## LIMITED NAVY PACT IN SIGHT

### Franco-Italian Deadlock Not Yet Solved

LONDON, March 19.—Continuance of the deadlock between Italy and France over the question of naval parity bids fair, in the belief of many observers here, to render nugatory much of the work already done at the Five Power Conference, but will not necessarily prevent the achievement of a five-power naval pact, limited in scope, but important to the peace of the world.

END IN TWO WEEKS

If the present situation lasts through Sunday, when Premier Tardieu of France will return to another conference with Premier MacDonald of Great Britain, authoritative quarters see the end of the negotiations within two weeks.

A limited five-power treaty may be the result in that case, and within its scope will be complete agreement among the United States, Great Britain and Japan.

**GOOD AGREEMENT**

That this treaty would be what Mr. MacDonald has called a "good" agreement, fulfilling the expectations of those who have fully realized the difficulties of the five-power negotiations since their inception two months ago, is the belief of the responsible sources from which this information is derived.

The limited five-power treaty would include a five-year battleship holiday for all powers represented here, the limitation of submarine warfare and agreement on important and far-reaching technical problems. The Three-Power Concord would cover all classes of American, British and Japanese warships.

The Franco-Italian problem would be referred to the permanent disarmament commission of the League of Nations and as the next meeting of that body will be held early in the summer, efforts toward its solution would continue almost without interruption upon adjournment of the London conference.

SEATTLE, March 19.—Criminal prosecution will follow the findings of department of justice agents who recently investigated the prohibition enforcement of the Pacific northwest, if the report is substantiated by proof, said Mr. Frank Bell, secretary of Senator C. C. Dill, in Seattle today.

"From what I have heard," Bell said, "if the report should be made public, it will rock the entire northwest."

The secretary declared there was an unusual interest being taken in the department of justice investigation unit by official Washington, but he would not discuss the attitude of either Senator Wesley L. Jones or Senator Dill.

## ROAD CONTRACT AWARDED

**Ladner Diversion to Be Built at Once**

Official notification has been received by the British Columbia Bridge & Dredging Company, Limited, Standard Bank building, that its tender of \$74,976 for the construction of a new highway diversion across the Ladner marsh has been accepted by the provincial government.

This was the only bid received on this work which comprises the construction of approximately 1.61 miles of new road that will entail a fill of at least 550,000 cubic yards of sand and gravel and probably considerably more.

"This new road will start at a point on the River road near Ladner and will run in a northerly direction across Lots 452 and 471, Group 2, N.W.D., to a point on the main channel of the Fraser that will enable the present Ladner-Woodwards Landing ferry to cut its present running time to considerably less than half."

Construction of a new wharf on the main channel of the river at the north end of the new section of road will be commenced later in the season. This wharf site will have the advantage of deep water at all stages and obviate the frequent dredging that has been necessary for the present landing at Ladner. The road will have a width of 34 feet and the fill will be made largely of river sand, hydraulically graded, and will help to remove a bar near the site of the new wharf. "About five acres of clearing and grubbing will be a necessary preliminary to the fill."

## 14-ROOM SCHOOL PLANS O.K.'D

## MOVE TO SHELVE FISHERIES BILL DEFEATED

### Hanna's Amendment Beaten 30 to 11 on Straight Party Vote

VICTORIA, March 19.—Liberal members moved the division on the bill for Hon. S. L. Howe's fisheries bill on third reading in the legislature this morning.

Mr. A. Hanna, Albernati, declared that the most important part of the act was not printed. All decisions were left to the lieutenant governor-in-council.

There was nothing about how licenses were to be issued or how the canners were to be regulated. There was language in the bill that implied the government intended to dictate indirectly how and by whom fish were to be caught, although this language could not do directly.

"If the minister had given this house and the industry the regulation which he proposed in the bill, he would have done something more useful," said Mr. Hanna.

## BILL DEFENDED

There was nothing in the bill except the conferring of power on the government to do anything with the fishing industry, he declared.

By deferring this bill, Mr. Hanna said, there would be opportunity for the government to arrive at its policy and present a proper bill next session.

Hon. S. L. Howe, commissioner of fisheries, agreed the whole situation was difficult and said he planned to take up the whole question with the Dominion.

## MOTION DEFEATED

All interests favored the province in getting control of fisheries as well as canneries if possible, he said, but while many matters were not settled, the government needed this bill to carry out the jurisdiction conferred on it by the privy council.

Opposition members demanded a formal division and Mr. Hanna's proposed second motion was defeated by a straight party vote of 30 to 11, after which the bill passed.

There is not the slightest possibility, according to Mr. Cribb, that she could now be salvaged.
