied these releases. You received the washing machine and the typewriter?

AQ Yes.

10 Q The washing machine with a bench attached to it?

A The washing machine and the typewriter I received.

Q And the bench that went with it? The bench for tubs, I presume? A: Yes, bench.

Q And the other shipping bill refers to two boxes of effects, No. 3 and 13, and two "ctns" effects,-- I don't know whether that is meant for cartons,-- No. 5 and 12. Did you receive two boxes of effects?

A Yes, it contained dolls.

Q It contained dolls? A: Yes.

20 Q But your statement is that you received all those articles that you signed a release for with the exception of the twine? A: Yes, just the twine missing.

MR. RUSSELL: Is my learned friend putting in those shipping bills?

MR. RICE: I will if you wish them.

MR. RUSSELL: Yes.

MR. RICE: Perhaps they can go in as part of the exhibit I have just filed.

30 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Attach them to Exhibit 8.

MR. RICE: The shipping or way bills.

Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.

(DOCUMENTS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 8).

MR. RICE: Q: You left certain articles with Mr.

John Jacobson at Ladner, B. C., did you not?

A Yes.

Q When you were evacuated? A: Yes.

Q You left your chesterfield suite, did you, with him?

A Yes.

Q And you left a kitchen stove? A: No.

Q He says that you left a kitchen stove, a three-piece  
10 bed-room suite, two radio tables?

A That is my brother's. Mine is just chesterfield.

Q That is your brother's? A: Yes.

Q Well, they were left with John Jacobson, is that it?

A Yes.

Q All of your property that was left with him was  
this chesterfield suite? A: Yes, just the  
chesterfield.

Q I show you a letter, apparently signed by you; is  
that your signature? A: Yes.

20 Q That is a letter that you wrote on September 6th  
from Iron Springs, Alberta? A: Yes.

Q Addressed to the office of the Custodian at  
Vancouver.

"I am going to write a letter to your  
office to send my stuff and what is like those  
things that I had left the coast (Brunswick  
Cannery, Ladner, B.C.) when I leave there.  
That why will you please let me know all the  
things in house and all the nets and fishing  
equipment which are stored in Brunswick

Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.

Cannery. Those are Y. Takasaki #1, #2, #3,  
T. Mitsuishi, K. Higo, S. Higo and S.  
Suzuki.

"I had send a application to your office the  
middle of June to get some of my stuff by the  
hand of B. C. Security Commission of Lethbridge,  
but after that here is no answer and those things  
not arrive yet.

"Will you please send the following things  
as soon as possible

1. Washing machine (Beatty) stored Mrs. Emmy
  2. Typewriter (Remington) Johnson in Brunswick  
Cannery.
  3. No. 8 paper box (Books and magazines)
  4. No. 10 paper box (small Buddhist shrine)
  5. No. 12 paper box (old magazine)
  6. No. 13 Wooden Box (dolls for girl)
  7. Japanese phonograph Records (all)
  8. All the kind framed picture without the frame.
- Please, thank you, Your truly."

I tender that as an exhibit.

(LETTER MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 9).

I wish to tender as an exhibit a summary from the  
vessels records.

(SUMMARY MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 10);

MR. RICE: Q: I believe you left on your boat the stove,  
a battery, an anchor and the set of wrenches?

A Pardon?

Q Did you leave on your boat the stove?

A Yes.

Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.

Q A battery? A: Yes.

Q An anchor? A: Yes.

Q And a set of wrenches? A: Yes.

MR. RICE: I am submitting, your Honour, that that equipment is part of the boat equipment and was sold with the boat.

Q The spotlight, wasn't that on the boat?

A Yes, one.

10 Q That is all you are claiming for. I mean, there are other batteries you are claiming for, six batteries, storage batteries; did you say that you sold batteries? A: Well, just one battery in boat.

Q Yes? A: The other six we using at different place.

Q Well, the generator, was that on the boat?

A Well, that is a new one too.

Q But used on the boat, was it?

A No, no.

20 Q It wasn't on the boat? A: No.

Q Should there have been one on the boat?

A Yes, one is in the boat anyway, but that one new one.

Q But there was one on the boat and this is another one? A: Yes, another one.

Q Well, did I understand you to say before that you dealt in boat equipment? Did you buy and sell equipment for boats? A: Yes.

Q That is part of your business is to sell equipment for boats? A: Yes, side business.

30 Q Oh, a side business? A: Yes.



Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.

Q You claim 600~~k~~, I presume that is feet, rubber hose?  
A: Yes.

Q That is a lot of rubber hose. What would you have 600 feet of rubber hose for?

10 A Well, fishermen got water tank, you know, quite a big one beside the net, and we got water from the house, about five feet or six, I mean, six hundred or seven hundred feet from the house, you see, and I use the hose, and got gas station beside the bank, I got it right by water, and sell for fishermen.

Q Did you measure this hose, or just guessed at it?

A Just guess. I got over 1000 feet anyway.

Q How old was it?  
A: Well, some new, someone just old.

Q How long have you been in business there?

A Oh, 1938 or '9, start them up.

Q Started in '38 or '9?  
A: Yes.

Q Some of this hose would be four years old?

20 A No, got to be changed every year.

Q Water running through hose you have to change it every year?  
A: Yes, because laid down all the time along ditch, you see; well, sometimes bust like that, yousee; that is why got to be changed every year some part anyway.

Q Your rubber hose where you are won't last more than a year, is that what you want to infer?

A Yes, because I have on ground like that.

30 Q Well, you are claiming for two sets of pulley

Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.

and rope that you paid \$25.00 for and you say at the time you were evacuated they were worth \$35.00. What advanced the price on them? I will show it to you. I refer to Exhibit 1, the third page, nearly halfway down, "2 set pulley & rope" that you purchased in the year 1939 and '40, \$25.00, and you say the value today, or at the time you were evacuated is \$10.00 more, \$35.00?

A Well, that must be upside down.

10 Q I think so. You are claiming for lumber, or did I understand you to say that you are claiming for lumber, 500 feet of cedar lumber?

A Yes.

Q Hadn't you used any of that lumber?

A No.

Q How long did you buy it before you were evacuated?

A Before war. Before start war.

Q How long before the war started?

A That is about three or four months, end of 1941.

20 Q The end of 1941 war started with Japan, but when did you purchase the lumber, you and your brother? You say that the two of you purchased 1000 feet of lumber?

A: November or first part of December, 1941, just a few days before, you see.

Q And you say you hadn't used any of it up to the time you were evacuated?

A: No.

Q Not a stick of it?

A: No.

Q Perhaps you can explain this, Mr. Russell.

30 There is an item a little over halfway down on

Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.

page 3 of Exhibit 1, "2 vessek stive".

MR. RUSSELL: I think that should be two vessel stoves.  
It has there "1 new oil stove price of wholesale".  
I would say whoever was copying it wasn't an expert  
typist.

MR. RICE: That is another one that is upside down,  
the price paid is \$7.00 and you are claiming \$13.00?

A No, it is \$25.00 each.

Q No, that is the next item, \$25.00 each. I am  
10 talking about the item that is misnamed there,  
two vessel stoves, purchased in 1938 for \$7.00 and  
which you claim at the time you were evacuated to  
be worth \$13.00? A: That is two.

Q That is true? A: Two stoves.

Q Well, that is what it says, two stoves that cost  
you \$7.00.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Q: Do you mean \$7.00 each?

A One is \$7.00, and I should put one in \$15.00.

MR. RICE: Q: How do you know? A: Well, \$7.00  
20 each, but one is older stove, cost about \$7.00  
or \$8.00, put him in oil.

Q Oh, I see, they should be \$7.00 each?

A Yes, should be \$15.00.

Q Or should be \$14.00?

MR. RUSSELL: \$7.00 each and \$8.00 for oil attachment.

MR. RICE: Q: You say one of the stoves was new?

A Yes.

Q Just what did these stoves cost you, or do you  
30 know, and how many were there? Better start with  
that. Were there just two stoves?

Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.

A Yes, two stoves.

Q How much did they cost you, or do you know?

A Well, I give about \$7.00 or \$8.00 apiece, but I sell to fishermen about \$10.00.

Q You paid \$7.00 or \$8.00 apiece?

A Yes.

Q And you sold them to the fishermen for \$10.00?

A Yes.

Q But you bought these stoves in 1938, and after they were rusted-up for four years they wouldn't be worth as much, would they? A: Oh, no, I got to keep one near as new one, you see.

10

Q Well, going up the list again, you have storage batteries that cost you \$20.00 but you now claim \$30.00, or you claimed \$30.00 as of the date that you were evacuated. Is that upside down too? I will show it to you. "Storage batteries, 6, 1941, purchase price \$8.00 and \$12.00"?

A That means between \$8.00 to \$12.00.

20

Q Purchased from \$8.00 to \$12.00?

A Yes, each, you see.

Q Well, then, the batteries do you mean to say would cost you over \$48.00? A: Yes; someone \$12.00, someone \$8.00 new.

Q Were they worn out or what was the trouble with them?

A Well, the \$8.00 one that be, I mean, someone 17-plate and someone 15-plate, like that.

Q I know, but these batteries had been used?

A Yes, just a half season.

30

Q Used a half season? A: Yes.

Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.

Q You have a claim here for a bookcase with books and you say you paid \$200.00 for it and you claim \$100.00, and you apparently acquired these items in 1927 to 1941?

MR. RUSSELL: '37.

MR. RICE: '27 my form says. That is, you were fifteen years in acquiring that stuff. Are you just guessing at the price?

MR. RUSSELL: What does your Honour's form say?

10 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: 1937 to '41.

MR. RICE: There is the form I was furnished with; it was 1927.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Yes, on your form, but not on the exhibit filed.

MR. RICE: My land there seems to me to be a lot of carelessness the way these things are prepared. This is a newly typed sheet, and it isn't copied off right maybe.

20 Q The years don't mean so much, but the bookcase with the books, you say the price paid was \$200.00, and you are just guessing at that, aren't you?

A Yes.

Q You don't know what you paid for it?

A No.

Q And you don't know what it is worth, the value? This here is just a guess?

A No, because in here I got a set of what you call it, encyclopedia, and that cost about \$70.00, and I just bought before the war, 1941, you see.

30 Q Those books don't grow in value, do they?

Y. Takasaki,  
Cross Exam.  
Re Direct.

A It was a set of World Books.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Q: Were there other books  
besides the set?

A: Yes, I had  
several other books besides.

Q That is all. Anything else, Mr. Russell?

MR. RUSSELL: Just one or two things.

RE DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. RUSSELL:

10

Q My learned friend showed you a list of I think it  
was a battery, spotlight, some wrenches and a  
stove which were on the boat which you sold,





 Re Carpenter Tools - \$250.00: Yukinori declared carpenter tools, \$200. Yukio did not declare owning any carpenter tools. However, in B.C.S.C. Release for Shipment form dated Dec.15/43, Yukio requests shipment of Carpenter tools in box. These were shipped Mar.27/44.  
 Re 500 ft. Cedar lumber - \$75.00: Yukio did not declare owning lumber at anytime. Yukinori declared ownership of lumber and therefore, proceeds from sale of lumber were transferred to Yukinori's acct.  
 Re new band saw - \$80.00: Yukio did not declare owning band saw. Yukinori declared ownership of machine saw, therefore, proceeds from sale of band saw and motor (\$43.16) were credited to Yukinori's account.

This file reveals the above owned no real property in any protected area of B.C. and did not carry any Fire Insurance

CHATELS: The above, who made his declaration to the Custodian on April 8/42 and was evacuated on April 14/42, declared chattels as shown on Chattel Schedule on file, at the Brunswick Cannery. In accordance with a request contained in Custodian release dated July 13/43, the washing machine and the typewriter were shipped, but apparently not the boxes, books and records he asked for. A further Custodian release was received on Dec 23/43 asking for the records, net twine, three boxes (no numbers given), picture without frame and carpenter tools in box, and one big black box. These were shipped on March 27/44 as per memo on file on that date.

It will be noted that lumber sold for \$40.00 was originally credited the above, but as he did not declare it and his brother Yukinori did, this credit was transferred to the account of Yukinori. A band saw and motor, also credited to the above, has been transferred to the account of Yukinori for the same reason.

Practically all items declared have been accounted for with the exception of a Singer sewing machine, 2 scales. A kitchen range inventoried by us was not sold, and I note that in an excerpt from Mr Robinsons files, that a sawdust burner was apparently loaned to Cpl. Watts, who probably has it still. This could be the kitchen range inventoried by us.
