WASHINGTON Nov. 17.—Cheerful news for Canadian readers is contained in the weekly report of the Department of Commerce.

On information from the Dominion, the department notes that Canadian exports of automotive products show a slight improvement while Canadian lumber exports for the fiscal year are up.

Automotive exports from Canada for which New Zealand and South Africa were the best buyers increased in October number 18 per cent over those for August.

Fool-proof Machines Used To Record and Add Votes



Voters Simply Pull a Lever; 'Robot' Does the Rest

Voting machines were used in Seattle for its 406 precincts in the last Congressional election. The picture shows how voters register their preferences simply by pulling down small levers which stand above cards bearing the names of the candidates. The machines are fool-proof. They give the result of the poll instantly at the end of the day. They obviate errors in counting ballots. And they do away with spoiled ballots.

The machine itself is a tabulating mechanism, modified on the adding machine. As the individual total is increased, the picture on the tape, however, is concealed until the poll closes, a registering disk or bar chime. When the vote has been cast, the curtain is drawn, the picture appears.
