JAPANESE INTERNEES Dear Sir:-The sum of \$2,332.26 was collected from certain Japanese Internees while they were held in custody in the Immigration Building Vancouver. Individual receipts were given in each case and the whole of the money placed in the Benk of Montreal in trust account. The matter was referred to National Defence Headquarters and advice has now been received that this money be handed to the custodian of enemy property but it's disposition rests with you. It is requested advice now be forwarded as to whom this money should be paid.to. Attention is also drawn to the fact that there are bills for some \$1,200.00 account to contractors and covering repairs which were necessitated through damage done to the Immigration Building by a later detachment of Internees. As these repairs were authorized by this department it is requested that steps may be taken to Bill o Kayed liquidate the contractor's accounts as soon as possible.

- Definite advice has been received from National Defence Headquarters to the effect that 2. the custodian of alien meney property states that the cash and securities held personally by Japanese within the restricted area remains the property of the individual and that they are, therefore, entitled to retain these funds.
- It is requested that advice will be received as to the disposition to be made of the funds, now lying in trust account in the Bank of Montreal, Vancouver, which funds were taken from Japanese who were being held in custody in the Immigration Building, Vancouver.

It has now been definitely stated by the Officer Commanding Vancouver Defences that the money collected from Japanese held in custody in the Immigration Building, and which was deposited in a credit trust account, Bank of Montreal, represents funds belonging to the same group of Japanese that were responsible for the damage to the building which, presumably, would allow the payment of the Contractor accounts. As the Dominion Government District Resident Architect has again written pressing for payment it would be appreciated if some immediate action can be taken and advice forwarded here so that the contractors accounts will be protected. Dear Mr. MacNamara:

Replying to your letter of the 7th instant regarding monies collected from Japanese detained in the Immigration Building, Vancouver, at the request of the British Columbia Security Commission:

It is my opinion that as this money is the property of the individual Japanese from whom it was taken it should be returned to them and I cannot see how we would be justified in taking any other course. It should, therefore, be forwarded to the Department of the Secretary of State for distribution to the individual Japanese, if and when they are released. In my opinion it would be improper to deduct the amount of \$1,200.00 for repairs to the Immigration Building from money such as this. It would cause no end of trouble later on as those that are innocent would not be willing to share the responsibility with those who are guilty.

It is noted that individual receipts have been given for each amount taken.




Replying to your letter of November 28th, of May 18th, you will note that it was suggested by Ottawa Department of Labour.
