MEMORANDUM

December 5th, 1949.

TO: Mr. F. G. Shears  
FROM: Mr. J. Cuming

*OK'd Recommended - HRS*

Re: Case 1196 - Jiro ICHIKAWA

The grocery and fruit store was purchased under the Conditional Sales Act by the Claimant from his brother, Haruo ICHIKAWA, on 2nd July, 1941, the contract being \$500.00 down and 22 monthly payments of \$50.00 without interest.

As the Claimant was taken into custody for internment by the R.C.M.P. on 2nd March, 1942, (see R.C.M.P. report 4/3/42), he owned and operated the business for 8 months.

Agency

Claimant attempted to state YAMAMOTO was not placed in charge of the store by himself. However, P.4 L.2, P.4 L.8-9, P.11 to P.12 L.5 and his letter to Custodian of 21/4/42 together with P.8 L.6-30 notes:

- (a) YAMAMOTO worked for the Claimant's brother in the same type of store and knew the business.
- (b) Was Claimant's friend.
- (c) Claimant called him on the phone when the R.C.M.P. arrived and he asked YAMAMOTO to take over the store.

Re - sale

Two tenders received: McDonald of Oakland Market \$600.00 and Colthorne \$275.00.

McDonald, on seeing the stock had been reduced, refused to pay \$600.00 and P.S. Ross & Sons finally sold to him at \$450.00, provided the sum of \$78.61 in the cash drawer became the Claimant's property. This gave the Claimant \$528.61.

'Phone conversation 2nd December, 1949, (Cuming to McDonald) resulted in McDonald stating that he wanted only the refrigerator from the store as he found it impossible to procure one for his own business.

Prior to finalization of McDonald's purchase he sold the store to a Chinese by the name of Lee for \$25.00 more than he paid for it - less the refrigerator.

McDonald stated that the refrigerator was the only decent piece of equipment in Claimant's store and that he considered it to be worth \$150.00 to him at that time.

Therefore it would appear that McDonald gained \$175.00 by the purchase.

McDonald expressed himself as being willing to appear for examination.

JIRO ICHIKAWA, the claimant herein, having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. BREWIN:

Q. You are the owner of a grocery business at 916 Robson Street in Vancouver? A. Yes.

Q. I presume you leased the premises -- you didn't own the building? A. No.

Q. You were actually the owner of the building?  
A. No, just the business.

Q. Did you have a written lease or something by which you had the right to occupy the premises?

A. I brought the conditional sales paper.

Q. Have you got it there? A. Yes.

Q. This is a Condition Bill of Sale from Haruo Ichikawa; was he your father?

A. My brother.

Q. And this is a condition bill of sale for the sum of \$1600. and it is dated 2nd of July, 1941; that was the time you bought the property from your brother? A. Yes.

Q. This is a Condition Sale Agreement covering stockin trade and equipment on the premises at 916 Robson Street? A. Yes.

Q. The total amount you paid for it was \$1600?  
A. Yes.

(CONDITIONAL SALES AGREEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT 1)

Q. How long had your brother carried on business there, do you know? A. About three years.

Q. Before you? A. Yes.

Q. So he started in 1938; is that right?

Q. Do you know whether it had been carried on  
as a green grocer store before that? A. Yes.

Q. He bought it as a going business?

A. That is a long time ago.

Q. Is it a good location for a grocery business?

A. Yes.

Q. Where is Robson Street, is it a main  
thoroughfare? A. Yes.

Q. The year 1941 is about the only year you  
had it? A. Yes.

Q. You had a gross turn over of \$18,000?

A. Yes.

Q. A net income of \$1200. is that right?

A. Yes.

Q. Is that your signature? A. Yes.

Q. Are the facts stated there correct?

A. Yes.

Q. Did you keep careful books? A. Oh yes.

Q. Or is the net income just a rough guess?

A. No.

Q. Your income from the grocery store, your  
net income you said was \$1200; is that right?

A. Yes, that is correct.

Q. You had in connection with the store a cash  
register, a frigidair and two scales, is that right?

A. Yes.

Q. When you were evacuated did you make any

arrangements about who should carry on the work of  
the store?           A. No.

Q. What did you do; did you notify the Custodian  
that you had the store?

A. Just on March 2nd , 1942.

Q. Let us get this straight now -- on March 2nd  
you did what?       A. I left the store.

Q. Did you leave anybody in charge of the store?

A. No.

Q. What about Mr. Yamamoto, was he living there  
with your approval?       A. That is the time the  
Mounties called me; I just had half an hour and I had  
to go.

Q. I don't follow you.       A. I was arrested by  
the R.C.M.P., I just had half an hour to go.

Q. The thing I don't understand is, was it  
with your agreement or not that Mr. Yamamoto was in  
charge of the store after you left? I was wondering  
if that was by arrangement with you, or with your  
consent?           A. No, I left it with the Custodian.

Q. And if the Custodian arranged with  
Mr. Yamamoto that wasn't your arrangement?

A. No.

Q. I would like to get that clear. You were  
arrested and removed quickly and you had no arrangements  
as to what was to happen to the store?

A. No.

Q. Although you did report to the Custodian that  
you had a store there?       A. Yes.

Q. There is one thing I notice; on April 1st,

1942, when you reported your assets to the Custodian you placed a value of \$1600. on the business, whereas at the present time you are placing a somewhat higher value on it? A. I put in more stock.

Q. You paid only \$500. for the stock at that time, and you put more into it? A. Yes.

Q. There was some stock on the date you left?

A. Yes, I have the stock taking sheet.

Q. When did you have this taken -- it says March 2nd, 1942. A. Yes.

Q. And did you send a copy of this to the Custodian? A. No.

Q. You sent it to the lawyers? A. Yes.

Q. What lawyers, your own lawyers? A. No.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Is this the stock in trade at the time you purchased it from your brother?

A. No, no, at the time I was arrested.

MR. BREWIN: This says March 2nd, 1942. Who took this and put these valuations on it; who did this for you? A. I did it.

Q. And then your brother completed it, is that right? A. Yes.

Q. This is your work, is it? A. Yes.

Q. And your brother's? A. Yes.

Q. This shows the stock taken at cost, \$470., and it shows the stock taken at selling price, less a 20 percent deduction, making a total for the stock of \$1387.58, and the equipment you show as \$285., making a total of \$1672.58; and that you show to be the total valuation on March 2nd, 1942, is that right?

Q. Now, you have a long list of stock on hand adding up at selling price to \$1146.98, from which you have deducted 20 percent, is that right?

A. Yes.

Q. And all this stock was on hand at this date, is that right? A. Yes.

(STOCK TAKING INVENTORY MARKED EXHIBIT 3)

Q. Did you ever send a copy of that inventory to the Custodian or any of his officers?

A. No .

Q. Why didn't you do that if the Custodian was to operate the business and look after it -- why didn't you send him a copy? A. Oh, I was only 15 days out there and I was moved to a camp.

Q. What sort of customers did you have, all sorts who lived around there? A. Yes.

Q. Then perhaps we had better come to the personal property claim. It is for \$225. and is set out in regard to certain chattels in your original claim form? A. Yes.

Q. I am showing you a document which is marked "Personal Chattels"; is that information correct? A. Yes.

Q. And is that your signature? A. Yes.

Q. Now, where did you leave these items of personal property when you left Vancouver?

A. At the back of the store.

Q. Whereabouts at the back of the store?

Q. Were they boarded in or hidden or anything of that sort? A. No, just left.

Q. Did you leave anybody in charge of them? Did you ask anybody to look after them in your business? A. No.

Q. You just left them? A. Yes.

Q. I understand from what you said before that you were arrested some time in March of 1942. Did you have to leave very hurriedly or did you have a chance to go back and look after your things?

A. No chance to go back.

Q. Now, the Custodian's office informs us that the tenant supplied all the information to the Custodian about these matters, at least that is what I think he says. Did you never have presented to you a form for you to declare the property which you left behind. In most of these cases we have had a form in which those who were evacuated left a declaration.

A. Oh my circumstances were different. I only had about 15 minutes -- I couldn't count the money or anything.

Q. When you left were you asked to sign any form or make any declaration either when you left or afterwards as to what property you had left behind?

A. No.

Q. Did you in fact write to the Custodian at any time and tell him what property you had left behind? A. I claimed in 1942, I sent it to the Custodian.

Q. I don't follow you.

A. In 1942, in March, I sent a particularized list to the Custodian from Kananaskis.

Q. You haven't a copy of that list, have you?

A. No, I haven't.

Q. There is one thing I haven't got clear. I thought when I was questioning you before you said you didn't leave the store in charge of Mr. Yamamoto.

The Custodian apparently thinks you did , and I notice on Exhibit 4, which you had prepared upon your instructions you say upon evacuation these goods were left in the back of the store and the store was left in the care of Mr. Yamamoto. Perhaps I misunderstood the situation. Did you say you didn't arrange for Mr. Yamamoto to be there?

A. No.

Q. Who did arrange it? A. The Mounties asked me who would look after the store and I had only half an hour and I called him up.

Q. What arrangement did you make when you called him -- by the way, was he related to you in any way?

A. No.

Q. He wasn't your brother-in-law or something of that sort? A. No.

Q. Was he a personal friend? A. Yes, he was my friend.

Q. And what was his occupation? A. The same, a grocery business.

Q. Did he have a grocery business somewhere else?

A. Yes, he worked in one of my brother's stores.

Q. You did call him in this half hour? A. Yes.

1 Q. What did you tell him? A. Just to look  
2 after it until I got back, and I asked him to ask the  
3 Custodian to take charge of it.

4 Q. You asked the Custodian to take charge  
5 of it? A. Yes.

6 Q. Was there anything more definite with  
7 Mr. Yamamoto whether he was to be paid anything for  
8 looking after it? A. Oh, the Custodian pays  
9 fair pay for wages.

10 Q. Perhaps you don't understand me. When you  
11 telephoned to Mr. Yamamoto and asked him to look after  
12 it, did you make any arrangement with him as to how  
13 he was to be paid for his time or anything of that  
14 sort? A. No, nothing. I just had half an  
15 hour and I rang up Mr. Yamamoto and asked him to look  
16 after my store.

17 Q. But you also told the Custodian about it,  
18 about your store, and asked them to take charge of  
19 it, is that right? A. The Mounted Police  
20 interned me temporarily in the Immigration Building,  
21 and the Custodian's man came down to the Immigration  
22 Building and at that time I told the Custodian about  
23 my business.

24 Q. Did you ask, or did the Custodian say  
25 anything about their taking the responsibility for it?

26 A. No, they were just asking a few questions.

27 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. CHRISTIE:

28 A. I am showing you a document here dated  
29 April 1st, 1942; is that statement signed by you?

30 A. Yes.

2 Q. And that was as a result of a letter sent to  
3 the interment camp? A. Yes.

4 Q. I file this statement of assets and liabilities,  
5 dated April 1st, 1942, as Exhibit 5.

6 (STATEMENT OF ASSETS AND LIABILITIES MARKED  
7 EXHIBIT NO. 5)

8 Q. I am reading a copy of a letter which was  
9 sent to the Officer in charge of the interment camp  
10 dated March 25th, 1943;

11 "Dear Sir:

12 When declaring his assets and liabilities the above  
13 named internee listed - Personal Chattels,  
14 estimated at \$500.

15 Would you kindly parade this man and obtain from  
16 him an itemized list of these chattels and  
17 advice from him as to their present location.  
18 Your kind attention to this request will be very  
19 much appreciated."

20 Were you ever asked about these in the  
21 interment camp? A. Yes, I told him that but  
22 I didn't see this letter.

23 Q. I am filing a copy of the letter dated  
24 March 25th, 1943, signed by K.W. Wright, Counsel to  
25 the Custodian.

26 (LETTER ABOVE REFERRED TO MARKED EXHIBIT 6)

27 Q. In reply there is a letter from C.G. Bradshaw,  
28 Lieutenant-Colonel, Camp Commandant, dated April 1,  
29 1943, which states:

30 "I have shown the contents of this letter to  
the above internee, and he states that the  
Chattels are his personal effects and were

"stored in the back of his store, 916 Robson Street, Vancouver, B.C."

Q. Now, I am reading a copy of a letter dated April 17th, 1942, addressed to the Camp Commandant, Internment Camp #33, Petawawa, Ontario. It is from Edgar T. Read, for G. W. McPherson, Authorized Deputy of the Secretary of State and/or Custodian. It states:

"Dear Sir:

I have received your statement of assets and liabilities, dated April 10.

In this connection I have received a report from our agents, to the effect that the volume of sales has dropped so much that the person in charge, H. Yamamoto, is of the opinion that the business cannot be carried on at a profit. They recommend, therefore, that the business be advertised for sale as a going concern. In this I agree, and therefore I will be glad if you would please consider the matter carefully, and let me have your views by return Air Mail."

Now, is this your signature to the letter in reply?      A. Oh yes, it is my signature.

Q. And is the body of the letter in your writing?      A. No.

Q. Just your signature?      A. Yes.

Q. Did you understand that when you signed it?

A. Yes.

Q. It states:      "I am in receipt of your letter

2 "dated April 17th, which was addressed to  
3 Camp Commandant.

4 After fully considered, I have to advise you  
5 that I am willing to sell my grocery store  
6 which was operated by H. Yamamoto on behalf  
7 of me.

8 Please be kind enough to let me know the price  
9 as soon as you sold my property."

10 (TWO LETTERS ABOVE NOTED, MARKED EXHIBIT 7)

11 Q. Now, I am reading a telegram dated  
12 April 27th, 1942, to the Camp Commandant, from  
13 Edgar T. Read:

14 "Reference my letter April 17 Jiro Ichikawa stop.  
15 Business depreciating rapidly making a decision  
16 imperative kindly wire today internees approval to  
17 sell business."

18 Then there is a telegram to Edgar T. Read,  
19 dated April 27th:

20 "Retel asking reply letter April seventeenth  
21 regarding Jiro Ichikawa stop This replied to April  
22 twenty-second effect he is willing to sell."

23 Did you know about that telegram?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. That was sent on your instructions?

26 A. Yes.

27 Q. I think those can go in with Exhibit 7.

28 They seem to relate to the same matters.

29 ---See Exhibit no.7.

30 THE INTERPRETER: He would like to add that there  
was nothing else that he could do except to sell.

2 MR. CHRISTIE: Did you make any arrangements about  
3 wages being paid to Mr. Yamamoto?

4 A. No.

5 Q. Now, I understand that Mr. Yamamoto operated  
6 this store until the end of May, 1942. Do you know  
7 anything about that?

8 A. I had a letter from my friend.

9 Q. And he told you that Yamamoto was running  
10 the store? A. Yes.

11 Q. And ran it until the end of May?

12 A. I don't know definitely.

13 Q. Here is a further telegram dated May 24th,  
14 1942, addressed to the Custodian:

15 "Under present circumstances I am insisting to  
16 discontinue my business 916 Robson Street  
17 effective May 31."

18 You sent that? A. Yes.

19 Q. I think perhaps we can put that in as part  
20 of Exhibit 7 too.

21 Q. When did you buy this bicycle?

22 A. I bought that in 1938.

23 Q. Was it new or used when you bought it?

24 A. It was a new C.C.M.

25 Q. How much did you pay for it? A. \$35.

26 Q. And were these books English or Japanese?

27 A. They were both.

28 Q. Were they fiction books? A. A dictionary  
29 and fiction books.

30 Q. How old were these beds when you bought them?

2 A. Very old, but the springs were nice and they  
3 were new mattresses.

4 Q. Now, did you ever when you were in the camp  
5 ever send any itemized list, or you just merely told  
6 the Camp Commandant that your chattels were stored in  
7 your store -- did you ever at any time send a list of  
8 chattels in detail? A. No.

9 Q. That is all, thank you.

10 I think we can file this as one exhibit,  
11 sundry letters of P. S. Ross & Sons. I don't think  
12 there is any need for me to read these in detail. They  
13 were put in charge of the selling of the business and  
14 these letters show their dealings and the sale price  
15 arrived at and the purchases and so on. I think  
16 perhaps we can put these in as one exhibit.

17 (SUNDRY LETTERS OF P.S. ROSS & SONS, MARKED  
18 EXHIBIT No. 8)

19 There is just one thing, in the letter of the 27th  
20 of August, 1948, from P.S. Ross & Sons to the  
21 Custodian, there is one paragraph:

22 "May we point out that this store was left in  
23 the hands of one Yamamoto by Ichikawa, who oper-  
24 ated the store. We were not satisfied with  
25 Mr. Yamamoto's operation and it was for this  
26 reason that we verbally recommended to you that  
27 the subsequent offer of Mr. McDonald be accepted."  
28 We have no knowledge of any personal effects of  
29 Mr. Ichikawa."

30 MR. BREWIN: In the letter of April 15th, 1942,  
there is a valuation put on the stock and fixtures  
without any details, at \$825., and there was a certain

1 amount on hand in a bank balance and the rent had been  
2 paid to the end of March 1942. There were no  
3 liabilities other than a small trade account of \$5.38.  
4 I was wondering if my friend had the actual advertise-  
5 ment in this case. P.S. Ross & Sons advise it was  
6 sold as a going concern.

7 MR. CHRISTIE: I haven't that.

8 MR. BREWIN: I wonder if my friend has anything  
9 on the file that indicates whether Mr. McDonald  
10 proposed to carry on any business at this address or  
11 not. There is a statement that Mr. McDonald has  
12 resold the property to a Chinese named Lee, and in so  
13 doing relieved us of the necessity of paying rent for  
14 the premises for the month of June. Apparently he made  
15 a sale, according to the letter of 3rd of June, 1942,  
16 to a Chinese named Lee, and it appears Lee was going to  
17 pay rent. The reason I am going into this is that  
18 there may be a considerable difference in a fair market







PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARYRe: ICHIKAWA, Jiro - Reg. No. 00747.

The above was taken into custody on March 2 and was interned on March 12th, 1942. His P. W. A. Number was 401. The date of release is not given on the file.

CHATELS: He declared to the R. C. M. P. a grocery store with stock and fixtures at 916 Robson Street. The Japanese in his letter of April 1, 1942 stated that the stock and Business were valued at \$1,600.00 and the personal effects at \$500.00. P. S. Ross & Sons who investigated the affairs of Ichikawa reported on April 15, 1942 that the stock and fixtures would be valued at \$825.00. The Building was rented on a monthly basis from McGregor, Creery and Farmer Ltd. and the rent was paid to the end of March. A Japanese named YAMAMOTO was in charge but held no power of attorney. P. S. Ross & Sons advised that the interests of the Japanese would be to have the business sold as soon as possible. To this, the internee agreed on April 21, 1942. "See ltr. Aug. 27/48"

The sum of \$178.61 in currency was forwarded to us by P. S. Ross on June 2, 1942 and credited to this account. The file does not reveal that this came from the sale of the store but it would appear to be so, as the following day, P. S. Ross forwarded us a cheque for the sum of \$350.00 being the balance of the sale price of the Rose Fruit Market. The purchaser was Mr. McDonald of the Oakland Market. From these proceeds the sum of \$20.00 was paid to YAMAMOTO for wages, on June 5, 1942. Advertising the business for sale, \$15.91 was also charged to this account.

BANK

ACCOUNTS: ICHIKAWA declared to the R. C. M. P. that he had accounts with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Robson & Granville branch in the amount of \$90.00 and with the Bank of Toronto, Burrard & Robson, but did not know the balance. The Canadian Bank of Commerce advised that the balance was \$92.48. In September 1942, the balance then \$93.51 was remitted to this office. The Bank of Toronto advised the balance with them was \$195.87 current account and \$38.60 Savings Account. The total balance, \$235.46 was received on September 11, 1942.

LIFE

INSURANCE He declared to the R.C.M.P. that he believed that he had a policy with the Monarch Life Assurance Co. The Custodian's Office received a premium notice but the Japanese did not wish to pay. The policy has no doubt now lapsed.

REMITTANCES: 11 remittances of \$25.00 each were made to the Japanese while he was interned. These totalled \$275.00.


