LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

(On January 14, 1942.)

Consists of 48 members elected by popular vote. Last general election, Oct. 21, 1941. On April 13, 1932, Chap. 8, 1932, entitled "An Act to amend the Constitution Act", decreasing the membership of the Legislature from 48 to 47, was assented to by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor. Dates of previous Redistribution Acts—March 6, 1915, May 31, 1916, and Dec. 21, 1923. The constituency of Columbia which was joined to Revelstoke in 1932 was recreated as a separate constituency at the session of the Legislature of 1934.

Sessional indemnity, \$2,000; Speaker, \$1,800. Leader of the Opposition, \$2,000.

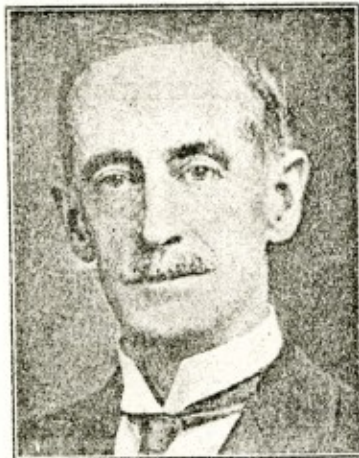

Deputy Commissioner Mead was born in Essex, England on April 29, 1889. He engaged in the Royal North West Mounted Police on July 18, 1910 at Regina. He was 6'½" in height, 150 pounds, with brown hair, hazel eyes and a fair complexion. He listed his previous occupation as clerk and farmer; his previous residence as Verden, Manitoba. He had previously served in the 12th Manitoba Dragoons.

Deputy Commissioner Mead served at Macleod as clerk to the Commanding Officer until June 14, 1915 when he was transferred to "N" Division. While at Macleod he had been promoted to Sergeant. On July 1, 1916 he became the Sergeant Major of "N" Division, Athabasca. Two years later, he went overseas as a Lieutenant with the R.N.W.M.P. Cavalry Draft.

After his return from Europe he was stationed at Regina. He was promoted to Inspector on March 31, 1919 and was sent to Winnipeg during the Winnipeg General Strike. He remained in Winnipeg until 1925 when he was transferred to Lethbridge. Three years later, he was put in charge of the Criminal Investigation Branch

in Vancouver where he remained until 1933 when he was transferred to Montreal to take command of "C" Division. He was promoted to Superintendent on April 1, 1933.

Deputy Commissioner Mead received the R.C.M.P. Long Service Medal in May of 1935. In 1938 he was promoted to the rank of Assistant Commissioner and put in command of "H" Division, Nova Scotia. Later he was to command "D" Division and "A" Division, and to serve as Director of C.I.B. in Ottawa. He was appointed Deputy Commissioner on August 1, 1943 and remained in that post until his retirement on March 1, 1947.

Deputy Commissioner Mead was a member of the B.C. Security Commission during W.W. II and a member of the British Columbia Doukhobor Commission. He was awarded the C.B.E. in 1946. Mead continued to serve the Force until February 1, 1955 as a special official and consultant, and supplied his expertise on matters relating to strikes and industrial relations. Deputy Commissioner Mead died in Vancouver on September 9, 1961.

indescribably heavy. Authority existed for their remuneration as junior constables of the Force, but they donated their services as a contribution to Canada's war effort. Many were already receiving lucrative salaries from their own professions, yet devoted much of their time to police work. The offer of two dollars a day, the pay of a constable, was, it would seem, a commentary on our weird sense of values. Apart from the issue of a few articles of uniform, they gave valiant aid without costing the nation a five-cent piece. Rarely has there been a more fitting example of practical patriotism.

To Britain in Wartime



In September, 1942, I was promoted to the rank of Assistant Commissioner. Eight months later I was requested to present myself to Commissioner Wood at Headquarters, Ottawa. A vacancy had occurred for the Deputy Commissionership and everyone in the Force, down to the last-joined recruit, knew who was selected for the post.

Frederick John Mead, at the time in command of the Criminal Investigation Department of the entire Force, was in line for the advancement. This was not merely a case of elevating the senior Assistant Commissioner, which position Mead held, but the promotion would bring to the second ranking position in the organization one of the most alert minds and capable personalities ever to serve in the Force. Mead was possessed of tremendous vision. He was perhaps the best-informed man in Canada on the history and ramifications of the Communist Party.

One of the young Britons who had joined the old R.N.W.M.P. in 1910, a few weeks before my own inauspicious enlistment, he had served through the ranks, had proceeded overseas with our R.N.W.M.P. detail in the First World War, and had been commissioned as an Inspector in 1919. His complete fitness for senior rank was recognized by all who knew him.

He had led Mounted men into action during the days of the Winnipeg strike and had quickly perceived the extreme hazard to which democracy would be exposed should subversive influences gain the upper hand. From those days onward, he mastered the textbooks, speeches and other outpourings of the

Communist leaders, not only in Canada but in the international scene. A compelling speaker, he was able to portray in especially lucid form the conviction of heart from which he expressed his views.

On one occasion a small group of young but prominent men in Ottawa, fearing that the Mounted Police, during the later years of the war, when Russia was an ally, were misguided in their continued condemnation of Communism, asked that an officer be sent to one of their discussion groups. Their purpose was obviously to put the Force straight. Mead attended. Within a few minutes, those who came to talk remained to listen and at the conclusion of the gathering he was invited to return so that they could learn more. The half had obviously not been told them.

On another occasion during the war, a large group of miners went on strike in the Province of Nova Scotia. Mead's technique was to don his uniform and drive to where a mass meeting was being held. Quite alone and unconcerned, he mounted the platform and gave the men a half-hour talk on the subject of patriotism during wartime. At the conclusion, his audience gave him a rousing hand and the next day voted to return to work.

This was the man who was about to be called to the position of Deputy Commissioner. The purpose of my visit to Headquarters was in order that I could be informed of my own appointment as Mead's successor in the position of Director of the Criminal Investigation Department. I naturally regretted leaving my command in Toronto, and the excellent team which had been developed during the war years.

Not only had Mead held the post I was to assume, but Commissioner Wood himself had been "D.C.I." prior to his own promotion. The position is generally recognized as onerous and important as its incumbent heads up the department concerned with the actual work of the entire organization.

I learned also that I was to proceed without delay to England and there consult with the British Security Service, or M.I.5 as it is better known, and learn some of the techniques which they had evolved in counteracting subversive activities, wartime espionage and sabotage.

The British authorities were quite familiar with the attempts of the Germans and Italians to infiltrate spies into Great Britain,

and their continuing efforts to hamper the war effort by direct acts of sabotage. In Canada we had escaped the work of the enemy-directed saboteur, but the war was far from over in 1943, and the Government wisely decided to carry out first-hand studies of this subject.

There had actually been a spy landed by submarine on Canadian shores. He had appeared on the Gaspé Peninsula, equipped with a small transmitting wireless set, faked documents and instructions as to his method of operations. He was quickly detected, the German intelligence having furnished him with old-fashioned and obsolete bank-notes of a type and size out of circulation for many years. Sundry other discrepancies contributed to his prompt unmasking, notably a strong and peculiar odour to his clothing due to his life in the confines of the submarine. He had resided, before the war, in Canada and had, in fact, a wife living at the time in Toronto.

The local police, upon being summoned by citizens who suspected the newcomer was a spy, were at a loss to know what to do and in a matter of a few hours, after a thoroughly uncomfortable drive throughout the night from Montreal, Inspector Harvison took charge of the situation. Whether this man was the forerunner of other spies or not, the decision was reached that the Mounted Police, charged with responsibility of internal security in Canada, should be fully informed on the anti-espionage methods developed so admirably in Britain; hence my despatch overseas.

I was accompanied to the United Kingdom by Sub-Inspector Fred. A. Regan, just commissioned and a graduate in law from Dalhousie University. Regan was an admirable travelling companion. It was his first visit to England and our journeyings thither and homewards were highly interesting. We travelled to Britain on the *Queen Elizabeth*. The voyage was made notable by the congestion on board. Most of the ship's vast company were American troops and the pleasure of intimate acquaintance with many of these stout-hearted warriors was considerable. They were well behaved and good company. Seemingly all possessed a remarkable keenness for the pastime of poker at unusually high stakes, although an occasional game of crap could be encountered.

Regan and I travelled in plain clothes and were classed as

The Doukhobors, taking the Bible literally, decided no longer to take heed for their lives, their food or their clothing. They wandered about the country living like Adam and Eve. "Full band of fanatics perfectly nude marching on Hleboderno singing," one telegram advised founded Police headquarters, "wheeling dead woman in truck. Cannot persuade them to make a coffin."

On such occasions the police patiently rounded up the offenders and retrieved their clothing from along the line of march. Then they persuaded them to dress, or if necessary forcibly dressed them, and herded them back to their homes, protecting them meanwhile from angry settlers.

One chilly October day several hundred naked men and women marched across the prairie, looking for Christ. When the police intervened they agreed to go to the nearest village, but insisted that a policeman should ride in front. So when the psalm-singing, naked pilgrims arrived, attracting the curious attention of the whole community, the leader of the procession was a blushing young constable.

One of the worst experiences the Mounted Police had with the Doukhobors was in the spring of 1908, when seventy immigrants arrived in colonist cars at Yorkton. Immediately twenty of them, absolutely naked, dashed out into the streets. Inspector Christen Junget and his men herded them back into the railway cars, then hired the Yorkton Agricultural Hall while awaiting instructions from the Saskatchewan government. Because the government's answer was delayed, the police had to keep the Doukhobors in the hall for over a month while they lived constantly in religious mania. Then they moved them into tents in a fenced enclosure away from the town, but still the Doukhobors lived.

In mid-July the police were ordered to remove six men and six women to an insane asylum. The Doukhobors resisted, stoning the police and beating them with clubs, and it was only after a three-hour battle that the police could remove the twelve. Then the other adults went on a hunger strike and would not give any food to their children. When the police entered the camp, this time to remove the children whom they took to Yorkton for proper care.

Toward the end of the month the adults were weak from starvation. The police fed the weakest forcibly, but several deaths seemed imminent. Just before tragedy struck, however, the police managed to persuade the Doukhobors to eat again. Their hunger strike collapsed and gradually they regained strength. By September most of them had lost their religious fervour and were sent to communal farms operated by other Doukhobors, and the remaining few were committed to lunatic

asylums. But this was by no means the end of the trouble with the Doukhobors.

During the succeeding years the duties of the prairie police varied from breaking up gangs of horse thieves to sending a special contingent of nearly ninety Mounted Police, under Commissioner Perry himself, to represent the Force at the coronation of King George V in 1911.

The Commissioner's Annual Report for the following year commented that the population of the prairie provinces had doubled since the Force had adopted the prefix "Royal," and that police work had increased accordingly. Figures compiled from Perry's once-criticized files of detailed information showed that at the time he wrote the report Royal North-West Mounted Police strength stood at 654, all ranks. In the preceding twelve months the Force had dealt with 13,391 criminal cases and had secured 11,435 convictions.

Yet criminal cases were only a part of police duties. In June, 1914, after a mine disaster at Hillcrest, Alberta, Corporals F.J. Mead and A. Grant looked after 188 mutilated bodies as they were brought to the surface. Assisted by relays of miners the two corporals spent four sultry, noisome days and nights examining the grimy, bloody bodies, listing check numbers, making inventory of money and properties, washing mangled remains and wrapping them in sheets.

The next year, when Constable Rose was sent to Island Lake Reserve in Saskatchewan to enforce a quarantine for typhoid fever, he, too, performed a distasteful task. When a half-breed family near the reserve fell ill and the father died, the rest of the family grew hysterical so Rose took command. He dressed the body for burial and made a coffin, fastened with wooden pegs in the absence of nails. Because the flies were very bad, he stayed overnight in the same room with the corpse, while the almost delirious children of the family kept crying and clinging to him all night.

On another occasion Constable Moorehead risked his life trying to rescue four men from the reducing plant of the Natural Gas Company at Nanton, Alberta. Actually the men were already dead from the poisonous fumes, but Moorehead saw one body moving. In spite of the obvious danger he went in. He was struck by the same four-inch jet of escaping gas that was moving the body, and was blown to the opposite side of the high-pressure chamber. Fortunately another man had come by this time, and he reached in and pulled out the almost unconscious constable, who was groping in vain for the door.

As soon as Moorehead revived, he found a bar and pried off some of the corrugated iron near the bodies. He crawled in through the hole while the other man held his feet, and pulled out one of the dead men.

The key men advocating the revolutionary movement were members of the One Big Union or the Industrial Workers of the World, both of which sympathized with the Bolsheviks. They planned to paralyze important cities across the country by general strikes, and then take over the governments of those cities, with the ultimate aim of overthrowing the government of the whole of Canada.

Winnipeg by now was Canada's third-largest city. So when Winnipeg metal workers went on strike on May 1, 1919, it seemed logical to call a Winnipeg general strike. Sympathetic strikes spread to about 30,000 workers, including city firemen, light and power operators, telegraph and telephone operators, streetcar workers, garbage men, postal men, milk-and-bread delivery men, and newspaper workers (except those of the *Labour Journal*). Hence the city's services were seriously disrupted.

The Dominion government made no move to interfere. The affairs of Winnipeg were its own responsibility, with the Province of Manitoba also responsible to a certain extent. But because the Royal North-West Mounted Police now enforced the federal laws in Manitoba they had a detachment at Winnipeg, and Superintendent Cortlandt Starnes prepared to protect Dominion government property, including His Majesty's mails. Also, extra Mounted Police were sent to Winnipeg in case city or provincial officials asked the Dominion government for aid.

At first there was no violence. In spite of the inconvenience, many Winnipeg citizens still sympathized with the strikers. Then the strike committee began to allow some theatres to open and some companies to deliver milk and bread if they displayed prominently a sign reading "By permission of the Strike Committee." Now the ordinary citizens began to show resentment of the strikers' dictatorial control. They formed a citizens' committee for the protection of public rights, and soon thousands of citizens were acting as volunteer firemen, postal workers and so on.

The strikers in turn were annoyed and began to use violence. They hauled truck drivers from their trucks and beat them. A citizen who displayed the Union Jack was nearly murdered by a mob. The city police, in sympathy with the strikers, did nothing to maintain order. And the Mounted Police, still not asked to help, could only continue to guard Dominion government property and protect volunteer postal workers.

On June 9 the city authorities, realizing that they could not rely on the city police, dismissed them. Two thousand volunteers immediately took their places. The next day a young returned army sergeant, winner of the Victoria Cross, was on volunteer police duty. When strikers began

to tie up traffic, he protested. They dragged him from his horse, then kicked him and jumped on him repeatedly. By the time onlookers rescued him his ribs were broken, his chest crushed, and one arm dangled helpless. Indignation swept the whole country, and the federal government passed a law providing for the arrest and possible deportation of persons trying to overthrow the government by force.

Meanwhile the Mounted Police had been investigating the true intentions of the strike leaders. They found evidence that instead of merely leading a legal labour movement, some of them were planning a revolution. Warrants were issued for the arrest of the leaders of the seditious conspiracy, and other warrants were issued to allow the Mounted Police to search their homes and offices for incriminating papers. At two o'clock on the morning of June 18 small squads of Mounted Police visited the bedsides of certain strike leaders, arrested them, and took them to Stony Mountain Penitentiary. Other squads gathered truckloads of incriminating documents from the prisoners' houses and the Labour Temple.

The arrest of these leaders prevented the revolutionary movement from developing further, but there was continuous danger of outbreaks by disgruntled strikers who still thronged the streets. In an effort to prevent possible violence, Winnipeg's Mayor Charles Gray temporarily forbade parades. The strikers planned one anyway, for the afternoon of Saturday, June 21. By noon of that day the heart of the city was crowded with tens of thousands of milling strikers, many of them armed.

At last the mayor appealed to the federal government for help. The government ordered the Mounted Police to prevent the parade that would obviously lead to bloodshed, and to restore order, using as little force as possible.

About fifty scarlet-tunicked mounted men trotted out of barracks after Inspectors W.C. Proby and F.I. Mead. Behind them came thirty-six others in motor trucks. A reserve of Mounted Police and a large contingent of militia remained on call, but neither was used. As the police neared Portage Avenue and Main Street, strikers crowding the streets and standing on roof-tops showered them with tin cans, bottles and bricks, stunning some of them. Then they closed in, jabbing the horses' flanks with pocket knives and broken glass, so that the riders were nearly thrown from the tortured animals. The police only parried the blows until Inspector Proby blew his whistle. Then they charged through the crowd, wheeled about and charged again, after which they once more merely parried blows according to their previous instructions to keep the use of force to a minimum.

Strikers carrying hidden revolvers now began to fire at the police.

Others beat them with sticks and rocks and tried to pull them from their horses. Men on roofs hurled down great chunks of cement. One striker hit Proby from behind, and a second aimed a revolver at him. A corporal probably saved his life by felling the second striker just as he prepared to pull the trigger. Then part of the mob turned on a stalled streetcar, rocking it and trying to upset it and the motorman along with it. Others produced papers and sticks and set it on fire. As Proby ordered his men forward the strikers managed to tear a piece from the side of the streetcar. They hurled it among the police horses and three fell.

"Kill the bloody yellow legs!" the mob shrieked and closed in.

"Draw pistols!" Proby ordered at last.

A first warning volley into the air had no effect. A striker dragged a constable from his horse and clubbed him. Several other policemen were likewise disabled. Mead's horse fell, throwing him, but he regained the saddle before the strikers got him. A corporal, struck on the head with a piece of steel and blinded by blood, escaped by holding the mob at bay with a drawn revolver while he felt his way along a wall until he reached a doorway.

By this time nearly every policeman was wounded. Now, still maintaining strict discipline, the battered police fired at the rioters in self-defence, aiming only to wound. Several men were wounded. One was killed. That was enough. The other strikers backed away.

Gradually the mob dispersed and the Mounted Police returned to barracks. Less than one hundred well-disciplined police had restored order in opposition to thousands of rioters, many of them armed. And the police had used their own weapons only as a last resort in self-defence.

Before Inspector Mead left the scene he called at an undertaking parlour to inquire after a wounded constable carried there for safety. In the room where the constable rested lay a body covered with a Union Jack. By strange coincidence it was that of Major-General Sir Samuel B. Steele (knighted for service in the First World War). The stalwart Old Original had been brought back for burial to the place where, some forty-five years earlier, he had begun his illustrious police career.

A few days after the Winnipeg riot, the general strike in that city was called off, and sympathetic strikes in other Canadian cities were cancelled simultaneously. The revolutionaries' plans to overthrow the Canadian government had been defeated.

The revolutionaries themselves were later tried in court on charges of seditious conspiracy. They made an incongruous outcry against such infringement of their civil liberties.

"Appeal is made by these men to British fair play," Commissioner

Perry remarked, "to protect them in their efforts to destroy British fair play."

The charges of seditious conspiracy were proved, thanks largely to the work of the plainclothes Mounted Policemen who had been checking the movements of aliens ever since the outbreak of war in 1914. When some of these aliens had threatened to turn legal labour organizations into tools of their revolutionary movement, young Constable F.W. Zaneth had managed to get himself hired incognito as secretary to the Industrial Workers of the World. From that vantage point he could see exactly what went on. Zaneth's testimony regarding the subversive principles advocated by the revolutionary conspirators helped to convict them, and they were sent to jail for terms varying from six months to two years.

Most of the western press spoke proudly of the Mounted Police, but the western labour press labelled them "strikebreakers." Yet they had only acted on government orders to prevent a forbidden parade and had gathered evidence against certain men, not because they were labour leaders but because they were plotting to overthrow the government, by force if necessary.

The Canadian government knew how vital a part the Mounted Police had played in averting a tragedy. Later that year it decided to enlarge the scope of the Force to include all federal police work in the whole Dominion. In November, 1919, an Act of Parliament made this possible. The Royal North-West Mounted Police would soon become the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.
