

We have gone further into the question about which I spoke to you yesterday and I find that it was really unnecessary to have asked you to approach the matter as though it were a new topic. I am sorry.

It is well established practice to pay a new Minister for the day on which he receives the Seals of Office. The late Chancellor of the Exchequer will therefore be paid as Lord Chancellor from and including the 13th instant. Lord Caldecote will draw pension for the 13th and 14th and be paid as Secretary of State for the Dominions on and after the 15th instant on which date he received the Seals of Office.

You agreed that we need not issue the usual instructions about the salary and pension of the two Lord Chancellors until Sir John Simon's title is announced.
