YUKIO KOYANAGI, the claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. BEST:

Q. Is that your signature? A. Yes, sir.

Q. And was that form prepared upon your instructions? A. Yes, sir.

Q. And do you swear the contents are true?

A. Yes, sir.

MR. BEST: I am submitting as Exhibit 1 the Personal Property Fishing Vessels claim.

(PARTICULARS OF PERSONAL CHATTELS FISHING VESSELS CLAIM, MARKED EXHIBIT NO.1)

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Personal property? It is marked "Real property" on my list.

MR. BEST: No. This is personal property only. It relates to fishing gear.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Mine is marked "real property."

MR. BEST: It is entirely a fishing gear claim. There is no boat involved since the boat was sold by the J.F.V.D.C., rather than the Custodian.

Q. I understand that you carried on a fishing business at Terra Nova, B.C., which is near or at Eburne? A. Yes, sir.

Q. Had you been in the fishing business there for very long? A. Yes, sir.

Q. How long? A. About eight years.

Q. About eight years? A. Yes, sir.

Q. Prior to evacuation? A. Yes, sir.

Q. I understand that you lived there, and you



1 left most of your gear and nets at the Terra Nova
2 Cannery. Is that correct? A. Yes, sir.

3 Q. And I take it that you sold most of your
4 fish to them? A. Yes, sir.

5 Q. You were doing business with them all the
6 time? A. Yes, sir.

7 Q. Knew them very well? A. Yes, sir.

8 Q. And did any other Japanese Canadians leave
9 their gear in this cannery? A. Yes; a couple.

10 Q. A couple of others? A. Yes.

11 Q. And did you prepare a list of the nets and
12 the gear which you left there at the time?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. And to whom did you give that list?

15 A. I do not know the name of the person but the
16 man came over from the B.C. Packers and I told him the
17 price of that net and he said the net was worth so
18 much and he gave me a slip.

19 Q. Did he say he was an official of the Custodian's
20 office? A. No, I did not ask him any
21 questions, he just came over.

22 Q. He asked you all the questions?

23 A. Yes. He asked me the questions. He wanted
24 to see that net, what I got, such as Spring salmon
25 and Sokeye salmon.

26 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Q. Did this man from the
27 B.C. Packers tell you to make out a list?

28 A. Yes. He gave me a slip. There was the
29 "B.C. Packers" on the top of the slip.
30



1 He took down a list of the nets and put the prices
2 alongside.

3 MR. BEST: I do not think it is an important
4 point since I believe the Custodian acknowledges that
5 he did get all the gear and the equipment and it is
6 largely a question of valuation.

7 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: The B.C. Packer man was
8 the representative of the Custodian, I imagine.

9 MR. BEST: Yes; I think so.

10 Q. One or two questions about these nets.
11 You have several gill nets listed here and the total
12 valuation is \$862. Now, most of them apparently were
13 either one or two years old. How long do gillnets
14 usually last? A. They last - it all depends -
15 about three to three and one-half ---

16 Q. That is, if they are used constantly during
17 the fishing season? A. Yes. The fishing season
18 is about two months long. The Sackeye is finished at
19 the end of August. It is finished until next year.
20 They only last about three to three and one-half years.

21 Q. Now about these lines, these leadlines and
22 cork lines? Some of them apparently were two or three
23 years old. How long do they normally last?

24 A. About five or six years, if they are not
25 damages.

26 Q. Where was this rowboat left?

27 A. At the Terra Nova Cannery, too.

28 Q. And did you tell this man who came over to
29 make a list of your nets that you had the rowboat?

30 A. No. He did not say anything about the boat.



1 He just came over about the net.

2 Q. Was he the man who took down the information
3 about the different lines and so on, too?

4 A. Yes. He gave me one slip.

5 Q. But you did not tell or say anything to him
6 about the rowboat? A. No, I did not.

7 Q. Did you tell any other officer of the
8 Custodian's department about the rowboat, that you had
9 a rowboat and that you had left it at the cannery?

10 A. Yes, sir. I think one of the Navy officers
11 who came over to see the boat, I said "This is the row-
12 boat" and "this is the boat."

13 Q. That was when the Navy picked up your big
14 boat? A. Yes.

15
16 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. CHRISTIE:

17 Q. I am producing a J.P. Form, dated January 21,
18 1943. Is that your signature? A. Yes, sir.

19 Q. And you put the fishing nets and lines - your
20 valuation - as \$1,000. there? A. This was when
21 I was evacuated to Ontario and that I considered the
22 price of the nets.

23 (J.P. FORM, JANUARY 21, 1943, MARKED EXHIBIT
NO.2)

24 Q. You signed an earlier J.P. Form, I believe
25 in April; is that correct?

26 A. I think that is right.

27 Q. I just note this for the record. I will
28 not file it. There was an earlier one signed on April 1,
29 signed by Koyanagi, and for some reason it is marked
30



1 "cancelled" and it says in brackets under the statement
2 of "personal property": "Particulars of nets, being
3 sent to custodian direct by the Terra Nova Cannery."

4 What relation is Mitsuo Koyanagi to you?

5 A. I do not know.

6 Q. Are you related to him? A. No.

7 Q. Did you know him? A. Yes. I knew
8 him.

9 Q. Well, did you know that he had a skiff, too?

10 A. Yes, he had.

11 Q. When you left this skiff of yours at the
12 cannery did you put any kind of tag on it?

13 A. Yes. I put my name and number on it.

14 Q. If these nets are not in use do they
15 deteriorate? A. I do not think so.

16 Q. From where did you buy these nets?

17 A. I bought some from B.C. Packers and some
18 from Lipsett.

19 Q. Are they made in British Columbia?

20 A. No. They come from Ireland.

21 Q. I think that is all, thank you.

22 MR. BEST: That is all, thank you.

23

25 MR. CHRISTIE: I am filing as Exhibit 3 the
26 Personal Property Summary.

27 (PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY, MARKED EXHIBIT NO.3)

28 I think perhaps I will file this "net statement"
29 dated October 8, 1947, as Exhibit 4.



1 (NET STATEMENT, OCTOBER 8, 1947, MARKED
2 EXHIBIT NO.4)

3 I make a note of this for the record. It says:

4 " A skiff was found tagged 'U' (Yukio)
5 Koyanagi. This was sold for \$10.00. As Yukio
6 did not declare a skiff with the Custodian,
7 and as Mitsuo Koyanagi, File No. 1221, declared
8 a skiff that was not found, the funds derived
9 from the sale of this skiff were credited to
10 Mitsuo's account."

11 It is submitted, your honour, that the articles
12 of personal property which were sold were sold at their
13 fair market value.

14 In regard to the boat, the rowboat it is submitted
15 that as this was not declared the Custodian cannot be
16 held responsible if the funds went to the wrong person.

17 That concludes the defence, your honour.

18 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Very well.

RE: Yukio KOYANAGI, Reg. No. 05223CHATELS:

The above was interned on April 21, 1942, and released on December 22, 1942, to Pigeon River Timber To., Neys Ont. He made his declaration to the Custodian on January 28th, 1943, and declared fishing nets and lines to the value of \$1000.00 and carpenter's tools valued at \$100.00, left at the Terra Nova Cannery, Sea Island. On June 1st, 1942, we wrote to the Terra Nova Cannery asking them to give us full particulars about the equipment left by the above at the Terra Nova Cannery. On June 5th, 1942, Mr. Gillespie, the Manager of the Imperial Cannery, sent us a list of the nets, numbered 1-7, left by KOYANAGI at the Terra Nova Cannery, but made no mention of any tools left there by him. (it is noted that on July 7, 1942, the Commandant of the Petawawa Internment Camp wrote to us advising that KOYANAGI wished his nets and tools to remain at the Terra Nova Cannery). On Feb. 23/43 our Steveston representative, Mr. C. C. Robinson, inventoried these nets at the Cannery, but did not remove them from the cannery. Nets numbered 2 and 4 were sold to the Imperial Cannery for the sums of \$135.00 and \$175.00 respectively, these being the values set on these nets by KOYANAGI as shown on the list dated June 5/42, from the Imperial Cannery. A piece of No. 3 and a spring net were sold for a total of \$49.00, and these three amounts totalling \$359.00, were credited to the account of KOYANAGI. Two nets were most likely discarded as being of no value and one was not found at the Cannery. A row boat found at the Terra Nova Cannery was first credited to Yukio KOYANAGI, but as he did not declare one, and Mitsuo KOYANAGI, (File 1221), did declare one left at the Terra Nova Cannery, the proceeds from sale of this in the sum of \$10.00, were transferred from the account of the above to the account of Mitsuo KOYANAGI on March 1st, 1946.

SPECIFIED ARTICLES:

A fishing vessel, the "Y.K." was licensed in the name of Masaru KOYANAGI. Information supplied to this office through the Japanese Fishing Vessel Disposal Committee stated that Yukio KOYANAGI was the licensed and actual owner. Sales papers were signed by the Custodian on behalf of Yukio KOYANAGI. However a letter from Yukio KOYANAGI dated June 30/42 states that this boat was not his but belonged to Masaru KOYANAGI. The net proceeds from sale of this boat in the amount of \$641.00, were therefore transferred to the account of Masaru KOYANAGI. Full details given on Specified Articles Summary on file.

Yukio KOYANAGI was the registered owner of a vessel, the Miss Terra Nova, which was sold through the Japanese Fishing Vessel Disposal Committee for the net sum of \$482.60, and this amount was paid to the Custodian and credited to the account of Yukio KOYANAGI.

VICTORY BOND:

In his statement of assets dated May 11th, 1942, he declared ownership of a \$50.00 Victory Bond. On June 10th, 1942, we wrote to the Camp Commandant at Petawawa Camp #33, and asked him to forward this Bond to our office for safe keeping. It was received in this office.

on June 20/42. On August 27/42 KOYANAGI requested us to sell this Bond. It was sold on September 19/42 for the total sum of \$51.89 and this amount was credited to his account.

BANK:
ACCOUNT:

On June 16th, 1942, the Japan and Canada Trust Co. forwarded us the information that the above Internee ^{had} and a sum of \$94.96 deposited with them. This was transferred to this office and credited to his account.

LIFE
INSURANCE:

The above declared a \$1000.00 life insurance policy with the sun Life Insurance Co. This was a 25 year endowment policy taken out in 1914, the beneficiary being his mother, Koto KOYANAGI. The following premiums were paid on this policy at the request of Yukio KOYANAGI:

NOTE: A skiff was found tagged 'U'. (Yukio) KOYANAGI. This was sold for \$10.00. As Yukio did not declare a skiff with the Custodian, and as Mitsuo KOYANAGI, File No. 1221, declared a skiff that was not found, the funds derived from the sale of this skiff were credited to Mitsuo's account. However, on examination of the Cannery records it may be seen that Yukio did declare a skiff left at Terra Nova Cannery with his nets. As the funds derived from the sale of this row boat have already been sent to Mitsuo KOYANAGI, no adjustment can be made.

Terra Nova Cannery record book (held at this office) lists all nets which KOYANAGI declared to be left in their care. On June 5, 1942, the Cannery supplied this office with a list of the nets which they held as of that date. A memo to the file dated March 8, 1946, signed by E. Bridson of this office lists the fishing equipment reportedly sold direct to B. C. Packers by the Japanese Fishermen. The Custodian had no information that Japanese fishermen were selling direct. It was assumed that the nets not listed on the inventory of June 5, 1942 were disposed of by KOYANAGI. However, his letter dated May 6, 1946, states "Concerning your letter "(of April 17th, 1946)" I notice that the B. C. Packers has told you that some of my fishing nets are sold to them & being paid to me. To this news I am very disappointed as I have not sold any to that company & not a cent have I received. I had far more than \$359.00 worth of fishing goods."
