In Chief.

FUJIKO KIKUCHI, the claimant herein, being
first duly sworn, testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. CHERNIACK:

MR. CHERNIACK: In this case I ask leave to amend as
far as the Custodian's sale price is concerned.

We show it at \$47.00 and the loss claimed is \$179.00.

Q I show you a typewritten statement, was this prepared
in accordance with your instructions?

A Yes, that is quite right.

10 Q Is that (indicating) your signature?

A Yes.

Q And you swear the contents to be true to the best of
your knowledge and recollection?

A Yes.

MR. CHERNIACK: I tender this as Exhibit 1.

(Personal Chattels Statement, EXHIBIT 1.)

MR. CHERNIACK: And on behalf of my learned friend I
file as Exhibit 2 the Analysis of Personal Property
Claim.

20 (Analysis of Personal Property Claim, EXHIBIT 2.)

MR. CHERNIACK: Your honour will note that in Exhibit 1
full details of all items claimed are shown as to the
date of purchase, the price obtained and the estimated
value.

Q Mr. Kikuchi, you are claiming for a bedroom suite
consisting of a dresser, vanity and bed, where was the
vanity? A 409 Alexander Street, Vancouver.

MR. CHERNIACK: I would like to indicate, your honour,
that the vanity is shown by the Custodian in Exhibit 2
as "No Record at Any Time." I would therefore like

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to indicate the first column of Exhibit 2 at the very bottom where they refer to "Additional Registration," one dresser and stool stored at 409 Alexander Street and my submission is it is a matter of nomenclature as to whether they are the same.

Q Did you store the dresser at 409 Alexander, or just the vanity? A The vanity.

Q Did you store the dresser in addition?

A Yes, at the Community Hall.

10 Q Did you store the dresser at Alexander?

A The vanity at Alexander and the dresser at the Community Hall.

Q All you stored on Alexander Street was the vanity?

A Yes.

Q Nothing else? A No.

Q Vanity and stool? A Yes.

Q Nothing else? A No.

MR. CHERNIACK: That answers that, your honour. Just to make certain about that I should indicate there is a dresser shown in the left-hand column of the Analysis, Number 14. It is shown as stored at the Japanese Hall, Fanny Bay, B.C., so I believe that fully answers the question as to the contention they never had record of the vanity.

20

Q Now, Mrs. Kikuchi, the Custodian says that all dishes that were declared by you were shipped to you. Now, you are making a claim for a 48-piece dinner set which you value at \$18.00. Did you ever receive that dinner set? A No.

30

Q Do you have an indication as to which box it was in -

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when I say that I should explain that there was a number of boxes reported in the J. P. Form and these boxes were numbered - now, do you have a record of the number of the box in which the 48-piece dinner set was? A 12.

Q You are saying that on the basis of a record that you have? A Yes.

Q And you have that with you? A Yes.

Q Did you ever receive Box No. 12? A No.

10 Q Now, there is also a claim for 2 boxes of odd dinner pieces \$10.00; did you ever receive those 2 boxes?

A No.

Q Do you have a record of the number of the two boxes?

A Boxes 13 and 15.

Q Did you ever receive those 2 boxes? A No.

Q And you say that from a record which you kept, is that correct? A Yes.

Q Now, an electric iron, the Custodian says that they never had any record of it, where was the electric iron kept? A In the wash tub.

20

Q Now, according to the Custodian's copy of your J.P. Form, Item No. 26 says washtub and broom?

A No, that should be wash tub and iron.

Q Did you have a broom there? A I never packed the broom at all.

Q So you say Item No. 26 should have read "Wash Tub and Iron?" A Yes.

Q And that is the iron for which you are making claim?

A Yes, because the iron was missing, I got the wash tub okay.

30

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In Chief.

- Q You got the wash tub but not the iron?
- A No, the iron is missing.
- Q Now, the Custodian says in regard to your baby's crib and mattress, for which you are claiming \$18.00, that they never found it; was it also stored at the Japanese Hall, Fanny Bay? A Yes.
- Q Was it tagged with your name?
- A Yes, and the numbers.
- Q That would be Number 17? A Yes.
- 10 Q And you left it there with the other goods?
- A Yes.
- Q I show you what is called the J. P. Form, it is the form which was signed at evacuation, is that (indicating) your signature? A Yes.
- Q Attached to this is a list of 25 packages stored at the Japanese Hall? A Yes.
- Q And opposite that are prices shown, did you put those prices on there? A No, I didn't do that.
- 20 Q Did you fix any price for any of your goods?
- A Yes, I have my own price list.
- Q Did you give that price list to the Custodian?
- A No, they said they didn't need it.
- Q Did you offer it to them? A Yes, they asked me to keep it myself.
- Q What have you? A A copy of it.
- Q And these prices you say are not those given by you to the Custodian? A No.
- Q And you are quite definite about that?
- 30 A Yes.

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- Q Did you dictate to them a list of goods you had, or did you leave a list with them of the goods, I am not speaking of the prices but the goods?
- A To the Custodian?
- Q Yes. A What do you mean?
- Q When you completed this form, did you give them a written list of these 25 items?
- A No.
- Q Did you dictate it to them? A No.
- 10 Q Did you just say --- A I just left them in the Community Hall.
- Q What did you tell the Custodian? A Nothing.
- Q In regard to these goods, did you tell him you had goods in the Fanny Hall? A Yes.
- Q Did you tell him what you put there?
- A I copied it out myself and kept it.
- Q Did you give them a copy? A No.
- Q Did you tell them there were 25 packages?
- A No, there were more than 25 packages.
- 20 Q Let me understand it; do you remember whether this sentence here, "25 packages household goods left in Japanese Hall, Fanny Bay, B.C., as per list attached," do you remember if that was in this form at the time you signed it?
- A I do not remember whether I signed it.
- Q You do not remember signing this at all?
- A No.
- Q But this is your signature (indicating)?
- A Yes.
- 30 Q Do you remember having signed any blank forms with

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typewriting on them? A No.

Q You do not actually remember signing it?

A No.

Q You say at the time you were interviewed before evacuation you told them you had stored goods at the Japanese Hall? A Yes.

Q Did you tell them how many parcels there were?

A Yes.

Q How many were there? A 29.

10 Q And did you give them a list of the items?

A No.

Q You just told them they were there? A Yes.

Q And you didn't give them any prices? A No.

Q Subsequently you received a statement from the Custodian of the goods, or an inventory?

A Yes.

Q Did that show prices on it? A No.

Q Did that show all the goods? A Yes.

Q You checked that? A Yes.

20 Q How many items were there? A 29.

Q Do you have it with you - or possibly my learned friend will have that - is this your signature (indicating)?

A Yes, that is my signature.

MR. CHERNIACK: I should file these as exhibits.

(J.P. FORM, EXHIBIT 3.)

(List of Chattels signed for by the Claimant, EXHIBIT 4.)

Q Now, Exhibit 4, which you have just identified, gives a list of the goods numbered from 1 to 28, and 2 chairs, but this doesn't include all the numbers. It is

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numbered 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 12, 13; 16 is left out, 26 and 27 are left out. Are those the items which you received or can you explain that?

A Those are the chattels left in storage at the Community Hall.

Q Did you receive any of these things from the Custodian? A No, nothing, only two stone crocks.

Q You received those? A Yes.

Q But you didn't receive the other items? A No.

10 Q There were certain items you did receive, was that before this date, November 24, 1942? There are not 29 items here. I am showing you Number 4 is missing.

A 4 might mean the two chairs here.

Q And I show you 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 are missing.

A I received those goods, all the other missing numbers are the ones I received, the first part was at Hastings Park and twice in Tashme.

Q That means you received three shipments?

A Yes.

20 Q One in Hastings Park? A Yes.

Q And two in Tashme? A Yes.

Q According to the Custodian's records in Exhibit 2, there were certain goods shipped to you on May 26, 1942, would that be while you were at Hastings Park?

A Yes.

Q That is right? A Yes.

Q According to what they say, they shipped you Items numbered 7 and 8, which was some groceries and a sewing machine? A Yes.

30 Q Items 10 and 12 which consisted of household goods,

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glassware and dishes, is that right? A Yes.

Q Then they say another shipment was made June 24, 1942?

A Yes.

Q And then they say they sent you Number 9, which was glassware, is that right? And Number 16, which was household goods, that is right? A Yes.

10 Q Then they say that on November 30, 1942, they sent you Numbers 12, 13 and 15. Now, 12 and 13 are the items which you have shown as being your dinner set and the two boxes of odd dinner pieces; did you ever receive that? A No.

Q So you say what they say they shipped you on November 30th were not received by you, that is the three items shipped, that is correct? A Yes.

Q They also say they shipped you two crocks at that time?

A Yes, I received those in June.

Q You are quite sure you didn't receive those in November? A No.

20 Q And you say before making this claim you never gave the Custodian any valuation on any of these goods, is that correct? A Yes.

CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. FERG:

MR. FERG: It is submitted, your honour, that the property sold was sold at its fair market value and that the price claimed for goods declared not found is excessive and unreasonable.

Q Did you receive a shipment of goods at all in November 1942? A No, sir.

30 Q In the Custodian Records there were three shipments of

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of goods to you, one in May 1942, one in June 1942, and another in November 1942. Did you not receive the shipment in November 1942?

A No, I do not remember that. I received three times, but not in November.

Q Could you give us the approximate times, you won't know the dates, but give us the month if you can; you will agree there was a shipment in May 1942?

A One time in Hastings Park.

10 Q Another time in June 1942, where were you then?

A I was in Hastings Park then but I asked them to send to Tashme.

Q The third shipment you received? A Around September 1942.

Q Where were you then? A Tashme.

Q What did you receive in November 1942, do you remember?

A Dishes.

Q I show you Exhibit No. 4, now, could you tell us what items you received in the shipment in September 1942? A This is a paper I got from the

20 Custodian, this is May and June.

Q Yes? A I got three times, first time in the Park I received sewing machine in Hastings Park and the mattress I received in June. I write it down here (indicating).

Q You received it in June? A Yes.

Q What I want to get now is, can you tell us from the list in Exhibit 4, and each item is numbered, would you tell us the numbers of the items that you

30 received in the shipment at Tashme in September 1942,

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that would be the final shipment?

A One tub of sauce, one box of household goods, two crocks.

Q Can you identify these items you have mentioned on Exhibit 4? This Exhibit 4 which contains a list of the goods you left in the Community Hall at Cumberland, B.C., and you have signed this list, that being all the chattels you had in the protected area. Now, I want the numbers, these are all numbered on the left-hand side of the page, can you tell the court the numbers of those articles that you received on the final shipment in September 1942?

10

A You mean you want to know what I received in September 1942?

Q Yes, you have told us you received tubs and crocks, but where are they referred to in the list Exhibit 4?

A What do you mean by that?

Q Well, this is your list.

MR. CHERNIACK: May I ask my learned friend to note the date of that list.

20

MR. FERG:

Q Did you receive anything else besides the crocks?

A I received two crocks but nothing else, two crocks and just one mattress and no spring.

MR. FERG: There is a question there, your honour.

THE WITNESS: One mattress without a spring and two crocks.

MR. FERG:

Q And of course this list, Exhibit 4, refers to the goods and the complete list of goods that you left on

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evacuation in the spring of 1942, doesn't it? That is what you mean by the list Exhibit 4. The reason I am asking you this, you will notice that the document is dated November 30, 1942, but you had already received part of these goods?

A That is the list of chattels.

Q This is the list of chattels that were left after receiving the shipments in May, June and September?

A Yes, all the rest I haven't got.

10 Q So that the goods referred to in that list, Exhibit 4, were the goods left in the protected area after receiving the shipments you mention?

A Yes.

Q And that is the reason why the baby crib, iron and dinner set, and so on, are not shown in this list?

A The iron was in the wash tub.

Q And you received the wash tub?

A Yes, this is the chattel I received and this is the chattel not received.

20 Q Exhibit 4 is a list of the chattels not received?

A No, just the two crocks and mattress.

Q You do not show any baby crib on here, do you?

A The baby crib would be 17.

Q There is no 17 on there, is there? A No.

Q Had you received it? A No.

Q Now, Items 16 and 17 not shown on the list?

A 16 I received.

Q What do you say about the baby crib, that it is number 17 on your list? A Yes.

30 Q And when you reported to the Custodian in November

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1942, you didn't show that as being in the protected area, had you received it? A No.

Q Why didn't you show it in Exhibit 4 as being still in the protected area?

A What do you mean by that? It is missing here, number 17.

10 Q The point is this, by Exhibit 4, dated November 30, 1942, you show a list of all goods as being in the protected area represents all of your chattels in any protected area in British Columbia. Now, on this list you do not show as being in the protected area the baby bed, the set of dishes, the electric iron, 48-piece dinner set; you don't show any of these things as being in the protected area on November 30th?

A This should be 48-piece dinner set, number 12.

Q Number 12 is the box of effects and is that the dishes?

A Yes.

Q Which dishes? A 48-piece dishes.

20 Q Now, the Custodian says he shipped that to you on the 30th of November, 1942, and you say you didn't get it?

A No, nothing after September.

Q These valuations are your own, are they?

A Yes.

Q You haven't had an independent valuation made of them?

A No, I did it myself.

Q When did you store the vanity and the stool at 409 Alexander Street? A Just as we go to Tashme from Hastings Park.

30 Q Was there any particular reason for storing those goods apart from the other goods?

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Cr. Exam.

A How do you mean?

Q Why did you put that separate? A We took all my things to Fanny Bay and the vanity was hard to be crated. I left it there with my friends.

Q What was your friend's name? A Nishimo.

Q Was he evacuated? A I do not know where he is now, he was evacuated.

Q Did he give you a receipt for the goods?

A No.

10 Q At any rate you left those things with him?

A Yes.

Q And did you inform the Custodian of these things at the time the J.P. Form was completed by you?

A No.

Q Did you tell the Custodian that the vanity was stored at the Community Hall? A The vanity at Alexander?

Q Yes, did you tell the Custodian to do that?

A Mr. Nishimo did that, I had no time to do it.

20 Q He did it for you, you had no time to do it?

A No.

MR. CHERNIACK: May I point out that the question on informing the Custodian about this last-mentioned vanity is shown in Exhibit 4 as having been stored at 409 Alexander Street and therefore has apparently been inventoried by the Custodian. Might I also indicate that in Exhibit 2, the Analysis Sheet, there is mention made of four shipments of goods, not three shipments, namely, May 26th, June 24th, November 24th and November 30th, and it would appear to me from the

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Cr. Exam.

evidence given that the claimant admits receiving all shipments except the last one, November 30th. You will note, sir, that the two crocks are shown in Exhibit 2 as having been shipped November 24th.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. CHERNIACK: So it is a question really of the last shipment.

THE COMMISSIONER: How were they shipped to her, in what manner?

10 MR. FERG: Do you mean the goods she received?

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, by express or what?

MR. FERG: Probably my learned friend would have the Bill of Lading.

MR. CHERNIACK: I haven't the Bill of Lading.

THE COMMISSIONER: Where was it sent?

MR. FERG: Tashme.

BY THE COMMISSIONER:

Q How far is that from Vancouver?

A A little over 100 miles.

20 Q Was it shipped by truck?

BY MR. FERG:

Q Tashme was a re-location centre? A Yes.

Q And the British Columbia Security Commission was in charge? A Yes.

Q Do you remember in what way these goods were shipped to Tashme, by train, bus or truck?

A I guess on a freight train, to Hope, and Hope to Tashme by truck.

Q You guess that? A Yes.

30 Q All that was done by the British Columbia Security

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Commission? A Yes.

Q And when it was received you were notified and picked it up? A Yes.

THE COMMISSIONER: It was evidently received by the British Columbia Security Commission and they in turn sent it forward.

MR. FERG: Yes, and as I point out, it is the question of the last shipment only; November 30th shipment which the Custodian claims to have sent and the claimant denies receiving.

10

Q While you were being questioned you were looking at a statement, is this your handwriting, the statement?

A Yes.

Q Is this the statement you said was prepared at the date of evacuation? A That is the statement I prepared at the time I took it.

Q Is this the original statement or a copy of it, is this the statement you actually wrote on?

A Yes.

20 Q When you packed your goods? A Yes.

Q And these figures, are these the prices shown by you?

A Yes.

Q And is this the statement you said they told you not to bother with giving them at the time of the J.P. Form? A Yes.

MR. FERG: I think I should file this as an exhibit.

(Statement, EXHIBIT 5.)

MR. CHERNIACK: That is her own statement.

MR. FERG: Yes, which she says she prepared when she packed the goods. There is the date right on it,

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March 15, 1942, her name and her registration number. Might I ask my learned friend, your honour, to produce a copy of the letter to the claimant dated November 24, 1942.

MR. CHERNIACK: What is the date?

MR. FERG: November 24, 1942, that is the letter that accompanied the inventory.

Q Does that mean anything? A Yes, this is the same time I got it.

10 MR. CHERNIACK: You mean the letter from the Custodian?

MR. FERG: Yes, my learned friend has produced from his file a copy of letter sent by the Custodian to the claimant dated November 24, 1942, and enclosing the inventory which has been filed as Exhibit 4 and also setting out certain goods which were shipped to the claimant. They say goods shipped May 26th and gave a list, and June 24th and gave a list, but they do not mention any goods shipped on that date. That is the day the crocks were shipped according to Exhibit 2.

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(Letter dated November 24, 1942, EXHIBIT 6.)

BY MR. FERG:

Q Now, Mrs. Kikuchi, I show you this letter, I think you mentioned that these goods were not all received exactly as shown. For example, May 26th, 1942, there are certain items set out; which of these goods did you not receive with that shipment?

A As far as I know, number 7.

Q What about number 8, was that the same time as 7?

A I do not think so.

30

Q What about 10, 11 and 28 - in any event you say it is

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correct as far as the shipment is concerned but it is wrong as far as the dates are concerned?

A Yes.

Q What they say was shipped is correct? A Yes.

Q And in addition to what is shown here you say you received two crooks and a mattress?

A Yes.

Q An old mattress? A Yes.

MR. FERG: That is the case, your honour.

10

RE-EXAMINATION BY MR. CHERNIACK:

Q You say that you informed the Custodian of the dresser and stool being stored at 409 Alexander Street?

A Yes.

Q I will show you a document dated 9th September, 1942, Hastings Park, is that your signature (indicating), madam? A Yes, it seems to be, I usually write my full name, I guess that is mine.

Q That is your signature? A Yes.

20 THE COMMISSIONER: What is that?

MR. CHERNIACK: It is an additional registration and it gives the name of the claimant and the address where the articles are.

Q Is that the first occasion you informed the Custodian these particular goods listed in Exhibit 7 were stored in Alexander Street? A Yes.

Q That is the first occasion you informed the Custodian those goods were there? A Yes.

MR. CHERNIACK: Does my learned friend contend that they were not inventoried?

30

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MR. FERG: Well, the contention is this, under the terms of record you will observe that if any goods are left in charge of other persons and the goods are lost while under that control, and so on --- Now, this witness testified she left the goods with her friend at Alexander Street and didn't report it. When the Custodian goes to make an inventory there are no goods there, and after the matter was reported they found no goods. The contention will be these goods were lost while they were under the control of somebody.

MR. CHERNIACK: I asked that question advisedly. In the Analysis Sheet there is no contention at all that they didn't find goods on Alexander Street, instead of that it is shown on the Inventory Sheet.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, but it is marked "Goods not Found."

MR. FERG: Where is that?

THE COMMISSIONER: In the analysis.

(Additional Registration, EXHIBIT 7.)

MR. FERG: Yes, I see. Well, it would be a question to be answered by the Custodian as to when they looked and why they put it on the inventory sheet.

MR. CHERNIACK: On the copy of Exhibit 7 that I have is a memorandum dated June 5, 1946. Yes, these articles were not found at 409 Alexander Street and signed by George Spain.

MR. FERG: I am sure my learned friend doesn't want to be tied to the date of June 5, 1946.

MR. CHERNIACK: No.




