THE COMMISSIONER: What is the first case that counsel desires to proceed with this morning?

MR. MAKAROFF: If it suits your Lordship's convenience, I would like to call the case of Takatsugi Kano.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is the first one on the list.

MR. MAKAROFF: The first one on the list.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, I see it. Incidentally, Mr. Makaroff, this list has been prepared with a view of indicating to you which claims will be heard on each day, but you are not bound by it. If you prefer to bring on any other case, all you need do is notify Government counsel. Give him enough time and you can proceed with any other case you desire.

TAKATSUGI KANO, the claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. MAKAROFF:

Q You are Takatsugi Kano? A: Yes, sir.

Q When did you come to this country?

20= A I was born here, sir, in Vancouver.

Q You were born in Vancouver, and how old are you?

A I am thirty years old now.

Q And at about the time of the outbreak of war,

what were you doing? A: I was a cook in a restaurant.

Q Where? A: 133 Carrall Street, Vancouver.

Q And were you allowed to continue at that occupation?

30 THE COMMISSIONER: Now, Mr. Makaroff, we can suspend all the formalities. If you want to lead him on

the material things, do so.

MR. MAKAROFF: Thank you, my lord.

Q I understand you were required to evacuate the  
Coast line? A: Yes.

Q When was that? A: The first  
order for evacuation came around March, 1942.

MR. HUNTER: My lord, we will admit the date he was  
evacuated, if it is necessary.

THE COMMISSIONER: Mr. Makaroff, you will be probably  
10 *he* shocked at the extent of the streamlining we have  
done on this investigation.

MR. MAKAROFF: I can understand that.

THE COMMISSIONER: There are so many claims it has been  
imperative, so you can eliminate the formality.

MR. MAKAROFF: Thank you. I will try and speed it up  
then.

Q Now, did you have any property? A: Just  
chattels, sir.

Q And what did you do with the chattels?

20 A We left them at the school house which was  
designated by the B.C. Security Commission as the  
original storehouse.

Q And did you give an inventory of the property that  
you turned over to the Custodian? A: Yes.

Q Did you do that yourself? A: Yes.

Q Have you a brother named Seiichi?

A Yes. I took the inventory and he took it to the  
gentleman from the Commission who was representing  
the Commission.

30 Q So that you didn't make the declaration? It was

your brother that declared the inventory.

THE COMMISSIONER: Have you a chattel statement?

MR. MAKAROFF: I have a copy here. Is there an original of this (indicating)?

THE COMMISSIONER: That is the Custodian's analysis, is it?

MR. MAKAROFF: Yes.

THE COMMISSIONER: Government counsel will put that in.

(CLAIMS ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1).

10 MR. MAKAROFF: Q: I believe you were shown a copy of the analysis of personal property?

A Yes, sir.

Q You have examined it? A: Yes, I have.

Q What do you say; is that a correct copy?

A There is a few items missing, but what is there is correct.

Q I see. And what did you do with that stuff before you turned it over to the Custodian?

20 A It was all packed in containers and labelled with what was in it, and the approximate value of each container.

THE COMMISSIONER: Have you a J.P. form, Mr. Hunter?

MR. HUNTER: Yes, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: Perhaps it would be helpful to allow counsel to put that in. I think in all probability you will find the inventory of goods on that form.

MR. HUNTER: He declared nothing, my lord.

MR. MAKAROFF: It was his brother that declared it.

30 That is why I brought that fact out. Have you

the one declared by Seiichi Kano?

THE COMMISSIONER: The difficulty with these things, Mr. Makaroff, is there are so many that unless the individual who made the declaration has notified Government counsel, he would not have the file here.

MR. MAKAROFF: There is no purpose to be served in filing this, my lord. It declares nothing.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: I fancy not, except that Government counsel probably will.

MR. MAKAROFF: It is consistent with the evidence that he didn't make the declaration.

Q Now, did you get that property back ?

A Well, we requested the Security Commission to ship us some goods and outside of a bureau and a set of drawers, nothing else was returned to us.

Q Now I show you here an inventory and synopsis of personal chattels. This was prepared on your instructions?

A: Yes.

20 Q And whose signature is that?

A That is mine, sir.

Q And are the contents of that document true in every respect to the best of your knowledge?

A Yes, they are, sir.

Q Information and belief? A: Yes.

Q Are the valuations here, particularly in the last column under the heading "Estimated value at date of evacuation" correct to the best of your knowledge, information and belief?

30 A They are a conservative estimate, and as far as I

Know, I believe them to be correct.

Q And they amount to \$540.00? A: Yes.

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: That is your own estimate of value?

A Yes.

Q Not cost? A:

MR. MAKAROFF: It also has a column there for cost price paid, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. MAKAROFF: There is a substantial reduction.

10

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2).

Q Is the statement there as to the condition of these various items in the inventory correct? I will show you another document. Whose signature is that?

A That is my signature, sir.

Q And this document purports to be a listing of the personal property, fishing vessels gear and equipment? A: Yes, sir.

Q Are the items contained therein correct and true to the best of your knowledge, information and belief? A: Yes, sir.

20

MR. MAKAROFF: I would like to tender that, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is just fishing nets, is it?

MR. MAKAROFF: Yes, it is just fishing nets. There are four in number to the value of \$200.00.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3).

Q And these nets were left at the Celtic Cannery shed? A: The net shed.

Q The net shed, yes. In what condition were they left there? A: They were

dried and hung up in the middle with a cork and

lead line hanging on each side.

Q And was that proper protection for them?

A Yes, sir.

Q For the purpose of storage?

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: They had been bluestoned, had they?

A Oh yes.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is sufficient then, Mr. Makaroff.

MR. MAKAROFF: I tender that as Exhibit 3.

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: Now all the personal chattels as

well as the nets were left at the Celtic Cannery school, were they?

A: No. The chattels

were left at the school but the net was left at the Celtic Cannery sheds.

Q The net house, yes, very good.

MR. MAKAROFF: Your Lordship will observe there has been a slight reduction in the amount of the claim particularly in the item described as fencing equipment and repair parts. The claim as originally filed was for \$375.00 in that respect, and that

20

has been reduced to \$310.00 --

THE COMMISSIONER: Reduced to \$250.00, is it not?

MR. MAKAROFF: Well there are two items there.

THE COMMISSIONER: Oh yes, I see. You are right, \$310.00 in all.

MR. MAKAROFF: Yes, \$310.00 in all, a \$65.00 reduction.

THE COMMISSIONER: Unless there is something else you desire to bring out, our procedure has been to accept the evidence such as you have tendered as establishing a prima facie case.

MR. HUNTER: It is submitted, my lord, that the chattels which were sold were sold for their fair market values. It is submitted, that in view of the negative declaration of the claimant, that any articles which were not found, or were lost, destroyed or stolen, disappeared, entirely due to the carelessness and negligence of the claimant.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: Now there has been an explanation here, Mr. Hunter, that I think Government counsel should investigate.

Q What is your brother's name?

A Seiichi.

THE COMMISSIONER: So if Government counsel would cause inquiries to be made as to whether these articles were declared by Seiichi, I would like him to do so.

20 MR. HUNTER: I have already done so, my lord, and the articles declared by Seiichi are practically the same as the articles for which this man is claiming, and that last bit about ~~the~~ being lost, destroyed or stolen is just in case there is the odd item. Practically all the items actually are included, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: I take it the Government's position then is this, that so long as a claim is not presented by the brother you are content that Takatsugi should be given credit for the property declared by his brother, is that the situation?

MR. HUNTER: Yes, that is correct, my lord.

30 MR. MAKAROFF: I might say the brother is here in

Court, if your Lordship cares to hear him.

THE COMMISSIONER: It would be just as well for you  
to call him later then.

CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. HUNTER:

Q Now, Mr. Kano, this fencing equipment and repair  
tools for which you claim, they had no market value,  
had they? A: Well, to the

10 Occidental they had no marketable value, but to  
a Japanese person who was initiated into the sport,  
it had a market value, sir.

Q There was no market value when you left them?

A No, but regarding that question, sir, if I may  
say so I have requested the Security Commission to  
ship me those goods quite early, around 1943,--  
May, 1943, but he couldn't send it to me because  
it was already gone or had already been sold. I  
had the purpose of selling it to people in Alberta  
or in the interior towns of B.C.

20 THE COMMISSIONER: Q: I take it, it was Japanese  
sporting equipment, was it?

A Yes, sir.

MR. HUNTER: Q: When you left your property in this  
Celtic Cannery, I understand you put your name on  
it? A: Yes, on the boxes and the  
crates.

Q Your surname or your Christian name?

A Both, sir.

Q I see. Is this your signature on that? (producing).

30 A Yes.

Q This is a request that you made to the B.C. Security Commission for the release of goods. Now I notice on the back here you say, "The exact location of the dressing stand and cabinet . . . . ". Are you sure that you had your full name on all of these things?

A Well, that is a mis-spelling there but on some of the goods I just put "T. Kano" and on others the full name, and on some others there were other initials for indicating my middle name, sir.

10

THE COMMISSIONER: Are you putting in that letter, Mr. Hunter?

MR. HUNTER: I wasn't going to, my lord, but if my friend wishes it, all right.

THE COMMISSIONER: Has it any material value?

MR. HUNTER: This is merely a request to the B.C. Security Commission for the shipment of certain things, my lord.

20 THE COMMISSIONER: It serves to verify the statement the claimant made.

MR. HUNTER: Yes, there are two of these actually.

THE COMMISSIONER: There seems to be no purpose in putting it in. It just confirms his statement, that is all.

MR. HUNTER: I don't think there is any need to put in the J.P. form, my lord. The claimant had already admitted he didn't declare anything.

30 Q Now these books and other reading material which you value at \$45.00, are they Japanese books or

English books?

A: Mostly English

books, sir.

Q What type of books?

A: Reference

books and educational books, sir.

Q Did you buy them new or secondhand?

A New.

Q Did you ever try to sell any used books?

A I have.

Q You don't get very much for them?

10 A No, you don't.

Q What type of personal effects were in this trunk containing personal effects?

A There were some odd pieces of clothing and there was one 60-fathoms of small net.

Q But aside from the small net, it was all clothing, is that it?

A: Yes, and paper pertaining to the B.C. establishment called the White Cap Sea Food at 133 Carrall Street.

Q Those would be personal papers of no market value?

20 A No.

Q And the clothing, was it worn?

A It was second hand, yes.

MR. HUNTER: I think that is all, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: Is there any re-examination?

MR. MAKAROFF: Just a question, or two.

Q My learned friend drew your attention to the fact that second-hand books have little value for re-sale purposes. Did you place a valuation on these secondhand books in the light of that fact?

30A: Well, do you mean to say that say a book cost \$5.00,

did I value it at \$2.50, or \$3.00, say, or at 50%, or did I value it at full price?

Q Did you value it according to the price you would be likely to realize on it or did you value it according to the original purchase price?

A I valued it at what I would have had to pay to replace it again.

Q As new? A: No, even as second-hand.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: We will take it at that, but he put a value on them that he thought would correspond to what he would have to pay for it if he bought the same second-hand.

MR. MAKAROFF: Yes.

Q And though your brother made the declaration, as I understand it you had the right of ownership and disposition of these goods?

A Yes.

Q And this fencing equipment and sets, you have  
20 stated that they had no market value amongst Occidentals? A: Yes, sir.

Q Would that be true with regard to the Orientals? Would they have any better market value among them? Was there a demand for them?

A There was positively a demand because further shipments from Japan, the country that made them, was impossible.

Q You placed a valuation on them according to what you thought you would be able to re-sell them where  
30 there was a market? A: Yes, sir.

Q And that is true with regard to second-hand clothing also that my learned friend has spoken of?

A Yes.

THE COMMISSIONER: Mr. Kano, you have been in communication with your brother in regard to this property?

A Yes.

Q Do you know whether or not he has filed a claim?

A No. He lives at the same place as I and we discussed the matter thoroughly before I filed.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: He is here, in any case?

MR. MAKAROFF: No, I was misinformed on that.

Q He is in the city though, isn't he?

A Yes.

THE COMMISSIONER: You do not need to call him.

MR. MAKAROFF: We could call him this afternoon.

THE COMMISSIONER: Unless a claim appears, we will take it that Takatsugi is claiming for his own goods.

Thank you very much.

THE WITNESS: Thank you, my lord.
