2 MR. OPPER: This is a case where a wife is
3 claiming on behalf of a deceased husband, and Mrs. Hay-
4 ashida apparently is not allowed to travel and her son
5 turns up this morning on her behalf. I don't know
6 whether your honour would consider hearing his evidence
7 or not.

8 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Anybody that knows
9 anything about the claim can give evidence.

10 MR. OPPER: I would say, your honour, this young
11 gentleman probably understands more about it than the
12 wife of the deceased man.

13 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: All right, go ahead.

14 MR. CHRISTIE: Your honour, if it is a case
15 of illness or something like that, I have no objection
16 to that happening, but I must take the same position
17 that Judge McGibbon took last week, that if the
18 claimant is to be heard, the claimant must be prepared
19 to present herself for cross-examination. That has
20 been ruled on before, and I believe that is the ruling
21 of Mr. Justice Bird. My friend has indicated she is
22 unable to come -- if it is due to sickness I am quite
23 agreeable to cooperate in anyway, otherwise I take the
24 position that has been taken previously.

25 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: How do you want it
26 established that this woman cannot travel?

27 MR. CHRISTIE: I believe some cases in Lethbridge
28 and in other places had doctor's certificates. I am
29 not insisting on that this morning, but if my friend
30 assures me that is the case, I am prepared to accept
that in this instance.

1 MR. OPPER: I am told she gets sick every time
2 she travels. There has been a lot of talk about a
3 ruling in this matter, and I would like to see that.

4 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: As far as the ruling
5 is concerned, I don't want to differ, of course, but
6 for the life of me I cannot see any justification for
7 any such ruling. I cannot see why this is not the
8 same as any case in Court where the plaintiff can prove
9 his case by what evidence he has. If he leaves out
10 evidence one would expect him to bring, it weakens his
11 case, but why should he be dictated to as to who proves
12 his case?

13 MR. CHRISTIE: That is covered in the Terms of
14 Reference; that was argued in Vancouver and that
15 decision was made.

16 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: I do not understand it
17 unless there is something in the Terms of Reference.

18 MR. CHRISTIE: You see, your honour, what
19 happened in these cases is this -- originally
20 Mr. Smith sent out notices to all claimants. Counsel
21 for the claimants came along and said that was not
22 satisfactory because they might want to bring out of
23 town people here, and as a special concession to counsel
24 for the claimants we permitted them to notify these
25 people. Now we are put in the position we do do not
26 know how many people have real reasons for not coming
27 or not. Unless there is a good reason, such as on
28 account of illness, and that is substantiated, I must
29 take objection to this procedure.

30 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Call your witness. You
say the claimant is dead and his wife is unable to

1 travel?

2 MR. OPPER: That is what I am told, your
3 honour. Apparently the chattels belonged to the
4 deceased man and his wife is making the claim. My
5 point is that the witness is just as conversant with
6 these details as she is.

7 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: You understand, of
8 course, the decision was made by the Commissioner, and
9 if the Commissioner is not satisfied with the evidence,
10 in view of the claimant not being here, that is a
11 risk you are running.

12 MR. OPPER: I understand that, your honour.
13 I was wondering if the Secretary has a copy of that
14 decision. There has been a great deal of talk about it.

15 MR. CHRISTIE: I am a little surprised at my
16 friend making observations like that.

17 MR. OPPER: There is no reflection whatsoever
18 on anybody; it is merely for my own information.

19 MR. CHRISTIE: If my friend is taking that
20 attitude I would take strong objection, and I would
21 refuse to hear this claim unless the claimant is here
22 in person.

23 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: I am admitting the
24 evidence; go ahead.

25 MR. OPPER: I would like to file as Exhibit 1
26 a letter from Mrs. Hayashida, authorizing her son to
27 appear.

3 HIDEKAZU HAYASHIDA, the son of the claimant
4 herein, being first duly
5 sworn, testified as follows:

6 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. OPPER:

7 Q. Your mother is Mrs. Suemo Hayashida?

8 A. Yes, sir.

9 Q. And your father is deceased, is that correct?

10 A. Yes, sir.

11 Q. We haven't got the form signed, due to the
12 fact that the mother didn't turn up this morning, but
13 in view of the fact that there is a written authorization
14 from the mother here, I presume he can sign on her
15 behalf.

16 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: You mean the mother
17 has never signed the claim sheet?

18 MR. OPPER: The ordinary practice we have
19 been following is that the claimant signed the
20 morning they came in.

21 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: You understand the
22 position. You have authority here from the deceased's
23 widow to this boy to make the claim, and I presume
24 that involves signing the claim, but his signing the
25 claim in no sense makes that evidence. You will have
26 to take your risks when you get out before the
27 Commissioner on the strength of your evidence. I have
28 nothing to do with that.

29 MR. OPPER: I think we will take that risk and
30 have him sign on behalf of his mother.

MR. CHRISTIE: If the claimant is not here the
Commissioner is at a loss to make decisions if I cannot

3 cross-examine the claimant.

4 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: You can cross-examine
5 this fellow, and he has authority to appear for his
6 mother and anything he says is binding on his mother.

7 MR. OPPER: You have told us you are here
8 representing your mother, and you identify this
9 authority -- this is your mother's signature?

10 A. Yes, sir.

11 Q. You are Hidekazu Hayashida? A. Yes.

12 Q. You have just signed another form entitled
13 "Personal Chattels", and you are signing on behalf
14 of your mother, and that is your signature?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. Do you have a full knowledge of the
17 matters contained in this form?

18 A. Mostly I know.

19 Q. Have you considered a copy of this form at
20 home? A. Most of the things I have been taking
21 up with her.

22 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: What did he say?

23 MR. OPPER: He has taken up the case with her.

24 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: I don't think that is
25 sound. If he gets evidence from his mother he is
26 passing that on with no opportunity for cross-exam-
27 ination.

28 MR. OPPER: Do you know of your own knowledge
29 about these matters; the truck, the stove, automobile
30 tools, and a large ice box? Do you know of your
own knowledge about these articles?

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A. Yes, sir, I was down there.

Q. Did you know of these articles when you were out on the west coast -- would you have recognized these articles if you had seen them again?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. You know about the truck? A. Yes.

Q. And you know about the scale?

A. Yes, sir, that was a 30 lb. scale.

Q. Then you know of your own knowledge about the scale? A. Yes, sir.

Q. And what about the other items there; do you know about them of your own knowledge?

A. Yes, sir.

MR. CHRISTIE: I tender as Exhibit 3 the Analysis of Personal Property Claim.

(ANALYSIS OF PERSONAL PROPERTY CLAIM MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3)

MR. OPPER: Now, talking about the scale, where was that scale left, do you know?

A. At A. R. McPhee's, R.R. No. 4, New Westminster.

Q. Were any other articles left there?

A. At that time, yes, sir, there was the ice box and wheel, and roll of tin.

Q. What is this document here?

A. This was written by him and signed by him. He got a list of things and that is a receipt.

Q. You are in a position to identify that is what it is? A. Yes.

(RECEIPT ABOVE REFERRED TO MARKED EXHIBIT No. 4)

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2 Q. Now, do you know anything about the
3 International Truck; do you know what model it was?

4 A. It was a 1939 model, sir.

5 Q. I notice it is stated here it is a 1938?

6 A. It was bought on December 23rd, 1938.

7 Q. When was it bought, in 1938 or 1939?

8 A. It is a 1939 model, it was bought in 1938.

9 Q. A 1939 model International truck? A. Yes.

10 Q. Do you know what weight the truck was?

11 A. It was a half ton, but after the body was
12 put on it was one ton.

13 MR. CHRISTIE: I tender as Exhibit 5 the
14 R.C.M.P. Report.

15 (R.C.M.P. REPORT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 5)

16 MR. OPPER: How was that truck running, do
17 you know? A. It was in good condition, sir.

18 Q. Was it need of repairing in any way?

19 A. No, sir.

20 Q. And do you know what your father paid for
21 that truck; was it over \$1,000.

22 A. He paid \$750 when it was new; that is just
23 for the engine and chassis like.

24 Q. And did he pay for the body of the truck?

25 A. Yes, plus carpenter's fees.

26 Q. Would the figure of \$1050. be about right?

27 A. Yes, sir.

28 Q. Do you know whether or not your father ever
29 told the Custodian he was leaving certain articles
30 in the care of Mr. McPhee? A. He filled it in,
but I don't know if he put it in.

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Q. When did he tell the Custodian about these articles? A. When the filing occurred at Slocan, when he reported all these in.

Q. What date would that be, do you remember?

A. It would be about 1946.

MR. CHRISTIE: I tender as Exhibit 6 the McDermott Motors appraisal.

(APPRAISAL ABOVE REFERRED TO MARKED EXHIBIT 6)

MR. OPPER: This appraisal in Exhibit 6 indicates that the truck had a selling price of \$255.

Speaking about the truck; would it have needed a paint job? A. No, sir.

Q. Did it need body and fender work?

A. Well, it needed a little bit, that is about all, sir.

Q. You were quite familiar with this truck?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. And were the fenders dented in at all?

A. It was a little.

Q. A little bit? A. Yes, sir.

Q. What about the radiator, what shape was it in? A. It was in good condition, sir.

Q. and the upholstery? A. That was in good condition too.

Q. And how was the motor running?

A. It was running real good, sir.

Q. Do you remember whether there had been a tune up of the motor recently? A. No, sir.

Q. You don't remember that? A. No.

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Q. How did it steer; did you ever drive it?


A. Yes, sir, once in a while.

CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. CHRISTIE:

Q. I am producing here a J.P. Form, dated
March 30, 1942. Do you know whose signature that is?

A. That is my father's signature.

MR. CHRISTIE: I file the J.P. Form as Exhibit 7.
(J.P. FORM, MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 7)

Q. How old were you at the time of evacuation?

A. Fifteen, sir.

Q. How old? A. Fifteen.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Q. What did your father
do before evacuation?

A. He used to go around selling fish.

Q. Selling fish? A. Yes, sir.



1 Q. Fish which he had caught, himself?

2 A. No.

3 Q. He was not a fisherman? A. No.

4 Q. Did you live at home?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. Did you ever do any work in your father's
7 business? A. Yes, sir.

8 Q. Did you ever help him?

9 A. Yes, sir.

10 Q. Were there any other children?

11 A. Two brothers and ---

12 Q. Were the brothers younger or older than you?

13 A. One is younger than I am.

14 Q. Was the older living at home at the time
15 of evacuation? A. Yes, sir.

16 Q. Where is he now? A. He is in
17 Toronto.

18 Q. Why did they pick you or do you know why
19 you are here instead of your brother?

20 A. He does not know much about this case.

21 Q. If he was older than you and living home
22 at the time why would he not know more about it than
23 you? A. He seemed to be the black sheep of the

24 family.

25 MR. CHRISTIE: Q. Do you know whose signature
26 that is?

27 A. That is my mother's sir.

28 MR. CHRISTIE: I file as Exhibit 8 the J.P.

29 Card signed by the mother dated May 6, 1942, which says:

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"To be completed by persons of the Japanese race having no property in the protected area."
(J.P. CARD, MAY 6, 1942, MARKED EXHIBIT NO.8)

Q. Were you present when your father signed this J.P. Form?

A. No, sir. My mother was with him.

Q. Where were these goods listed in the J.P. Form at the time of his signature?

A. Well, is that at Vancouver, sir?

Q. Pardon? A. Is that at Vancouver, sir?

Q. No. Your address is New Westminster. It does not indicate where it is signed. Did you help your father to make up this list of goods in the J.P. Form? A. No, sir.

Q. Where were these goods left?

A. 1025 Quebec Street.

Q. Whose home is that? A. Teramura's.

Q. So, it was left in his home by your father prior to the evacuation?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. Now, in his J.P. Form your father said he had two scales and you claim for one scale. Have you any explanation of why that is?

A. Well, it was supposed to be one scale, sir.

Q. Your father is wrong in claiming for two scales. Is that what you are telling the Commission?

A. That is at Vancouver, sir.

Q. Also, there were two ice-boxes in your



1 father's J.P. Form, and you are claiming for one. Have
2 you any explanation for that?

3 A. There was one large ice-box at our place at
4 1033 and the other was left in the care of A.R. McPhee,
5 sir.

6 Q. For which one are you claiming? You are only
7 claiming for one. For which one are you claiming?

8 A. It is on the large ice-box, sir.

9 Q. Where was that left? A. 1033, sir.

10 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: They are claiming for
11 two iceboxes. The second item and the last item, is
12 that for which they are claiming.

13 MR. CHRISTIE: Yes, your honour; that is right,
14 sir.

15 Q. Where was this large ice-box purchased?

16 A. We made it, sir.

17 Q. It was home-made? A. Yes, sir.

18 Q. Did you see it made? A. No, sir.

19 Q. Perhaps I missed it, but I do not seem to
20 see a wheel in the J.P. Form. Do you know why this
21 wheel was not listed in your father's J.P. Form?

22 A. No, sir.

23 Q. What kind of wheel was it?

24 A. It must be connected with an automobile,
25 sir.

26 Q. Do you know of your own knowledge?

27 A. I do not think my mother knows that either,
28 sir.

29 Q. You do not think your mother knows?

30 A. No, sir; she does now know.



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Q. Did you discuss that with your mother before you came here?

A. No. She does not know about it, sir.

Q. Did you discuss it with your mother before you came here, about the wheel? A. Yes, sir.

Q. And did she tell you that she did not know about it? A. Yes, sir.

Q. Where was this wheel left? A. At A.R. McPhee's, sir.

Q. Was A.R. McPhee appointed to look after this wheel prior to the evacuation, after certain goods?

A. He was looking after it for us.

Q. Pardon? A. He was to look after other goods for us after we left, sir.

Q. Here is a roll of tin. I do not seem to see that on the J.P. Form. Do you know why that was not listed? A. No, sir.

Q. Did you discuss that with your mother?

A. No, sir.

Q. Do you know whether your mother helped your father to make up this J.P. Form? A. I think she went down to Vancouver with him.

Q. And the two of them made it up together?

A. Yes, sir. I think so, sir.

Q. So, if she were here she could probably tell us about it. Do you know how old these beds were? There are four beds here which you estimate at \$60. Do you know how old they were?

A. Well, there was one Spring which was brand

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Q. What about the beds, themselves?

How old were they? A. They must be about five or six years, sir.

Q. Do you know where they were bought?

A. No, sir.

Q. Do you know how much was paid for them?

A. No, sir.

Q. Would your mother know that? A. I do not think she would.

Q. You do not think she would have any knowledge of that? A. No, sir.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Q. You say the beds were five or six years old? A. Yes, sir.

Q. Do you remember them being bought?

A. No, sir.

MR. CHRISTIE: He would be 10 years of age then, your honour.

THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Q. The beds were always there, as far as you know?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. You do not know anything about when they were bought. Is that right? A. Yes, sir.

Q. Why do you say five or six years?

A. I just wanted to give the approximate year of that, sir,

Q. Do you know anything at all about when they were bought, approximately, or anything else?

A. No, your honour.



1 MR. CHRISTIE: Q. Do you know anything about
2 the stove, when it was bought? A. I just know
3 about the kitchen stove.

4 Q. Do you know when it was bought?

5 A. It was bought about a year before we evacua-
6 ted.

7 Q. From where was it bought?

8 A. We got it from a friend, bought it from him.

9 Q. And do you know how old that stove was when
10 you bought it from this friend? A. No, sir.

11 Q. Who bought it, your mother or your father?

12 A. My father.

13 Q. I think you told us the large icebox was
14 home-made. What about the other ice-box? Do you know
15 how old it was? A. No, sir.

16 Q. Who bought that, your mother or your father?

17 A. I do not know anything about it, sir.

18 Q. Were you present when this vehicle was
19 bought? With respect to this International truck,
20 were you present when it was bought?

21 A. Yes, sir.

22 Q. You would be 12 years of age then, in 1939?

23 A. In 1938.

24 Q. When was it bought?

25 A. December 23, 1938, sir. It was a 1939 model.

26 Q. You have it twisted around here on the claim.
27 Do you say it was bought in 1938?

28 A. Yes, sir.

29 Q. You have here "Approximate date purchased:
30 1939." A. It is a model 1939, sir.



1 Q. Is this a mistake in your claim that the
2 date of purchase is 1939, and that should read 1938?

3 A. It should read 1938, sir.

4 Q. Who put that down, was that your mother or
5 yourself? A. That was written by Roy It~~o~~ when

6 we had the interview in Hamilton.

7 Q. Were you present? A. Yes, sir.

8 Q. Who gave this information, your mother or
9 you? A. I gave it to him, sir.

10 Q. That is a mistake, then. I think you ought
11 to make a note that it is changed since it came here.

12 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: I do not think you should
13 be changing that claim, Mr. Opper.

14 MR. CHRISTIE: That is my point.

15 MR. OPPER: Can I ask him a question and say I
16 have made certain changes, are those changes correct?

17 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: That is the claim which
18 he made in the first place and he has been cross-examin-
19 ed on it. If the Commissioner believes his evidence,
20 and it is in evidence, all well and good. If he does
21 not believe it, that is what the evidence is for.
22 You have no right to change the claim after it is
23 signed, unless an amendment is made and allowed.

24 MR. OPPER: I would like to ask your honour, ---

25 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: I do not think an amendment
26 is necessary. In respect of the claim as taken with
27 his evidence, the evidence is quite self-explanatory,
28 if accepted.

29 The Commissioner should weigh this witness'
30 evidence by its accuracy or otherwise compared with this



1 claim.

2 MR. OPPER: I believe actually it is a typograph-
3 ical error in the office. In the original claim he
4 claims for a 1939 International truck. Somebody
5 transposed these figures. They simply transposed them.
6 I do not think that there is a great deal which hinges
7 on that. However, if your honour wishes it I will
8 change it.

9 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Let it go in in the form
10 in which it went in originally. The explanation is
11 in the evidence.

12 MR. OPPER: Maybe I had better file the copy
13 which has not been all swivelled up. This one here
14 is signed by him, too. It is the same one as I showed
15 him.

16 THE SECRETARY: Already in as Exhibit 2.

17 MR. CHRISTIE: Q. Do you know what mileage was
18 on this truck when it was purchased?

19 A. By whom, sir?

20 Q. This truck you told the Commission was
21 purchased in 1939, what mileage was already on this
22 truck when you bought it?

23 A. He told us it was bought in 1938, in
24 December.

25 Q. In 1938. It was brand new? A. Yes, sir;
26 and I have the slip here.

27 Q. So that this mileage of 73,067 was put on
28 between 1938 and the time of evacuation. Is that
29 right? A. Yes, sir.

30 Q. And was it used solely in the city or out



1 through the country? A. Well, once in a week
2 it was taken out to the country, sir.

3 Q. And what was the condition of the tires
4 at the time of evacuation?

5 A. Fair, sir.

6 Q. Had there been any new tires purchased in
7 the meantime? A. No, sir.

8 Q. Pardon? A. No, sir.

9 Q. So, this is the mileage on the original
10 tires; is that right? A. No, sir. I do not
11 think those tires would last three years, sir.

12 Q. Do you know whether this was the mileage on
13 the original tires or not, or whether there were new
14 tires purchased? A. New tires must have been
15 purchased after the first ones.

16 Q. Do you know whether or not that was the
17 case? A. No, sir.

18 Q. Who built this box on the car?

19 A. Mr. Teramura.

20 Q. Do you know what he charged for that?

21 A. No, sir.

22 Q. In putting these values on these different
23 articles, did your mother arrive at these values or
24 did you? A. She arrived at them, sir.

25 Q. And you had nothing to do with estimating
26 these values?

27 A. No.

28 Q. So that you cannot tell us on what basis the
29 estimation was made? A. I just know some, sir,
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Q. What ones do you know?

A. The ice-box and International truck.

Q. Why did you put \$30. on the large ice-box?

A. It was in good condition, sir.

Q. I know, but it was home-made. How did you arrive at the \$30.? A. Well, labour and things like that, sir.

Q. Did you go out and look at any other ice-boxes in the stores? A. This is a different kind of ice-box altogether, sir.

Q. What kind of ice-box is it?
