

The objective of the National Japanese Canadian Citizens's Association as drawn up in Committee during special conference sessions held between August 30th and September 2nd, 1947, in Toronto, reads as follows:-

"To enable Japanese Canadian organizations in Canada to work together as a unified whole in order to undertake active and collective action for the betterment and advancement of the welfare of Canadians of Japanese ancestry desirous of living in Canada as full Canadian citizens, and with the realization of the need to stress the responsibilities as well as the privileges of Canadian citizenship;

"To foster and spread the true spirit of Canadian democracy;

"To cooperate and work with all Canadian groups whose aim it is to extend to each and every Canadian citizen the fundamental democratic rights and liberties irrespective of race, creed or colour; and

"To cooperate with organizations in other countries with similar aims."

In the National J.C.C.A. we have an indissoluble organization, a strong chain which binds and works in the common interest of all Japanese Canadians through unified coordination and cooperation between the national and provincial chapter organizations.

Towards this objective the National J.C.C.A. has launched on a very ambitious program in the form of projects and assignments. They are as follows:-

- (1) Adequate compensation for property losses to evacuees through forced evacuation.
- (2) Removal of existing restrictions on our civil rights such as franchise, commercial fishing, travel, etc., in British Columbia, Alberta, and other Provinces.
- (5) Full enquiry concerning stranded Japanese Canadians in Japan.
 (4) Information regarding ways and means for naturalization application.
- (5) Investigation on old age pension.
- (6) Documentation of experiences based on evacuation.
- (7) Establishment of a bill of rights in Canada as a part of the Canadian constitution.
- (8) Enactment of fair employment practices legislation aimed at outlawing employment discrimination.

These are some of the immediate projects requiring the individual attention of the National J.C.C.A. Concerning evacuation claims, the machinery has already been set in motion. The various assignments on hand will not be rectified in a matter of days or months. They may take many years before due redress is granted.

As outlined in the object of the national organization, it is the ultimate aim of the National J.C.C.A. to strive for and attain the goal of full fledged Canadian citizenship.

Many problems singular to the racial minorities, and particularly to the Japanese Canadians, are bound to come to a head from time to time. The National J.C.C.A. will act as a safeguard, the official spokesman to cope with such contingent problems.

THE QUEBEC CHAPTER IN RELATION TO MONTREAL J.C.C.A.

Hiroshi Okuda, Pres. Quebec J.C.C.A.

The following in brief explains the set up of the National Japanese Canadian Citizens' Association.

The National Council serves as a brake on certain powers of the National Executive Committee and as a check on the National Executive Secretary. It is an indigenous institution. It represents by provinces and not by population. In other words, through the National Council, Quebec has equal voting power and equal voice as Ontario or any other of the other provinces.

The National Executive Committee acts as a steering, standing and combing committee. It guides and directs. It forms the liaison between the National Council and the National Executive Secretary.

The National Executive Secretary is the head master, the spokesman, whose duty it is to embody the public opinion of the Japanese Canadians, to protect our rights and to assure our liberties.

At the National Conference held in Toronto over the Labor Day week-end, the Provincial delegates selected Toronto as the Present National Headquarter. Therefore, the members of the National Executive Committee were chosen from among Toronto residents: issels, nisels and caucasians. It was also understood that should a National Executive Secretary be appointed from among outside residents, he must take up residence in Toronto.

You may wonder how the Quebec Japanese Canadian Citizens' Association ties in with the national set-up. The local J.C.C.A. is the provincial chapter of the National J.C.C.A. It is the leading organization in this province, and it acts as the connecting link between the local and national set-up.

Problems indigenous to the province will be handled through the Quebec J.C.C.A., whereas all other problems will be undertaken by the National J.C.C.A. The relation, therefore, is one of close coordination.

From the provincial standpoint, we consider the Quebec J.C.C.A. as our organization. From the national viewpoint, we must also consider the National J.C.C.A. as our organization. Therefore, your wholehearted support, financial or otherwise, will not only give credence to the local province chapter but also to the national organization.

Without local public support, the Quebec J.C.C.A. will not be a strong organization, well modulated and well coordinated. Let us, therefore, resolve to give our provincial J.C.C.A. our full confidence, our wholehearted cooperation, our unbounded support; and further resolve to make this an organization of, by and for the Japanese Canadians.

He is not overly satisfied with his job. He would like to do better, but pin him down to what he considers "better" and he is designificated vague. I like my man to be definite and to know where he is headed for.

His education generally stops when he begins bringing home the pay cheque. His hobbies are snooker, poker, feminology, movies, and an occasional baseball game. He considers himself widely read when he tackles Esquire, Readers: Digest, and the Standard, and quite intelligent when he does not base up Time Magazine or Newsweek. His left eyebrow lifts obliquely when he hears of someambitious lad being interested more than slightly in "isms" or "ologies", and wild horses will not drag him to a cultural event such as a good play or a symphony. Frankly, he quite proudly beasts that "highbrow stuff ain't in his line".

He is afraid to be different, which seemingly arises from a deep-scated infarlority. He haten to take the initiative,
especially in any community endeavour. He
has a glib way of evading the issue, but
should a "potticoat executive" result, he
will not admit it is one of his raking.
I'd much prefer to keep to skirts, if
Average Joe Nisei would wear pants!

He still does not find it only to accept women on the same footing. His reaction is not as "catty" as that of women who tag a girl's success in a min's realm as "sublination to hidden frustration". He is afraid. Or why is he so inconsistent? He gallantly declares he admires a gal with brains (not "brains" but some "brains") and will even be brave enough

I can pick a good figure when I see one without the assistance of any Euclidian theory, thus proving that I am no misogynist, although the niselettes of late have almost converted me into a misogynist.

But in this article, I (and a lot of fellas agree with me) am going to be fair. We men do not criticize (we may comment) a girl for lacking certain qualities when God has not seen fit to distribute evenly the gift of beauty or intelligence, but we will and do condemn a girl who does not exploit her aesthetic inheritances because she is too lax or ignorant to realize that, for example; the best "make-up" ever discovered is still soap. (Mind you, I am not against make-up, not by any means, so long as a girl does not lay so much on that she hides her natural beauty behind an artifice.

Another hindrance is the lack of poise in the nisei girl. She is ill at ease forcing herself to believe that people are staring at her.

A man wants to take a girl out who is presentable, not only to his professor but also to his pals, so don't be lobsided, but try to maintain an equilibrium, thereby having a personality which is welcomed everywhere.

An additional contribution of \$1,000.00 was made to the Co-operative Committee on Japanese Canadians on April 18, 1946, to raise the total amount donated through the Citizenship Defense Committee to \$4,000.00.

The Co-operative Committee has received contributions directly from Japanese organizations across Canada, among them: \$2,146.15 from Winnipeg; \$150.00 from Tashme, and \$201.80 from the Southern Alberta Youth Council.
