A MESSAGE TO ORGANIZATIONS INTERESTED IN THE HOUSING PROBLEM

Enclosed is a memorandum sent yesterday to B.C. MLA's prepared by the Vancouver Housing Association, entitled "A Housing Program for B.C.". It includes a summary of the newly revised Dominion legislation and figures showing the costs of bad housing, as well as positive gains from slum clearance and rehousing.

We have stressed the point that an adequate housing program requires three approaches: (a) home ownership; (b) rental housing; and (c) slum clearance; and that the greatest present need is for low rental housing, which is still not receiving the attention it demands. X

Since the Provincial Housing Bill will be introduced shortly, we urge that organizations which have not already done so, should make known their recommendations to the government along these lines as soon as possible.
