1 MR. BEST: This is a personal chattels claim,
2 and, as Mr. Christie has just pointed out to me, we
3 have not credited the Custodian with what actually
4 has been apparently obtained for these goods, because
5 there has been some question of the ownership and the
6 money has not been paid over to the claimant, it is
7 being held in the Custodian's ^x expense account. Obviously
8 if we prove that the claimant is the owner of these
9 properties then this money would ^{be} his and we should
10 deduct it from the amount. I think, for the purposes
11 of the Commission, we should credit the total in this
12 column. Is that your point, Mr. Christie?

13 MR. CHRISTIE: Yes.

14 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Are you in a position to
15 amend your claim now?

16 MR. BEST: Yes. It is a matter of totalling that
17 column. The claimant has not received anything as yet.
18 Obviously the Custodian has sold all these goods but
19 he has not credited it to the claimant, the claimant
20 not having received anything on the claim but put down
21 that he valued the goods at \$1,100., some odd, and no
22 deductions, but that is wrong, of course. If the
23 goods are his then this money should and would be
24 credited to his account with the custodian and we would
25 deduct that from the \$1,109.

26 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: How would it be if Mr.
27 Christie makes a statement to the court in regard to
28 it, we can hear the evidence and leave the deductions
29 to be made out in British Columbia?

30 MR. CHRISTIE: Could you not do it now?

1 MR. BEST: Yes.

2 MR. CHRISTIE: These two goods were mixed up
3 and the Custodian wrote to the claimant asking him
4 to mark with an "X" those goods which were sold at
5 auction which belonged to him and providing this
6 morning he proves he is the owner of those goods they
7 should be deducted from the claim and we be given
8 credit. The claim will show "sold by custodian -
9 nothing," which is not true, because we sold a great
10 many goods.

11 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Who is going to add the
12 column?

13 MR. CHRISTIE: We can go ahead.

14 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Subject to the deduction at
15 the end we will hear the evidence.

16
17 GUNJI NAKAMACHI, the claimant herein, being
18 first duly sworn, testified
as follows:

19 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. BEST:

20 Q. Is that your signature? (Indicating)

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. And was that form prepared upon your
23 instructions?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. And do you swear the contents are true? You
26 say that is correct as it was prepared by you? You
27 say that is correct, as it was prepared for you, rather?

28 A. Yes.

29 Q. I see.

30 I am filing as Exhibit 1 the particulars of



1 personal chattels claim.

2 (PARTICULARS OF PERSONAL CHATTELS CLAIM,
3 MARKED EXHIBIT NO.1)

4 MR. BEST: There was one claim which should have
5 been heard, really, with this one, and we intended to
6 facilitate the operation of the commission by having
7 them heard together. Mrs. Okada who was formerly a
8 Miss Kato owned the house in which these goods were
9 stored. She did have some chattels and had filed a
10 claim. However, they apparently were not of great value
11 and she has now decided to abandon her claim entirely.
12 Consequently she is not before the Commission. It might
13 have facilitated things if she had been here, but we did
14 not know until very recently that she did not intend to
15 press her claim and did not take any steps, as perhaps
16 we might have to subpoena her here on this matter.
17 I do not think I am saying anything to my friend's pre-
18 judice if I say that the fact this Mrs. Kato has abandoned
19 her claim and has not questioned this claimant's owner-
20 ship of most of these goods I think would indicate that
21 she is satisfied that most of these goods actually
22 did belong to this particular claimant.

23 MR. CHRISTIE: You are making this statement on
24 her behalf that she is abandoning it?

25 MR. BEST: Yes. We have been notified by Mrs.
26 Kato that she is abandoning her claim because we did
27 intend to have her here today and present her claim with
28 Mr. Nakamachi, but she told us that she was not going
29 to pursue the matter.

30 MR. CHRISTIE: I will tender as Exhibit No. 2,



1 the Analysis of Personal Property Claim.

2 (ANALYSIS OF PERSONAL PROPERTY CLAIM,
3 MARKED EXHIBIT NO.2)

4 MR. BEST: Q. I understand that before evacuation
5 you lived in Vancouver. Is that right?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. And apparently at the time of evacuation
8 you made some arrangement with Miss Kato to store your
9 goods in her house at 2584 Oxford Street. Is that
10 right?

11 A. Yes. That is right.

12 Q. Incidentally, is she any relation to you
13 or is she just a friend?

14 A. She is my good friend.

15 Q. She is a good friend? A. Yes.

16 Q. Now, where were these goods of yours stored
17 in Miss Kato's house? Were they put in one room or ---

18 A. It is a big house, a six-room house.

19 Q. Yes? A. And I left the stuff upstairs
20 in one room and in the basement.

21 Q. You left the stuff upstairs in one room and
22 in the basement? A. In the basement.

23 Q. Well now, at that time did you take any steps
24 to mark your goods as belonging to you or did you just
25 feel that if the Custodian knew that your goods were in
26 this house that that was sufficient?

27 A. I marked some and others I did not.

28 Q. I understand that the list which you have
29 compiled now and which you have presented to the
30 Commission in your claim form actually was copied from



1 a list which was provided to you by the Custodian when
2 your goods were moved from 2584 Oxford Street to 992
3 Powell Street? Is that right?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. And you had the further assistance of the
6 auction sheets with which the Custodian was good enough
7 to provide us to double-check them? Is that right?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. Incidentally, I believe that you have had
10 considerable correspondence with the Custodian about
11 these chattels?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. But to date you have not actually received any
14 money from the Custodian for them?

15 A. No.

16 Q. With respect to this gramophone which you say
17 was valued at \$30. and you paid \$85. for it in 1930,
18 was it a small gramophone which would sit on a table or
19 was it a large model?

20 A. Just about this high, with the cabinet.

21 Q. Was it electrically driven or did you wind
22 it up?

23 A. Just the winder.

24 Q. Apparently you had a brass vase here, which
25 you brought from Japan. Did you bring that from Japan,
26 yourself, and did some other member of your family ---

27 A. Yes. I got it myself.

28 Q. What was your occupation prior to evacuation?

29 A. I was in the photographic business.
30



1 Q. So that this photographic equipment which you
2 have claimed for would be equipment which you used
3 in your business?

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. Were there any cameras used, or, included
6 in it? A. No.

7 Q. There is just one large item, roller, with
8 motor, and you estimated that at \$65. Can you tell
9 us just what that was?

10 A. Well, this is just used for photographic work.
11 It was some equipment for enlarging.

12 Q. The other smaller items, I take it, were
13 the usual small pieces of photographic equipment
14 you would have around your shop?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. In respect of this diningroom table and six
17 chairs, were those chairs to match the table? Were
18 they one set?

19 A. A set for the table.

20 Q. And you paid \$90. for them in 1940?

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. Did you buy them from a store or from some
23 friend?

24 A. A store.

25 Q. I see. How large a family did you have
26 prior to evacuation?

27 A. Seven.

28 Q. And would these dishes and cuttlery include
29 the dishes, cuttlery for the whole family, then?

30 A. Yes.



1 Q. How about this roll of linoleum? It obviously
2 had not been laid, or, had it been, or had you taken
3 it up and rolled it up?

4 A. Just rolled up.

5 Q. Had it been used? A. Just about only
6 two or three months; just almost new, you know.

7 Q. I think most of the other items are a
8 question of valuation.

9 Do you know whether any of your goods were
10 mixed up with a man's called Naka?

11 A. No. I never mixed them up.

12 Q. Do you know a Mr. Tomajiro Naka?

13 A. I do not know him.

14 Q. You do not know him? A. No.

15 MR. BEST: That is all, your honour.
16

17 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. CHRISTIE:

18 Q. I am showing you a J.P. Form dated April 28,
19 1942. Is that your signature (Indicating)?

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. Whose signatures are these (Indicating)?

22 A. This is my daughter signed that, I think.
23 This is my wife's.

24 Q. Your daughter and your's?

25 A. And this is mine.

26 MR. CHRISTIE: I file this J.P. Form as Exhibit 3.
27 (J.P. FORM, MARKED EXHIBIT NO.3)

28 Q. And I am showing you a list of chattels
29 dated November 20, 1942, and sent to you by the Custodian?
30



1 office and I believe you signed this on January 4, 1943.

2 Is that your signature (Indicating)?

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. And those were all goods belonging to you?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. You owned all these goods?

7 A. Yes.

8 MR. CHRISTIE: I will file this inventory as
9 Exhibit 4.

10 (INVENTORY, MARKED EXHIBIT NO.4)

11 It was signed by the claimant on January 4, 1943.

12 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: What is the date?

13 MR. CHRISTIE: The claimant signed it on
14 January 4, 1943, even though it is dated at the top
15 November 20, 1942.

16 Q. Now, you gave a list here totalling \$944.50.
17 That included, in that sum, one davinette and right
18 below that you have davinette, \$70. It seems to me
19 that you are claiming for that article twice. Did you
20 have more than one davinette in your house?

21 A. Yes. I have two, one used in the studio.

22 Q. This davinette you are claiming, being in the
23 list amounting to \$944.50, is a different davinette
24 than this one which you are estimating at \$70.?

25 A. Yes.

26 Q. Then, here is an umbrella stand for which
27 you are claiming among these goods totalling \$944.50 and
28 down here you claim for an umbrella stand at \$5.00.
29 You claim \$5.00, for that. Did you have more than one
30 umbrella stand? A. This is in the nature of a

clothes and a hat stand. That is a bamboo stand just to



1 put in umbrellas and canes. And this --

2 Q. I am referring to the umbrella stand here,
3 (Indicating) not the clothes rack. That is what I am
4 talking about. You have an umbrella stand here, \$5.,
5 and included in this total of \$944.50 you have an
6 umbrella stand. Is that a duplication in preparing this
7 list?

8 , A. I think it is some coat-hanger.

9 Q. Have you two umbrella stands, as such?

10 A. There was a combination umbrella stand and
11 hat peg, and one umbrella stand.

12 Q. Is that all you had altogether, two, two
13 things? A. Yes.

14 Q. All right, then; here is a clothes rack
15 and stand, and here is another clothes rack stand, in
16 the other list. Did you have two clothes-rack stands,
17 then? I think there is duplication here.

18 MR. BEST: There might be one or two, but
19 I think the claim is ---

20 MR. CHRISTIE: He has a total of \$944.50 for all
21 these goods and he lists separate goods here and here
22 is a davinette \$70., and one over here (Indicating).
23 There is an umbrella stand here (Indicating) and one
24 over here (Indicating) and there is a clothes rack
25 stand, clothes rack stand.

26 MR. BEST: The claim, itself, does not show
27 duplication. There is the davinette \$70. These
28 are broken down that way.

29 MR. CHRISTIE: You have a divanette in two
30 places.

MR. BEST: Not on this list.



1 MR. CHRISTIE: Yes.

2 MR. BEST: I cannot find it here.

3 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: It looks to me as if he is
4 bound by the list he signed on January 4, because he
5 said "This represents all my chattels in the restricted
6 area of British Columbia."

7 MR. CHRISTIE: That is my point. There is only
8 one there. He has two divanettes, two umbrella stands,
9 and he puts this in additionally.

10 Q. How many paintings did you have altogether?

11 A. I had five paintings.

12 MR. CHRISTIE: I think the rest is a question
13 pretty well of appraisal, your honour. All the goods
14 are accounted for. He estimates the goods at a certain
15 value. They were sold at auction at another value.
16 Most of them are very small items. I do not think
17 it would pay me to go into them.

18 That is all, thank you.

19 MR. BEST: We make the total of the sale of the
20 claimant's goods by auction, and, as Mr.Christie has
21 just said, I think they were all sold by auction,
22 \$222.25, so that the claimant's claim would be amended by
23 taking the \$222.25 from the \$1,109.50.

24 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Which makes \$887.25.

25 MR. BEST: Which would be the amended claim.

26 That is all.

27 _____

28 MR. CHRISTIE: I file the auctioneer's sheets as
29 Exhibit 5.

30 MR. BEST: Incidentally, were they totalled?



1 Sometimes they are totalled, sometimes they are not.

2 MR. CHRISTIE: Yes. They are totalled separately.
3 They are not totalled as a whole.

4 (AUCTIONEER'S SHEETS, MARKED EXHIBIT NO.5)

5 There is one further exhibit which should be
6 filed.

7 The Custodian sent the claimant a letter asking
8 him to mark those articles which belonged to him and
9 I have a letter here dated September 29, 1948, signed ---

10 Q. Is this your signature (Indicating)?

11 A. Yes.

12 MR. CHRISTIE: --- signed by the claimant, and
13 opposite each item which he owned in this list which
14 was forwarded to him he marked an "S" as being his
15 property and not Miss Kato's.

16 I think, perhaps to complete the record, that
17 should go in as Exhibit 6.

18 (LETTER, SEPTEMBER 29, 1948, MARKED EXHIBIT
19 NO.6)

20 It is submitted that those articles of personal
21 property which were sold at auction were sold at their
22 fair market value.

23 It is submitted that there are certain articles
24 on this Analysis of Personal Property Claim which
25 have been duplicated and that the claimant is bound by
26 the list which he signed on January 4, 1943.

27 MR. BEST: On that specific point I quite
28 agree that he is bound so far as those items are con-
29 cerned, but I do not think there is anything to pre-
30 clude him from adding additional items and if my friend




1 takes the position which he has a perfect right to, that
2 those additional items never came within the custody
3 of the Custodian that may be a defence, but I think
4 there are one or two items where there is doubt as to
5 whether there was duplication. I am not prepared to
6 admit that all the items are duplicated, but I will
7 admit there are one or two which are.

8 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: I think you would be bound
9 by it.



GENERAL REMARKS:

Gunji NAKAMACHI only declared five or six chattels belonging to him on his JP DECLARATION, Apr.28/42.

Chattels listed in inventory column of claim analysis were removed under Gunji NAKAMACHI'S name from 2584 Oxford St., to 992 Powell St. NAKAMACHI was forwarded this list together with letter Nov.20/42, requesting him to sign same, if correct, stating that these chattels are all the personal belongings belonging to him in the Protected Area. This list was signed by NAKAMACHI January 4/43. As this is the only list on our files we presume that his claim refers to this list. It would seem that NAKAMACHI is claiming twice on items #2,3,4,5,6,7, as similar chattels appear in the list mentioned in item (e) 1.

Miss Hisa KATO (now Mrs. Tomatsu OKADA) was the owner of 2584 Oxford St. In letter Apr.13/43 (copy on claim file) we were informed that one room was closed up and her belongings stored there. We, therefore, wrote to NAKAMACHI and KATO on several occasions requesting them to identify their individual chattels from auction sheets that were enclosed but to date we have received no reply. Mr. Tomijiro NAKA'S chattels became mixed up with NAKAMACHI'S chattels in warehouse during the sale of same on account of the similarity of names.

It has been impossible, due to lack of co-operation on the part of the Japanese, to identify ownership of these chattels and proceeds from sale of same are being held in chattel suspense account.
