MR. TAMAKI: Some of the evidence in this claim, my lord, will be quite similar to the other, and perhaps as we go along we could tie in some of the things which were submitted before.

THE COMMISSIONER: If you can, do so.

THOMAS SHIGETSUGU TAMAKI, the claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. TAMAKI:

10 Q Your name is Thomas Shigetsugu Tamaki?

A That is correct.

Q And you filed a claim with the Japanese Property Claims Commission for loss on property?

A Yes, sir.

Q Before you were evacuated from the Coast, did you file a J.P. form? A: I did.

MR. TAMAKI: May I have that, Mr. Hunter, please?

Q I have here from Mr. Hunter's files a J.P. form. Is this your signature on this document?

20 A Yes, that is my signature.

Q And page 1 of the answers of this J.P. form contains a list of nets and fishing equipment and so on.

Is that your signature? A: Yes, that is my signature.

Q And the next page, what is that?

A That is also my signature.

Q And what does this show?

A That is a list of stuff, bonds, that was in my name.

30 MR. TAMAKI: I would like to tender this as evidence,

my lord.

(J.P. FORM MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1).

THE COMMISSIONER: What is the reference to the stocks
and bonds?

MR. TAMAKI: Perhaps that is not relevant, my lord.

MR. HUNTER: They were not dealt with by the Custodian,
were they?

MR. TAMAKI: No.

10 Q I show you a statement headed "Personal Property
(Fishing gear and equipment)". Is this your sig-
nature? A: Yes, that is my
signature.

Q Did you instruct me to prepare this form?

A I did.

Q And you say that the contents of this form are
true to the best of your knowledge and recollection?

A Yes.

20 MR. TAMAKI: I will tender this as Exhibit 2, my lord.
I wonder if we might have the claims analysis now,
my lord.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2).

Q I show you from the files of Mr. Hunter a statement
headed "Analysis of Personal Property Claim". Did
you have an opportunity of seeing what purported to
be a copy of this personal property claims analysis?

A Yes, I did.

Q And did you go through the various items listed
under "Details of Claim"?

A I did.

30 Q And did you have an opportunity to examine from

the files of Fusamatsu, file No. 9518, a list of chattels which were sold on his behalf?

A I did, yes.

Q Did you have an opportunity of examining any other documents in his file?

A Well, I went through his file and read them, if that is what you mean.

Q What did you find in it? Did you find any inventories taken by the Custodian's office?

10 A Yes, I did.

Q And did you compare such inventories and the statement of chattels sold that we just referred to, and what was your conclusion?

A Well I noticed that most of the chattels listed here were contained in that inventory, that is the inventory of the Custodian in reference to my father's chattels, but there were some items which were missing, and in comparing it with the list of chattels sold by the Custodian, that is the list
20 that was in my father's file, I found there was only one item, namely the property which was sold for \$3.00.

Q Credited to ---? A: To my father and not to me.

Q That is your father is Fusamatsu Tamaki?

A Yes, that is right.

Q And you have heard the evidence presented by your father in the last claim, claim No. 814?

A Yes, I have.

30 Q What have you to say about that as to storage, and

premises in which these goods were left?

A Well, all of the -- well, I shouldn't say "all", because there are certain things like floats and so forth, boom chains, etc., which weren't stored in the net house, but by and large most of the items and articles for which I claim were stored in my father's net house.

Q And you say that you examined the Custodian's statement as to chattels sold and you couldn't find anything credited to him which you are claiming for now, except the property? A: That is right, sir.

10

MR. TAMAKI: I would like to tender this as Exhibit 3.

(CLAIMS ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3).

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: In your examination of your father's file, did you observe whether the articles for which you are claiming were included in the inventory made jointly by your brother, George Tamaki, and Mr. Anderson?

A: Some of it was included in there.

20 Q You say some of it was? A: Yes.

Q Do you know which articles were missing from that list?

A: I think I have a notation on one of the copies.

MR. TAMAKI: I have here our copy of the claims analysis on which he has made notations.

THE COMMISSIONER: Would you tell me which chattels were not included in the Anderson-Tamaki inventory?

MR. TAMAKI: Well, perhaps if I went down this list, there are some other references, too.

30 THE COMMISSIONER: Very well.

MR. TAMAKI: Under details of claim, under "nets", the second net, $5\frac{1}{2}$ inch 60-mesh, 200 fathoms.

MR. HUNTER: That is the third.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is the third. That was missing, was it?

MR. TAMAKI: That was reported missing in a letter dated May 19th, 1943. I believe that is also in Exhibit 13 of the last claim, claim No. 814.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

10 MR. TAMAKI: Reported missing on May 10th, 1943, under "floats, booming chains, cables, piles," etc., that is after the nets.

THE COMMISSIONER: I see "floats, booming chains, cables, files", etc.

MR. TAMAKI: Opposite that we have here reported missing May 10th, 1943. The rowboat, the next item, was reported stolen.

20 THE COMMISSIONER: As long as they were not included in the Anderson inventory, made with your assistance, Mr. Tamaki, that is all I want to know. It is not material to me when they were reported missing, as long as they were not included in that joint inventory.

MR. TAMAKI: We don't seem to have proceeded on that basis, exactly, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: You did not?

30 MR. TAMAKI: For instance, under "battery tester, oilers, funnels, etc.," we reported on an inventory of May 12th, 1943. I think that is Mr. Anderson's and my joint inventory; also foghorn, and bell.

One foghorn reported inventory May 12th, 1943. Putty, plastic wood, seam pitch, turpentine, paints, varnishes, etc.,; paints reported inventory May 12th, 1943. One gas and two oil drums is the next item, reported in inventory of May 12th. Five gallon kerosene and water cans, the note there is four reported in inventory of May 12th. Then two or three lines down, "gaff hooks, pike poles, iron decks, boat hooks, caulking, etc.," one gaff hook
10 inventory May 12th.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. TAMAKI: I seem to have lost one here. Battery and coils which is further up, about ten lines down. Battery reported -- excuse me, that was reported missing. Five coils reported May 10th, 1943.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. TAMAKI: And the rest have been reported as missing, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: The rest were reported missing at the
20 time that inventory was taken?

MR. TAMAKI: It seems so from this statement, my lord, except for the nets, of course, which the notation from the Custodian's office is that they were sold on appraisal.

THE COMMISSIONER: They were which?

MR. TAMAKI: They were sold for appraisal.

MR. HUNTER: My lord, I don't think they were in the inventory of missing goods.

THE COMMISSIONER: Even the nets?

30 MR. HUNTER: All these things, my lord, I don't think so.

THE COMMISSIONER: As I understood Mr. Tamaki, he is pointing out to me which were included in the inventory taken by Anderson. Is that on the inventory of missing goods?

MR. HUNTER: Both. They inventoried everything that was there and then they had an inventory of things missing from the original inventory.

THE COMMISSIONER: I am marking with an "X" the articles in Exhibit 3 that were missing at the time the
10 Anderson-Tamaki inventory was taken.

I am showing with an "X" all those things shown in the inventory as missing. I think I am correct, but I will have to check myself with the transcript.

MR. TAMAKI: Q: Now, these nets which you left, how did you leave them? A: Well, I put

them in bluestone, that is copper sulphate.

THE COMMISSIONER: You have them all covered in your written statement. You do not need to go over it again unless you want to.

20 MR. TAMAKI: That is all then, my lord.

THE WITNESS: My lord, if I might put in a word here? None of these chattels have been duplicated in my father's claim.

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: I see.. A: And vice versa. I might say I am a law student myself and I went into the files very thoroughly. It was done in a very legal way.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is good. Yes, Mr. Hunter.

MR. HUNTER: It is submitted, my lord, that the fishing
30 nets were sold for their fair market value. It is

submitted that the chattels were left under the custody, control or management of some person other than the Custodian, appointed by the owner, and accordingly only those things which came under the custody, control or management of the Custodian are within the terms of reference.

10 My lord, do you wish anything filed to show the question of the power of attorney and the tenancy in connection with this case as it has all gone in in the father's case?

THE COMMISSIONER: I think it can be understood that the evidence that was led in that regard in claim No. 814 would be applicable to 815. Would that be satisfactory to you, Mr. Tamaki?

MR. TAMAKI: That would be satisfactory, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: Would it suit you, Mr. Hunter?

MR. HUNTER: Yes, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: All right, we will take it accordingly.

20 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. HUNTER:

Q Now, Mr. Tamaki, I presume you understood that your father had given a power of attorney to Mr. Sullivan?

A Yes.

Q And you also knew your father had leased the premises with the exception of a net house to this Mr. Weir and someone else?

A Yes, but I might add I was evacuated before the lease was signed, and I reported on May 11th to the Custodian, and the lease, I think, was made on
30 the 18th of May which is 7 days later.

MR. TAMAKI: The 15th of May.

MR. HUNTER: Q: At the time you evacuated was there any mention of the lease?

A I beg your pardon?

Q At the time you evacuated, were negotiations going on for this lease?

A: Well, dad had mentioned he might lease, but he had had no definite plans laid out at that time.

Q He had given the power of attorney by that time.

10 Q What is the date of the power of attorney?

AA I am not sure on that.

THE SECRETARY: The 13th day of May, 1942.

MR. HUNTER: Q: When were you evacuated again?

A On the 11th of May, 1942.

Q Now, when you put these things in the net house, your father, I presume, knew you were putting them in there?

A: Yes.

Q And did you make any arrangements with your father as to the future of these items you were leaving there?

20 A: Not particularly, no, but I did have these nets identified with my name and the price which I would like to have, assuming that the Custodian was going to dispose of them.

MR. HUNTER: These nets, my lord, were appraised by C.P. Leckie & Company, and a written appraisal, that is handwritten, from Mr. C.P. Leckie, came in on January 14th, and it was followed up by a typewritten appraisal on their letterhead.

30 I presume one was probably made right on the spot.

THE COMMISSIONER: You better file them as one exhibit.

MR. HUNTER: I think so, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: That is January, 1943, is it?

MR. HUNTER: January, 1943, my lord.

MR. TAMAKI: I am pointing out to my friend, my lord, that in the letter dated January 16th, 1943, there is mention of a previous appraisal of the same nets, and I was asking him whether he intended to file copies of that appraisal.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: If you have them, I think you ought to file any appraisals that were made.

MR. HUNTER: Yes. The reason I wasn't going to do so was in this subsequent appraisal he mentions the price at which he had appraised originally and then either verifies them or gives a lower one, depending on the condition the nets are in; but I will look up the previous one and file it.

THE COMMISSIONER: In effect there is contained in that all the information that would be in the other appraisal.

20

MR. HUNTER: That is what I thought, but if my friend wishes the other one, all right.

MR. TAMAKI: That is satisfactory.

THE COMMISSIONER: No, you better let counsel find it. You have it in the other file?

MR. HUNTER: It isn't in the ~~small~~ file. It is probably in the master file, and I can pick it out.

THE COMMISSIONER: Do not bother with it now. I will take counsel's undertaking to file it later.

30 MR. HUNTER: This one reads, my lord, "In accordance

with your request, I visited the net house of S. Tamaki at Sunbury, (south side of the Fraser River) on January 14th. last, to re-examine certain nets which I had valued last October, to see if these had depreciated in value since that time.

I understood you requested this because a prospective buyer had felt the nets were not worth the original valuation. I re-examined five nets as follows:

10 1 net 40/4 x 6 1/8 x 60 x 400 fa. str., the Japanese asked price was \$75.00, my original valuation was to accept the best offer, present valuation, \$25.00.

1 net 50/5 x 6 1/2 x 50 x 400 fa. str., the Japanese asked price was \$200.00, my original valuation \$150.00, present value \$150.00.

1 net 50/4 x 5 x 60 x 460 fa. str., the Japanese asked price was \$100.00 and my original valuation was \$50.00. This net is of no use until 1944 because of the small mesh size. A tentative offer of \$30.00 has been received, I understand, and I have sent a memo to Mr. Robinson recommending this be accepted in view of the possible depreciation of this net during 1943."

20

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: I presume there were some new fishing regulations. Would that be a reasonable explanation?

A: No, I don't think so, my lord. Mind you, I don't know what the regulations were in 1944, but I can tell you this, that certain years sockeye salmon is smaller, that is they weigh less, and naturally with larger

sockeye you would require bigger meshes to catch them.

MR. HUNTER: The next net, "1 net 50¹/₄ x 5¹/₂ x 60 x 400 fa. str., the Japanese asked price was \$100.00, my original valuation \$65.00, present value \$50.00. This net was measured and found to be only about 320 fathoms and I would say the rest of the nets are probably short also.

10 "A Mr. Sjoblom was with me at the time I re-
examined the above nets and he advised me that he
would purchase them at the foregoing prices.
He also agreed to buy two lead lines and three
c cork lines at the following prices: 1 lead line,
\$7.00; 1 lead line, \$5.00. 1 cork line, \$20.00,
1 cork line, \$15.00, 1 cork line \$10.00."

And as he mentions he did this on January 14th,
I presume this handwritten one dated January 14th
would be the one made on the spot, and I put them in
as one exhibit.

20 (APPRAISALS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4).

THE COMMISSIONER: Q: Do you know the Leckie Company
as a fishing supply firm in Vancouver?

A Yes, I do.

Q Are there other firms that handle the same type of
commercial fishing supplies? A: I

don't think so, my lord.

Q Leckie are the principal people?

A They handle the Barbour nets, and I had the Barbour
nets.

30 MR. HUNTER: The only other letter, my lord, which I

see from Mr. Leckie is one dated June 1st, 1943. He says, "In reply to your letter of May 31st regarding nets belonging to T.S. Tamaki, at Sunbury, B.C., I have checked my records and find that I first examined these nets on October 27th, 1942, when I reported on six nets in the lower part of the shed. I also noted that there were various pieces of netting in the upper east end of the shed of no value.

10 "In my report of January 16th, only five nets are mentioned as being examined and I do not remember whether there were six nets or not. However, in my first examination the sixth net was merely noted as "1 net hump back" of no value, and I do remember that this net certainly was useless, but I cannot say whether or not it was a 6 1/8 mesh. I remember examining these nets very carefully and I am prepared to say that those described in my letter of January 16th are correct,
20 and I believe the sixth net, previously examined and noted as being worthless, was still there at that time, and this would be the 'hump back' net referred to above.

"I am sorry I cannot give any further information in this matter to help you out, but it is possible that the net I described as a 5 inch mesh was originally a 5 1/8" mesh net as it would shrink in use."

30 Then again he puts an "X" under 5 1/8 and down below the "X" indicates, "Although I am not

sure".

MR. HUNTER: Q: Did you have a hump back net, or rather is one of the nets you are claiming for a net which would be referred to as a hump back net?

A It is some time ago now, and it is pretty hard for me to recall. I think I didn't put in a claim for a hump back net, because, as Mr. Leckie has indicated there, those nets are not of much value.

MR. HUNTER: I think possibly we will put this in if it is agreeable. We will have to call Mr. Leckie, anyway. I would suggest that be made part of the previous exhibit, if that is agreeable.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, it seems to relate to the same subject.

MR. HUNTER: If he made a written appraisal the first time, my lord, it doesn't appear to be in the file. I think possibly he may have just 'phoned it in.

THE COMMISSIONER: Very well. Any re-examination, Mr. Tamaki?

MR. TAMAKI: Just one comment, my lord. I want to ask my learned friend if he is serious in suggesting that there may be no claim for loss here because it was in the custody and control of the father? You are not contending that, are you, surely?

MR. HUNTER: I hadn't thought of that one.

THE COMMISSIONER: I take it he is raising the same line of defence that he took in relation to your father's claim?

MR. TAMAKI: That is all right, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: All right, thank you, Mr. Tamaki.

(PROCEEDINGS ADJOURNED SINE DIE)

Dear Sir: Re claims: TAMAKI Fusamatsu #814
 TAMAKI Thomas Shigetsugu #815

I have your letter of the 26th ultimo respecting the above claims and am glad to note that early conclusion of the hearings is now in sight.

In connection with these two claims, this is to confirm that I am acting for both claimants and that the claims do not come under the Toronto Co-operative Committee, although we of course worked in close co-operation with them in the matter of general appraisals and other questions of a general nature.

In the light of what you say regarding the intentions of the Government Counsel respecting further submissions by him, this is to state that I wish to forego further oral argument on these two claims if he has no objection to my making the following special comments with respect to the said claims:

1. That in connection with the chattel claims under both #814 and #815, we submit that a very careful check should be made of the articles declared in the Claims Analyses to have been sold by auction or otherwise, to make sure that all of the goods so listed, for example as "miscellaneous goods", were in fact sold by the Custodian and not lost, destroyed or stolen, (transcript of hearing re claim #814, pp 18-19).

2. That whereas in connection with both chattel claims, Government Counsel indicated that many of the chattels were lost, destroyed or stolen when they were under the custody, control or management of the tenant of the main premises, Mr.B.Weir, or of the senior claimant's solicitor, Mr.H.J.Sullivan, now the Honourable Mr.Justice Sullivan of the County Court,New Westminster, B.C., we wish to submit in the first place that the tenant's lease expressly excepted the building in which most of the goods were stored (transcript - claim #814 p.39 and Exhibit 6). We also wish to state that we do not consider that the power of attorney respecting the Sunbury property granted to the Honourable Mr. Justice Sullivan was ever intended to place any responsibility upon him for the custody, control or management of the chattels, (transcript - #814, pp 38-40). The word "changes" on p.38 line 28 should be "chattels".)

3. That with reference to claimants' valuation of chattels, the values claimed were those originally reported in the J.P. forms on evacuation. In this connection, with reference to the claim for \$75 for 2 brooder stove sets which Counsel for the Government pointed out was too high, (transcript - #814 pp 30-31), we wish to admit that this was our typographical error for a claim for 3 complete brooder stove sets. This is evident when reference is made to the Claims Analysis for Claim #814 (p.4 Col.1, 1.10) and to the respective J.P. form (p.5 second to last line) where 3 complete sets are shown as having been left. If only 2 brooder stoves were sold, it appears that one complete set was lost, destroyed or stolen.

4. That in respect of the claim for the Sunbury real property under claim #814, we should like to submit that inasmuch as the said property appears to have been sold to the Soldiers Settlement Board as ordinary farm property although it was in fact greenhouse and poultry farm property and also had fishing facilities, special consideration should be given to the valuation of that property.

As all of the above points and others have already been covered at the hearings and statements filed then, I should like to be spared the expense and time involved in making a special trip to Vancouver to present further argument. If this is satisfactory to you, I should appreciate it if you would forward the enclosed copy of this letter to Government Counsel for any comments which he may wish to make hereon.



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

In accordance with your request, I visited the net house of S. Tamaki at Sunbury, (South side of the Fraser River) on January 14th. last, to re-examine certain nets which I had valued last October, to see if these had depreciated in value since that time.

I understood you requested this because a prospective buyer had felt the nets were not worth the original valuations.

I re-examined five nets as follows:

- ① 1 net 40/4 x 6 1/8 x 60 x 400 fa str., the Japanese asked price was \$75.00, my original valuation was to accept the best offer.

Dear Sirs:

In reply to your letter of May 31st regarding nets belonging to T.S. Tamaki, at Sunbury, B. C. I have checked my records and find that I first examined these nets on October 27th, 1942, when I reported on six nets in the lower part of the shed. I also noted that there were various pieces of netting in the upper east end of the shed of no value.

In my report of January 16th, only five nets are mentioned as being examined and I do not remember whether there were six nets or not. However, in my first examination the sixth net was merely noted as "one net hump back", of no value, and I do remember that this net certainly was useless, but I cannot say whether or not it was a 6-1/8" mesh. I remember examining these nets very carefully and I am prepared to say that those described in my letter of January 16th are correct, and I believe the sixth net, previously examined and noted as being worthless, was still there at that time, and this would be the "hump back" net referred to above.

I am sorry I cannot give any further information in this matter to help you out, but it is possible that the net I described as a 5" mesh was originally a 5- 1/8" mesh net as it would shrink in use.
