**HANDRAIL MISSED AT 30 FEET UP**  
**Tragic End of Local Musician and War Hero**

HERBERT E. ELLIS, fireman, musician and war hero, was fatally injured at 30 feet from an aerial ladder during practice manoeuvres on Beach avenue, near the Cascade laundry premises.

His head struck an iron bar on the ladder track, and less than two hours later he died at St. Paul's hospital from a fractured skull.

The victim, who was 38 years old, leaves a widow and four children, residing at 215 East Seventeenth avenue.

**MISSED HAND-RAIL**

Fireman Ellis was the driver of the truck, which is equipped with an 80-foot aerial ladder.

Under the direction of Fire Captain A. Condon and W. F. Fox, he was practicing with a squad from No. 2 Fire Hall.

The tragedy occurred as he descended thirty feet above the truck he held on one of the rungs.

The witness Herbert Ellis, fireman, has a distinguished record in the service of his country and in the Vancouver fire department.

**FINE WAS RECORDED**  
 During the early months of the Great War he enlisted with the 48th Battalion from Victoria. He was afterwards machine gun instructor and was promoted to the rank of sergeant-major after he was transferred to the Motor Machine Gun corps.

As a member of the local fire-fighting force on May 24, 1920, serving most of the time at No. 2 hall.

A talented athlete, fireman Ellis had, for several years, been a member of the Vancouver Fire Department's band.

His versatility, energy and affable manner made him a popular figure among the firemen and a respected superior officer considered him an efficient and reliable officer.

**STRAY IDENTIFIED BY PARENTS**

He is now away in his boat, and efforts are being made to find him.

Until he is found nothing is known of where or what condition the canoe was picked up. It lies on the wharf empty and with its painter missing.

Whether it was found in such condition as to imply that it had capsized or was found at anchor at the wharf in the same condition as the canoe was found late Sunday afternoon, Mr. J. Smith of Duncan.

Mr. Cumliffe put Mrs. Plant on the witness stand as directing their inquiries at the moment.

**BELIEVE THEY ARE MARBOONED**

If the boat was floating head up with or with a certain amount of water in it the fate of the three youths, Charles Westman, Oedric Morrison and George Smith would be only too plain.

If it is floating high and dry as Mrs. Nelson described it, the mystery of the boys' disappearance is deeper than ever.

A newspaper publication drawn by members of the families from the Passage Island incident was that the canoe had got adrift while the boys were ashore some place, thus supporting the theory that they may be marooned.

**POSITIVE IDENTIFICATION**

Upon the provincial police being notified this forenoon of an unclaimed green canoe lying on the Gore avenue wharf, Mr. J. B. Smith, father of George, Ian Morrison, brother Oedric, and Miss Westman, sister of Charles, proceeded to the wharf and all positively identified the craft.

Certain patches and other details made the identification unmistakable.

**Woman 'Victimized' by Go-Between in Marks Case**

NANAIMO, April 17.—A sensation was caused in Justice court here today when Mr. Justice D. A. Macdonald advised Mrs. A. Plant of Vancouver that she should lay a charge of theft against a man named Kelly, of Vancouver.

"It is in my opinion the meanest trick I have heard of," remarked the judge.

The incident occurred after Mr. F. S. Cumliffe, counsel for A. Mark of Vancouver, was given permission to produce new evidence before sentence was passed on his client who had been found guilty of theft of \$4000 from Mr. J. Smith of Duncan.
