

Dear Mr. Bunt.

I have received your letter with much thanks. We are all glad that the fighting has ceased, but we must prepare to face other difficulties.

It was said that approximately 50% of 1100 persons of our people who have resettled in this province since 1942 is believed to have requested repatriation to Japan after the war. Most of the people residing here now are doing well and getting along smoothly with their neighbours.

I have been told that the policy of the government of this province will to take into this province a 1000 more

Japanese.

We will always remember the sympathies extended to our people by the United Church, who has done for us much in our difficult time since the outbreak of the war.


In the matter of the conference, I do not think a meeting at this time will of much advantage on account of the unsettled condition of the Japanese people, regarding repatriation etc. and definite plans could not be drawn out. Also, in view of the fact Mr. Shimizu has just recently moved with his family to the East, I would think it will be difficult for him to attend a meeting in B.C. this fall. Therefore, I propose that the conference of the workers be postponed until sometime next year when a more suitable plan can be discussed and formed.

If possible, I am planning to visit our people in remaining in B.C. this fall, so if you have any suggestions I

shall be glad to receive them.

January 26th 1943 UPERINTENDENT Rev. Y. Akagawa, Morris, Man. Dear Mr. Akagawa, I am very pleased to be able to send you the enclosed cheque for \$100.00, which is a cost of living bonus for 1942. You are very much in my mind during this cold weather, and I am wondering how you and Mrs. Akagawa are keeping. We are having the coldest weather in Vancouver in over thirty years, and the fuel shortage is creating some very serious problems. Schools are all closed and on Sunday quite a number of the churches held no services on account of insufficient fuel. It is a little milder today, and I am hoping that the worst of the weather is over. On my way through to the Board meeting near the end of March, I am thinking of making a break in the journey at Winnipeg and of coming out to Morris just to pay a friendly visit to Mrs. Akagawa and yourself. As the time approaches and I know the exact date, I will drop you a line, so that you may know when to expect me. I am wondering if you received a photograph which I sent you just before Christmas as a token of my goodwill and to convey the Season's Greetings. COPY TO MR.BUNT Rev. J.A. Cormie, D.D., 441 Somerset Bldg., Winnipeg, Man. Re Mr. Akagawa Dear Dr. Cormie: I have your letter of February 4th. Regarding Mr. Akagawa's travelling expenses, on checking up the account, I findthat the travel grant was not drawn for the first half of the year, while he was in British Columbia. We did pay \$25 in November, so he is still entitled to \$25 for the first half year, and another \$25 for the last six months. I am enclosing a cheque for \$50. Re the bonus, this was sent in error to Mr. Bunt. He reported on salaries received by all the Japanese missionaries from their fields, and we sent cheques accordingly, but the one for Mr. Akagawa should have gone to you. Dear Mr. Akagawa,

Just a line to acknowledge your letter of August 22nd, and to assure you that I shall always be very much interested in your work, even although for the time being you are working under another Superintendent of Missions. I am sure you will find Dr. Cormie a very good friend and a splendid Superintendent. He is now the senior Superintendent of all those in our Church. I am interested in knowing some of the things you have written about your field, and there is no doubt that it is a large one. However, as I recall the way in which you got around in the Fraser Valley, I know that you will not be wanting in diligence in the matter of seeking out and visiting your people in Manitoba. I can well understand that when the roads are bad you will not be able to get around and particularly if they are what we call "gumbo" which is a kind of Bud over which it is absolutely impossible to drive. Your people will welcome, I know, the visits of Mrs. Akagawa and yourself in their homes and the Bible Study and Prayer Meetings, which you will held with them. I do not think there is much more that you can do under the circumstances.

I have written Dr. Dorey about the matter of travel on the field allowance for you mrn who are using your cars, and I suggested that he should ask Dr. Cormie to make a recommendation in your case, because I know nothing of the field as you have to cover it. If you happen to be talking with Dr. Cormie soon, you might tell him what I have suggested. You and he together would be able to estimate the amount of travel you will be able to do over the twelve months period, and then he can send in a recommendation on that basis.



Until the end of December, I am sending in your requisition from here, but when the new year begins, Dr. Cormie will be taking care of that, or whoever your Home Mission Convener may be.

Dear Mr. Bunt, I have in hand your letter of June 26th which I m was very pleased to receive. Dr. and Mrs. Cormie visited us at our new home in RINTENDENT Morris, soon after their return to Winnipeg, from their holidays. Since our arrival, two months have already elapsed, during which time we have travelled over 3000 miles in order to contact our people who are scattered around in ahout 52 various villages. These villages are situated in an area of over 100 sq. miles. There are about 200 families, and, totalling about 1050 persons. The nearest family from my home is living about 4 miles in the west, 9 miles in the east, 9 miles in the north, and 14 miles in the south. It is difficult to contact these people very often because of these long distances, and with the strict gas rationing. The roads too, are very muddy on raining days and not in good condition even at its best, as it is now. Therefore in the bad weather travelling maybe almost impossible to these distant villages and, I am afraid I may not be able to carry on work to any great extent as I am able to do now, but I am forever hopeful. At present it is impossible to form or conduct any regular worship meetings, except for bible studies and prayer meetings in individual homes with perhaps two or three families. But there are many problems and difficulties of different natures which gives me much more opportunities to serve them. There are about 30 Christian families, numbering 80 persons in these areas. K, The families with whom I have so far contacted are in good spirits and look healthier than when living in the coastal areas, and they are prepared to face hardships, to share their joys and sorrows as they come, with their neighbours. gements I have received a cheque for \$60.00 from Dr. Dorey on August 1st.. The letter enclosed stated, "I have a request from Mr. Bunt for an advance of \$60.00 for you". Is this amount to cover part of my travelling expenses? Owing to delayed mail services I have not yet received any other mail from the Board of Home Missiom, Disregarding the proximity of the point of mailing, all mail take at least two weeks to arrive, so I presume this is the delay in receiving my cheques for July and August. 



I hope that you will find friendliness in your contacts with our Canadian people and especially with our United Church folk, as you go around amongst your own people in Manitoba.

Those of us who have known you in British Columbia will not forget you, and of course owing to the uncertainty of the present arrangements regarding the Japanese in Canada, it may be that at some future date you will again be working here in British Columbia.

I have had Mr. Shaw and Mr. Cox make a careful inventory of everything that is in the new church at Mission, and a copy of it is being filed here in my office and a copy given to the Home Mission Convener of the Westminster Presbytery. I have done this so that we may take the best care possible of the things which were left in the church. May I say again that I was much impressed by the beauty of that fine little church, as well as of the splendid way in which it was planned, and it is a great tribute to your leadership as well as to the faithful and sacrificial support of the undertaking on the part of your people.

June 9, 1942 Rev. W.P.Bunt, B.A., B.D., Dominion Bank Building. Vancouver. B.C. Dear Mr. Bunt: Your two letters of June 4th are just to hand. I was out of the city over the week end hence the delay in replying. I have just yesterday found a place for Mr. Akagawa Housing is so bad down here that it is impossible to find a place in Winnipeg. As the majority of the Japanese in Manitoba live in the Red River Valley I have chosen Morris as the most suitable location. There is a furnished house in Morris, the only unoccupied house in the place or in the neighborhood, which is available at \$25. a month and I have secured it. It will be available until the fall at least and perhaps for a longer period. By that time, if necessary we will find some other place. Mr. Akagawa will therefore not require to have his furniture shipped in the meantime. There is no difficulty about the roads. I am sorry that I am leaving Winnipeg on Tuesday next and will be away for three or four weeks. I am disappointed that I will not likely be here to help him get established but will leave directions in the office and our minister Rev.D.B. Sparling of Morris will give him every help. He will find Mr. Sparling a very brotherly minister. If he can be here by June 16th I will see him myself but in any event will get in touch with him as soon as possible after my return. If there is any way in which I can help him I hope he will be sure to let me know. Yours very sincerely,

Akagawa to Manitoba, and so I presume that you are fully acquainted with the content of his letter. I have applied to the Security Commission for the necessary. document, enabling Mr. Agakawa to leave for Manitoba, and I presume that he will get away the beginning of next week. I shall direct him to report to you in Winnipeg and await your instructions as to the next step he should take. Hr. Akagawa is the senior of our Japanese Pastors and has been in Canada for over thirty years. For a number of years past he has worked among the agricultural Japanese in the Fraser Valley, and is a very faithful pastor and a great one to get around amongst the people. He seems to carry the confidence and respect of his people to a high degree, and I would say that he is one of our most effective Japanese pastors. He has a car of his own, a Dodge, about a year old, and will be in a position to move amongst his people in Manitoba. They have one daughter, a graduate nurse, but it is not likely that she will be with her parents, so that there will be just Mr. Akagawa and his wife. Dear Mr. Bunt:

I have only this morning received a statement of the location of the Japanese in Manitoba. The number allocated to farmers, mostly in the sugar beet area, is 828 distributed in 47 different localities in three different Presbyteries. The largest group at any point is at Letellier, where there are 74. They run from that all the way down to 2. There are in the Immigration Hall unallocated 87. The total number in this provice to-day is 915 and another 90 or 100 are yet to come. We will have here about 1000 persons.


It is difficult to select the most convenient location for a missionary. I think Morris is the place and I am making inquiry regarding accommodation to-day. In some ways Winnipeg would be a more convenient place but the cost of living is very much greater than Morris. A large number of the Japanese here are in a French settlement living in French homes and the commissioner's representative tells me are attending the Catholic Church if they are Christian.

Will you please let me know the name of the Missionary likely to come to Manitoba and when we might look for him. I understand a change has been made since we talked about Mr. Nomota when we were in Toronto.

When I was at the Presbytery of Superior the other day I learned that there are approximately 450 Japanese working on highway construction and lumber camps in the eastern end of this conference approximately 600 miles east of here and was informed that this summer that number would be increased to informed that this summer that number would be increased to 3000. I have written to the Chairman of the Security Commission 3000. I have written to the Chairman of the Security Commission the matter up with the commission. The district referred to the matter up with the commission. The district referred to lies between Schreiber on the west and White River on the east.
