

Cricket Batsmen Do Well

Two Centuries Scored by Local Players in Saturday's League Play

Heavy scoring featured the mainstay of the B. C. Mainland Cricket League Saturday, during which M. M. Graves, playing for Point Grey, compiled 145 against North Shore, the highest individual score of the season, the previous high being 142 by Lawrence Smith for Brockton Point, also contributed a spectacular 125 against Burrard B.

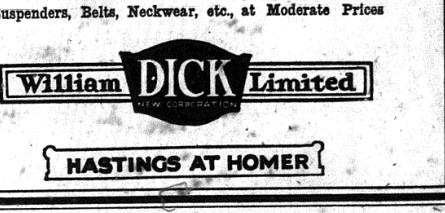
