2 MR. BREWIN: I have a file with the copy of this
3 claim which is made available to the Co-operative
4 Committee. It is a claim for \$396.15. It does not
5 seem to have been on either the original list or this
6 list. I do not know why. It was only called to my
7 attention a day or two ago. Sometimes we have these
8 files in the office and it appears they have been
9 heard before. Because we do not know, or because we
10 did not know what had happened to this case we wrote
11 to Mr. Tehara, who lives at 15 Murray Street in Toronto.
12 He telephoned me this morning for the first time to
13 say that his case had not been heard and he did not
14 know why.

15 Frankly, I do not know why or how it is that it
16 has been overlooked. I do not quite know what ^{to} do
17 about it. Mr. Tehara is here. But, of course, my
18 friend has not any file or any information about it.
19 We do not know whether the original forms were ever
20 received, although Mr. Tehara says he completed them.
21 It may have been an oversight that it was omitted from
22 the list. We are in the dark about it. He is here.

23 He is a claimant. He says he put in a claim and natur-
24 ally he wants to have his claim presented, although it
25 happens to be a small one.

26 MR. CHRISTIE: I have not received any instruct-
27 ions from Vancouver in regard to this case. I have
28 not received the file. If by any chance it is due to
29 an oversight on the part of the Custodian I would not
30 want the claimant to be prejudiced, and if my friend

1 wants to have the claimant make any statement I have
2 no objection today. I suppose this case would come up
3 for hearing in Vancouver and if it is a small claim
4 the claimant could not afford to go there. If he
5 wishes to make any statement or bring out any evidence
6 here I have no objection.

7 THE SUB-COMMISSIONER: That is fair enough.

8
9 GENTARO TEHARA, the claimant herein, being
10 first duly sworn, testified
11 as follows:

12 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. BREWIN:

13 Q. Before the evacuation of the Japanese Cana-
14 dians you lived at 336 Fifth Avenue, West Vancouver?

15 A. Yes, I did.

16 Q. And at some time or other did you prepare
17 a claim form for the Commission which was invdstigating
18 the property losses? Did you have a form prepared and
19 completed? A. Previous to this?

20 Q. At the same time as this document was
21 prepared?

22 A. I received two slips from the Co-operative
23 Committee.

24 Q. And did you complete them?

25 A. Yes, sir.

26 Q. To whom did you give them?

27 A. I sent them to the committee.

28 Q. And did you send another one, or two to
29 the Custodian in Vancouver? Those were the instructions.
30 Do you remember if you did that? It is some time ago.

1 A. I am sure I completed two. I do not know
2 if I sent two to the Co-operative or the other one to
3 Vancouver.

4 Q. When did you do this - a little more than
5 a year ago? A. I presume so. I cannot give
6 you the definite date right now.

7 Q. Where did you have these forms prepared -
8 at your home?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. I am showing you a document which is headed:
11 "Form for Co-operative Committee." Is that a
12 copy of a form which was prepared by you?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. That is one of the ones you prepared?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. That is your writing?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. And another similar form filled in in a
19 similar way, you either sent it to Vancouver or else
20 you left it with the Co-operative Committee. Do you
21 know what you did with it?

22 A. I cannot remember definitely, but I did what
23 I was told to do.

24 Q. You did whatever you were told to do. I am
25 not surprised you do not remember the details of it.

26 This document we have here is a copy of a claim
27 form in which you are claiming \$396.15 for a number
28 of articles of personal property described in the
29 document. Is that right?

30 A. Yes.



1 Q. And that is the claim which you wish to
2 present to the Commissioner?

3 A. That is all I can present. I lost a lot
4 more things, but they were under the Custodian's
5 custody.

6 Q. Attached to this form are first of all
7 a list of new clothing, shoes, etc., coming to \$101.
8 Those are the particulars of Item No.3, are they?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. And you have another list under personal
11 property "Contents of box."

12 A. They were in the custodian's hands, you see.
13 They were registered in Vancouver. If you check up
14 the Custodian has, I think, all those details type-
15 written and signed.

16 Q. And you attached a statement here:

17 "As I was suddenly detained at the Immigration
18 Bldg., my sister, Mrs. Kayo Miyauchi & Mr. Fred K.
19 Nishikawa subsequently stored most of the goods
20 at 334 W. 5th. Ave., ---"

21 That was your house?

22 A. This Fred Nishikawa, he owned the houses.
23 He had a cabin behind us and two separate houses. I was
24 leasing one of the front houses and he stored my goods
25 with his.

26 Q. And, you say:

27 "---and the rest in care of Mr. T. Kanatsuka---"

28 A. Yes.

29 Q. "---of 800 block 7th Ave. W."?

30 A. Yes.

1 Q. "The goods stored at Campbell Storage
2 and at the Fairview Buddhist Church were taken
3 care of by myself previously.

4 My entire property were registered with
5 the Custodian on March 17th, 1942, at Powell
6 Street----"

7 You filled in a form?

8 A. Yes.

9 Q. And you gave them a complete list?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. "---- prior to my detention at the Immigration
12 Bldg.

13 On Sept. 27, 1943, subsequent on my release
14 from Camp 101 Angler, I received a letter from
15 the Protection Dept. per Mr. H.F. Green confir-
16 ming my property were all in order, and suggested
17 that I communicate with him should I require
18 anything so he can forward it to me."

19 A. Yes.

20 Q. Are those statements of fact correct?

21 A. I think I have some articles there to prove
22 that statement, because ---

23 Q. Where have you them?

24 A. In my coat.

25 Q. You have that letter?

26 A. Yes.

27 Q. Would you get the letter as quickly as you
28 can? A. Yes.

29 MR. BREWIN: In the meantime I would like to
30 tender this document as Exhibit 1. It is called:

4 Q. You have produced from your files a letter
5 from the Custodian apparently signed by Mr. Green
6 dated in September, exactly September 27, 1943,
7 which refers to the fact that there were effects left
8 in the care of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Nishikawa, at 334
9 West 5th Avenue.

10 "There is a locked room here full of effects
11 where your things will be quite safe until such
12 time as we come to move them to central storage
13 when we shall sell any furniture. Personal
14 belongings will, of course, be kept safe for you."

15 (2) Large Buddha cabinet left at the
16 Fairview Buddhist Church. This is, of course,
17 a religious building with which we should under
18 no circumstances interfere and your shrine
19 will be quite safe here.

20 (3) Three or four boxes of kitchen utensils
21 left at the house of Mr. Touemon Kanatsuka, our
22 file 11142. This is quite safe where it is for
23 the time being.

24 We understand the B.C. Security Commission
25 will pay shipping expenses for certain essential
26 articles like sewing machines, kitchen utensils,
27 etc., and we suggest that if you require anything
28 shipped, you follow out the instructions given
29 in our enclosed form letter ---"

30 and so on.



1 Did you ask that some of these things be shipped
2 to you?

3 A. Yes. I had my trunks in storage at the
4 Campbell storage house.

5 Q. And were they shipped to you?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. Some of them were?

8 A. Yes; just by trunk. I asked for my kitchen
9 utensils and that to be shipped when I got married and
10 I was told they were all sold.

11 Q. Were any of these items for which you are
12 making a claim shipped to you?

13 A. No.

14 Q. There was a washing machine, Zenith model?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. For which you paid how much?

17 A. One hundred and forty-nine dollars and fifty
18 cents.

19 Q. When did you buy that? I mean, how long before
20 you were evacuated did you buy that?

21 A. That was just before this luxury or war tax
22 was put on. It was in July.

23 Q. Of what year? You were evacuated in 1942?

24 A. Yes. About a year I had had it.

25 Q. Where did you buy it?

26 A. Marshall Wells.

27 (TWO LETTERS, DATES: SEPTEMBER 27, 1943, MARKED
EXHIBIT NO.2)

28 Q. Where did you leave the washing machine?

29 A. At Campbell's storage.
30

1 Q. And you informed the Custodian about that?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. Was it sold? A. Yes.

4 Q. Do you know how much you received for it?

5 A. \$90.

6 Q. And you have not given any credit for what
7 you received here. Do you know how much you received
8 for these things altogether? You are making a claim
9 for \$396.15. Some of these things apparently were sold
10 by the Custodian. Do you know for how much they were
11 sold altogether?

12 A. This washing machine was sold for \$90.

13 Q. Did you get anything for the picture frame?

14 A. No.

15 Q. I suppose the Custodian's file will show what
16 you received. You did receive some monies?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. Some of these things were sold at auction?

19 A. Yes.

20 Q. Now, the values which you have put here, what
21 do you say about them? Can you tell us whether they
22 are a fair value or how did you arrive at them?

23 A. What do you mean, a fair value?

24 A. You have put down here a number of items coming
25 to \$396.15. How did you arrive at the figures?

26 You have shown some of them in detail. Attached to
27 this Exhibit 1 you have shown a new clothing, shoes,
28 etc. How did you get the figures which you put in there
29 to make up \$101.?

30 A. I think you will find those were the exact
prices.



1 Q. Pretty well the exact prices?

2 A. Which I registered with the Custodian.

3 Q. You mean when you gave the list to the
4 Custodian you gave the exact prices, amount?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. All these were purchased in readiness for
7 road camp and were all brand new?

8 A. Yes. I purchased those, all those for my
9 three brothers amounting to over \$300. for the three
10 of us at the road camp.

11 Q. You are only claiming for your own things.

12 A. They are all mine. They have no claim at
13 all.

14 Q. Are these all picture frames?

15 A. Yes.

16 Q. You must have had a very large number of
17 picture frames? A. I had a house. I had a whole
18 box - that size - of picture frames.

19 Q. For what did you use them?

20 A. I had a family house. I had it all in my
21 house and I took it down and put it in a box for storage.

22 Q. With respect to this Victor phonograph and
23 records, you are asking \$50. for it. Do you know for
24 what it was sold by the Custodian?

25 A. I lost money on that, in fact. You see,
26 I paid for storage for about three years, I think it
27 was, and they sold it at auction sale and with the
28 auctioneer's fee and all that I think I received only
29 about six dollars, or something.

30 Q. Why do you say it was \$50.?

A. I had records, and everything.



1 Q. When did you buy it? A. Maybe about
2 five years before the war.

3 Q. When you say "the war" do you mean the
4 outbreak of war with Japan?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. You bought it about five years before that?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. How much did you pay for it?

9 A. I think it was \$75.

10 Q. And, how many records did you have?

11 A. I could not be sure, but I had about three
12 of those books and there must be somewhere around 50
13 or 60.

14 Q. And, had you bought them over the course of
15 time?

16 A. Yes; English records and Japanese records.

17 Q. That is all, thank you.

18
19 MR. CHRISTIE: I cannot do much in the way of
20 cross-examination at this point, your honour. I have
21 no file and I have no record of any goods which might
22 be in the care of the Custodian or which we might,
23 under other circumstances, allege that we had no record
24 of, or which were not accounted for. I think if these
25 goods have been sold at auction it would be largely
26 a question of appraisal.

27 THE COMMISSIONER: Very well.

28 MR. BREWIN: That is all, thank you.

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(PROCEEDINGS ADJOURNED SINE DIE)

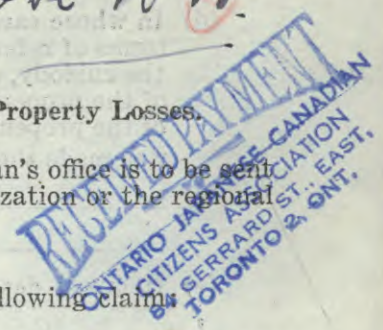




