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CASE NO: 1282

MRS. FUSAKO KANDA, having been first duly sworn,
testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. BEST:

Q. Is that your signature? A. Yes.

Q. Was that form prepared upon your instructions?

A. Yes.

Q. Do you swear the contents of it are true?

A. Yes.

(PERSONAL CHATTELS CLAIM FORM MARKED EXHIBIT NO.1)

MR. CHRISTIE: I tender as Exhibit 2 the analysis
of personal property claim.

(ANALYSIS OF PERSONAL PROPERTY CLAIM MARKED
EXHIBIT NO. 2)

MR. BEST: I understand that you lived at Steveston
before the evacuation? A. Yes.

Q. And you had certain goods and chattels,
furniture and so on, that were left there?

A. Yes.

Q. I understand that it was actually left at the
Imperial Cannery at Steveston, was it?

A. Yes, in my house.

Q. You had one of the cannery houses? A. Yes.

Q. So your goods were left in your house?

A. Yes.

Q. Did you give a list of those goods to the
Custodian at the time you left Steveston?

A. Yes.

Q. Now, about some of these particular items;
first of all this dining-room set, you purchased it
in 1929, did you? A. Yes.



1 Q. Incidentally was that when you were married?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. So a good many of these articles of furniture
4 would have been purchased about 1929 or '30?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. Where did you buy the dining-room suite you
7 said you paid ^{\$100} for it new? A. In Vancouver.

8 Q. And I suppose you had used it from 1929 until
9 the date of evacuation? A. Yes.

10 Q. Were all these 12 kitchen chairs bought at
11 the same time? A. Yes.

12 Q. I understand that some of the beds were bought
13 in 1929 and others later? A. Yes.

8 14 Q. How about this baby bed, when was that
15 purchased, do you remember the baby bed?

16 A. In 1932.

17 Q. Now, these electric lamps, were they table
18 lamps or floor lamps?

19 A. Some were table lamps.

20 Q. Apparently there were three lamps; how many
21 of those would be table lamps?

22 A. There were two chandeliers.

23 Q. Two chandeliers? A. Yes.

24 Q. And one table lamp? A. Yes.

25 Q. Any floor lamps, lamps that stand on the floor?

26 A. Yes, one.

27 Q. You are lumping those all together and have
28 estimated their value at \$35? A. Yes.

29 Q. Now, this logging saw and ropes and barometer;
30 did those belong to your husband? A. Yes.



1 Q. Were they left in the house when you left
2 with your furniture too? A. Yes.

3 Q. Your husband was there at the time of
4 evacuation? A. Yes.

5 Q. He was evacuated with you? A. Yes.

6 Q. That was in June, 1942? A. Yes.

7 Q. I don't suppose you felt it necessary to
8 put your name on any of these goods that you left in
9 your house? A. Some I marked and
10 some not.

11 Q. Do you remember whether you put any tags on
12 that saw and barometer? A. I don't remember.

13 Q. Now these books and bookcase that you value at
14 \$50; can you tell us how much you would value the book-
15 case at without the books?

16 A. It cost nearly \$50.

17 Q. The bookcase cost about \$50? A. Yes.

18 Q. When did you buy it? A. 1929,
19 when I was married.

20 Q. What kind of books did you have in the bookcase?

21 A. Mostly Japanese books.

22 Q. Would they be novels or non-fiction books?

23 A. Religious books.

24 Q. Now, apparently you had a great many dolls?

25 A. Yes.

26 Q. And you said you accumulated them over the
27 years; can you tell us just how many you had?

28 A. About 50.

29 Q. Fifty individual dolls? A. Yes.

30 Q. And I suppose you had the usual robes in which



1 to dress the dolls and so on?

2 A. They are all dressed.

3 Q. These bathroom fixtures, I suppose they were
4 the usual fixtures or what do you mean by bathroom
5 fixtures? A. A sink and toilet, bath

6 and everything.

7 Q. You purchased those yourself and put them in
8 the house? A. Yes.

9 Q. And you rented the house from the Imperial
10 Cannery? A. Yes.

11 Q. Now, if you had been moving out of the
12 Imperial Cannery house in the normal course of events
13 would you have taken those articles with you? Would
14 they have let you take the bathroom fixtures away?

15 A. I think so.

16 Q. If your husband had stopped working for them
17 they would have directed you to take them away?

18 A. Yes.

19 _____
20 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. CHRISTIE:

21 Q. I am showing you a J.P. form dated the 21st
22 of April, 1942; whose signature is that?

23 A. It is mine.

24 Q. I tender the J.P. form as Exhibit 3.

25 (J.P. FORM MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3)

26 Q. In this J.P. form why didn't you list some
27 of these chattels that you are claiming for now?

28 There are quite a few of these chattels you have not
29 listed? A. This was done roughly.

30 Q. Where did you leave the key when you were



1 evacuated? A. It was a pass key and I
2 took it away myself.

3 Q. I am showing you a copy of a letter dated
4 January 29th, 1944, addressed to Mrs. Kanda at Kaslo,
5 B.C. Did you get the original of that letter?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. Now, why didn't you reply to the Custodian?

8 A. I went to see the representative of the
9 Commission at Kaslo and I didn't reply because I had
10 been ill and the man at Kaslo told me there was no
11 need to reply as I had already reported these things
12 to the Custodian.

13 Q. It states in this letter that you hadn't
14 reported some of these things. They said they
15 couldn't locate them.

16 (LETTER ABOVE REFERRED TO MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4)

17 THE WITNESS: I reported all my own things to
18 the Custodian but there were some of my husband's things
19 which I don't know of which might not have been
20 reported.

21 Q. Did you report any of your chattels in any
22 other letter or document besides the J.P. form?

23 A. No, I didn't report anything else.

24 Q. Who did you see at Kaslo and what was his name?

25 A. Mr. Lockheed and a Mr. Morrison.

26 Q. Did you show them the original of this letter
27 you received from the Custodian?

28 A. I took it to the office but I don't know
29 whether Mr. Morrison or Mr. Lockheed saw it.

30 Q. Did you give them any other list?



1 A. I showed it to the girl in the office.

2 Q. Did you leave with the office there any list
3 of your goods or did you give the office there any
4 explanation as to why some of these goods were not
5 included in your J.P. form? A. No.

6 Q. Who did these carpenter's tools belong to?

7 A. To my husband.

8 Q. Who did the logging saw and ropes and
9 barometer belong to? A. My husband.

10 Q. Who did the bathroom fixtures belong to?

11 A. They were in my name.

12 Q. Is your husband livin g? A. Yes.

13 Q. Has he made a claim? A. No.

14 Q. He has not made a claim; your husband is
15 not here? A. No.

16 Q. Were any of these other chattels you have
17 listed in your claim besides the carpenter tools and
18 logging saw the property of your husband?

19 A. At the time of my evacuation the Custodian
20 told me to put all the things including my husband's
21 down on my J.P. form.

22 Q. What was your husband's first name?

23 A. 'Yoshio.

24 Q. Is he living at the same address you are?

25 A. Yes.

26 Q. Did your husband not sign a J.P. form?

27 A. No.

28 Q. How did the Custodian get a list of your
29 husband's goods then? A. I don't know.

30 Q. When were these carpenter tools bought?



- 1 A. About 1929, but year by year.
- 2 Q. Were you present when they were bought?
- 3 A. Yes.
- 4 Q. Where were they bought? A. Some in
5 Steveston and some in Vancouver.
- 6 Q. You were present on each occasion?
- 7 A. Oh, yes.
- 8 Q. Were you present when the logging saw, ropes
9 and barometer were bought? A. Yes.
- 10 Q. Where were they bought?
- 11 A. Mostly in Vancouver.
- 12 Q. Were they all bought at one time? A. No.
- 13 Q. Were you present each time they were bought?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. These bathroom fixtures, were they bolted or
16 screwed to the floor or walls?
- 17 A. The bath was not.
- 18 Q. Were the other fixtures attached to the walls?
- 19 A. Yes.
- 20 Q. When you moved into this house owned by the
21 Imperial Cannery have they not any of these bathroom
22 fixtures there? A. No.
- 23 Q. The tenant had to supply even the ordinary
24 bathroom fixtures? A. Yes, the tenants put
25 them in and own them themselves.
- 26 Q. What kind of beds were these, what material
27 were they made of? A. Iron.
- 28 Q. Where were the dolls bought, in Japan or in
29 Vancouver? A. Some in Japan but
30 mostly in Vancouver.

1 RE-EXAMINATION BY MR. BEST:

2 Q. You know as a fact, do you, that your husband
3 didn't declare any of these items you are claiming for
4 on his J.P. form; is that true? A. Yes.

5 MR. CHRISTIE: She has no status to make a claim
6 on behalf of her husband for goods owned by him. He
7 must make his own claim.

8 MR. BEST: I submit as far as the household goods
9 are concerned it has been accepted.

10 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: I think we have been doing
11 that pretty regularly with household goods. The
12 Commissioner makes the decision and if he decides that
13 the claim is this woman's only and she had no right
14 to make it on behalf of her husband, that will be up
15 to them out there.

9 16 MR. BEST: I don't think my friend needs to worry
17 about it since the husband apparently did not make
18 any J.P. declaration and he can hardly do so at this
19 late date.

20 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: Mr. Christie's point is
21 that if they are the husband's, the husband should be
22 here for cross-examination as to their value and
23 where he got them. For me to rule definitely on that
24 would be allowing or disallowing the claim, which I
25 have now power to do.

26 MR. CHRISTIE: I file as Exhibit 5 a list of
27 goods removed from the Imperial Cannery house to
28 storage.

29 (LIST OF GOODS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 5)

30 MR. CHRISTIE: It is submitted, your honour,



1 that these articles which were sold at auction were
2 sold at their fair market value.


3 It is submitted that the Custodian is not
4 responsible for those articles of which he had no
5 record and which were not sold by him.

6 It is submitted that certain articles of personal
7 property were not the property of the claimant but
8 were the property of the husband.


9 It is submitted further that the valuation of
10 the different articles of personal property was
11 excessive.
