away, so that the council may know just where it stands." It has been the custom heretofore, in Vancouver civic financing, for the comptroller to withhold his estimate of sinking fund surpluses until just before the mill rate was struck.

INCREASE GENERAL

Analysis of the individual budgets of the leading civic departments show that the increase in estimated expenditures is general throughout the service.

In the police department the estimated expenditures in 1929 were \$333,836 and the actual expenses were \$556,280. This year's estimates call for the spending of \$1,076,012 in the department.

The relief department shows 1929 estimates of \$268,804 and expenditures of \$362,845. The 1930 budget calls for an allocation of \$585,372.

The fire department was allotted \$894,702 last year, but spent only \$891,428. Chief C. W. Thompson is asking for \$1,129,236 this year. The civic library spent \$100,000 in 1928, exactly the amount of its estimates. The board has asked for \$170,000 for 1930.

SCHOOLS, HOSPITALS

The increase in the school board estimates is comparatively small. Though \$3,115,316 was allocated for schools last year, the amount expended was \$3,081,555. The trustees estimate that they will need \$3,519,348 this year. For grants to hospitals and char-

itable institutions the City Council set aside \$486,600 in 1929 and spent \$480,705. This year's estimate will cost \$624,000, including \$150,000 to be applied to the deficits of Vancouver General Hospital.

The park board estimates last year totaled \$487,700. Expenditures were \$386,896. The 1930 estimates call for \$480,583.

Electrical inspection and street lighting, which were allowed \$272,659 last year, were allowed \$261,623 last year. The estimated cost for this year is \$333,232.

The water department was allotted \$5,471,125 in 1929 and cost \$577,753. This year, if its budget is approved, it will cost \$948,190.

LARGEST ITEM

The largest single item in the budget is, however, fixed charges on borrowed money. The 1929 city council set aside \$3,890,246 to meet fixed charges. The actual disbursements in that year were \$3,977,524. This year the comptroller figures that carrying charges will absorb \$4,744,569 gross, against which he sets estimated sinking fund earnings of \$125,000, leaving net fixed charges of \$4,619,569. As against universal increases in expenditure, the budget shows that the revenues from sources other than the mill rate will gain very little. For,

JAPANESE MAKES NO DEFENSE

Court Discharges Jury After Deliberations of Five and Three-quarter Hours

AFTER an absence from court of five and three-quarter hours, a failure to agree was reported by a jury empaneled at the spring assizes before Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald at trial of Kizo Furoswa, Japanese, charged with the murder of Iwao Akasawa, aboard the freighter Ruyjin Maru on January 30 in Vancouver harbor. The jury retired at ten minutes after four and returned again at 6:25 p.m. On instructions from Mr. Justice Macdonald, the jury again came back into court at 7:00 p.m. and after receiving further instructions, retired and came back into court at 9:25 p.m.

Questioned by the court, Mr. J. H. Weeden, foreman, reported that the jury had come to the conclusion that it was unable to agree on a verdict and accordingly were discharged by his lordship.

DRINKING BOUT ON SHIP

Furoswa was charged with the murder of Iwao Akasawa, storkeeper of the freighter Ruyjin Maru during a drinking bout but did not offer any defense. Mr. J. A. Fletcher, counsel for the accused, stating that Furoswa did not remember anything that took place in the cabin occupied by Furoswa and Akasawa. A few seconds after the shooting Furoswa staggered into an adjoining cabin and informed several other members of the crew that he had "done something wrong."

EVIDENCE OF CREW


Evidence tendered by officers and members of the crew at the preliminary hearing in police court was admitted by Mr. Justice Macdonald when proof was submitted by the crown that the vessel was in the Far East and would not return here for some time. The crown also submitted evidence that no evidence of liquor was found on the ship.

THE general entertaining fund was estimated at \$1500 last year but cost only \$783. The mayor's entertaining fund, which was estimated in 1929 at \$1000, cost \$1068. Both funds are estimated at an even \$1000 this year.

The airport estimates are \$2710 for 1930. The cost of airport administration last year was \$7352. Unemployment relief costs have taken a great jump, partly because the city council must ratify in the 1930 budget extraordinary expenditures incurred since the first of January. The estimate for the year is \$225,792 as against an estimate of \$51,700 for 1929.

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Sidelights on Budget

THE budgets of the police and fire departments, incorporated in the 1930 estimate laid before the city council today, call for expenditures of over \$1,000,000 in each of those branches of the civic service. Fire Chief C. W. Thompson is asking the council for \$1,129,236. Police Chief W. J. Bingham wants \$1,076,012.

- Among the required additions to the fire department are:
1. Two more captains, two more fire wardens and 20 more firemen.
 2. A squad wagon and first-aid car.
 3. Several large pieces of apparatus.
 4. Extensive repairs and alterations to fire halls.
 5. Extensions of the fire alarm service.

REQUIREMENTS OF POLICE DEPT.

- THE police department, through the police commission, is asking for:
1. Ten more patrolmen, in addition to the 40 added to the force since the beginning of 1929.
 2. A painter for the traffic department.
 3. A new clerk.
 4. A new automobile for the chief and five other new cars.
 5. Four new motorcycles.
 6. New traffic signals.
 7. Alterations to the patrol boat.
 8. Three additional horses.
 9. A stable for the horses, which are to be combined a repair and storage garage and a paint shop.

SALARY INCREASES LISTED

SALARY increases under the Britain-Bengough-Winter report will cost \$71,244 in the fire department and \$32,760 in the police department.

An item of \$21,000 for reconditioning the city jail is the largest single appropriation under the heading of "justice department" in the police estimates.

Chief Bingham's salary is listed at \$6000 a year. The deputy chief is paid at the rate of \$3900. Supervisors receive \$250 a month.

Chief Thompson's salary, as increased recently by the city council, is \$5400 a year. The first assistant is \$3240, according to the chief record. The second assistant chief is paid at the rate of \$2880 a year. District chiefs get \$210 a month.

CITY ENGINEER'S DEPT.

In the city engineer's department, the estimate is increased by approximately \$65,000 in the roadways branch, \$12,500 in the sewer branch, \$33,000 in the street cleaning department, \$75,000 for general ward improvements, \$9500 for temporary walks and sundries and \$31,000 in the scavenging branch.

Increases under the salary commission's report will cost \$56,984 in that department.

The expenditures of the health department are estimated to be \$14,071 as against estimates of \$14,328 last year. Of the increase \$6547 is accounted for under salary adjustments. Child hygiene will cost \$3,700 more than in 1929.

JUVENILE COURT, ETC. The salary adjustment item in the budget of the electrical department amounts to \$2628. Notwithstanding an increase of \$1020 in salaries in the juvenile court and Detention home, the estimates of that department are lower than the expenditures for 1929, and only \$930 higher than the 1929 estimates.

THE EXPENDITURE OF THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT are estimated to be \$140,151 as against estimates of \$114,326 last year. Of the increase \$947 is accounted for under salary adjustments. Child hygiene will cost \$3,700 more than in 1929.

JUVENILE COURT, ETC.
 The salary adjustment item in the budget of the judicial department amounts to \$2828.

Notwithstanding an increase of \$1020 in salaries in the juvenile court and Detention home, the estimates of that department are lower than the expenditures for 1929, and only \$330 higher than the 1929 estimates.

The greater part of the \$70,000 additional asked for by the Library board is for the establishment of branch libraries in Point Grey and Vancouver South.

In the Park board budget, allowance is made for salary increases totalling \$17,755.

Under the general heading of finance, which includes the civic services which are not grouped under separate departments, the estimated expenditure for 1930 is \$748,208, as against actual expenditures of \$788,696 last year. The 1929 estimate was \$702,860.

No provision is made in the budget.

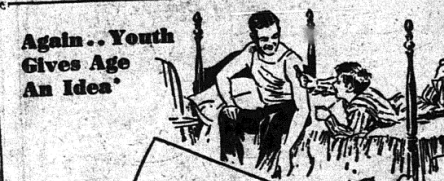
