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CASE NO: 1273

TOSHIRO SHIMIZU, having been first duly sworn, testified through the Interpreter as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. BEST:

Q. Is that your signature? A. Yes.

Q. Was that form prepared upon your instructions?

A. Yes.

Q. Do you swear the contents of it are true?

A. Yes.

(PERSONAL PROPERTY, FISHING VESSELS CLAIM FORM
MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1)

Q. I understand that prior to the evacuation you lived at Springs Cove at Uclaelet?

A. Yes.

Q. And you were a fisherman? A. Yes.

Q. And you owned a boat known as T.3133?

A. Yes.

MR. CHRISTIE: I tender as Exhibit 2 the analysis of personal property claim.

(ANALYSIS OF PERSONAL PROPERTY CLAIM,
MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2)

Q. And that boat, like all the others, was taken over by the Navy in December, 1941, was it?

A. Yes.

Q. Now, I understand that you built the whole of this boat yourself, did you? A. Yes.

Q. Are you a shipwright? A. Yes.

Q. And the cost then I take it of the hull shown here as \$1,000 in 1933 would represent your own labour and the material that went into it?

A. Yes.



1 Q. And I take it that you then purchased the
2 engine, and did you install it or did you have some
3 one else install the engine in the hull?

4 A. I installed it myself.

5 Q. What type of engine was it? A. A Vivian.

6 Q. A Vivian 15 horsepower marine engine?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. Now, this remark about the boat being over-
9 hauled every year; did you do that yourself?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. Was this boat small enough to be taken out
12 of the water at the end of the season or did you
13 leave it in the water all winter?

14 A. Every year it is customary to take the boat
15 out of the water and overhaul it and afterwards you
16 put it in the water again.

17 Q. And was the boat painted each year when it
18 was taken out of the water? A. Yes.

19 Q. Now, this gear that you show on your claim
20 form, the anchor, storage battery, compass, etc.; was
21 that gear all left on the boat when the Navy took it
22 over? A. Yes, it was complete

23 with all these things.

24 Q. You have mentioned in a general way mechanical
25 tools, wrenches, screw drivers, etc. Can you tell us
26 a little about those; how many wrenches or screw
27 drivers did you have?

28 A. Four or five screw drivers, pinchers, a chisel
29 and there were probably some other things but I cannot
30 recollect them now.



1 Q. These coils of manilla rope which you value
2 at \$40; can you give us any idea what the length of
3 that rope would be?

4 A. About 50 fathoms of 1 3/4 inch rope, and I
5 think about 100 fathoms of 3/8 inch rope.

6 Q. Now, this dynamo and storage battery, was
7 the sole purpose of this battery to start the engine
8 of the boat or did it have some other purpose?

9 A. Yes, it was to start the engine.

10 Q. Did you have electric light on the boat?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. And it, I take it, was taken off the battery
13 and dynamo? A. Yes.

14 Q. Now, this power-driven winch that you have
15 listed here as fishing gear and claim \$100 for, where
16 was it on the boat?

17 A. It was at the back of the boat.

18 Q. Was it to pull in the nets?

19 A. No, the trolling gear.

20 Q. When you say it was power-driven, do you
21 mean it was driven off the engine of the boat or was
22 there a separate motor to drive that winch?

23 A. Yes, it was driven by the main engine.

24 MR. CHRISTIE: I tender as Exhibit 3 the
25 appraisal report of John Gould, dated August, 1942,
26 and the appraised valuation is \$450, and the estimated
27 market value \$500.

28 MR. BEST: Is there anything else about the boat
29 you want to tell us?

30 A. I have explained everything perfectly in my



1 claim sheet.

2

3 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. CHRISTIE:

4 Q. I am showing you a J.P. form dated the 26th
5 of March, 1942; whose signature is that?

6 A. That is my signature.

7 Q. Why didn't you list this fishing gear on your
8 J.P. form? A. I was anxious at that

9 time about my family and one thing and another and I
10 must have forgotten it.

11 (J.P. FORM, MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4)

12 Q. What make of storage battery was this?

13 A. I couldn't say what make it was.

14 Q. How old was it, when did you buy it?

15 A. About two or three years before the evacuation.

16 Q. I am pointing out to my learned friend that
17 the estimated value is \$50 and on the personal property
18 claim they have claimed \$40 for the battery.

19 MR. BEST: I think the explanation is that the
20 analysis was made from the original claim where it
21 was shown as \$50, but the claimant when preparing the
22 claim finally said a fair valuation probably would be
23 \$40.

24 MR. CHRISTIE: Q. What is the usual life of
25 these storage batteries in a boat if you give them
26 average use? A. About four or five

27 years in my line of business.

28 Q. And you had used this battery about four
29 years approximately? A. I think about three
30 years.



1 Q. You bought it in 1938 and you were evacuated
2 in March, 1942.

3 Now, this fishing gear, where did you buy it?

4 A. At Ucluelet Machine Shop.

5 Q. What did you pay for it?

6 A. It is estimated at \$100.

7

8 RE-EXAMINATION BY MR. BEST:

9 Q. Mr. Christie asked you why you didn't mention
10 these items in your J.P. form which you signed at the
11 end of June, 1942. Now, as I understand your evidence
12 you say this gear was on the boat and the boat was
13 taken from you in December, 1941, wasn't it?

14 A. Yes.

2 15 Q. So actually you didn't have any of this gear
16 when you signed this form?

17 A. That is so.

18 Q. I wish to tender as Exhibit 5 an appraisal
19 of O. W. Phillipson. The appraisal was made in March
20 or April, 1942, it doesn't give a definite date. The
21 appraised value is \$300.

22 (APPRAISAL ABOVE REFERRED TO, MARKED EXHIBIT NO.5)

23 Q. I would like to file as Exhibit 6 a summary
24 taken from the Vessel's Record dated August 8, 1944.

25 (SUMMARY ABOVE REFERRED TO, MARKED EXHIBIT NO.6)

26 Q. I am filing as Exhibit 7 a paper which pur-
27 ports to be a claim settlement statement and the
28 allowance made for the battery was \$7, for the
29 compass \$12.25, for the generator \$18.50, and for the
30 anchor line, \$4.50.

2 (PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY, MARKED EXHIBIT NO.8)

3 MR. BEST: I do not think, your honour, we are
4 particularly concerned with this claim unless the
5 Custodian pays this \$42.25 out of the claimant's account.
6 We take the position, of course, and the testimony
7 to-day has been that these parts were all on the boat
8 at the time it was taken over from him.

9 MR. CHRISTIE: Your honour, I didn't put it in for
10 that purpose; the only reason I put it in was to show
11 the valuation put on these parts in the settlement.

12 MR. BEST: I take it that the generator would be
13 the dynamo. I understand your boat, like most of the
14 others, lay at New Westminster during the winter of
15 1941-42, or do you know?

16 A. Yes, it was at New Westminster.


17 Q. Now this appraisal that was made in 1942 in
18 April says the deck needs extensive repairs. It
19 doesn't say what part of the deck, what do you say
20 about the condition of the deck when the boat was
21 taken over?

22 A. There was no need for any repairs to the
23 deck when I handed the boat over, it was in good
24 condition.

25 MR. CHRISTIE: It is submitted, your honour, this
26 boat was sold at its fair market value.





In his declaration he reported 10 packages of personal belongings at C.P.R. Wharf, Vancouver. These were released to SHIMIZU and acknowledged in a letter of July 13, 1942.

In his declaration this man reported a boat engine left with Mr. Stanley Littleton at Ucluelet. This engine was sold in May, 1942 and the amount of \$50.00 was credited to this man's account. This sum was remitted to him on May 24, 1943. This sale was made with the approval of Mr. Shimizu.

In his declaration this man reported a sewing machine left at Ucluelet. This sewing machine was sent to SHIMIZU in December, 1942.

In his declaration he reported a motor boat "T.S" in custody at Ucluelet. This boat was sold in September, 1943, and the net proceeds of the sale in the amount of \$388.89 were credited to this man's account.

The account of this man was credited with the sum of \$12.25 received in settlement of claim lodged through the Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee as refund of expenses incurred at the time of the impounding of the vessel "T.S."

This file reveals no other property of any kind.
