I have your letter of February 15th,
and wish to thank you for the sentiments expressed.

My resolution came up for discussion
in Parliament on Thursday, February 20th. The
debate on it is not yet finished. I will try to
get you a copy of Hansard for that date, and should
there be any further discussion I will try to get
you the record also.

You can understand my reason for
moving the resolution in the terms in which I did.
You will also note that the Prime Minister suggested
that the matter of Oriental franchise could be dis-
cussed in the committee that is to be appointed
during the present Session.

I have advised Professor Angus of the
University of B.C., and also Mr. Iwashita of this
statement by the Prime Minister, and suggested to
them that it might be advisable to have representa-
tives appear here on behalf of the Orientals in
British Columbia. I feel satisfied that the resolu-
tion can only be productive of good results.


