MORIJI SHIOZAKI, the claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified through the Interpreter as follows:

MR. CHERNIACK: There is a fairly substantial amendment, my Lord, in this and since it is clearly set out in the statement attached, I thought I could give your Lordship just the net amount.

THE COMMISSIONER: Very well.

MR. CHERNIACK: The net amount, my Lord, is \$1104.33.

10 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. CHERNIACK:

Q Mr. Shiozaki, I show you a typewritten statement. Was this prepared in accordance with your instructions?

A Yes.

Q Is that your signature? A: Yes.

Q Do you swear the contents to be true to the best of your knowledge and recollection?

A Yes.

MR. CHERNIACK: I enter this as Exhibit 1, my Lord.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1).

20 MR. CHERNIACK: Your Lordship will find in Exhibit 1 that the goods are all set out and divided into categories. One, "Stock-in-Trade", 2, "Store Fixtures and Household Goods". I think I had better file the analysis as Exhibit 2.

(ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2).

THE COMMISSIONER: What type of business was this?

MR. CHERNIACK: This man was in the jewelry business, sir. Exhibit 1 sets out that the goods are listed in (a) in the Custodian's inventory of
30 November 9th, 1944, and (b) on this list, and if my

learned friend might produce and file that inventory in that event I can refer your Lordship to the individual items.

(INVENTORY MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3).

MR. CHERNIACK: This has been altered and added to, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: Well, we can have a recess while you go over it.

(PROCEEDINGS RESUMED AFTER SHORT ADJOURNMENT).

10

MORIJI SHIOZAKI, resumed the stand, testified further as follows:

MR. CHERNIACK: Has your Lordship now the three exhibits?

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, I think I have.

MR. CHERNIACK: Referring to Exhibit 1 first, my lord, the personal property statement. It itemizes the various chattels sold by the Custodian for which claim is being made. Your Lordship will note the first reference on that page is stock-in-trade at retail prices as per Custodian's itemized inventory taken by Mr. Matt Brown, November 9th, 1944, \$1,998.66. That is also shown on Exhibit 3, \$1,998.66, is shown opposite the amount in Exhibit 3. That list, Exhibit 3, my lord, does not itemize the watch glasses which are then shown at \$175.00. You will note that the claimant shows his mark-up as one-third, and then shows a credit for the price received by the Custodian. If your Lordship will refer in this connection to Exhibit 2, the analysis, you will note that there has been some changes made. The first item under "Remarks" refers to a sale

August, 1942, with consent of Mr. Shiozaki by the Canadian Credit Men's Association for the sum of \$750.00 of goods valued at Mr. Shiozaki's retail price at \$2,278.55. These goods are the ones which we have abandoned. The second paragraph refers to a sale December 1st, 1944, by the Custodian for the sum of \$700.00 of goods valued at Mr. Shiozaki's prices at \$1,998.66. That is the claim to which I have already referred.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: I don't see that.

MR. CHERNIACK: It is the fifth line from the top, "sale December 1st, 1944, by Custodian for the sum of \$700.00 of goods valued at Mr. Shiozaki's prices at \$1,998.66". And that corresponds with the figure in Exhibit 1.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

MR. CHERNIACK: The other items, my lord, are shown there although the values have been reduced.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.

20 MR. CHERNIACK: Those goods that were sold for \$700.00, I think my learned friend will agree that they are the amounts shown above in Exhibit 1, and do not include the watch glasses which my learned friend now advises me were lost.

MR. HUNTER: They are missing, my lord.

MR. CHERNIACK: That claim then shows \$175.00 of which one-third is a mark-up, so the net amount should be \$116.66 for this item. My lord, the other items are fairly clearly shown in Exhibit 1, and the analysis shows the comment of the Custodian..

Thank you, sir.

MR. HUNTER: It is submitted, my lord, that the chattels which were sold by the Custodian were sold for their fair market value. It is submitted that the claims made for chattels not sold are exorbitant.

THE COMMISSIONER: That would include only the watch glasses. There are other household goods.

MR. HUNTER: There are certain things which were declared and not found, my lord.

10 THE COMMISSIONER: Oh yes, I see.

MR. HUNTER: My learned friend has questioned the claim for goods which were sold by the Canadian Credit Men's Association. The remaining chattels excluding the watch glasses were appraised by E. Felix Thomas, auctioneer and Notary Public, of Courtenay, British Columbia, which appraisal I propose to put in.

THE COMMISSIONER: At what price?

MR. HUNTER: If your Lordship does not mind I think I should read it in.

20 THE COMMISSIONER: Very well.

MR. HUNTER: "In appraising this diversified stock, several aspects have had to be considered.

"A goodly portion of the stock is in good condition and, under existing circumstances, should be readily saleable.

"The retail prices marked on the goods are, in most instances, reasonable.

"This applies particularly to the leather, glassware, silverware, cutlery, clocks, brushes, compacts, cheap jewellery, etc.

30

"On the other hand such things as faded show trays, ring cases, unfitted eye glasses and parts, watchmakers' repairs and parts, social cards, etc.: would be difficult, or impossible, to sell quickly locally to advantage.

"It must be remembered too that this is not new stock. Some of it is decidedly shopworn. Some definitely damaged. Stock of artificial flowers is very much off colour.

10

"It should also be remembered that the retailer's mark-up on this class of stock is considerable.

"In a few instances I found the price tags out of line, being too high.

"Consideration have to be given to that part of these goods which has, during the next immediate pre-seasonal shopping weeks, a value it may never again possess.

20

"As indicated above, some of this stock would probably realize the full retail price, or more, at auction; but these articles should certainly have a value of inducement in disposing of the entire list en masse.

"In other words, to dispose of these goods by public auction would entail the time and expense of two sales - say one in Cumberland and one in Courtenay. This would probably cost an additional 15 to 20%. To retail them over a longer period would cost more.

"It would therefore seem advisable to accept an offer in bulk at somewhere near 20 to 25% less

than my appraisal of the total value which is \$959.36.

"I would like to add that my expenses would have been considerably higher had it not been for good work of yourself and helpers at Cumberland in unpacking and making these goods easily accessible for inspection and appraisal."

(APPRAISAL MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4).

10 MR. HUNTER: From that sale by bulk the Custodian took \$700.00 to be a fair amount after taking off the 20% as recommended.

THE COMMISSIONER: And the sale was made at \$700.00?

MR. HUNTER: Yes. It was advertised for public tender, I have a copy of the advertisement. I have a type-written copy or we have a copy off the original file, whichever your Lordship desires.

THE COMMISSIONER: One is a copy of the other?

MR. HUNTER: Yes, my lord.

THE COMMISSIONER: Have you examined it, Mr. Cherniack?

20 MR. CHERNIACK: No, I haven't, my lord.

MR. HUNTER: Yes, it is the same, my lord. It is dated the 31st of October, 1944, and I tender that as an exhibit.

(ADVERTISEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 5).

MR. HUNTER: If my learned friend requires proof that it was published, I have no doubt that we can get other clippings.

30 THE COMMISSIONER: Proof to be required. It will be accepted unless proof is required by defendant's counsel. Is there any information as to what

publication the advertisement was run in?

10 MR. HUNTER: This one appears to be in the Comox District Free Press, and there is another one apparently run in the Comox Argos. Those are the only two that I see here, my lord. Mr. Shears points out that that would be at Cumberland and Courtenay. I have another appraisal here, my lord, from Simms & Sons, but as they were interested in bidding I don't think it is of much value as they were pretty low, and they pointed out that if any amount was received in excess of their bid, that it would be very unfortunate for the buyer. I think there is personal interest involved there, my lord. There was also one for \$250.00 from H.P. Fraser, Gatz & Thomas bid \$650.00, and when the Custodian told them they would not take less than \$700.00, they raised their bid and it was sold to them. There was just the three tenders, as far as I can see, my lord. The history of this thing, my lord, is that 20 when the stock was taken over, Mr. Thomas or Brown, rather, who made the investigation of it, recommended that the more valuable stuff be shipped to Vancouver. That was done and shipped to the Canadian Credit Men's Association who sold it for \$750.00. The cheaper stuff was left up there and was sold by public advertisement. The watch glasses were taken down to Vancouver to the Custodian's office and placed by the Custodian in storage. When it was investigated later, and it was found that they were missing, so 30 I presume that they were stolen from storage.

The furniture, of course, was sold by public auction and is supported by the auction sheets. In regard to the missing items Matt Brown was written and asked to investigate and he wrote back and says, "In reply to your letter of March 22nd, 1948, pertaining to items marked X that do not appear on the auction sheets dated October 17th and 25th, 1944.

"Upon checking our records we find that:

10

1. We have no record of 1 cedar box containing chinaware valued at \$7.00.
2. One gas stove valued at \$10.00 was 1 coal oil stove and was sold at auction for \$1.00.
3. Chinaware, teapots, kettles, pots, pans, silverware, etc., valued at \$38.25 was just a lot of old used stuff left lying around the house and was not ~~fit~~ for sale.
4. 3 rugs valued at \$5.00 were old mats left on the floor, not saleable.
5. Chairs valued \$3.00 were broken and not saleable.
6. One stove and pipes valued at \$3.50 was an old tin heater left in the house, not saleable.
7. Two picture frames valued at \$2.75, no record.
8. One carpet valued at \$16.00, no record.

Hoping this is the information you wanted."
I would like to put that letter in for information.

(LETTER MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 6).

MR. HUNTER: This appears to be entirely a question of value, my lord. There are very few missing items except the watch glasses, and the few shown there were not declared and abandoned.

THE COMMISSIONER: Any re-examination?



And more particularly to part stock of his jewellery and other goods:-

In appraising this diversified stock several aspects have had to be considered.

A goodly portion of the stock is in good condition and, under existing circumstances, should be readily saleable

The retail prices marked on the goods are, in most instances, reasonable.

This applies particularly to the leather, glassware, silverware, cuttlery, clocks, brushes, compacts, cheap jewellery etc:

On the other hand such things as faded show trays, ring cases, unfitted eyeglasses and parts, watchmakers' repairs and parts, social cards etc: would be difficult, or impossible, to sell quickly locally to advantage.

It must be remembered too that this is not new stock. Some of it is decidedly shop worn. Some definitely damaged. The stock of artificial flowers is very much off colour.

It should also be remembered that the retailer's mark up on this class of stock is considerable.

In a few instances I found the price tags out of line, being too high.

Consideration has to be given to that part of these goods which has, during the next immediate pre-seasonal shopping weeks, a value it may never again possess.

As indicated above, some of this stock would probably realize the full retail price, or more, at auction; but these articles should certainly have a value of inducement in disposing of the entire list en masse

In other words, to dispose of these goods by public auction would entail the time and expense of two sales - say one in Cumberland and one in Courtenay. This would probably cost an additional 15 to 20%. To retail them over a longer period would cost more.



Stock valued by Shiozaki at \$2,278.55 was sold by the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, at the request and with the consent of Shiozaki, for \$750.00, and this stock is admittedly the most saleable portion of all the stock possessed by him at the date of evacuation so that the price of \$700.00 realized by us on the sale by tender of the balance of his goods appears reasonable except for the item of a stock of watch glasses claimed for by Shiozaki at \$116.66, which definitely came under the control of the Custodian and were lost. The actual value of these watch glasses is a matter of pure guesswork for very obvious reasons.

Store fixtures were valued by the claimant at \$360.00 and were sold by auction for \$217.50, which appears to be quite a reasonable percentage of the amount claimed.

Household goods claimed at \$159.75 were sold by auction for \$82.75, but on reading the report by Matt Brown covering the items not found and abandoned one would not be inclined to value the remainder of the claimant's household possessions at any great figure.
