TOSHIAKI THOMAS EBATA, the claimant herein,  
being first duly sworn,  
testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. BEST:

Q. Mr. Ebata, I understand that you lived at  
Eburne, British Columbia, before the evacuation?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. Is that your signature (Indicating)?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. And, was that form prepared upon your  
instructions? A. Yes, sir.

Q. And, do you swear the contents of it are  
true? A. Yes.

(PARTICULARS OF PERSONAL CHATTELS, MARKED  
EXHIBIT NO.1)

MR. CHRISTIE: I tender as Exhibit 2 the  
Analysis of Personal Property claim.

(ANALYSIS OF PERSONAL PROPERTY CLAIM,  
MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2)

MR. BEST:, Q. Did you live with your father  
or did you live in another house at Eburne?

A. I lived with my father.

Q. By the way, were you a married man at that  
time? A. No, sir.

Q. According to your claim apparently these  
goods of yours were left in the basement of your  
father's house at 415 Bridgeport Road?

A. No. 475.

Q. No. 475? A. Yes.

Q. I am sorry. That is an error. It should  
be 475 Bridgeport Road, Eburne?

A. Yes.

1 Q. Were they stored with your father's goods  
2 or were they in a separate pile?

3 A. I am not sure about where my father stored  
4 all his goods because I left before my felks did.

5 Q. You left before your father?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. When did you leave? A. June; June  
8 first.

9 Q. June first, 1942? A. 1942.

10 Q. And you have claimed \$275. for a 21-quart  
11 cake-mixer. Were you in the baking business?

12 A. Yes, sir.

13 Q. That was your profession or your business?

14 A. Not exactly. I have done various other  
15 work, too.

16 Q. But I take it you bought this to use in  
17 a business you were operating?

18 A. Yes, sir.

19 Q. And this was purchased in 1939, and did you  
20 use it constantly between the time you purchased it  
21 and when you were evacuated?

22 A. Between 1940 and 1941.

23 Q. What make was it, a Reynolds?

24 A. Yes, sir.

25 Q. Where did you buy it?

26 A. I think I bought it from a person called  
27 Peterson, privately.

28 Q. And with respect to this bakery scale,  
29 did you buy that from Peterson, too?

30 A. That was new, bought new.

1 Q. I see. From whom did you purchase it, do  
2 you remember?

3 A. I do not know the firm but it was one of  
4 the Fairbanks Morris.

5 Q. It was a Fairbanks-Morris scale?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. You bought it in Vancouver?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. In respect of this cash register, could you  
10 tell us what make it was?

11 A. National.

12 Q. And you paid \$60. for it in 1939, too?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. I wonder if you could elaborate a little  
15 on this claim for a set of snap-on and blue point  
16 mechanics tools? Just what were they?

17 A. A set of tools for working on cars.

18 Q. Did you do some car repair work?

19 A. Yes, sir.

20 Q. After or before you were in the bakery  
21 business? A. Before.

22 Q. Before. I see. And, with respect to this  
23 black and decker electric drill, I take it it  
24 was part of your automobile repair equipment?

25 A. Yes, sir.

26 Q. Did you buy it in 1939, too?

27 A. Yes, sir.

28 Q. Do you remember how much you paid for it?

29 A. (No audible answer).

1 Q. You valued it at \$50. here, I see.

2 Do you remember what you paid for it?

3 A. That is what I paid for it, \$50.

4 Q. I see. Well, did you list these items on  
5 a J.P. Form similar to the usual one which all evacua-  
6 ted persons filed when you were evacuated?

7 A. In Vancouver, you mean?

8 Q. Yes? A. No, sir, I have not filed any.

9 Q. You have told us you left your home around  
10 June first, 1942. Did you go straight to Vancouver  
11 at that time, when you were evacuated?

12 A. Yes, sir.

13 Q. And, were you in Hastings Park for a while?

14 A. No, sir. I just went there for my physical  
15 examination and left. That was about seven miles  
16 from where I lived.

17 Q. And were you not asked to file one of  
18 those J.P. Forms while you were at Hastings Park?  
19 Do you remember that?

20 A. No. I was not asked. I was handed the  
21 paper. I just signed it.

22 Q. I see. Well then, when did you first  
23 notify the Custodian that you had left these goods  
24 in your father's basement?

25 A. I was sent to Essex, for sugar-beets, direct  
26 from Vancouver and I worked on the farm for seven  
27 or eight months and I got into Hamilton and I worked  
28 at the steel plant and then I went in the garage.

29 Q. According to your claim form here you said

1 you wrote to the Custodian about August 1943  
2 concerning these goods? A. Yes.

3 Q. And apparently the Custodian wrote back  
4 and said that the goods had been misplaced?

5 A. Either misplaced or missing. I am not  
6 very sure. I was in Hamilton when I wrote them.

7 Q. Has your father made a claim before this  
8 Commission? A. No, sir.

9 Q. He has not made any claim at all?

10 A. No, sir, nothing.

11 Q. Do you know whether any of these goods you  
12 are claiming for now were on a J.P. Form signed by  
13 your father? A. No, sir.

14 Q. Or any other member of your family?

15 A. No, sir. I was back in Slocan about the  
16 Winter of 1945, December 1945 and I asked my father  
17 but he said he has not made a claim in respect of  
18 my goods at all.

19 Q. Then, you do not know anything more about  
20 these goods since you got word from the Custodian  
21 that they had been misplaced or were missing?

22 A. No. I do not know anything about it.

23 Q. Your parents were still in the house at  
24 the time you left, so you did not know what precau-  
25 tions were taken?

26 A. They had to board the house up about a  
27 week after I left.

28 Q. You do not know anything about what  
29 precautions were taken to protect anything which was  
30





1 in the house then? A. No, I do not.

2 Q. All right, thank you.

3  
4 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. CHRISTIE:

5 Q. I am producing here a card dated April 11,  
6 1942. Is that your signature?

7 A. Yes, sir.

8 Q. April 11, 1942? A. Yes.

9 Q. Yes? A. Yes.

10 Q. That is your signature?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. Can you read English?

13 A. Yes, sir.

14 Q. Would you read that sentence there?

15 A. "To be completed by persons of the Japanese  
16 race having no property in any protected area."

17 Q. Did you read this thing through when you  
18 signed it? A. Yes, sir.

19 MR. CHRISTIE: I am filing this as Exhibit 3.  
20 I think we will call it "J. Card," dated April 11, 1942.

21 (J. CARD, APRIL 11, 1942, MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3)

22 Q. It is signed "T. Ebata."

23 A. Excuse me. The reason I did not file  
24 my personal belongings was I intended to go in the  
25 group and do garage work and I thought once moved  
26 out here I might be able to have my things whipped  
27 out to wherever I intend to work.

28 Q. You state in your claim that you received  
29 a letter from the Custodian. Have you that letter  
30



1 with you? A. No, sir. I was in Hamilton.

2 Q. I have gone through both the master file  
3 and the claim file and I can find no letter sent to you  
4 at any time. Do you remember the date of the letter  
5 from the Custodian?

6 A. It was some time in the Fall. That is  
7 about all I can remember.

8 Q. The fall of what year?

9 A. In 1943, when I was working in Hamilton.

10 Q. Do you remember what the letter said?

11 Could you give me some of the wording?

12 A. The letter said that it was either misplaced--

13 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Was not all the pro-  
14 perty left in the custody of his father?

15 MR. CHRISTIE: Yes. Sometimes Mr. Brewin has  
16 been arguing that there is a ---

17 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: It would not take me  
18 long to deal with it.

19 MR. BEST: I think the father would have no  
20 right to make the claim for this property.

21 MR. CHRISTIE: Q. Do you remember the contents  
22 of this letter?

23 A. I am not exactly sure of the report but  
24 I thought it said that there is no record of it.

25 Q. It said there was no record of it?

26 A. No record of any tools or my belongings.

27 Q. I suggest the Custodian if he wrote that  
28 letter suggested there was no record and did not use  
29 the words "misplaced." Is that correct?

1 A. I thought I seen it in the letter which I  
2 got from the Custodian; either "misplaced" or  
3 "missing."

4 Q. In any event you did not keep the letter  
5 or you have not got it?

6 A. No.

7 Q. That is all, thank you.

11 Q. You told my friend that the reason you  
12 signed this card was because you thought these tools  
13 might be sent to you?

14 A. Yes. That is right.

15

16 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: He can read the English  
17 language and he read it "To be completed by persons  
18 of the Japanese race having no property in any  
19 protected area."

19 A. I was afraid of the Custodian taking hold  
20 of my property and in that way ---

21 Q. You left the property stored with your  
22 father in your own house?

23 A. Yes. I expected my father would be able  
24 to send them up to me.

25

26 MR. BEST: Q. You have told us that you  
27 left on June first, 1942, and that card was signed  
28 April 11. Were you still at home then? That was  
29 almost two months before?

29 A. Yes, sir.

30 Q. You were still at home? A. Yes, sir.



1 Q. And you did not move until June first?

2 A. No, sir.

3 Q. I see. All right; that is all.
