Dear Mr. Shears:-

I have not had an opportunity of writing you since returning to Ottawa, and there are many things that I realize require attention. I have, however, been up to my ears in work, with particular reference to arranging a memorandum to be considered by a Special Committee of the Cabinet relating to your office and its future policy.

I was supposed to go to New York last week-end, but postponed the trip in order to be here for the meeting with the Cabinet, which was to be held early this week. Events have intervened, and the meeting has been postponed from day to day, but I am hopeful that it may be held Friday morning. In any event, I leave Friday evening for New York, but expect to be back Sunday or Monday noon. I do not know what will come of the New York trip, but Dr. Coleman is insistent that I remain in Ottawa.

I have not forgotten either the Nanaimo Shipyards or the Royston Lumber Company deals, but the latter will have to await the Cabinet meeting before I can get a decision, and you might tell Mr. Wray this. As regards the Nanaimo Shipyards, I have made several attempts to see Admiral Stevens, who is handling the matter here, and I may possibly see him Friday, but more likely early next week. I can assure you that I am not allowing these matters to drag. You might tell Mr. Coffey that I have not forgotten him, and will drop him a line as soon as I return from New York.

I know that you are up to your ears in work, but I hope that your sense of humour is holding out, and that your good wife is keeping you well fed.

Mercia and I both send our personal regards to yourself, your wife and the staff.

Dear Mr. Shears: -

I have received some correspondence from your Department during the past week and have answered some of the letters, and expect to be able to deal with them all today or tomorrow. But, in order that you may know that I have not forgotten my promise to press for a definite determination of policy here, I think it is advisable to review events since my arrival, but would request that this letter remain on your personal file and its contents be considered as confidential by you for the present.

Upon my arrival in Ottawa, on December 30th, I discussed, in a general way, the Vancouver office, with Dr. Coleman, and presented my report to him for the Custodian. I advised that I was proceeding to New York the following weekend to discuss my registion them. York the following weekend to discuss my position there, but he stated that a special committee of the Cabinet was anxious to have me attend the meeting to discuss the general Vancouver situation, and requested that I defer my trip south. It was anticipated that the meeting would be held possibly on Monday, the 4th instant, but owing to unforeseen events, it could not be arranged until yesterday, and was held at 2.30 p.m. in the office of the Honourable T. A. Crerar.

In anticipation of the meeting, and in an attempt to get my position clarified in New York, I went to New York Thursday night, returning here Monday morning at 11.15. For your information, the situation in New York has not yet been clarified, but I am hoping to have a definite decision by the end of this week.

I attended the special meeting of the committee of the Cabinet in the afternoon, and the decisions of the committee as to policy are far better than I had hoped to obtain, but since they necessitate certain amendments to existing Orders-in-Council, and these amendments cannot be passed until Thursday, I am not in a position to discuss the entire picture at this time, since I do not believe in counting our chickens before they are hatched, but I will write you immediately the Order-in-Council is dealt with. Incidentally, the amending Order-in-Council is being drafted by myself, and will be approved by Dr. Coleman.

Since some of these matters will require careful consideration by you, and are going to upset your organization, one of them I think should be mentioned here, although it will be subject to the approval of the Order-in-Council, and that is that the Soldier Settlement of Canada will withdraw from the farm picture entirely. This, of course, is extremely confidential, but I think you should know that Mr. Murchison has agreed to our taking Mr. McKay into our organization to handle the farm problems. I appreciate that this will require considerable diplomacy in so far as Mr. Richardson is concerned, but I would suggest that it can be dealt with along the line that we will require a farm expert in view of the withdrawal of the Soldier Settlement, whose advice will no longer be available. Mr.Richardson could either work with Mr. McKay, dealing in particular with the chattels involved, co-operating in this regard with Mr. Green. You might turn this problem over in your mind, but in the meantime, continue to have leases prepared and approved by Mr. Barnet, until you are officially advised of the change. Mr. McKay's salary will be set by the Deputy Custodian here, since it will have to take into consideration the remuneration he is now receiving.

You will recall that we had many discussions as to the interpretation of the words "management and control," with particular reference as to the Custodian's power to liquidate, and it is intended to definitely give this power by amending Order-in-Council. In anticipation of this amendment being approved, I wired P.S. Ross and Sons and yourself about the Royston Lumber Company Limited, and Mr. Wray may be instructed to proceed with the sale of the Deep Bay Logging Company Limited, if Mr. Stewart has not already arranged it. The necessary orders, of course, will have to be prepared and signed.

As regards the radios and cameras, this is a matter separate and distinct from the other problems discussed, and may be made known to the staff, and the policy carried out.

In so far as the Press are concerned, if they should hear of it, I would suggest that the only thing to tell them is that radios and cameras are not being released to Japanese residing in the Province of British Columbia. I am writing you a separate letter dealing with these articles, so that you may put it on the proper file.

I am also writing you about the fishing vessels and the disbursements incidental to their administration, and that letter speaks for itself.

As regards the disposition of chattels, this matter was considered, and I believe a policy of liquidation will be adopted, but the method of carrying out the liquidation is being considered by Dr. Coleman and Mr. MacNamara, the Deputy Minister of Labour, and I will advise you when they have reached a decision. In the meantime, the present policy regarding chattels should be continued. I am also writing you a letter dealing with the policy of insurance now being followed, this policy having been approved.

I had a meeting with Admiral Stevens this morning concerning the Nanaimo Shipyards, and I am writing a letter dealing with this situation, one copy being

Dear Mr. Commissioner:

During the course of my testimony this morning I was requested by Mr. Locke, K.C., to produce correspondence which I referred to. I have been successful this afternoon in locating the correspondence and I am enclosing ribbon copies made from the Custodian's file and wish to hand them to you direct, assuming that this is the proper course to follow. I regret that I have been called East and have arranged to leave tonight, otherwise I would be pleased to deliver these letters personally.

I would appreciate your indulgence to point out that in the course of my testimony this morning I was speaking entirely from memory on a matter which happened in May last, since which time I have been involved in considerable detail relating to Japanese. I, therefore, do not find it strange the original report on my investigation was sent to Colonel Hill and a copy to Major Taylor, which is just the reverse of my testimony this morning. The correspondence, I believe, explains the reason for this.

I note that my report does not refer specifically to \$20.00 but I must have picked this information up, possibly from Mr. Thornton, and incorrectly attributed it to Mrs. Hosaki. You will also note that this letter refers to two additional matters concerning which I am, of course, unable to testify.

As stated in the last paragraph of my letter of May 2nd, copy of which is enclosed, I have no personal knowledge as to the truth of any of the statements made but I do feel that in fairness to the two Japanese referred to, in case there is anything in the charges, that their names should be treated in confidence and I would respectfully request this, particularly if Mr. Morii is present and if the letter is read into the records.

Re: Mr. Morii

As you have no doubt been advised by members of the B.C. Security Commission, certain rumours relating to the above party were brought to my attention by a Mr. Thornton, who states that he was pre-viously attached to the Japanese Consulate. I advised the Commissioners of these remours and arranged an interview with the Chairman of the Commission for Mr. Thornton. Mr. Thornton repeated the rumours to the Chairman and, after considerable discussion, the Chairman advised that Mr. Morii was not working for the B.C. Security Commission and I am not informed as to whether or not he is working for your detachment. In any event, in view of the liaison existing between this office and your office both here and in Ottawa, and on the suggestion of Ass't Commissioner Mead, · I feel that the rumours should be brought to your attention, for such action as you may desire.

As to the bona fide of Mr. Thornton, he made several statements which were fairly easy to verify to my satisfaction. He stated he had supplied certain information to the Naval Intelligence in Ottawa and he produced for my examination a business card of Mr. Norman Senior the then Secretary to the Minister of National Defence, which card contained an introduction for Mr. Thernton to Commander Nelles in Ottawa. He also made a statement that a census had been made of persons of the Japanese race residing here on the instigation of the Japanese Consulate prior to the outbreak of war and he had extracted a form from the Japanese Consulate file and forwarded it to Naval Intelligence in Ottawa. He produced for my examination a copy of a form which appears to substantiate this statement.

Being satisfied as to the bona fide of these statements of Mr. Thornton and in view of the fact that I do not wish to be classed with rumour mongers in these difficult times, and particularly in view of the serious nature of the rumours, I conside ed it advisable to obtain some confirmation of Mr. Thornton's statements before bringing the matter to your attention.

Statements made by Mr. Thornton were to the effect that a certain Japanese lady, as a result of representations made to her and in view of the fact that her husband was held in the Immigration Shed, placed some money in a box of chocolates and delivered the chocolates to the above party's home, and that subsequently herehusband was released. The statement was made at the interview with the Chairman of the B.C. Security Commission that the party referred to, namely, Mr. Shokichi Hosaki, had a tumour on the brain, had been found insane and had been removed to an institution. Subsequent to the meeting I ascertained that this was not according to the fact and that this party and his wife were not only residing in the City of Vancouver but were in the process of packing their personal effects to go to the sugar beet area, leaving Vancouver, according to their statements, on Sunday, April 26th.

I arranged an interview with Shokichi Hosaki and Mrs. Hosaki on Saturday April 25th. The interview was conducted in the office of Mr. Frederick Field, Chartered Accountant, and there were present Mr. and Mrs. Hosaki, Mr. Thornton, Mr. Frederick Field, Miss Fox of the Custodian's staff, a Ja anese lady as interpreter, whose name is unimportant, and myself.

Mr. Hosaki produced his police registration card Number 06636, a receipt from the Immigration authorities for \$10.50, and a statement which indicates that he was detained on February 20th at 5 P.M. and released on March 4th at 1:30 P.M. The \$10.50 paid to the Immigration authorities appear to cover meals and his detention had nothing to do with the B.C. Security Commission or the police departments.

Mrs. Hosaki stated she did not know why her husband was picked up but she was greatly disturbed and a friend, whose name she would not give, told her to get in touch with Mr. Morii who would no doubt assist her. She admitted she purchased a two pund box of chocolates at a corner store operated by a relative, whose name she would not give, and that she did put some money in the box, the amount of which should would not state, and that she did take the chocolates and the money to Mr. Morrii's place on Cordova Street. She stated that when she arrived there Mr. Morii was out but that the erewas a man there and she gave the box to him for Mr. Morii and subsequently her husband was released. I have discussed this matter with Mr. Taylor of the immigration Department and, of course, relaize that the release had no connection whatever with the gift to Mr. Morii, if any such gift were made.

Another matter which I feel should be brought to your attention since it deals with the above party, is information given to me by Mr. Wright, M nager of the Sun Life Assurance Company, whom I assume is a well-known and reputable citizen of this city. Mr. Wright came to my office yesterday morning to turn over to the Custodian a cheque for a Mr. Kobayashi, a former agent of the Sun Life in this city. His reason for coming was because he believed this party had been interned. On checking the records I found this man was not so and he was surprised since Mr. Kobayashi had told him personally that he was going up to the R.C.M.P. to ask that he be interned. I considered this a strange request by a Japanese and asked Mr. Wright to clarify the statement. Mr. Wright stated that this party was their best salesman among the Ja anese and that he had absolute confidence in him and he did excellent work in the recent Victory Loan campaign. Mr. Wright stated that Mr. Kobayashi advised him that he was not prepared to deal with Mr. Morii as to the terms of his evacuation or prepared to make any arrangement for deferrment and that he felt so insulted over the fact that Mr. Morii appeared to have some control over the evacuation that he would sooner be interned than come under his control. He left Mr. Wright's office with the intention of applying for internment but appears to have been evacuated rather than interned so the cheque was not accepted by this office.

Mr. Wright stated that Mr. Kobayashi advised him that Mr. Morii had collected a considerable sum f money for obtai ing deferments for Japanese. Mr. Wright further stat d that he would be prepared to make this statement at any time to the chairman of the B.C. Security Commission. However, since Mr. Morii is not working for that Commission it appears to be a matter more directly concerning your department.

Mr. Frederick Field, Chartered Accountant, advised me some time ago that Mrs. Nagata, the wife of an internee, came to see him with a story about Mr. Morii demanding \$300.00 from her for some organizational work. He advised me that his advice to her was to tell Mr. Morii to come and see him. Mr. Morii did not come.

This information is given to you as information received by the Custodian's office. Neither myself nor anyone in this office has any personal knowledge as to the truth of the statements made but since there seems to be some connection between Mr. Morii and your department, I thought that the information should be given to

C. Dear Major Taylor: I have your letter of April 23rd. It appears from same that there is a slight misunderstanding as to the nature of my remarks at the Advisory Board meeting yesterday. In the past I have found that any controversial matter as between this organization and your Commission has been settled on the spot by direct discussion with you and I would not introduce at any Advisory Board meeting, particularly in view of my position as an exofficio member of it, any controversial matter, but since the matter referred to was introduced by a prominent member of that board and since, representing a Covernment department. I had received centain information representing a Government department, I had received certain information, I felt it was my duty to disclose the information to the Board at the time the discussion was taking place. I regret if my remarks were interpreted as a personal insinuation against the party referred to but the information given to me was of such a serious nature that I felt it should either be disproved or established as fact. You will appreciate that the Custodian's organization cannot conduct, and in fact is not the proper organization to conduct, an investigation into rumours of this kind but I did state that I was endeavouring to obtain affidavit evidence and would make same available to the proper parties if and when obtained. One of the parties who has given me certain information concerning the individual referred to has expressed the desire to meet you personally and he will be in my office in a half hour. I realize that your time is fully occupied but, in order that the matter may be placed on a proper footing, I would respectfully suggest that you grant my informant an interview as soon as possible and I, personally, if you so desire, will be prepared to attend with him. In order that no time may be lost in tracking down these rumours, I am having this letter delivered to you by hand and would appreciate a telephone call as soon as possible as to whether or not you would desire to meet my informant whose name I do not desire to mention in writing since I have not his permission to do so. Dear Corbet:

I am enclosing this personal note in my letter to you about Mr. Noble. The situation, to be quite frank, has worried me considerably. Mr. Noble's work appears to be in order; the only disquieting feature is the information which your associated company gave you about his integrity. As I recall, the conviction was mentioned.

I have discussed the matter with Mr. Banfield, Mr. Field, Mr. Noble and Mr. Noble's lawyer, and I have obtained a copy of the Court Judgment certified by the official Court Stenographer. I am enclosing a copy of this Judgment.

Mr. Noble is completely broken up over the whole affair and while I have tried to see him today, I am advised that he had a slight heart attack and is at home.

I do not know whether or not a great injustice has been done but I have not been able to get him to state whether or not he wishes to proceed with the bond application since he does not wish to run the risk of having it refused and I can understand this. He feels that the company have indicated what their decision will be and will not look favourably on the application at this time regardless of any evidence put before it.

The lawyer knows, from his talk with Mr. Banfield, that no real enquiry was made and that is the reason I am writing you this personal letter. If it is a fact that the company has not made a proper enquiry and that the facts are not as given to you, then I think your associated company may have done the man an injustice,

but I realize that the company is at liberty to accept or refuse any business at its discretion without disclosing the reason. I do feel, however, that since this is a matter which concerns yourself and this office directly, and since a man's monouris involved, the bonding company without having a formal application filed, should make all the enquiries it would make if the application were filed and then unofficially let me know whether or not the bond would be granted. After reading over the Court Judgment, a copy of which I am enclosing, I must say that I am greatly disturbed and I know that you would not want this man's reputation to be ruined simply because the bonding company has expressed an opinion on other than a thorough investigation and would not be prepared to alter this decision on a formal application.

I trust you will consider this letter as purely personal as between us and not written in any critical sense about the company itself. I would appreciate it if you would write me personally about this matter as soon as possible.

Mercia and I send our regards and thank you for your note. In due course we will accept your kind invitation to visit in Toronto.

that Mr Castillou read from the Inspector of - from Mr
DeBeck, the superintendent of Brokers, I will suspend sentence.

Now, the next thing is with regard to the individual directors: there is some point there.

MR CAMERON. I am appearing for Mr Noble in that respect.

THE COURT. You don't want any penalty imposed upon him, I suppose?

MR CAMERON. No, I don't see how it would be justice, in view of the fact that he was advised by the Solicitor for the Company that what he did was correct, and he was merely acting in the capacity of Secretary in executing that duty. Forthermore, this letter that was sent to the Superintendent of Brokers was sent by the Company's solicitor himself and it was drafted by him. We had nothing to do with that, as far as we knew we were advised by Mr Kennedy, our solicitor, that everything was in order. After all, if the layman cannot depend upon his solicitor's advice....

THE COURT...You think Mr Kennedy should suffer?

MR CAMERON. No, I don't think he should suffer if it was a

question of a mistake in law, I don't think Mr Kennedy should suffer either, but I am not appearing directly on behalf of Mr Kennedy, I am appearing for Mr Noble.

THE COURT. You say it was Mr Kennedy's fault, otherwise your man would not have done it?

MR CAMERON. My man was merely a cog in the machine and he acts in accordance with the instructions given to him by his solicitor.

THE COURT. Yes. What do you say about that, Mr Castillou; is that correct?

MR CASTILLOU. I have nothing further to say.

THE COURT. If that situation is correct how can I do other than follow Mr DeBeck's suggestion, with regard to Mr Noble, he is as innocent as the company. I will suspend sentence.

An old client of ours, Mr. A. J. Noble, who is employed in your accounting department, has consulted us with regard to a bond which was applied for on his behalf to the Norwich Union Insurance Company. He has been advised the application was subsequently withdrawn, he was led to believe that this was done because of his association with a group of mining companys.

Proceedings were started by the Attorney General's Department under the Securities Act against the Highland Surprise Gold Mines Limited, for an infraction of the said Act.

I attended the trial on behalf of the minority group of share-holders, who had been extremely active in having the prosecution brought about.

Mr. Noble was a leading member of this minority group. At the trial, the Highland Surprise Company was convicted of an infraction of the Securities Act, but sentence was suspended. At the time the prosecution requested permission from the trial magistrate to proceed against the directors individually. This the Magistrate refused to do, and stated that while the company had been guilty of a technical infraction of the Act, this was merely because they had been improperly advised by the Company's Solicitor.

For these reasons, no blame whatever can be attached to Mr. Noble as a director of this company. It seems to me that it is a grave injustice to him that his application for bond should have been refused.

In view of this fact, it is respectfully submitted that a further application for bond should be launched at once.

We have not replaced Mr. Noble up to the present time and there have been several developments lately.

I received a long letter from his lawyer outlining the situation as regards the conviction of the Gold Mining Company and I talked to the lawyer for about half an hour regarding this case and Mr. Noble personally. The lawyer had nothing but praise for Mr. Noble in the whole matter and advised that the conviction was against the company for an infringement of the Securities Act. The Megistrate refused to permit the Directors to be prosecuted on the grounds that they had taken legal advice from a Mr. Kennedy who, unfortunately for the company, had advised them wrongly.

f then called on Mr. Banfield and asked him whether or not your company had made elaborate investigations. He advised me that he thought the only report they had acted on was the report of the Retail Credit Association here, but if an application were filed a complete investigation would be made, possibly resulting in an examination of the Court Papers, etc.

Acting on this information I spoke to Mr. Field who was with me when I saw Mr. Banfield and Mr. Field took this up with the Retail Credit Association, who are friends of his, and they told him that it was on this investigation that they based their report and that in view of the situation they were going to have the Court Papers examined and discuss the case further with the Attorney General.

I then discussed the matter with Mr. Noble and told him it was up to him whether or not he wished this office to proceed with the application and he must take the consequences if a bond were refused.

The consequence of the application to be made.

I do not wish you to think that I am asking any spacial consideration but rather that I think this whole matter should be considered strictly on its merits regardless of the connection of your office with this case. So far as we know Mr. Noble's work has been entirely satisfactory and it will be practically impossible to replace him at the present time, but this should not enter into the consideration of whether or not a bond should be granted. I do not feel we should let Mr. Noble go if he wishes an application filed without filing the application and if a bond is refused we will let him go but if a bond is granted I will feel justified in keeping him. We feel it is up to the bonding company to make the decision as to his integrity.

About a month ago I was handed a letter from Mr. Milsom with regard to taking the inventory of Kuba's stock situated at 703 No. 1 Road, Steveston. On arrival at the Custodian's office in Steveston I called to see Mr. Robinson and found he was not there and, in turn, I handed the letter to Mr. Sterling who, after a short conversation, stated that Mr. Robinson wasn't there, but in view of the fact that I had a letter from Mr. Milsom he would take me down to Kuba's store and turn the key over to me.

On arrival at Kuba's store Mr. Sterling stated there were people living in the back section of the store but he had a key for the door leading in from the back into the store. He unlocked the door and made mention there was no sense of him being there at that particular time and that he would leave me to take the stock. I mentioned at that time my intentions were to make an appraisal and to check all the chattels which now remained on the premises. Mr. Sterling said "is it necessary for you to check the chattels as well" and I stated it was. After looking around upstairs at furniture, etc., I asked him where the sixteen parcels of personal belongings were and his answer to that question was very vague and as though he did not feel inclined to offer any suggestion as to where they were, and I just let it go at that.

Mr. Sterling mentioned before leaving that should I be there later than five o'clock, to turn the key over to Mr. Robinson, who lived at the back or in one of the other houses of the Custodian's office.

About 7:30 that night I was still taking the inventory there and I noticed many discrepancies in the stock and I made a notation of one particular item of a chime clock which was inventoried at \$15.00, and so I mentioned it to Mr. Robinson on meeting him this same evening. At the time I said there were many discrepancies in the stock and one particular item amounting to \$15.00 I failed to find on the premises. He stated that the chime clock was taken from Kuba's store and they now had it in their office, and then I mentioned to him that I would include that in my inventory.

In winding up the sale of Kuba's store I sold the balance of the stock to another party, who is now renting the building, and Mr. Robinson was called in to check off my inventory of the chattels which were not included in my original purchase of the stock. I had Mr. Robinson check off the entire chattels, of which I had a list, and which they have a list of here in this office, to protect myself after I left the premises. Mr. Robinson was good enough to check them all off and found them to be there. I then asked Mr. Robinson to return to me the chime clock which he had in the office and which belonged to the Kuba stock. In turn Mr. Robinson made a statement, in front of a truck driver whom they have hauling the different chattels, that the clock which he mentioned to me that he had taken out of Kuba's store he now finds from Mr. Sterling did not belong to Kuba's stock and was taken over to the Custodian's office by a Mr. Green who is affiliated with the sale of Red Cross goods out there, and who, incidentally, lived next door to Kuba's. I thought it rather strange that at that late hour Mr. Robinson should mention to me that the clock did not belong to Kuba's stock.

During this time I had a further letter from Mr. Milsom asking me to go to Steveston and make an inventory of the stock of Omiya's store owned by Kitagawa. I arrived in Steveston Friday noon and found that Mr. Robinson was in Vancouver, and Mr. Sterling's statement to me was that he would finish his business in Vancouver and he would not be back in Steveston until Monday morning, and that I would not be able to get the key for Omiya's store until Monday morning. I considered it strange at that time that Mr. Sterling would tell me I would have to wait until Monday morning to get the key when it was there on the premises, seeing that he was good enough to give me the key to Kuba's store previous to this, so I dismissed it from my mind.

The following Sunday I drove out to Steveston prior to winding up the complete sale, to take from Kuba's stock, which I then owned, certain articles which I needed for my own personal use. On arriving in Steveston I drove up at the rear of Kuba's store, which is right alongside of Omiya's store, and in getting out of the car I noticed the only entracce to Omiya's store, which was a door, was wide open, and I asked the young lad

who was nearby who was in there and he said Mr. Robinson was there with two other men. I thought it very strange that Mr. Robinson would be out there Sunday when I understood from Mr. Sterling that he would not be back until Monday morning, and so I waited in the car for an hour before they left the store. Mr. Robinson walked alongside of my car but apparently didn't notice me and left with the two other men.

At 7:30 the same evening I was leaving Steveston and I noticed Mr. Robinson with several other men across the street in a discussion so I made it my own business to stay around Steveston for a little while as I felt in my own mind that Omiya's store might be broken into. At the time I noticed Mr. Robinson he was with Mr. Enright, a policeman appointed by yourselves to protect your property out there. I drove past the Custodian's office at nine o'clock and again at ten o'clock and noticed Mr. Robinson looking out the front window of the Custodian's office. I thought this was rather strange as his own living quarters were in the extreme rear and not in any part of the office. At eleven o'clock that evening I noticed Mr. Enright, the policeman, with two other men who appeared to be in Air Force uniform. Near twelve o'clock that night I walked down towards the tram as I noticed someone watching me, and made as though I was getting aboard the tram. The tram went out and I was behind a pole out of sight. Mr. Enright had taken the two men down towards Omiya's store and when the tram went out he finished his discussion and the two men walked down towards the store and went into the lane. I came out from behind the pole and started to walk towards Omiya's store and one of the Airforce men looked out to see whether everything was clear and they saw me walking up. He called the other fellow and they both walked up the street. I felt then that they thought I was watching them. They walked up the street and down again and went in the side of the policeman's place, found he wasn't there and walked down the street again. I left them for a little while and walked past the Custodian's office and found Mr. Robinson still looking out the window, with the lights on, and he was there until five minutes to one. At that time I had to get the tram back to Vancouver as it was the last tram.

The following week I went out to Steveston again and had difficulty in finding Mr. Robinson and he was carrying the keys for Omiya's store in his pocket. I had to wait for him until four o'clock in the afternoon to come back to get into Omiya's store. He explained to me then that the store had been broken into by several boys and the police had caught them and so on, and that he wanted me to know that before I went in to take the stock. After we had finished the discussion we went into the Omiya store with my intention of starting to take the stock. My suspicions were further aroused on entering the store when I found several cartons packed with merchandise from the store. It didn't look to me as though the stock was placed there by the Japanese as all the other stock was on the shelves, and particularly when the assortment of merchandise in the cartons was of a mixture of everything that was there, such as Standfield's underwear, men's shirts, ladies' wear and so on, and it looked very much to me as if those cartons were packed ready to be taken out by somebody. Mr. Robinson mentioned to me while in the store that several of the cannery people had mentioned to him that they would like to buy certain chattels in the store and he felt that it might be a good thing to sell them what they wanted. He stated that he had never taken them into the store even though they had asked him, and so on leaving Omiya's store that evening at 7:30 I asked Mr. Robinson who the two men were he had in Omiya's store on Sunday afternoon. A little flustered he stated that "that man I had in there was from the cannery", so I left the store that night with the thought in mind that I wasn't very interested in taking inventory of the stock out there unless I had somebody else with me to verify the stock which I would take, and also that this other party and I would live on the premises for a week to ten days until the stock was completely taken. This thought was conveyed to Mr. Milsom and the stock later offered for tender without the inventory being taken.

He was elected to the House of Commons in 1940, was elected Member of the Privy Council and has held the Posts of Minister of National Revenue and Minister of National Defence for Air.

He married Ethel Louise Roper and has one child.

His societies are represented by the letters A.F. & A.M., I.O.O.F., AND L.O.L.A.

He is now a member of the United Church of Canada.
