ANXIETY AROUSED FOR DO-X

Great Seaplane Is Reported Down on French Coast

LE BOURGET, Nov. 14.—It was reported here late today that the DO-X had landed at 5:05 p.m. near Saales D'Olonne.

ROCHFORD-SUR-MER, France, Nov. 14.—The aeronautic station late today received a message reporting the landing near Saales of a giant hydro-airplane, believed to be the DO-X.

The report said the seaplane was navigating the surface of the water under its own power.

PARIS, Nov. 14.—The French Air Ministry at eight o'clock tonight said it had received no confirmation of a Bordeaux report that the DO-X had landed at St. Nazaire.

NORTH HOF BORDEAUX, Nov. 14.—The chief harbor master at Bordeaux told the Associated Press tonight that the German seaplane DO-X had alighted at Hourdin Pond, St. Nazaire.

The DO-X took off from Calshot, England, at 11:45 o'clock this morning (London time) for Bordeaux, 400 miles away, in continuation of its trans-Atlantic flight to New York.

Two Bank Robbers to Serve Five Years. Bank Bandits Draw Heavy Sentences and Will Be Whipped

COURT SESSION SETS RECORD

Twenty-one men found guilty of crimes during the Fall Assizes were sentenced to a total of 87 years and 75 lashes by Chief Justice Morrison this morning.

Lashes were imposed on seven men—four cases were of bank holdups, two of distributing drugs, and one of assault.

The court was particularly severe in dealing with drug offenders and bank robbers. He tempered justice with mercy, however, when he meted out sentences to drug addicts.

Sentences were as follows: Michael P. Moran and J. W. Haybaker, unlawful assault, six months each. Harry Laird, assault to commit grievous bodily harm, one year.

George Mackey, assaulting victim, suspended sentence. Anthony Morrison, breaking and entering, 5 years. Tony Brown, possession of drugs, 6 years.

Ruben Duncan, assault to commit grievous bodily harm, 2 years and 5 lashes. Martin R. Scott, breaking and entering, 3 years. George K. Richardson and Richard C. Merrill, blackmail, 5 years each.

William Sigmond and Ralph Humphries, Royal Bank of Canada hold-up, 5 years and 10 lashes each. William Sigmond, J. W. McKenzie and Charles Keating, attempted hold-up and attempted murder in connection with the great Canadian bank, 5 years and 10 lashes each.

Sigmond's sentences in years are to run concurrently. He will receive a total of 20 lashes. H. A. Erickson, found guilty with the other trio, 3 years. John McNeilson, attempted breaking and entering, 2 years. Chin Poy Lim, possession of drugs, 3 years and a fine of \$500, or an additional three months.

Gordon Riddell, manslaughter, 2 years. Herbert F. Perry, manslaughter, 4 years. Charles Marino and Frank C. Yipp, distributing drugs, 5 years and 10 lashes each.

JAPANESE PREMIER WOUNDED

Bullet of Assassin Strikes Hamaguchi in Abdomen

By Associated Press TOKYO, Nov. 14.—Yuko Hamaguchi, premier of Japan and lion of politics, was wounded, was shot and seriously wounded today by a young man identified as a member of a reactionary patriotic organization.

Hamaguchi fell before the assassin's shot as he walked across the train platform of the Tokyo Central Station.

The assailant, Tomoe Saguro, 22, stepped out of the crowd lining the platform and fired from a distance of six feet. Without a sound, the premier clapped his hand to the wound in his abdomen.

The police pounced upon Saguro and he was immediately subjected to a grilling. Officers remained silent as to the identity of the assassin.

Saguro was said to be a member of the Alkohanka, or "Love of Country Association."

Hamaguchi was carried to the station first-aid office while his aides and members of the cabinet were summoned. He remained there more than three hours, during which time he was given a transfusion of blood.

Hamaguchi was taken to the Imperial University Hospital where he was given another blood transfusion and subjected to an operation in which a part of the small intestine was removed.

RECOVERY EXPECTED The bullet had struck the member of the cabinet in the abdomen and lodged in the left hip. Because of his condition, he was expected to remain in the hospital for several days.

"I think that he will lecture right at my door," writes another. "I wish to see him. Will he be there?—Myself and as many of my friends as I can get."

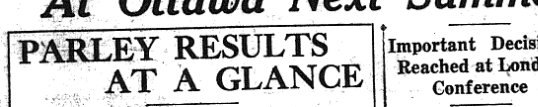

ANOTHER AIRPLANE MISSING

3 Vancouver Men in Burke Search Unreported

SAN DIEGO, Nov. 14.—Two amphibian planes took off from the naval base at North Island at 7:56 o'clock this morning for a search for the missing plane.

Still another missing plane is added to the two already lost in the north. The Junkers seaplane CP-ALX piloted by R. J. Van der Byl and co-pilot by A. J. Jones and H. E. Crowley, who left Vancouver Sunday to take part in the search for Capt. Burke.

The Junkers was last reported as leaving Prince George for the north on the afternoon of Nov. 12. It is reported that it should have reached Atlin Wednesday afternoon, but it is unreported.

OUT OF TOUCH After leaving Prince George the party would be lost to touch in Vancouver until they reached Atlin, where they travelled far to the east of the Selkirk range to the east of the Cascade and Wenatchee ranges. There is a possibility that the plane has been downed in one of the northern lakes.

STOPS FOR REPAIRS The amphibian plane, piloted by W. J. Barrows and Harry Blunt, arrived at Atlin on Wednesday afternoon. Apparently the plane was being serviced over the weekend at Atlin.
